

# MEAP confusion cleared

This is not the first time there has been confusion with the MEAP test. In recent events, the scores for elementary and middle school levels were posted and then quickly removed. Many may wonder why.

In last week's issue of The Clarkston News, the MEAP confusion was briefly explained. Now, new reasons for why the scores were pulled are clear.

According to Director of Marketing and Communications for Clarkston Community Schools Anita Banach, the results were pulled due to the writing portion. The writing portion is one part of the four section test. There is a prompt for students to follow, and apparently the prompt may have been more difficult than expected.

Due to the writing prompt, the

MEAP scores came out unusually low in the writing portion. This low level caused shock amongst school officials and administrators.

"Everyone was shocked about the writing scores," said Banach. "There was a lot of backlash from the state so they pulled the scores to determine why they were so low."

The Michigan Department of Education pulled the results almost immediately after they were posted, and looked at previous years' MEAP scores. Realizing the vast difference in last year's test compared to this year's, administrators decided that maybe the system needed to change for the future.

"There were a lot of speculations as to why the results were so low," said Banach. "Now we know that the

# Attorneys discourage sharing of easements

After some delay and debate, the Independence Township's legal firm stated that the township board "should not... cannot" share easements with the North Oakland Headwaters Land Conservancy.

At the May 4 regular meeting, Karlstrom Cooney presented a formal opinion on the Pine Knob Golf Course easements. According to the letter provided, the township board "should not, and in all probability, cannot effect such an assignment or purpose."

The letter, signed by Stuart B. Cooney, concludes, "we recommend that the board not endeavor to assign its scenic easement on the Pine Knob Properties to a private entity."

Karlstrom Cooney listed several reasons for not recommending the sharing of the Pine Knob easements:

• The township does not need to renew the easements after 40 years. "In Section 4, of the Marketable Title Act the legislature specifically exempted political subdivisions (such as villages, cities and townships) of the State of Michigan from application of the act."

• Sharing the easement would limit the township's interest without any measurable benefit. "It does not seem prudent to create a potentially terminable interest in the easement to protect a nonterminable interest."

• "The scenic easements at issue were executed as part of a specific zon-



#### **Community Health News Topic: Osteoporosis**

Among the myriad of problems we as individuals and society face with the aging of the Baby Boomers is bone health. Osteoporosis and the related osteopenia are increasing and often under recognized major health conditions. Osteoporosis is a disease characterized by low bone mass and structural deterioration of bone tissue, leading to bone fragility and an increased susceptibility to fractures. The conditions themselves cause no symptoms and are thus "silent" risk factors for major health consequences resulting from the related bone fractures particularly of the spine and hip. It is estimated that 44 million Americans, or 55 percent of the people 50 years of age and older are affected. One in two women and one in four men over age 50 will have an osteoporosis-related fracture in her/his remaining lifetime. While osteoporosis is often thought of as an older person's disease, it can strike at any age. Certain people are more likely to develop osteoporosis than others.


A partial list of risk factors include: being female (although males are affected as well), family history of osteoporosis, estrogen deficiency in females (especially following menopause) and testosterone deficiency in males, smoking and alcohol use, low body weight, nutritional deficiencies, physical inactivity and certain medications. Testing for osteoporosis can be done with a simple Bone Mineral Density scan, a non-invasive test readily available from your health care provider. Screening is recommended for all women following menopause or surgical removal of ovaries, men over age 70, adults with fractures with minimal trauma, and adults on certain medications or other risk factors. Treatment involves correction of underlying risk factors such as smoking cessation, increasing exercise and supplemental dietary calcium and vitamin D. There are several prescription medications available, which will restore bone density and lessen risk of associated fractures. Individuals are encouraged to discuss personal risk with their physician and determine whether Bone Density screening or other preventive measures are appropriate for them.

# Couple helps patients, families live full life despite Parkinson's

Harry and Nancy Knitter live such an active life in the Clarkston community, they figured they might as well appear in front of the camera, too.

The couple are among the "stars" of a new video, "In Their Own Words," a documentary focusing on people in Michigan affected by Parkinson's disease.

The 25-minute video debuted on May 4 at a support group meeting in Rochester facilitated by Nancy Knitter, and will be used by doctors and support groups throughout the state to help those facing the news of the chronic, progressive neurological condition.

"I'm a little bit of a ham, anyway," Harry Knitter said with a laugh. "We were glad to do it."

The video, narrated by Detroit media personality Rich Fisher, features interviews with the Knitters and other couples concerning their experiences not only coping, but living a full life despite the disease.

Harry Knitter, who with his wife run their own small publishing company, has already written a book about

his experiences. He welcomed the opportunity to do the video, however, hoping it will help comfort and encourage people receiving the news of the diagnosis.

In a way, he wishes something like that was available when he was diagnosed 13 years ago.

"We didn't have a lot of reference information," he said. "We didn't know where to turn."

The couple did a lot of their own research, but eventually joined with the Michigan Parkinson's Foundation, a non-profit organization working toward education and support for those dealing with the disease.

Knitter, who is also an active member of the Clarkston Optimist Club, has fully embraced the concept of "making lemonade when they throw lemons at you."

"If I have to go through life with Parkinson's, I'm going to do it with a positive note," he said.

Nancy Knitter, who considers herself a "care-partner" rather than a "caregiver," said she hopes people


Springfield Plains Elementary won for cone at Dairy Queen. Yummy!




It was a lot of hard work and a lot of fun. We are so happy that we helped promote the Walk & Roll for SCAMP!

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
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# Fancy meeting you here



The day, which organizers said kicks off the season for the annual 4-H Fair, included lots of contact with animals, but also offered opportunities to learn new skills in many other areas.








Next against Warren Mott,



Thanks to the United States Supreme Court, some athletes in Michigan are not being forced to choose between two sports which they enjoy playing.

Thanks to the United States Supreme Court, girls are still not treated equally in Michigan high school athletics.

As the sports seasons stand right now, Michigan

is somewhat out of whack with the rest of the nation. When our girls play soccer in the spring, everyone else's boys are on the field. When our volleyball players throw up the first serve of the season, the rest of the country has dug their final ball.

Had the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the ruling of the lower courts, Michigan girls basketball would have been played in the winter and volleyball in the fall. Boys and girls soccer, tennis and golf would have switched seasons as well.

Michigan is the only state which schedules volleyball in the winter and one of two which schedules girls basketball in the fall.

One of the easiest things to do when examining this issue is to say "who cares." The belief that the current MHSAA schooling is fitr and equitable is mislaid, and the result of a unwillingness to change.

To put this issue in simpler terms; what if the MH-SAA scheduled their football season for the spring, while the rest of the country played games in the fall?

Every other state's seasons would have been wrapped up by the time Michigan athletes hit the grid

iron. Now if you were a college scout, would you want to travel to see four kids during the fall, or three in the fall and one in the spring.

The answer to that question is easy. With the pressure of collegiate athletic programs placed on recruiting, why would a school hold a spot for a kid from Michigan? Often doing so means they will lose a talented recruit whose senior season is completed to another school.

A girl playing soccer in Michigan has an incomplete resume when compared to a girl from Ohio or Indiana. The soccer players from other states get to show their senior season off to college scouts. The girl om Michigan only has a chance to complete he junior year. When a scholarship to a prestigious university needs to be awarded, who do you think is going to be signing on the dotted line? Not the girl from Michigan.

I know of at least one Clarkston student who is playing collegiate soccer next year, she should be applauded for her excellence. But I can't help but wonder if she would have had even more opportunities if more college programs were able to see her play

The regrettable side of this issue, is that sports have been scheduled strangely in Michigan for so long that the MHSAA, the schools, the coaches and the athletes are entrenched; and change has become scary.

I do feel sympathy for students who would be forced to choose between two sports they love equally. While tough decisions like that will not have to be made this year, this court case is far from finished. Athletes may be forced to choose one sport over another as soon as the 2006-07 school year.

While change may be tough in the beginning, no reasoning against the sports season change can outweigh the reasoning for it. Female athletes in Michigan deserve to be on an equal playing field with the rest of the country.


The Clarkston golf team had one of their worst performances of the year in the most important meet of the season to date, but bounced back to put a silver lining on their week.



The Wolves had several standouts from the meet: Brad Gale took fifth and fourth respectively in the 300 medium hurdles and 110 high hurdles as well as helping the relay team of Jesse Kessler, Matt Alexander and Pedro Matos capture fifth in the 400; in the distance medley Matt Alexander, Jesse Kessler, Nick Puroll and Hazen Brennan finished third; and Gregg Knappe's time of 11.4 netted him fourth in the 100.

Also performing well for the Wolves was the 1600 relay team of Andrew Chaffee, Matt Inch, Travis Hughes and Ed Brennan; and the middle distance relay of Puroll, Steve Hunter, Matt Hunter and Chris Anderson. Both relays managed fifth place finishes.

The track teams hosted Rochester High on May 10, but the meet finished too late for this edition of *The Clarkston News*.

Both boys and girls track teams will travel together to the South Lyon Invitational on May 13, but the girls will also compete in the Mott relays on May 14, as both teams start winding up for regionals on May 20.

When asked about influences on her collegiate career, Karlstrom pointed directly back to Clarkston High School.


"I think having Ann (Lowney) as a coach really helped me," said Karlstrom, who still talks to her former coach

Karlstrom specifically pointed out that Lowney, the former varsity womens basketball coach at CHS, helped prepare her for college especially in the conditioning area.


Having helped Drexel to a 19-10 record this year, Karlstrom is hoping to continue improving with the team next year.

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



· First of all, the election consolidation legislation created the option of a May election date for school districts. This leads us to conclude that our elected representatives believe there are valid and justifiable reasons for holding school elections in May. From our perspective, this makes sense because it provides new board members with the time necessary to prepare for the new school year.

• November elections simply do not align with our fiscal year, board responsibilities and school calendar. This misalignment could negatively impact the school district in several ways.

The November date would have board members starting their terms well after the start of school; and after the most important decisions for that school vear have been made.

· School elections have historically been





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# larkston man dies in 6-car collision at Lapeer/Clarkston

A Clarkston man died during surgery on May 7, after he was the passenger in a vehicle that was involved in a six-car pile-up at Lapeer and Clarkston Roads on Saturday afternoon.

According to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, Donald Allen Moore, 77, of Clarkston, died at Royal Oak Beaumont Hospital, where he was taken by ambulance after being extricated from the vehicle he was riding in by the Orion Township Fire Department.

The accident occurred westbound Clarkston Road, west of M-24, at 2:57 p.m. on May 7, when a 75-yearold Clarkston woman attempted to make a prohibited left turn from Lapeer Road.

According to the OCSD, the woman was driving a

Chevrolet Suburban SUV, and was attempting to to turn medical treatment at the scene. from northbound Lapeer, south of Clarkston, to go westbound on Clarkston Road, from a lane marked for authorized vehicle use only.

Moore was the woman's front-seat passenger, and she ran the red light while turning left, and was struck by a 2002 Nissan Pathfinder, driven by a 55-year-old Commerce woman and traveling south on Lapeer Road.

After striking the Cheverolet, the Nissan ran off the roadway to the right, striking a light pole and the building housing the Limelight Salon at the northwest corner of Clarkston and Lapeer.

The Cheverolet went left of center, into the eastbound lanes of Clarkston Road, striking four vehicles that were sitting at the red light.

None of those drivers were injured, and all refused

The driver of the Nissan was transported to POH, where she was treated and released. The Clarkston woman driving the Chevrolet was transported to POH, where the OCSD said she was stable and still receiving treatment.

Moore was transported to Royal Oak Beaumont, where he later died in surgery at 5:48 p.m.

The OCSD Crash Reconstruction Unit is still investigating the accident, but said all of the people involved were wearing seatbelts, and that alcohol did not appear to be a factor.

The OCSD said the driver of the Chevrolet may have been having a medical problem prior to the crash, which may be a factor.

## MDOT: I-75 will get guardrails

In the wake of a fiery fatal crash on I-75, the Michigan Department of Transportation has announced plans to install guardrails in the median south of M-15.

"We are going to fill in that gap," said MDOT spokesman Rob Morosi. "We have every intention of completing it by this fall."

Local public safety officials last week lamented the lack of guardrails in the April 30 tragedy which took three lives and caused five vehicles to catch. fire. The combination of high-speed traffic, curved pavement and generally level medians have contributed to multiple fatal emergencies on I-75 through Independence Township.

Officials also credited newly-installed guardrails north of M-15 for preventing a major disaster when a semitruck overturned earlier this year.

Morosi said there are some "is sues" which may affect construction. Crews must relocate some utility lines and redesign drainage in some places. for example. There are also "fabrication issues," Morosi said, in relation to fulfilling orders for steel to build the guardrails themselves.

"We had a project in the pipeline," Morosi said, but recent events have led to making this a priority. "Every effort will be made" to complete the project

After last weekend's crash, Independence Township Fire Chief Steve Ronk said township officials needed to demand immediate attention to the lack of guardrails in the area.

Lt. Dale LaBair, commander of the Independence Township substation of the Oakland County Sheriff's Office. thought there were plans to install the guardrails, but was glad to hear those plans were accelerated.

"We're tired of cleaning 'em up," LaBair said of the frequent serious crashes on I-75. "It's too bad people had to get killed over the thing.

The April 30 crash occurred when a southbound 2002 Chevrolet S-10 pickup truck crossed the median, striking a northbound 2004 Jeep Cherokee. The crash spread burning gasoline which caused three other vehicles to

Michigan State Police on Monday were still waiting to see if an autopsy of the offending driver will shed any clues as to what caused him to cross the median.

The 54-year-old Clarkston resident died on May 1 after collapsing during a softball game in Sterling Heights.



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

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
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


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# Residents see coyote in local neighborhood

Stray animals may be a fact of life, but many may not know that wild animals also roam in residential neighborhoods of Independence Township.

Bistersky said residents have seen wild turkeys in the area, but this was the first time she had seen anything such as a coyote. She has heard second-hand


reports that residents along Waterford Road have lost pets to full-grown coy-

Neither the Oakland County Sheriff's Office nor Oakland County Animal Control have received any reports of coyote attacks on pets. At least one official, however, said Bistersky's sighting is not a surprise.

"They're all over Oakland County," said Sgt. Jerry McNair, animal control road supervisor. "It's not unexpected that you might see them every now and then."

Just as with deer and other wild animals, McNair said increased development has forced coyotes from their former habitats.

While unaware of any recent reports of lost pets, McNair said residents would be wise to keep pets from wandering off residential property.

 Andersonville Road between White Lake Road and Curtis Lane is scheduled to be closed through July 30 so Independence Township can install a water main and sanitary sewer

During the closure, the detour route will be White Lake Road to Maceday Lake Road to Williams Lake Road to Airport road to Dixie Highway and vice versa.

· Rattalee Lake Road was scheduled to be closed until May 10 so MDOT can make bridge repairs on the Rattalee Lake Road bridge over



Participants can either pay a set price, depending on the country they are traveling to, or the cost of the trip is covered with a scholarship from one of the many corporate donors, as well as donations from private individuals. According to Mary Alvy, a representative from YFU, about half of the 525 students that are participating this year got scholarships. Although she says that number varies year to year, most of the time 1/3 to 1/2 of students get their trips covered by scholarships. Scholarships opportunities are posted online at YFU's website. They normally require a student to have

Mallory Morell was thrilled when she got her scholarship from sponsors in the Ann Arbor area. "I went to Germany before, and I really liked it, enough that I wanted to do it again," she said. So much so that she is now signed up to go to Ecuador in August for a year.

One year in a far away land may frighten most, but it excites Mallory, "Sure I get homesick, but I mean, you're away, you keep busy," she says."I play my viola, make friends, hang out, do stuff I do here. 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



He a former businessman and she a former teacher, the Knitters are busy practicing what they preach, traveling around the state as seminar presenters and having newly-diagnosed Parkinson's patients in their home. Harry Knitter described a young woman they met with a couple weeks ago.

"She was confused and frustrated," he said. "We tried to point out that life doesn't end when you get Parkinson's."

According to the foundation, Parkinson's disease affects 2 percent of the population over 60 years of age, with an estimated 30,000 people in Michigan being diagnosed. Cardinal signs are tremor at rest, slowness of movement, stiffness and problems with balance. The Knitters say one of the silver linings of dealing with the disease is the number of nice people they've met across the state.

They hope to meet more, as their new support group meets at 7 p.m. on the first Wednesday of each month at Crittenton Hospital in Rochester.

ing proceeding." Since the easements are the product of a zoning procedure, they are subject to zoning law; and no reference was made in those easements to provide for any beneficiary other than the township.

• In the concluding paragraphs, the letter states that "since the board is clearly concerned with its ethical and legal duty to represent its constituents, we wonder why it is important to dictate to a future board that it may not freely perform the same duties." The opinion states that the Open Meetings Act and public elections provide opportunity for the public to express themselves.

"It is inappropriate for a municipal government to unilaterally alter its good faith agreements regarding valuable private property rights simply to prevent its own successors and future constituents from having a different view on the issue," as stated in the letter.

Several area residents spoke on the opinion; however, discussion was limited since the opinion letter was originally presented to the township as a confidential document, and did not become public until the meeting.

Representatives of AAC Acquisitions, Inc., were unable to attend the board meeting. Robert Mollicone, sales and marketing for Pine Knob Enclaves, said company officials have not yet seen the opinion or had an opportunity to review the board minutes.

In addition, Citizens for Orderly Growth (COG) did not have any updates on the topic posted on their website as of deadline Monday.

According to Wagner, he expects AAC Acquisitions to be before the board at the May 17 regular meeting; however, nothing formal was set at the time.







#### Formal event fits the 'bill' for Ducks Unlimited

An evening of beautiful ladies in formal wear and elegant auction items is not the picture that comes to mind when thinking of a banquet sponsored by Ducks Unlimited (DU).

However, Ducks Unlimited is not a typical sportsman's club.

Begun in 1937 by a group of sportsmen concerned by the drought-plagued waterfowl populations, Ducks Unlimited is a grassroots, volunteer-based conservation group focusing upon waterfowl and wetlands.

"I think people are really surprised when they learn about the projects we participate in," said Chuck Myers, area chairman for the North Oakland County Chapter of Ducks Unlimited.

On May 4, the local DU chapter held its largest fund-raiser of the year, an annual banquet featuring a live auction, silent auction and plenty of raffles. The event was held at Deer Lake Athletic Club.

Over 380 people attended the evening, including some from Harrison Township and even one gentleman from Midland. Around 20 committee members and 18 volunteers dressed their best to coordinate the evening.

'It went extremely well. I think everybody had a great time," said Myers. "The auctioneer was great. The selection was wonderful. Everything went quite well."

The local DU chapter will be forwarding over \$85,000 on to the National Ducks Unlimited. Myers said this is the most ever raised at the banquet and auction.

"Last year we raised just under \$79,000," he remembers. "That equalled to about 300 acres of conserved and protected area. We ended that year ranked 26th in the country (out of 3,500 chapters), which gave us access to some great items for the auction."

The featured auction item was an original wildlife scene by Clarkston's own Terry Tracy, owner of La Petite Gallery and featured artist for the evening. The piece depicts a quiet, gentle duck hidden among the reeds and cattails of a wet-

Whether it is the Catholic Church or any religious community, we need to always remember the moral influence of the church should never be based upon reason or cultural trends alone, but upon the fact that as believers in God, we are here to influence the world from God's perspective and not man's perspective.

As a protestant Christian, my practice of the ristian faith is often different than that practiced by the Catholic Church, I am a married clergy who does not have a problem with the practice of family planning and contraception. Although I have a different practice, my conclusions have come from the same desire: the desire to please God and live a life based on God's expectations and not my own. People of

In recent days, the Roman Catholic Church has faith must always remember that, for us, the world in which we live is but a shadow of something much greater.

Our belief in God and eternal things often puts us at odds with contemporary society. We stand as an alternative and also as a pillar to the contemporary society that is often practicing newly found ideas and experiences. One only has to look at recent history to see the great destruction that has come from the influence of secular thinking versus the influence of godly living and tradition.

Adolf Hitler, Joseph Stalin and many other despots came to power with the affirmation of many in the intellectual community. We often express great amazement of how wars and ethnic cleansing have taken place with the idea that it would never happen if people were only educated and informed. History has proven otherwise. We need to understand the role of the church is not to speak from a "godly authority," but to bring the influence of heaven to our

You may be thinking, "But haven't religious people and religion been used as a basis for evil?" I would say that is absolutely true. When we have allowed ourselves to become a part of the contemporary debate from an earthly perspective rather than a heavenly perspective, one can easily become a tool for the purposes of man.

That is why the church must maintain a visible and influential place in the community, not representing a personal opinion, but always striving to represent God's opinion. We must be in the debate, but separate from the system; always seeing ourselves as ambassadors of heaven and not agents of contemporary systems.

Anytime the church has lost sight of this heavenly calling, it has been drawn into the wrong side or been diluted of its power and mandate from God.


