New state laws on drunk driving welcome by locals

Clarkston Police Chief Ernest Combs welcomes new state standards for defining drunken driving, scheduled to take effect Oct. 1.

"This is something that has been needed for a long time," Combs said. "My officers are very vigorous in looking for intoxicated drivers."

To protect the state's eligibility for federal road dollars, the Michigan Legislature last month lowered the allowable blood alcohol level from 0.10 percent to 0.08 percent. Beginning Oct. 1, anyone who registers the new standard on a preliminary breath test is subject to arrest for operating under the influence of alcohol.

According to state Rep. John Stakoe (R-Highland Township), the new law is good legislation.


"There's no question that people's driving abilities are significantly impaired at 0.08," Stakoe said.


According to information from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, a driver can experience "divided attention" at a level as little as 0.02 percent BAC. "Emergency responses" can be compromised at 0.04 percent, and "concentrated attention" and "speed control" are impaired at 0.08 percent.

The degree of intoxication varies according to one's body weight. NHTSA says a male who weighs 170 pounds will reach the 0.07 percent BAC level after four drinks within one hour (one drink being considered 0.54 ounces of alcohol). A female weighing 137 pounds will reach the 0.08 percent BAC level after three drinks in one hour.

The current law allows police to prosecute for "impaired" driving if a driver registers "above" 0.07

## Survivor hopes to inspire others

Two years ago, the community rallied to help Lu Kuhta in her fight against bone cancer.

She won that fight, and now hopes the community will rally to help provide scholarships for others.

The WolfPack AAU basketball program will host what they are calling the Lu Kuhta Scholarship Fundraiser Friday Aug. 22. It's a full circle, of sorts, for the now 15-year-old who has successfully recovered from a rare type of osteosarcoma, or bone cancer.

"All my cancer's gone. Everything's great," Kuhta said. "It's great to know that I inspired a lot of people," It's uncertain how much the teen will do at the

#### in February of this year.

"This girl has never complained," Mellen said, despite more than 20 surgeries and chemotherapy. "She's doing great."

**Date Error** 

The first fund-raiser was an "outpouring" from the community, Mellen said. In addition to cash donations, came great raffle donations, including an autographed hockey stick from Detroit Red Wings great Gordie Howe.

The plan for this tourney is to raise money for scholarships for youths who have participated in the WolfPack program (designed for girls age 10 and up). Mellen said a majority of Clarkston High School's varsity players were in the AAU program. Kuhta's future in athletics is still a bit uncertain, but she has already engaged in bicycling as part of her physical therapy. (She has regained an estimated 85 to 90 percent of her mobility.) Bicycling has special meaning now, as she recently received a hat from Tour d'France champion and fellow caneer survivor Lance Armstrong.

fundraiser golf outing. She may putt on a couple greens, but it seems her presence alone will mean a lot.

"Mr. Mellen is in charge," she said with a smile. "I just do what he tells me."

"Mr. Mellen" is WolfPack coach and tournament organizer Jack Mellen, who loves to sing the youth's praises and also praises those who helped with the fund-raiser two years ago to help the family with medical expenses.

"Lu has always been a great athlete," he said. "She was as good an athlete as I'd ever seen."

Mellen tells of the origin of that unique first name. The teen's real name is Laura, but she shortened it to "Lu" when applying for an all-boys hockey team. When the cancer was diagnosed, it was the beginning of a hard road. In 2001 Kuhta required "radical surgery" involving the removal of the inside of her knee and replacement with metal. Eventually an infection required a virtual duplication of the surgery

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Golf and doubles tennis are possibilities for the comeback kid.

"The only thing I really can't do is high impact sports," she said. "I'm fine with that."

That doesn't mean her basketball talent will go to waste. Mellen said Kuhta may coach younger girls in the WolfPack program.

"It's something I've always wanted to try," she said. "I'm going to give it a shot and see how I like it."

Father Joe Kuhta gives credit to God and many friends for the progress his daughter has made.

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## Out of touch for 20 years... Old roommate donates kidney to Clarkston man

Clarkston News Staff Writer It was a chance encounter that ended up saving a life.

Nearly 20 years had passed since Clarkston resident Jerry Blackstone and Florida resident Kenneth Belsley, former Western Michigan University roommates, had been in touch.

But it wasn't too long to help out a friend in need.

Blackstone, 45, was diagnosed with kidney disease in 1996. He was having headaches and noticed a difference in his urine, so he went for testing which determined the disease. At that time both kidneys were 50 percent deteriorated.

"I wasn't really surprised. It's in my family. My father died at 31 of the disease, five years before they had dialysis." His sister also found out she had high protein in her urine, but never was diagnosed with the disease.

"My reaction was to deal with it," Blackstone said, who has lived in Clarkston since 1997 and has four kids, Kristin, 22, Tommy, 20, Nick, 17, and Chad, 13. "If you're dealt a hand, you just deal with it. My positive mental attitude is very strong. You choose your attitude. My favorite quote is 'Attitudes are contagious. Is yours worth catching?""

Diagnosis brought on a restricted low sodium, low protein diet and medication for the next three years. Within another year he was on dialysis three days a week, four hours a day.

Remaining positive, Blackstone said, "Dialysis doesn't mean life has to stop. Theoretically you are considered handicap. But I didn't slow down." A sales manager for Hilti, a construction tool and supply company where he has been employed for 22 years, Blackstone took his computer and cell phone to dialysis and continued to work.

His attitude was so impressive, a doctor at dialysis asked Blackstone to talk with other patients who weren't handling their diagnosis as well, and he did.

Dialysis continued for three years.

Blackstone had been placed on a donor recipient list and had seven people step up as a potential donor, including wife Lori, who was the first to be tested. Though she was a blood type match, she was dismissed because of a minor problem.

"They take great care in that donors are perfect," she said.

Some potential donors Blackstone had just met, which particularly touched him. One of Lori's longtime girlfriends' husband offered to donate his kidney, and Blackstone and he had never met until one recent New Years Eve party.

"These gestures are deep," Blackstone said, "It made me look at things a little differently about coming to one's side to help them. They are giving up a part of their body to help another, it's phenomenal."

lives just east of Tampa, and is the father of Jessica, 16, Jennelle, 12 and Morgan, 8. "If I have the opportunity to help someone out, I'll do it."

"It was unbelievable," Blackstone said. "Someone I hadn't talked to for years. And he was really confident this would happen and we could do this."

"I had a gut feeling we could do this," Belsley, 45, said, who beginning in November went through about six months of testing.

"I told him at any time he could change his mind," Blackstone said.

"I did have second thoughts. I couldn't believe it was really happening. But I was not not gonna do it," Belsley admitted.

On January 16, 2003 Blackstone received a call that there was a cadaver donor and he was needed at the hospital in two to three hours. Blackstone called family and friends. He called Ken to tell him he was "off the hook."

But not too long after, the hospital called back. There was a mistake. The cadaver had Hepatitis C, which they had missed before calling Blackstone.

"It was so hard calling everyone back, especially

other on stretchers in the hospital. "We did it brother," Belsley said.

But in recovery, Blackstone's kidney began functioning improperly. "That was my biggest fear, that Ken did all this and now it wasn't working."

After the fourth day in the hospital, though, the kidney started to respond again and Blackstone was sent home after four more days. Since then, recovery has been "a piece of cake."

The story was not the same for Belsley who had severe complications following the surgery. After being sent home, he was rushed to the hospital where it was found he had bile fluid in his blood. "I was in major pain. There was definitely fear going through me.

Blackstone said, "I couldn't enjoy a successful transplant because I'm home and the donor is in the hospital."

Belsley was released after a 10 day stay. Recovery has been long for Belsley, and just in the last couple of weeks he has been feeling back to normal.

After everyone was back on their feet again, the Blackstones hosted a "Celebrate Life" party, to have the extended Belsley and Blackstone families meet each other. "It was real nice, very emotional." "We feel like we are so blessed to have this miracle happen," Lori said. "Jerry handled the whole thing so amazingly. He has a tremendous positive attitude. He never once complained. He is an inspiration to me because of his courage." Lori said she hopes her husband's story inspires others to do what Belsley did. "How many lives could be saved?"

Meanwhile, Belsley, who is in heavy commercial construction, ran across a Hilti employee on Belsley's work site last fall. It was revealed he was a former co-worker of Blackstone. So, Belsley got Blackstone's phone number and decided to call and catch up.

In September 2002, "I was sitting at dialysis doing my work when I got a call on my cell phone. It was my old college roommate seeing how I was doing. He had no idea (about the kidney disease)."

"Generally I don't discuss my health issues, but in catching up I told him about my health. He didn't say anything (about becoming a donor) at that time. We just caught up and exchanged numbers."

A week later, Belsley called and asked, "How do I

go about seeing if I'm a donor match."

"It was not a hard decision to make. Jerry's a great guy. It was my responsibility to help out at the time," Belsley said, who was raised in Michigan, now

Ken.

It eventually got down to the final scan test for Belsley. Blackstone said, "Finally I asked, I just had to, I said, 'Have you heard about the scan?'

Belsley said he would call back in a few minutes after he called the hospital.

"He called back in five minutes and says to me, 'How does May 14 sound?' I said, 'What do you mean?"

"To do the surgery," Belsley clarified.

Blackstone's reaction was a simple, "Excuse me?" May 14 was only two weeks away. He expected at

least a month to schedule a surgery.

"I said, 'Okay, May 14 sounds wonderful.' And that was it."

On Wednesday morning, May 14, Belsley went into a two and a half hour surgery, prior to Jerry's three and a half hour surgery at the University of Michigan Medical Center in Ann Arbor.

Afterwards Belsley and Blackstone passed each

"It's a tremendous feeling helping someone like that; life changing," Belstey said.

In college, Belsley and Blackstone had thought it ironic they both had Suzuki 500 motorcycles. After graduation, Blackstone gave the bike to his roommate for parts.

"He brought that up to me. Here it is 20 years later and he says, 'You gave me motorcycle parts, now I'm giving you body parts.' We laughed at that. What an analogy.'

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# School board president to promote 'civility, respect'

Clarkston News Staff Writer Karen Foyteck gives a relatively short answer when describing the role of a school board president.

"I always laugh and say I'm a traffic cop," she said, "which really means I run the meeting."

Foyteck was elected president of the Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education last month, succeeding outgoing president Kurt Shanks. Now beginning her 12th year on the board, Foyteck has served as president before, as well as secretary and vice president.

During those years, she has noticed a misunderstanding she hopes can be clarified.

"There are some ceremonial things where you're asked to represent the board," she said. "But I have no supernatural powers, and I only have one vote like everyone else."

Further, there are limits as to what those votes can do, she said.

"Most people do not understand that school boards don't micromanage the district. We're a governance board that sets policy."

Foyteck's duties include meeting with Superintendent Al Roberts to determine items to be placed on each meeting's agenda, then ensuring each board member has agenda materials in advance.

That leads to more efficient board meetings, she said.

"Our board members are prepared," she said. "You don't see them reading

their packet when they come in."

Foyteck was a teacher before she had children, and a concerned parent after she quit teaching. Participation in PTA/PTO and athletic boosters was a springboard to elected office.

"I've always been active in school events," she said. "That grew into an interest in board activities."

Foyteck echoes concerns voiced by others in public education. Among those are funding, both sources and amounts. She credits the board's budget planning, begun three years ago when officials said the district's fund equity needed to be increased.

"It was too low, should there be a disastrous need," she said, and that was prior to rumblings of budget cuts from Lansing. "From that standpoint, we were ahead of the game. We're in good shape, but we're still concerned [about the future]."

The issue of standardized tests is also on Foyteck's list. She called the Michigan Educational Assessment Program "a tiny snapshot" which does not necessarily give the big picture.

"I understand the need to measure, but I think we need to be cognizant of what we're looking at," she said. "We all want all of our children to read and read well. We don't mind being held to the mark, but we would like it to be a fair and equitable mark."

The new president doesn't expect her style of gavel to be much different

Clarkston News Staff Writer Two local men were arrested on several charges including larceny and breaking and entering for crimes committed on Monday, July 29 in the Independence Woods mobile home park on Mann.

Zachary Barron, 18, and Jason Spencer, 19, entered several unlocked vehicles and used force to break into others. They stole several items from the cars, which were recovered.

When deputies caught them in action, Spencer fled the scene, reports stated.

Barron, of Waterford, remained at the scene, was arrested, and confessed. He was arraigned the next day at the 52-2 District Court in Clarkston and was given a \$5,000 bond.

Detective Lonnie Mullins of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Independence Township substation said Barron posted bail and was released from custody.

than past presidents. She has some goals, however.

"We'll conduct business in a professional manner, with civility and respect for each other's opinions," she said. "It will be thorough, and I'd like to think user-friendly."

Foyteck also believes the school board has a track record of being professional and cordial, even when there is controversy or disagreement.

"When the vote is taken and the meeting's over, everyone still respects and is friendly with everyone else."

A particular challenge this fall, she said, is the arrival of new trustees Tony Miller and John Koval. It is the first time in years for the board to have two new trustees.

"It takes some time for people to be comfortable, to feel confident," she said. "That's one of my challenges this year is to help those two

gentlemen integrate themselves into the board and the administrative team."

Both new and veteran trustees are gearing up to settle details on the new grade configuration to be implemented in the 2004-2005 school year. Foyteck said that will be a big item in months to come.

Although school board meetings are not considered "public hearings," they are open to the public and there are opportunities for public comment. In addition, school trustees' telephone numbers are public record.

"The public is always welcome," she said. "I'm always happy to hear from people."

School board members earn only a per-meeting fee, so money is not seen as the reward. For Foyteck it is, "...a great personal pleasure when I'm fortunate enough to have the opportunity to be in a classroom or at a student performance or read to a

group of children. It's exhilarating. That's one of the big payoffs for me."

In her spare time, Foyteck is a self-described voracious reader, with a particular interest in books dealing with history (both fiction and non-fiction).

"I'll read a cereal box if that's the only thing available," she said.

With three children having graduated from Clarkston schools, Foyteck now boasts of "three wonderful grandchildren," and she also enjoys her flower gardening.

"I have a tendency to either dry things out or drown them," she said, "but I'm getting better every year."

Above all, she said she enjoys people, and that's part of why she enjoys being involved in Clarkston schools.

"I would be very unhappy if I were stuck in a cubicle with no human contact."


our religion.

I suggested she write down all the things she didn't like. To my surprise, she took my pen and paper and started listing.





It's also hard when you're feeling the pain yourself.

It's been a rough year in several respects, not the least being I've lost two friends in re-

cent months. Steve had a heart attack at work in March of this year. Married and a father of four, he left a hole not only in his family, but in our church as well.

Steve was a peer. About the same age, and from somewhat similar backgrounds, we related well, and had good conversa-

tions. His sudden death was the proverbial kick in the head.

Within the past few days, Cheryl lost a long battle against cancer. She and her husband, Jeff, were part of our church for many years. They moved to Ohio a few years back because of work, but both their extended families are here. Parents, a brother, inlaws and assorted cousins are all among our friends.

Cheryl's death was not unexpected. We had regular updates on her progress (or lack thereof), and it led some of us to pray for a quick death as a second choice to complete healing.

These incidents are filed in the brain cells with the sudden death of two younger sisters at the hands of a drunk driver (that story for another day) and the passing of both parents several

years ago.

Because each of the above knew Jesus Christ as Savior, we know each has won the final victory. And we rejoice in the comfort promised by God in times of pain and grief.

Nothing in the Bible promises it will be an easy journey, however. We have questions. We have tears.

At least we should. It has become painfully evident that we take life too much for granted. Further, we seem to be too flippant about death.

Sure, a lot of focus has centered on continued fatalities in Iraq, and there's legitimate discussion as to whether it is a relatively low body count. The news media also give us up-to-thenanosecond updates on the grisly murder-du-jour.

Some of us, however, have learned a new appreciation for the obituaries in the community newspaper. They don't have the "lead" value of the above-mentioned incidents, but each has the same impact — or more — to loved ones somewhere.

And what about major lifetakers we take for granted? Car crashes (since most are avoidable, I don't call them accidents) still account for more deaths than war. The primary cause of AIDS is still behavior, and too many of us still think a balanced diet is a Big Mac in one hand and large fries in the other.

A newspaper column, usually, is meant to inform, persuade and/or entertain. This one, sorry to say, is of the more selfish category --- venting.

No, perhaps it is meant to be persuasive, at least to myself. If it helps someone else, all the better. The primary point applies to us all, and perhaps the reminder is needed.

Life is precious. Never forget it.

I have six children and as each of them has become old enough to work,

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




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

percent BAC, but Combs said that has presented a problem in the past.

The field Breathalyzer registers three decimal points, but the printer at the police station only prints to two decimal points. By the letter of the law, the "impaired" charge has been difficult to prosecute, Combs said.

Stakoe said the new standard will help, but there will still be the "driving while visibly impaired" charge available to police officers if they wish to use discretion in first-offense cases.

Combs estimated an average of about three OUIL arrests every couple months inside the city limits.

"That's a lot for a small town like this," he said. "That's more than I'm comfortable with here."

Stakoe, a former police officer, said the deterrent effect of the new law is not proven. The work of law enforcement is the key.

"People aren't thinking about the penalties when they get behind the wheel [while drunk]," he said. "I think enforce-

ment is what makes the impact."

As public scrutiny of drunken driving increases, Stakoe said there may be future increases in the penalties. In an early version of the current bill, for example, there was a proposal for an "enhanced" OUIL charge for those with a BAC of 0.15 percent.

That provision was dropped, but Stakoe said the statistics show the vast majority of OUIL offenders register at least that high.

Combs has seen instances of very high BAC, and said officers are required to take those with a level of 0.35 percent or higher to the hospital, since that is considered "alcohol poisoning."

Stakoe sees one negative in the new law — not in the content, but in the process.

"As a legislator, I'm not happy when the federal government uses it's leverage to force things on the state," he said. "I hate to do it at the point of a gun. It's another example of how [the federal government] is getting out of control."

# Free eye screenings for back-to-school students

Getting ready to go back to school typically means a trip to the store for supplies and new duds. This year put on the back-to-school to do list, a stop at Allison Eye Care Inc. for a free vision screening, too.

Dr. Allison Schulte, O.D., a lifelong Clarkston

resident, said it is estimated more than 10 million children suffer from vision problems; and one in four school children has an undiagnosed vision problem that can lead to difficulty in learning.

Common symptoms include headaches, nausea, dizziness, squinting, holding a book too close to the face, skipping or rereading lines, and trouble seeing the chalk board.

But learning related vision problems, when accurately diagnosed, can be treated successfully and permanently, Schulte said.

And for the last five years, since opening the Clarkston practice in 1998, Allison Eye Care has offered complimentary back-to-school vision screenings.

The first year approximately 50 to 75 people took advantage of Schulte's offer. It has since expanded to 100 to 200 people each year.

Schulte said she is, to her knowledge, the only one in the area to offer free screenings, which are intended for children between the ages of three and 18, and run month long in conjunction with August's National Children's Vision and Learning Month.

"I believe a lot of the schools in the area mandate vision tests. For someone who can't afford a full eye exam, the screenings are an alternative. It doesn't substitute a full eye exam. But it's a nice thing to do for the community."

At the screenings, children will have checked visual, distance and near acuity; color vision; near convergence; depth perception; automated refractive error; muscle imbalance; and eye muscle motility.

"If I do detect a problem. The parent will leave with a copy of the screening form, which I will go over briefly with the parent." A full eye exam should be the next step and can be set up either at Allison Eye Care or elsewhere. "As long as the kids are getting assistance. That's what's important."

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





# Counselor promotes healthy grieving

Clarkston News Staff Writer Need to talk? Alicia Brown has a lis-

tening ear. Brown is a certified therapist in private practice, a contracted grief counselor through area funeral homes and facilitator of a grief support group at the Independence Township Senior Citizens Center.

Dealing with death is part of life, but she finds many people have trouble dealing with it. She wants to help people work through the natural grieving process.

As seems to be the case with many therapists, Brown's motivation for her work comes from personal experience. Her mother died when she was 10 years old.

"At that time no one ever talked about the deceased afterwards," she said. "No one ever recognized that children suffer

ence from work at a hospice before starting her private practice 11 years ago.

She has established professional relationships with Wint Funeral Home in Clarkston and Coats Funeral Home in Waterford, both of which refer clients in need of grief counseling and "aftercare." She gives credit to both for recognizing the need.

"It's a wonderful service," she said. "It's an extremely positive outreach to the community."

In 1994, Brown was a periodic speaker at the Independence support group, founded by the Wint Funeral Home. Eventually she took over as facilitator, and offers specific teaching on grief about every other month.

The primary focus of the monthly meetings, however, is allowing folks to talk.

"Most of the people just want to share their stories," Brown said. "They want to know if they're grieving OK. I validate that for them."


said, and that means as many times as they need to tell it. "I'm free to express my pain and share my fears."

Some people attend the meetings as long as five years, and Brown said attendance ranges from four to 20. More are welcome, however, and no pre-registration is required for the meetings at 7 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month.

Sometimes well-meaning friends and family quench that freedom with inappropriate comments such as, "Get over it" or "I know just how you feel." Brown believes there is a need for more grief and death education to avoid further hurt.

"It's a form of ignorance," she said. "It's because our society is to death- and mourning-denying that people don't know what to say. The best thing is to be present and be supportive."

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just as adults do."

A positive experience came from her exposure to the funeral home and the funeral director.

"The funeral director was one of the kindest men, and that made an impression on me," she said.

After extensive education (including a bachelor's degree from Spring Arbor College and master's from Oakland University), Brown gained professional experiAttendance and participation are as varied as the circumstances surrounding the death of a loved one. Brown recommends folks begin attending about two months after the funeral, because that's the time friends and other family members tend to move back to their normal routine.

"The group provides that atmosphere that they can talk and tell their story," she Brown believes the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks served as a wakeup call concerning the need for healthy grieving and grief counseling. Her dream is to create a "grief center" in which regular education and support can be offered to meet the unique needs of various age groups and situations.

One basic point, she said, is to under-

"We have contacted local businesses and they are really supporting us. We are really excited about everything everyone has donated," Ponce said.




"All the people over there at Saturn really went to work for us," John said. "Clift was really great at tracking down those cars. I like Saturn cars and I like what they are doing."

stand that grieving is healthy, and the pain does not necessarily go away.

"We never get over it; we work through it," she said.

Helping people through their grief provides fulfillment in a way that's not always easy to describe.

"The reward is in watching and being part of the bereaved's journey and experiencing with them working through that in a healthy way," Brown said. She's also honored to learn about the special people who are being mourned.

As a specialist in grief counseling, Brown finds it helpful as she deals with folks in all kinds of therapy. She believes the lack of healthy grieving, too often, leads to other mental health problems.

"Usually underneath a lot of depression, anger and even anxiety is an unresolved grief issue," she said.

Outside her work, Brown enjoys music, reading and flower gardening. She admits the latter is more "trial and error," but it's still a beneficial hobby she recommends to others.

"It's very therapeutic," she said. "I tell my clients, 'Go dig in the dirt."

She is proud of her family, which includes a son in New Jersey with two children and a daughter in Harper Woods who occasionally asks Brown to babysit her cat.


When there, "Foster" became known as "the counseling cat," and Brown echoes what other experts have said about the therapeutic effect of pets in a home.

In addition to being certified therapist, she is trained in critical incident stress debriefing and hypnosis. She also is on staff at North Oakland Medical Center's mental health clinic in Waterford and serves as an American Red Cross disaster mental health volunteer.


