Workers set to shift from Holcomb to Waldon as...

Summer season construction slows traffic

The "stop" and "slow" parade on Holcomb Road should not have to proceed much longer, as paving was expected to begin this week.

Motorists have encountered delays including extended stretches of one-lane traffic - because of the water main and storm sewer project, which includes new curbs and pavement.

Gary Tressel, of the engineering firm of Hubbell, Roth and Clark, said pre-paving grading was scheduled to begin Tuesday, with asphalt coming Tuesday and Wednesday. After a break for the Independence Day weekend, workers will be back to finish the street and driveway aprons next week.

Spring rains delayed construction a bit, but recent weeks have seen better

"It's gone as well as can be expected for a project of this magnitude," Tressel said.

The impact of the Holcomb construction has also been felt on Main Street (M-15), and in at least four cases last week it was literal impact. Clarkston Police Chief Ernest Combs said four rear-end crashes happened, including one in which a driver was taken to the hospital.

"The traffic on Main Street has

slowed considerably," Combs said.

While he doesn't necessarily endorse it. Combs admits that many motorists use Holcomb south of Washington as an alternate route to Dixie Highway and White Lake Road. The Holcomb construction has shifted more vehicles onto M-15, he said.

Part of the confusion for motorists, Combs said, is the lack of warning to drivers that Holcomb is under construction. That is a duty under the jurisdiction of the Road Commission for Oakland County, he said.

"They don't have proper signage on that," he said, especially for those coming from White Lake Road to the south. "Once they drive through [the construction] they don't come back."


Combs has particular sympathy for the people who live on and near Holcomb.

"It's a real mess over there," he said, "but the light is at the end of the tunnel and it's looking brighter every day."

Tressel said he hasn't heard much in the way of complaints or questions about traffic delays.

'It's been more, 'What will it be like when it's finished?" he said.

When the Holcomb work is finished, much of the construction focus in Clarkston will shift to Waldon Road just east of M-15, where materials are already

in place for a similar street project. Tressel said the entire project is scheduled to be complete by October.

In the meantime, crews ask for continued patience as street work continues.

"Sometimes people step on the gas a little too much after being delayed,"

Tressel said. "Slow down and give the workers a little room. It would be appre-

Combs has the same advice, regardless of the location.

"Be particularly patient when driving through town," the chief said.

Skateboard complaints call for police action

A rash of complaints regarding skateboarders in the downtown area has led the Clarkston police chief to draft a revised ordinance to deal with the problem, but local skateboarders are none too pleased.

The current ordinance prohibits only biking or similar devices on Main Street. Chief Ernest Combs wants to clarify the wording to include skateboarding as well as in-line skates, which have also become a problem. The ordinance would also prohibit skateboarding on structures above ground.

Ever since the landscape wall was built at the Washington and Main streets municipal parking lot, Combs said, there's been a problem with skateboarders jumping off of it. The same has been said about the flower boxes at Depot Park. There are already abrasions on the new planter walls at the park because of skateboarding.

More than the damage, Combs is concerned about injury. He said the kids try to emulate professional extreme sport athletes, jumping off railings, stairs and walls, and eventually someone will get hurt.

"I'm not anti-skateboard," he assures. but wishes skateboarders would take their sport to the skateboard park in Ortonville or Waterford.

Combs has taken a half dozen citizen complaints about the skateboarding.


He hopes the revised draft will be approved at the next City Council meeting, July 14. City Attorney Thomas Ryan will review the draft in the meantime.

If anyone under the age of 17 violates the revised ordinance, which would be a civil infraction, Combs said the skateboard will be confiscated and their parents will have to pick up the skate-

Clarkston High schoolers and skateboard enthusiasts Alexx Keesling, Aaron Winston, Jon Guibord and Aaron Engler, all 15, aren't happy with the proposed ordinance.

"We need a place to skate," Engler said. Of going to a nearby skate park, he said, "How are we going to get there?"

"It was a wonderful time," Judy said. And all agree.



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

New house, driveway would destroy wetland: residents

To the developer, it's a simple matter of building a house. To some neighbors, it's a threat to the environment.

A proposed house on W. Princeton near Dartmouth has residents doing a lot of homework and lodging protests with various officials.

Sharon Vaughn's property, in the northeast corner of Independence Township, backs up on a designated wetland on which developer Dan Vackaro proposes to build a 10-by-30-foot driveway leading to the proposed three-bedroom home.

She and others along Dartmouth believe the fill will destroy the "functioning wetland" and add problems in an area with a history of flooding and septic failure.

"Everyone is really concerned," Vaughn said. "If my kid gets West Nile Virus because that becomes a stagnant pond, he's going to be held accountable for that."

There are other issues, including what Vaughn calls an "illegal fill" off of W. Princeton onto both her property and the wetland (which she also claims is likely not fully measured because of recent dry years).

The adventure began in August 2002, when Vaughn was away visiting family.

"My husband called me up at 8 in the morning because there was a bulldozer in the backyard," she said.

Mike Post, who lives a couple doors north from Vaughn, experienced something similar when a front-end loader came through his Dartmouth property to gain access to the shores of the wetland for soil tests.

Post doesn't blame the contractors, but said no one asked permission to come through his property.

"They were being told they had access," Vaughn said.

Post is grateful for Vaughn's hard work, especially because of the potential impact to his property

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Since the property is zoned for residential building, Vaughn said the contrac-

tors may have done them a favor.

"We would have had no knowledge of any of this, except for the dozer and things like that."

Since that time, Vaughn has filed Freedom of Information Act requests to learn more details, including the fact that Vackaro was hired by the nonresident owner, who purchased the property in a tax-default sale and hopes to sell the developed property.

"The whole transfer of property is dependent on it being developable," Vaughn said. "This is basically just somebody trying to make a quick buck and not caring about anything else."

Vaughn, a former wildlife refuge manager with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is also frustrated that the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality failed to block the development. She said she has documentation of valuable wildlife and vegetation that needs to be preserved, and argues for strict enforcement of a 25-foot buffer requirement.

"We have to be responsible to make sure the builder builds things that won't impact our property? How did that happen? Why do I have to be held accountable?"

Vackaro doesn't deny the profit motive, but does contest the claim that he will destroy the environment.

"It's only a little wetland," he said.
"I'm just filling in a tiny part. It's as small as I can get it. It was the only alternative. Otherwise the guy's stuck with a lot he has to pay taxes on and can't build on."

Vackaro said the owner offered to sell the 1.3-acres site to the Dartmouth neighbors (and is still willing to sell), but they declined. In fact, he is still willing to sell the property.

"They didn't want to buy it, but they all want to dictate it," he said. "The only reason it's a big fuss is because it's ruining their back yard."

Vackaro said Vaughn has a split rail fence encroaching onto the property in question, and Post has a storage shed that encroaches as well. Both admit that is true, but Vaughn said Vackaro came onto her property with the W. Princeton fill.

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

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

Property owners soon to receive tax bills

Property owners should receive their 2003 summer tax bills by the first week of July. Please contact the Treasurer's Office if you did not receive your bill.

Property owners without an escrow account will receive the actual bill. Property owners that have an escrow account will receive a copy of the bill for your records. Payment of the bill covers from July 1, 2003 to June 30, 2004 for all education related taxes. The bills are payable through Sept. 14 without penalty.

This year the State Education Tax will be five mills instead of the normal six mills. Yes, you are reading it right - a reduction. The State of Michigan, which authorizes local municipalities to collect the SET, has reduced the levy for one year only.

The set is collected statewide and becomes part of the State aid formula to equalize spending on students state-wide. The reduction came about through negotiations to require all municipalities to collect the set on a summer tax.

Starting in 2003 the SET will be collected by all municipalities in a summer tax collection. Independence Township residents will not see any changes since all school millages are already collected in a summer tax.



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
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Clarkston graduate competes in Junior Miss program

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

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The freedom to say, 'It is wrong'

In this culture of tolerance, diversity and independent thought, it seems one can say almost anything except: "It is wrong."

Anyone with the audacity to say a certain behavior, practice or policy is "wrong" incurs the wrath of people who believe the only thing to be considered "wrong" is to say something is "wrong."

Recent events suggest even the law has lost its power to say something is "wrong."

Throughout history, a number of sources have helped us determine what is "right" and "wrong." One by one, however, those sources have been diminished in their authority.

Moral authorities such as the Bible and the Judeo-Christian ethic have been relegated to the scrap heap of antiquities, despite their having stood the test of time for centuries.

History itself seems irrelevant, despite examples such as the Roman Empire and other civilizations whose power and dominance crumbled in direct proportion with their declining moral standards.

Science has not lost its appeal, but we now have folks changing the rules and the definition of terms. The current mantra appears to be, "We are God." If we can create our own reality, we can forget other realities (such as the difference between "right" and

Even the concept of civilization seems archaic according to our advanced sense of enlightenment. The word used to indicate a society with recognition of moral limits and responsibilities. Being "civil" seems low on the list, if on the list at all, to many climbing the ladder of "success."

Then there's what used to be considered the supreme standard of our land, the Constitution of the United States.

Various courts — including the U.S. Supreme Court — have gone beyond their statutory mandate to rule according to the law and the Constitution, instead ruling based on twisted legal definitions and prevailing cultural attitudes.

Over the years, judges have been allowed to serve as legislators, effectively creating concepts such as "separation of church and state" and "right to privacy," neither of which can be found in the Constitution.

Other concepts, such as the 10th Amendment provision giving states the authority to govern themselves on issues not specifically covered in the Constitution, are largely ignored. And the only "freedom of expression" mentioned in the Constitution is that of freedom of religion which...well...we can't go much farther without the risk of offending someone...

Perhaps we shouldn't be surprised when folks believe the only absolute truth is the lack of absolute truth, and the only standard of ethical measurement is, "It depends." The next logical step is to lobby for more tolerance when someone claims two plus two equals five.

Some of us, however, will continue to exercise our First Amendment rights to cite standards of moral authority and, when appropriate, proclaim, "It is wrong."

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Local sergeant trains for homeland security

Sergeant Schipani spends two days in dive training

With homeland security in mind, Springfield Township Sergeant Frank Schipani recently spent two days of dive training in a collaboration project with more than 15 police agencies.

"We had been planning this for six months," Schipani, of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD), said. The 55-year-old is the OCSD Dive Team co-leader and instructor. He has been diving since he was 12 years old and has been on the 12-member Dive Rescue Team for 25 years. "Lt. Joan Morrow, of the Detroit Dive Team, initiated the plan and set it in motion."

For the homeland security training, which took place June 17 and 18 on the Detroit River, the OCSD, Detroit Police, and 15 other agencies including Border Patrol and Canadian police came together in a joint effort.

"The idea was if terrorists attacked along the Detroit River we could respond and act as a group," Schipani said.

It was a two-day scenario set up as if someone had bombed the Detroit-Windsor tunnel.

"We're trying to prepare in case something did ever happen on the bridge or at the Renaissance Center."

Six vehicles and various car debris such as hoods and bumpers as well as mannequins and fake body parts were placed in the river.

The dive teams had to first grid the river on paper and set up a plan of attack. Then they sunk anchors from the rescue boats and worked off of ropes to recover the items. The OCSD furnished the equipment for the training dive.

"There were a few problems," Schipani said.

Once in the water, the strong current proved to be a challenge, visibility was limited to only 12 to 18 inches, and recovery was difficult because of a 12 foot drop from the surface to the river.

"But all-in-all we completed our mission. All the vehicles were recovered and most of the stuff that was in the river."

The training was taxing, Schipani said. "We spent long days. I'd leave here at 6:30 in the morning to get there at 8 a.m. and didn't get home until 7 p.m."

After the training was completed, the agencies were able to evaluate what went right and what needed improvement during the simulation.

"It was a good chance to work together and find our weaknesses and strengths."

Another joint effort is being discussed for next year. In regards to keeping Michigan safe from terrorists, Schipani said, "We are a lot better prepared now. We have the ability to use the dive team and other teams and work together. It's a nice pool to draw from."





"It was Labor Day and they were having Clarkston Days with sidewalk sales and a small carnival," Buck said. "It was a great community and a great opportunity.'


In 1983, the couple moved their business to 64 N. Main in an attempt for more room in addition to the fact they wanted to be on Main Street.

track of and I couldn't do it as well as I wanted to. About five years ago we decided just to concentrate on jewelry here at this location and rent the other rooms out to businesses," Buck said.

"There were a lot of retail stores when we first started out. There was a lot of walk up business up and down Main Street," Buck

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

that, whenever I so will, I can make small gifts of time and other things to people I love?



have ever seen," according to Kopietz.

"They have really helped downtown and really made an effort to have events downtown," Buck said.

Buck also has another interesting comment about shopping in downtown Clarkston.

"Clarkston has plenty of parking downtown, but it is just not utilized properly. They need to make parking more visible and put up signs so people know where it is at," Buck said.

Despite the growth and maturation of his adopted hometown, Buck still looks fondly at the tight-knit community he remembers from years ago.

"The kind of community that you could literally depend on everyone. We all really got along with each other," Buck said.

Buck shares a story about the time Morgan's caught on fire and Fire Chief Tink Ronk called Joan and said they had 15 minutes to evacuate. Joan was horrified since both the upstairs and downstairs were stocked full of merchandise.

However the people of Clarkston came to the rescue. Numerous residents cleared the store out in 15 minutes putting the merchandise in their trunks or storage space for safekeeping.

"They literally cleared out the entire place. I mean, they were throwing stuff out of the upstairs window with people on the ground catching the merchandise," Buck said. "We took inventory after the event and with all the people involved we only lost a few broken glasses. It was incredible but that was the kind of community it was."

Buck is quick to point out life in Clarkston is still pretty good.

"The growth has not been all bad. There are a lot of nice people who have come into our community. They are starting to come back downtown which has a lot of benefits for people. They run into people they have not seen in awhile and catch up on how things are going," Buck said.

Buck and Joan keep busy with their two businesses, they also own a bed and breakfast in town, but still find time to be help the community. They are currently collecting food for Lighthouse at their store and have many exciting events in the planning stages.

The couple has been active in Clarkston since they moved here.

Buck has served on numerous boards including being president of the Chamber. Joan started the Clarkston Area Arts Council and also kept the Concerts in the Park alive for a few years after the Downtown Business Association had disintegrated.

"If you are in southeast Michigan I can't think of a better place to live than Clarkston," Buck said. "We love being a part of the community."


