Power outage brings out best in residents, business

Were it not for the malfunctioning traffic signals, it might have been mistaken for a normal, pleasant summer evening in downtown Clarkston. People were walking dogs, sitting on benches and steps, passing the time as long as daylight would allow.

Valerie Hulderman came out of Rudy's Market on Main Street, having purchased "salad fixins" with the assistance of people with flashlights inside the

"They don't have a scale, so they're being real kind on the weight," Hulderman said.

It was only one example of how local residents coped with what is being described as the largest power outage in the nation's history. When the lights went out at about 4:15 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 14, most thought it was the typical local overload of the electrical system.

Emily Derby, a friend of Hulderman's daughter, Charity, was visiting from California.

"She called her mom to ask her to tell us what was going on in the news," Hulderman said.

(Although a little surprised at Michigan's humidity, Derby said California has become accustomed to rolling

Charity Hulderman, meanwhile, joked about being the cause of the black-

"I was feeling really sick today and I didn't want to go to work," she quipped. "I don't mind if it's my fault."

As folks throughout the northeastern United States and southeastern Canada debated the real cause of the overloaded energy grid, locals got on with business as best they could.

Downtown Clarkston got power back about 9 a.m. Friday, Aug. 15, but much of the outlying areas had to wait until the next day. Municipal water customers were under a boil order until Monday.

Another early Thursday evening shopper at Rudy's Market, Rawleen Cristea of Clarkston said she was shopping at the Waterford Kmart when the power went out.

"Everyone was just orderly and quiet," she said.

Miller files lawsuit to defend dual school positions

The attorney representing Clarkston schools Trustee Tony Miller has filed a lawsuit in Oakland County Circuit Court challenging the claim that Miller cannot also be a Clarkston High School football coach.

Attorney Arthur Weiss said Monday he filed the suit Thursday, Aug. 14, and an evidentiary hearing is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Sept. 3 before Circuit Judge John J. McDonald.

At the Aug. 11 school board meeting, school district attorney George Butler presented extensive arguments, including legal opinions from the Michigan Association of School Boards and the Michigan Attorney General, that Miller's dual role is a violation of the state's Incompatible Public Offices Act.

Weiss said he "attempted" to meet with Butler, Superintendent Al Roberts and board President Karen Foyteck, but, "We could not get a word in edgewise."

The legal basis for the challenge, Weiss said, is a Michigan Supreme Court reversal of the "Murphy" case, which was used to support the "Scott" case upon which Butler and other school officials have based their opinion.

Weiss said both cases involved a person holding flict. He said the Supreme Court ruling showed there must be a true conflict, not merely a potential conflict.

In addition, he said the Attorney General's opinion cited by Butler was made before the Supreme Court decision.


"Right now there is no conflict," with Miller's dual roles, Weiss said

Miller has agreed to coach as an unpaid volunteer and will avoid votes at school board meetings if necessary.

"If something comes up regarding the football program. [Miller] is going to abstain," Weiss said.

Weiss further criticized the suggestion that Miller could be involved in other football-related activities such as scouting. He fails to see the difference in the status of perceived conflict.

"It's like being a little bit pregnant," he said.

Weiss said he is a resident of the Clarkston school two "public offices" with only "appearance" of con-

"I have a personal interest in this as well," he

Miller, a lifelong district resident and a Clarkston High School graduate, was the top vote-getter in the June 9 school election. He said he checked with district representatives before his election campaign and was told there would be no conflict of interest if he did not hold a paid position.

Butler, however, said there is an inherent conflict of interest because the school board approves all hiring and firing of district employees (including coaches) and approves spending for all school budgets (including athletics).

Superintendent Al Roberts said Tuesday that he had not been informed about the filing of the lawsuit, and Miller said nothing about it at the school board's goal-setting workshop Thursday, Aug. 14.

"If it's true," Roberts said the timing of the action is disturbing.

"It diverts our attention from our primary purpose, and that's preparing for the beginning of school."

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The Second Front Finding the love of a family

Of 15,000 teens who've graduated from a Russian orphanage in 1993, one out of three became homeless, one out five committed a crime, and one out of 10 committed suicide, according to statistics released from the Russian Federation.

Kidsave International was formed to lessen these numbers, and give children in Russia and Kazakhstan a chance for a happy, family life.

The nonprofit organization brought its program to Michigan most recently with the Michigan Summer Miracles 2003 event, where 10 children, ages six to 13, traveled from Kazakhstan for a six-week stay in hopes of finding a permanent family. Here, they got to experience a summer day camp, weekend outings, play time and the love of a volunteer host family.

It was an experience that changed the lives of many, some right here in Clarkston.

Richard Powers was on his way out of town in January, when he saw in the newspaper Kidsave was having a meeting in Rochester. He couldn't be there, but called wife Susan for her to attend. She went and there signed up to be a host family. (Volunteer host families open their homes as well as provide a means for appropriate medical care for the children. Families receive support and guidance from a licensed adoption social worker.)

Four of the older children arrived July 11, the remaining six came in early Au-

"One girl in particular stood out," Susan Powers said. "She was so neat."

Her name is Ekaterina, and she is 13-years-old.

"We weren't thinking about adopting," Susan admits. The Powers have two other college-age children.

But a strong bond was formed and love began to bloom.

"Some people think we're crazy. But she fits right in to our family just great," Susan said, a Springfield Plains Elementary teacher who was named Clarkston's 2002 Teacher of the Year. Powers, who has taught for more 30 years, also got involved teaching at the Kidsave day camp this summer.

"She gets along with our kids real well. She's so polite, just like our kids." And the language barrier has not been a challenge, Susan said. "It's not hard because you just use a lot of action with your words. She understands."

Ekaterina goes back to Kazakhstan Aug. 22. The Powers will begin the adoption paper work immediately, with hopes they'll be able to travel to Kazakhstan at Christmas and bring her home.

When her new "Momma and Poppa" are mentioned, a big smile crosses Ekaterina's face and she describes her family enthusiastically, "Good!"

Ekaterina and the other children were told by a social worker, they would know when they meet their new Momma and Poppa because they would look forward to getting up in the morning with "hearts pumping" and "souls singing."

Excited, Ekaterina revealed, about the Powers, "I feel this way!"

For Joy Ohlsson, a Clarkston resident of three years, she had always dreamed of adopting.

She saw an article in the newspaper as well about a host family introduction

At the meeting, the facilitator began with a prayer asking the Lord's blessing.

At that moment, "I knew it was something I was supposed to do," Joy said, who has two stepdaughters, Linnea, 23, and Sara, 22.

But husband, Bjorn, was not sure about the idea. They prayed about it and eventually decided together to sign up to be a host family.

That's when Jenya came into their lives.

Unfortunately, Joy said, "Jenya had a hard time coming over." He was running on a playground and hit his head, causing a concussion. Jenya missed coming over to America with the other children. Joy didn't give up hope, though, Kidsave raised \$2,000 to help bring him here on Aug. 11.

Jenya, 10, is one of the only children with a physical disability. It isn't sure, but it is assumed he has cerebral palsy. Joy will be taking Jenya to the doctor for an evaluation. Many children with disabilities in Kazakhstan do not receive the

medical attention they deserve. For example, Jenya has not received the proper physical therapy and so has only been learned to walk three years ago.

Joy has treasured the time with Jenya. "It's been a very fast bonding situation. He opened up right away with us. It's been a blessing. Especially, seeing him open up and being so surprised by all the things we take for granted here. The Lord has also taught me patience and to rely on him since having to wait for him

to come here."

Jenya will have to return with the other children on Aug. 22. The Ohlssons are unsure if they'll adopt.

But with Kidsave, 95 percent of all kids participating in the six-week stay find permanent families.

"It's definitely a blessing to see the Lord work on all the children here. They are all real sweet kids," Joy said.

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Resident lobbies for improved Springfield FD

Kelly Bridgewater admitted her personal passion as the wife of an Independence Township firefighter, but she said her motivation was that of a concerned Springfield Township resident.

"Until I started asking questions, I didn't realize what we did not have," she said, referring to what she called a "deficient" emergency medical services sys-

At the Thursday, Aug. 14 Springfield Township Board meeting, Bridgewater presented a 20-page report comparing the staffing, equipment and funding of various communities' fire departments. She requested the board to immediately move toward more full-time firefighters, advanced life support training and emergency transportation capabilities.

"My concern is the Springfield Township Fire Department did not fare very well by comparison," she told the board. "There is a severe lack of progress and there is a deficiency in our EMS service.'

In addition to providing faster medical treatment in trauma situations, Bridgewater said an upgraded fire department would lead to a better ISO rating (from the International Standards Organization), which could help lower local property insurance rates.

The fire department this past year upgraded the medical response license from Medical First Responder to Basic Life Support/non-transport. That means the fire department will respond to medical runs with at least one emergency medical technician.

Advanced Life Support services, however, must come from private ambulance services such as American Medical Response or, in some cases, from adjoinging fire departments with an ALS rating.


Trustees were generally complimentary toward Bridgewater's report, and promised "serious considersome time.

"It is rare that residents even attend our meetings. It's rarer yet that they come forward with their concerns, and I can't remember anyone who has put the effort into any concern that you have," Supervisor Collin Walls said. "Personally, I believe the place for our review and discussion of this is the budgetary process for

Some said the report was an indication of the quality of the current fire department.

"I'm also struck with the incredibly high level of service this group of volunteers is currently providing with a budget roughly one-third of similarly populated areas," Trustee Dean Baker said.

"I don't think the problem lies with the personnel or the dedication of the personnel," Bridgewater said. "I think the

Although her husband is a current member of the Independence Township Fire Department and a former Springfield firefighter, Bridgewater said she did not represent current firefighters.

Fire Chief Charles Oaks said the department currently has about 30 paid-on-call firefighters, many of whom have EMT or paramedic licenses. Oaks is the only full-time department employee, however, and he has proposed the hiring of two full-time firefighters for

"I would like to see it quicker," he said, but the ation" of the report. Action, however, will likely take township government must plan for the fiscal year, which

begins in January.

"I think we need the ability to transport in emergency situations," Oaks said, noting the gradual withdrawal of AMR from northern Oakland County.

Orion Township, just east of Independence Township still has a "non-transport" EMS service, however, depending on private ambulance service to take patients to the hospital, so Oaks does not believe Springfield is as far behind as some believe.

"Right now we don't have the manpower" for a full Advanced Life Support service, the chief said.

Dixie crash kills 1

Michael Joseph Putnam, a 53-year-old Oakland Township man, was killed in a traffic accident on Dixie Highway near Maybee at approximately 7:30 p.m., Monday, Aug. 18.

Investigated by Deputy Gary Riehert, of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Traffic Division, it appeared Putnam was driving a 2003 Ford Explorer on northbound Dixie Highway when he crossed two lanes of traffic into southbound traffic striking head-on a Ford Econoline van, driven by a 32-year-old Pontiac resident. A third vehicle, a Ford Escort, driven by a 42-year-old Milford resident, was travelling behind the van and was unable to stop, striking the van in the rear.

Putnam was pronounced dead at the scene. The other drivers were transported to Genesys Hospital. The driver of the van is listed in critical condition. The driver of the Escort is in stable condition.

It appears all were wearing seatbelts and alcohol does not appear to be a factor, Riehert said.

The crash remains under investigation.


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
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Special tax to pay for Sashabaw drain system

It took three attempts, but by the end of their Aug. 5 meeting, the Independence Township Board last week approved a special assessment district for a new Sashabaw drain system.

Related to but different from a proposed special assessment for the road itself, the drain system is seen

as the answer to water management from recent and future development in the Sashabaw Road

In a district running along the west side of Sashabaw Road from Maybee Road north to I-75 beyond Waldon Road, construction of the drain system will cost an estimated \$1.32 million.

The struggle came in how to fairly distribute the special assessment, especially in the Links of Independence development.

Dale Stuart The proposed tax roll for the special assessment district showed \$162,000 divided among only 65 occupied units (at \$2,883 each), even though the development will eventually contain 159 units.

Jim Clark, CEO of Robertson Independence LLC asked for a way to levy the assessment when the other units are occupied, thus making the individual assessment share \$1,025.

"We understand and support the project," Clark said. "I'd like to not support it until we get that worked out."

Contracted township engineer Jamie Burton said it was a legitimate concern.

"We need to look into this," Burton said. "All the acreage is accounted for."

The problem, according to Supervisor Dale Stuart, was the need to approve the tax roll so construction

contracts could be approved. Further, the tax roll is established by the township assessor based on actual tax-

"We can't keep changing the tax roll over the next 10 years," Stuart said. "We can't approve this on hypothetical units. If we don't let these contracts, the project won't get done."

Township attorney Steve Joppich consulted with Clark outside the meeting room as the board conducted other business. Eventually there was agreement that Clark would attempt to get the other units on the assessor's records before the special assessment is

Clark was not the only speaker at the public hear-

ing. Harry Fagan, a resident of the Waldon Pond neighborhood, said the timing of the project is unfair to those who have already survived one round of construction.

"Now you're asking us to pay for something that should have been done six years ago," Fagan said.

Burton said a drain system was under consideration several years ago, but there was uncertainty about how to engineer things based on future development.

"Now we know how all the other developments fit," Burton said.

Property owners included in the special assessment district have a choice to pay the full drain assessment up front or make installment payments to the township over 15 years.

Sashabaw Road improvements stalled

The Sashabaw Road corridor drain system will be built, but improvements to the roadway itself are still uncertain.

A proposal for a special assessment district for improvements to Sashabaw Road between Maybee and Waldon roads has been stalled for several months. Some property owners had voiced concern about the fairness of the assessment related to use of the roadway. especially since Sashabaw Road is used by patrons of the DTE Energy Music Theater and other destinations.

Township officials are currently seeking donations of property for the expanded right-of-way. If enough property owners participate, Supervisor Dale Stuart said the township budget could handle "a reasonable contribution" to the construction project.

"It depends on the number of dedications we have," Stuart said. "If we don't, then we're going to have no

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choice but to create the assessments."

Stuart did not have hard numbers last week, but said he is pleased some property owners have agreed but disappointed others have not.

One of the pending property donations is from Clarkston Community Schools, because Pine Knob Elementary School has frontage on Sashabaw Road.

The proposal came to the school board Monday, Aug. 11 as an information item. Bruce Beamer, executive director of financial and business services, said the township government and the Road Commission for Oakland County have requested the district to consider the appraisal value of \$39,600 and the \$1,545 temporary grading permit fee as donations to the project.

There will be additional cost to the district to relocate fiber optic cable on 33 utility poles between Waldon and Maybee roads.

Trustees asked Beamer to bring more specific numbers to the Aug. 25 board meeting.



Who first looked at a cow and said, "I think I'll squeeze these things and drink whatever comes out?"



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

Gavette has suffered some softball injuries as well, but this past year it was torn knee cartilage that threatened his athletic status. Weight training helped him avoid surgery.

The day before the Senior Olympics, however, he pulled a groin muscle and a quadricep while running on a local school track. He didn't dampen his passion for competition, however.

"I just put a big wrap on it and it warmed right up," Gavette said.

Both men would like to see a few more competitors join the action, and they encourage folks to be active, in moderation, of course.

"If you're hurting, go to the gym and do some stretching," Gavette said. "It's fun to get out there."

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

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

After stocking up on pop and water from Rudy's, Norm Cristea said they were ready to tough it out, "as long as it doesn't last too long."

In one of the area's long gasoline lines Friday, customers at the Dixie Highway Speedway station said folks were generally kind and courteous during the wait.

"Yeah, most of them, but not all of them," said Paul Peel, who described a wait of about 15 minutes, with part of that time being in line on Dixie Highway. "I was hoping for a little better than this."

Parrish Jackson said, "We've got a generator, so we're all right."

Jackson's husband sat in line for gasoline the pre-

vious evening, but she had to join the wait Friday for fuel for the generator.

Add "blackout" to the rain, snow and dark of night; the Clarkston Post Office came through. Officer-incharge Jane Haugen gave credit to her crew for showing up for work Friday, after the Thursday night crews broke out the generator and flashlights.

"We delivered," she said, both Friday and Saturday, and, "We had community support."

Haugen gave credit to the Speedway gasoline station for fueling three postal vehicles with low tanks on Friday.

Although there were no computers operating at the

postal store on S. Main Street, Haugen said employees hand-cancelled mail for people wanting to meet Aug. 15 deadlines for tax and mortgage payments.

Independence Township Parks and Recreation closed parks on Friday, but kept the Deer Lake Beach open as an escape for folks who lost their air conditioning. Recreation Programmer Kelly Arcello said the parks and rec trip to Cedar Point went as scheduled, however, as the amusement park had their own emergency power.


Despite the lack of power, the Springfield Township Board conducted their meeting Thursday, Aug. 14, utilizing sunlight from the western-facing window of the meeting room. Clerk Nancy Strole asked trustees and audience members to speak up for the benefit of the battery-powered tape recorder used to document the proceedings.

"We view government as different" from business entities, Strole said later. "The meetings are scheduled, and we work on the premise that people would come to the meetings."

As officials debate how to follow up after the blackout and prevent future incidents, Clarkston resident Scott Speagle offered his own advice from the gasoline line Friday.

"Buy a generator," he said, "and keep some gas in the garage."



Sheriff, fire department suffer short communications blackout

Public safety agencies faced some communication glitches because of the Thursday, Aug. 14 blackout, but reported no major crises otherwise.

The blackout passed by fairly smoothly in Independence and Springfield townships as well as in the City of the Village of Clarkston, with no crimes or traffic accidents occurring.

The Independence Township Fire Department found itself out of communications with Oakland County Central Dispatch for a short period of time, because an emergency generator did not immediately activate at the repeater tower covering the area.

Capt. Mike Farner said they switched over to the local township transmitter and dispatched calls locally. That left other township departments, including the Department of Public Works, without radio service.

The transition took only "a couple of minutes," and the county repeater was up and running within three or four hours, Farner said.

Traffic was a bit of a concern during emergency responses, but most medical cases were transported to the new Clarkston Medical Center, which was fully operating thanks to their own emergency generators.

"We didn't have any major problems," Farner said.

Lt. Dale LaBair Oakland County Sheriff's Department

"That's why the backup system is in place."

Lt. Dale LaBair of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department in Independence Township said, "We stayed in good shape."

The department took emergency calls only on Thursday, while traffic was monitored.

"I was pleasantly surprised at the way traffic worked. People, for the most part, were considerate and treated intersections as four-way stops. There was no real problems."

In the city, Police Chief Ernest Combs said portable stop signs were placed at all the traffic lights.

"The stop signs were very efficient. The traffic was god-awful, but there was nothing we could do to help it."

"People did a nice job keeping calm," Sgt. Frank Schipani of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department said in Springfield Township said. "We had some busy gas stations (on Friday). I don't know why people had to rush out and fill up."

On the crime front, things stayed quiet.

"There was no crime," LaBair said, and Schipani and Combs said the same.

When power outages have happened in the past, it is typically limited locally. With it being widespread this time, LaBair said the township did not have the resources they would normally draw from other jurisdictions.

But he said, "We did well on our own. This was a good wakeup call."

LaBair said they'll look at what improvements need to be made, such as making plans for obtaining point-to-point radios in an emergency, which are on hand and available through township, to save from communication problems.





Those who practice the ancient art of stereotypes may be disappointed, and those who believe all media-types walk in lockstep may be shocked.

Some of us in the journalism profession get really hacked off by others in the journalism profession.

Many of us in the print media have a natural prejudice against broadcast media, because of their ten-

dency to provide superficial coverage of issues requiring more depth. That's not the frustration-du-jour, however.

When other newspaper reporters perform shoddy journalism (and when editors allow same), it reflects badly on those of us who still subscribe to fair, impartial and balanced coverage.

(We pause for the following public service announcement: What you are now reading is a column, an opinion piece, not to be confused with a news story. Those who think this column is off the wall are encouraged to write a letter to

the editor. For that matter, write a letter to the editor if you think our news coverage is off base.)

Welcome back. We present for your consideration two recent examples of classic bad journalism.

First is the now-all-too-often practice of injecting opinion or supposition in news reporting. A story in The Flint Journal told the story of a couple with eight children and the impact of the new federal income tax credit to families with children.

"But for families like the Faulkners, who earned less than \$26,000 and did not pay federal income tax last year, the check is not in the mail," the story read. "It's a loophole Congress is working to fix."

"Loophole?" At least, the writer should have said

"alleged loophole" or "perceived loophole." At best, the word would not be used.

The word "loophole" gave endorsement to the opinion that the tax credit should go to people who didn't pay the tax. If you subscribe to that opinion, say so, but it is still an opinion that there is a problem to be "fixed"

Another disturbing trend is the use of anonymous sources. Case in point was a Washington Post story about the alleged plans for U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell to step down should President George W. Bush be reelected in 2004.

The lead paragraph stated Powell's intent as if it were fact. The attribution (i.e. the source) for the story did not come until the third long paragraph.

Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage told National Security Advisor Condoleezza Rice of the pending resignation, "sources familiar with the conversation said."

Whoa! One or more unnamed people allegedly overheard a personal conversation between two other people. The identity and credibility of the sources are unknown, but the Washington Post continues a Watergate-era tradition.

While the use of unidentified sources may be a last resort for some stories, in too many cases the "highly placed source" is usually someone like the janitor who works on the top floor of the building.

We haven't even mentioned multiple cases of fiction writers masquerading as news reporters. After one of the fiction writers at the New York Times was exposed, Jon Stewart of Comedy Central's "The Daily Show" said, "As the fake anchor of a fake news show, I'm glad to see other media outlets taking our brand of journalism seriously."

Yes, I laughed, too, and I'm certainly not perfect. Our credibility is an issue, however, and some of us think it's no longer a laughing matter.

Optimist attempts to be 'friends of youth'

Local businessman Ahdi Dasuqi is attempting to give back to the community by helping the youth.

Dasuqi is current president of the Clarkston Optimist Club who call themselves, "friends of youth."

"We want to help guide the youth and teach items such as leadership," Dasuqi said. "We do things to benefit the community at large but we definitely focus on the youth."

The Optimists were introduced to the Clarkston area when charter president Jim Evans started the group in 1986. It started as a mens only club but today welcomes both men and women.

"It started out as old men but we realized that we had to change with the times. There was a very important energy that the females brought into the club. We are looking for active men and women," Dasuqi

The Clarkston Optimists currently have 63 active members. However, one of Dasuqi's goals as president was to increase the members by 25 people. Dasuqi's one year term ends on Sept. 30 and he has al-

ready increased membership by 18 people. Optimists have concluded that one active optimist affects 37 kids.

"We are always looking for new members and they can have quite an impact. Our active members are extremely active. We realize that one person does count," Dasugi said. "Clarkston has grown leaps and bounds in the last 15 years and we want to grow as well."

Optimists perform many activities in the community including:

• Having junior optimist clubs in the schools. Out of the 3,800 clubs across the country only five have a strong, active junior optimist club, according to Dasuqi.

The junior optimists learn about leadership and also give back to the community.

Running the "Respect for Law" program. The Optimists organize this program which teaches children about the court system. They take around 35 kids to the courts and let them run a mock trial.

"Each one of the kids is a separate part of the trial from the attorney to the judge to the defendant," Dasuqi said. "It shows them how our court systems work and it also teaches them respect for the law."

• Fund the Tri-Star basketball shooting contest. They had a record number of kids participate this year and many past contestants have become members of the high school basketball team with some even playing college ball.

• Hosting an oratorical contest. This is

hosted by the Optimists and allows the children of Clarkston to showcase their talents. The top three finishers this year received \$1,000 college scholarships.

"We also make donation to other items which come up and can benefit the community," Dasuqi said.

The Optimists raise this money by receiving donations from local businesses and holding a silent auction once a year. Last year the auction night raised \$24,000. Some of the projects they support included the new soccer field built last year which they donated \$10,000 towards.

The Optimist are also looking into making a donation to the proposed Spraypark at

Clintonwood.

"We definitely have a focus on the kids. It is not just giving them scholarships and education, but it is also giving them things to do in the Clarkston area," Dasuqi said.

The group also participated in the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life where they raised \$4,300.

"They said as a first time participant \$1,000 would be a good goal so we were very excited about our success," Dasuqi said.


Dasuqi got involved with the Optimists about five years ago, admittedly due to the wrong reasons. He was interested in get-

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

Visiting youngsters were given a fire helmet and other souvenirs as they visited a variety of big vehicles, including local emergency vehicles and construction equipment.




