Schools get report cards

The latest round of state school report cards shows improvements for Clarkston Community Schools, thanks at least in part to more "flexible" assessments of "annual yearly progress."

State report cards for 2002-2003 (issued in January of this year) had all Clarkston school buildings with a composite grade of "B" except Independence Elementary School, which did not have enough comparison data to generate a grade. Three elementary schools received "F" grades in the category of "achievement change," and Clarkston Middle School and Clarkston High School were ruled to have failed in the AYP category.

The 2003-2004 scores have all elementary schools with a composite grade of "A," both middle schools with composite grades of "B" and all elementary and middle schools meeting the AYP standard.

The report cards offer the latest measurement of how schools are meeting criteria of the federal "No Child Left Behind" program and Michigan's accreditation system to fulfill that program, "Education YES (Yardstick for Excellent Schools)."

The goal is for all schools to have all students proficient in reading and math by the 2013-2014 school year. The AYP is a key measurement toward that goal.

The "composite grades" are determined in part by student scores in the Michigan Educational Achievement Program tests, with each school assessed in categories such as "achievement status" and "achievement change" for the total test population and various economic and ethnic and disability subgroups.

District officials offered no comment on the latest report cards at the Monday, Aug. 9 school board meeting.

In January, however, they complained about how the report card system is unfair to school districts already showing high student achievement. In the case of Clarkston Middle School and Clarkston High School, officials appealed the AYP ruling.

(Since MEAP tests were administered to high schoolers later in the year, state report cards for high schools will be issued at a later date.)

Along with the report cards themselves, the Michigan Department of Education issued a 24-page report, "Guide to Reading 2004 Michigan School Report Cards." In its introduction, the guide explains how this year's grading system changed.

"It was agreed at the time [January 2004] that refinements in the system would be needed and that local educators should be involved in recommending revisions," the report said. For example, "The Achievement Grade worked against many high-performing

More than 270 participants gathered in Clarkston Sunday, Aug. 8 to take part in the Craig Greenfield Memorial Tri/Du. This was the city's first triathalon and a fund-raiser for the Michigan Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

Although final totals were not available at the time of press, event co-chair Corey Greenfield estimated \$8,000-\$10,000 was raised for the society.

"We didn't think we were going to make anything the first year," Greenfield said.

The event, limited to 300 people, received praise from its participants, some of whom traveled across the country to attend.

"I've been training forever," Brian Segerlind, triathalon competitor, said. "It's nice to get out and do a race."

The unusually-cool temperatures that morning added to the success of the race.

"I thought this flowed very well," Bullen said.

The event wasn't just for seasoned athletes. Many individuals from around the community came out to try a triathalon or duathalon for the very first time.

"This is the first one I've done," Bret Darling, triathalon competitor, said. "There's a big one coming up in Chicago at the end of the month, so this is a warm

up."

Helping staff the event were members of the Clarkston Police Department, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and a crew of local volunteers, many who just showed up the morning of the event to lend a hand.

"People just showed up the morning of," Bullen said of the caring volunteer brigade.

According to volunteer coordinator Renee Weaver-Wright, about 60 volunteers were present on the day of the race:

"It was really fun," Weaver-Wright said.

the event received from Clarkston and Independence


Township to make it a success.

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

Three positions available this term for council race


A mixture of incumbents, former candidates and new faces have filed petitions to run for three positions on Clarkston's city council this November.

Current council members Scott Meyland and Derek Werner are running for re-election.

Anne Clifton, who would also have been up for reelection, decided not to run again making her position available. Clifton stayed on the council to see the city's water project through and, since it's completion, would like to see new faces on the council. She also hopes to spend more time with enjoying her daughter's activities.

"I wanted to spend my time there," Clifton said. Steven Wylie and Steve Coventry have run for

council positions in previous elections and are attempting to be elected again this year. Kristy Ottman makes the fifth candidate. She has never run for the position be-



"I think the current council has done a good

job prioritizing," Meyland said. "Hopefully this election will give people a chance to focus on day-to-day activities."

A member of the council since 1999, Meyland believes the city's budget is an important issue.

"Each year we're expected to do more with less,"

Meyland said. "That's always a challenge."

Meyland looks forward to this year's election and is pleased to see five people running for the three posi-

"I'd like to continue to be involved and be an integral part of the city's run,"

Meyland said. Fellow council member Werner is also pleased with the council's current operation. Werner has served on the council for three years.

"I've enjoyed my three years on the council. I think we've done a good job," Werner said.

"I get to experience the community every day," Ottman said. "What I have is a unique perspective for the city council. I bring day-to-day issues that are happening on the street that other city council

On any given day during the summer, Main Street in downtown Clarkston is busy with residents enjoying a walk with friends and shoppers looking for unique finds.

To best utilize the busy atmosphere, Clarkston business owners are making the most of their store's property by featuring merchandise out-

"It's a real attention getter," Diane Brozovich, Village Apparel and Gifts manager, said. "It helps bring people into the store and see what we're all about."

The gift store features sale clothing and accessories on racks and tables outside its downtown location. According to Brozovich, the merchandise comes out during the good weather and stays outside "'til it snows."

"Everyday someone says something about the

sales," Brozovich said. Brozovich continually recruits new customers to the store by way of the outdoor items. Traditionally the pieces are those on sale and need "more attention."

"They're extra-good bargains," Brozovich said. Across the street from Village Apparel, Rudy's Market also sets up an outdoor display during the spring and summer seasons. Co-owner Christopher

Thomas finds the displays definitely bring people into his store.

"It's more of an outdoor farmer's look," Thomas said. "We're advertising our fresh produce and store approach. It really compliments each other."

Rudy's features items ranging from fresh fruits and vegetables to cut flowers and even garden items.

While displaying store items outside proves beneficial, store owners must be careful of pedestrian safety with the size of their displays.

According to Clarkston's City Clerk Art Pappus, the city has a 5-foot variance rule for clearance on city sidewalks. However, the Michigan Department of Transportation is responsible for Main Street and business owners must comply with their standards.

"It's usually whatever MDOT lets them get away

with," Pappas said. Stores aren't the only downtown businesses utilizing a Main Street location. Restaurants are also taking advantage of the downtown stretch.

Both the Clarkston Union and The Chocolate Moose feature outdoor seating for its patrons to enjoy the city scene.

The Aug. 3 primary election produced three new township officials in Supervisor-elect Dave Wagner, Clerk-elect Shelagh VanderVeen and Trustee-elect

Charles Dunn. The three will begin their fouryear terms on Nov. 20.

"My first order of business is to reinstate direchead tor meetings," Wagner said.

"I want to have open communication and have the ability to get to know each other. I also want to reestablish communication with the schools, county and community."

Wagner hopes to meet with current Supervisor Dale Stuart to get up to speed with the job.

"I am looking forward to the transition. I think it will be a smooth transition because we both love the township," Wagner said.

When asked about how the transition will go, Stuart said "It remains to be seen. I have not really thought about it."

Wagner has spent the last four years as a trustee so he is familiar with many of the issues affecting the township. He has already spoken to some department heads and township planner Dick Carlisle.

"Dick has done a tremendous job for this community and I look forward to working with him," Wagner said.

Wagner says he has a lot of work to do in the next few months.

"The day I walk in to the office I need to be up to speed. I need to be making decisions on day one and those decisions need to be right," Wagner said.

VanderVeen and retiring Clerk Joan

McCrary have already talked about the endorsed McCrary transition. VanderVeen in the primary.

"We talked about it before the election so I guess we were feeling pretty optimistic," VanderVeen said. "We already discussed me coming in and working while she is still there. I am pretty much going to ghost here. I expect the transition to be smooth."

VanderVeen will also have an opportunity to watch an actual election by job shadowing McCrary during the November election. The newly elected clerk also plans on attending board meetings to get up to date with all issues coming before the board.

"If people living in Clarkston had to make such long commutes," he reasoned, "it would be better if they had a regular blood pressure check and a periodic work-up to see if they were in danger of having a heart attack."

That was the day Leonard Salvia approached four of his medical colleagues to establish a cardiac practice in Clarkston. "If you live here, you already drive too many miles. You should be able to get a thorough checkup ... and cardiac treatment if you need it ... a few

miles from home.' Medical Center His partner,

Cardiologist Mark Stuart, lives in Clarkston with his young family, and has a special fondness for the area. "I want to make this a healthier place to live," he says. "Heart disease isn't only a disease of the elderly. Excessive diets and a general lack of physical activity have put young adults and kids at risk. We have a wonderful opportunity to do lifesaving things here."

And there is a glimmer of hope that heart disease is controllable, if not preventable. Dr. Salvia points to recent data indicating a small decline in coronary disease in Michigan. "It is too early to call it a trend yet, but we are beginning to see proof that coronary disease is less prevalent when we are able to detect risk factors earlier in younger people, get people started on proper medications, help them stop smoking and control their weight."

Vascular imaging, echo cardiograms and nuclear stress testing are just


some of the proactive procedures available on the Clarkston premises, which can usually be scheduled within 24 hours of a patient's call. "It has been helpful to have a fully operational Emergency Room downstairs — for those times someone goes into cardiac arrest," Salvia explains. "The 24-hour Clarkston Health Center ER facility is staffed by emergency trauma doctors and specialists from POH Medical Center, one of the most respected emergency medical teams in North Oakland County."

Township receives audit

Independence Township got a clean bill of health during their annual audit by Plante & Moran at the Aug. 6 board meeting.

"It is a clean opinion," Plant & Moran audit partner Joe Hefferman said. "There are a lot of cities and township that do not get clean opinions."

According to Hefferman, the two most significant financial highlights for last year was the state-shared revenue being reduced by approximately \$67,000 and the beginning of the Sashabaw drainage project with spending approximating \$850,000. .

The township reacted to the cut in revenue sharing, which is the largest \$74.846 million.

· source of the general fund, by requesting department directors reduce their expenditures.

As a result, the general fund balance decreased by only \$161,397. The general fund is at \$2.157 million, although only \$957,410 is unreserved meaning it is not already designated for a purpose.

That is a very healthy fund balance," Hefferman said. "The township is in real good shape."

Last year the township had \$19.218 million in expenditures with \$18.964 of revenue.

The township's combined net assets increased 1.42 percent from a year ago - increasing from \$73.799 million to





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Vandals jeopardize Frisbee golf course fûture

Vandalism remains a problem for the Frisbee golf course inside Bay Court Park in Independence Township. Damage to the memorial course has been a problem since it opened and if continues, will potentially close the activity all together.

"We can't baby-sit these people," Mike Turk, Independence Township Parks and Recreation director, said.

Damage to the course and surrounding park property has included written profanity, abuse to park trees and even removing baskets from the course itself.

"It's been hit and miss lately," Turk said.

The park has already closed once this summer because of vandalism problems. Large signs are posted when this occurs and specificly states the reason for closing is due to vandalism.

Parks and rec officials document all vandalism instances with local authorities. Park rangers are also on duty to keep trouble at a minimum.

The stances with local authorities are also on in 1998.

If the problems persist, Turk believes the Frisbee golf course will be removed from Bay Court all together.

"It's unfortunate because the Frisbee golf course was donated by a family who lost someone," Turk said. Turk, who would make the final decision of the course's future, said the family would be contacted if that decision must be made.

Damage to the course at Bay Park is not a new occurence. In 2002 the course was closed for several weeks after continued vandalism, including littered beer bottles, graffiti on park buildings, smashed electrical meters and even a dumpster set on fire.

Independence Township is not the only community facing problems with Frisbee golf courses. Seymour Lake Park in Oxford recently closed their course after continued vandalism.

The course is dedicated to Ryan Schmidt and opened

Home invasions baffle Independence investigators

Independence Township residents continue to report home burglaries, and Oakland County Sheriff investigators continue to work the clues.

Lt. Dale LaBair, commander of the Independence Township substation, admits little progress has been made in some recent cases.

"The wheels are turning, but we're not really getting anywhere fast," he said.

Jewelry and drugs have been favorite targets, with cent weeks.

this past week's incidents including burglaries on Maybee Road and Eastview on Aug. 4 and Pelton Road on Aug. 7.

A total of five people were arrested in two incidents in June, but home burglaries continue. LaBair said there are some "common denominators" among the cases, but he does not believe they are all perpetrated by one suspect or group of suspects.

"It's not just us," he said, noting neighboring communities have also been hit hard with burglaries in reLike it or not, the affluence of the Clarkston area appears to be a magnet.

"The same thing that brings people to suburbia also attract the thieves," LaBair said. "They know what to look for."

Some of the incidents have occurred at homes with unlocked doors, but many have been forced entry. LaBair said the purchase of a home safe could be a deterrent to thieves.

"They're not impenetrable, but they might discourage the novices," he said.

He is so young.

That was what my mind contemplated just before I shook the soldier's hand. In that nanosecond before our hands touched I didn't really know what to say -- the young man in front of me was a stranger. The people surrounding him in the park's pavilion were his family and friends. Total strangers to me. I extended my right hand to take his.

"Ah, Alec? Um. Thank you," was the unclear, not pithy and somewhat disjointed greeting that

escaped past my lips.

"Thank you, sir," he politely responded with a firm handshake and a calm, gentle voice.

"Um, thank you," I repeated. "This is my six-year-old son, Shamus."

In June, 2003 Alec MacDougall was new graduate of Goodrich High School. By January of 2004, PFC Alec MacDougall was heading to Baghdad via Kuwait as part of the United States 2nd Army Calvary Regiment, 84th Engineers. Gone were the lush greens of the Michigan landscape. Gone were

the friends, family and familiar sounds and smells of home. Home became an old cigarette factory out in the desert, halfway around the globe.

Having just cast ballots for the Primary Election, Shamus and I were en-route to karate class. I had seen the signs welcoming Alec home and so veered the family minivan off the main drag, down a side street to the park. I wanted to thank Alec and I wanted Shamus to thank Alec. Too many times we live our lives, enjoy our prosperity and ignore the world around us. It is not often enough we contemplate and thank those who go off and fight and die for the ideals of freedom and liberty.

Businessman Doug Tetmeyer employed Alec before Alec went to war. He was at the welcome home party and emailed me a note that summed things up nicely: "Whether you agree with the actions in Iraq or not, it is important to show support for the troops who are doing their best to protect us and our way of life, as well as the peace of the world."

I have been privileged to know and work with many veterans of foreign wars. Heck, after the Korean "conflict," my dad was a dogface who cleaned up mines and helped

build back Korea. But, I had never had the opportunity nor did I ever seek one out -- to thank a current soldier of an ongoing, current war.

I do know a soldier, cousin Kathleen's husband Mark. He served his time during the Gulf War and then for the benefits was a reservist after. He left for Iraq around Christmas time. Before he left, I bought him a Guinness, wished him luck and told him to make it back home. Every night I say a little prayer for his and all our soldiers' safe return. Every day I check my e-mail with trepidation. I signed up to receive the Department of Defense's daily updates. And each day when I see another announcement of the death of an American soldier, my heart slows down. I signed up as a reporter-type to keep current tabs on local soldiers, but what I really do is look and watch for Mark. I keep my fingers crossed.



schools with high Status grades whose achievement score declined slightly. In numerous cases, schools that had an 'A' in Status received an 'F' in Change because of a slight decline in their scores, even though student achievement remained at a very high level.

"Parents and the community in these schools objected to the 'F' grades, believing they misrepresented what they viewed as continued high performance by their schools," the report said.

Other areas of "flexibility" in the new grading system included "participation" (averaging data over two or three years to measure the required 95 percent participation in testing) and in assessment of "English Language Learners."

The format of the new report cards has been altered slightly to reflect the "flexible" scoring methods, now including a category for "adjusted" Achievement Change in each test category.

Anita Banach, director of marketing and communications for Clarkston Community Schools, said the district is taking the school report cards as only one element of measuring progress.

"We don't feel our hands are tied to that, because

we already set high standards," she said.

A press release from the Michigan Department of Education said NCLB is so stringent with subgroup requirements that the possibility for AYP "failure" exists in any of 50 possible combinations of testing area and student subgroup.

Statewide, the number of schools meeting the AYP requirement increased to 2,058 this year from 2,006 last year.

Schools failing to achieve AYP are required to engage in a series of federally-mandated corrective measures. The ultimate penalty under No Child Left Behind is loss of federal Title I funds, which only four Clarkston schools receive. Under the state Education YES system, "failing" schools would lose state accredi-

With this year's report, however, no Clarkston schools are targeted for corrective measures.

Beginning with the 2005-2006 school year, another measurement will be added to the state school report cards. In addition to "achievement status" and "achievement change" will be "achievement growth," a measurement of whether students are demonstrating at least one year of academic growth for each year of instruc-

Even next year, statewide minimum performance standards will increase for schools to achieve AYP.

"Our schools are going to have to continue working hard as the bar gets raised next year," according to Tom Watkins, state superintendent of public instruc-

While all Clarkston schools are already above next year's minimum test score targets, there is the matter of the gradual progression toward 100 percent.

"The reality is, if you're hovering in the 90s, it's going to be an up-down fluctuation," Banach said.

Local murder, rape cases proceed through court system

Two high profile cases from Independence Township are winding their way through Oakland County Circuit Court.

Lance Allen Schmidt, 20, and Joseph Wells Stapleton, 19, both of Independence Township, have been arraigned and will face a pre-trial examination at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 19 before Circuit Judge Denise K. Langford-Morris on charges of seconddegree murder.

The two men had already pleaded no contest to charges of assault with intent to inflict great bodily harm after a November 2002 incident at the McDonald's on Sashabaw Road. In that case, a verbal dispute turned violent and the convicts repeatedly punched and kicked Peter Richard, 44, of Lapeer.

Richard died March 4 of this year from a pulmonary embolism which, according to an Oakland County medical examiner, resulted from surgery made necessary by injuries suffered in the as-

In proceedings in district court, defense attorneys attempted to question the link of Richard's death to the as-

Meanwhile, Gregory H. Combs, 35, of Orion Town-

ship had a pre-trial examination last week before Circuit Judge John J. McDonald and is scheduled for a

Sept. 27 trial on two charges of first degree criminal sexual conduct.

Combs was charged in a May 28 incident in which he allegedly raped a 19-year-old Clarkston woman near the DTE Energy Music Theater.

The woman was walking away from a concert to meet friends outside the theater when she said Combs forced her into multiple sex acts alongside a deserted entrance road.

In district court appearances, the defense argued that the encounter was consensual.

Assistant county prosecutor Gregory Townsend is handling both cases, and said there were no difficulties encountered in recent Circuit Court proceed-

In both cases the potential penalty upon conviction is life in prison.

Woman suspects sweepstakes scam

The phone call sounded too good to be true, and the resident recognized it as such.

A Clarkston Road resident on Saturday, Aug. 7 reported receiving a telephone call from the "Kingston, Jamaica office of Publishers Clearinghouse." The caller said the resident was the winner of a \$493,000 cash prize, but said a requirement was to pay \$1,200 in "taxes" up front.

The resident expressed nervousness about sending that much money through the mail, and the caller said a pickup could be arranged.

Upon advice from Oakland County Sheriff investigators, the woman called back and said it would take a few days to collect the cash. Investigators were to have attempted a plainclothes surveillance of the transaction, Lt. Dale LaBair said Monday it is unlikely that a suspect would be apprehended in this matter.

"Just ignore it," he said, when receiving any questionable announcement which includes a solitication for money.

Lake board proposes assessment increase

The legal battles surrounding Waumegah Lake has led the lake improvement board to propose a \$120,000 assessment increase to pay for legal fees related to a proposed augmentation well.

A "hearing of practicability" took place Aug. 5 and produced a resolution to proceed to a "hearing of assessment" scheduled for Sept. 14.

If approved, the new assessment would be spread over a five-year period. The hearing process is according to state law governing lake improvement boards.

Charles Dunn, an attorney representing the lake board, said the assessment increase would be to cover "costs unforeseen at the time of the project."

The lake board, citing a 1997 ruling from Circuit Judge Rudy Nichols establishing the legal lake level at 1,049.9 feet, has been involved in a struggle both with opponents of the well and the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality.

Proponents say the well is needed to restore the lake to its proper level, while opponents have voiced concerns ranging from potential harm to wetlands to potential depletion of groundwater.

The lake board has filed suit in circuit court against an MDEQ denying the augmentation well, but Dunn said a full-blown court case may not be necessary.

"We are working on an interim settlement that will solve some of the problems," Dunn said.

Stolen vehicle abandoned in church lot

Larcenies from vehicles have become commonplace, but an incident last week involved the theft of the vehicle, as well.

Deputies responded to a Waldon Road address at about 4 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 4, where the owner said he was awakened by the sound of his vehicle starting. An unknown subject drove away.

About an hour later, the vehicle was recovered in

the parking lot of St. Daniel's Catholic Church. A custodian in the building said he saw the vehicle enter the parking lot at a high rate of speed, but he did not get a description of the occupant.

The owner reported golf clubs, shoes and CDs missing from the vehicle.

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

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
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
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Drawing made simple with princess jewels, gowns, crowns

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

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

A magic show for family and friends concluded the week-long magical study. Each camper presented their best trick to awe and amaze the audience.


"You learn the most when you're doing a show," Zieman said.



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



for her. "I get a lot of ribbing [about the title],


