

Judge Dana Fortinberry has answered the formal complaint by the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission and denied allegations of violating the Code of Judicial Conduct.

Leadership Clarkston sets leadership goals

Members of five public bodies from around the Clarkston area came together once again on May 26 to forge a common goal for the community.

In fact, those present forged three. Leadership Clarkston - a joint meeting hosted by the Clarkston Area Chamber of Commerce for board members from the City of the Village of Clarkston, Clarkston Community Schools, Independence Township and Springfield Township - established three "S.M.A.R.T." goals:

· form a steering committee by July 1,

• begin a Leadership Clarkston webpage and

• find a way to offer a "daddy-daughter" dance for all municipalities without duplicating services.

S.M.A.R.T. goals are specific, measurable, accountable, result-oriented and time-framed objectives. In this case, Leadership Clarkston was forming ways for those entities present to partner for the betterment of the community.

The idea of combining and opening the "daddy-daughter" dance, currently offered by both Independence Township Parks and Recreation and Clarkston Community Schools, came from a "team" of representatives looking for a specific,

short-term achievable goal.

"We were looking for a way to share resources and thought 'Where do we start?" said Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole. "We didn't want to grab something unachievable now. We wanted something that would share resources, ideas and allow for us to work together on the bigger picture later."

Setting the goal for a steering committee began with suggestions from two "teams" of representatives. One team wanted to find a way for those entities present to easily share information. Another team wanted a smaller committee formed to keep Leadership Clarkston going year round. The resulting goal was a steering committee.

The steering committee would be responsible for spearheading the Leadership Clarkston goals, making the public aware of partnerships that already exist between the entities and continuing the open communication of the organization. The committee would be a liaison for sharing information, such as when services can be combined or supplies can be combined to avoid duplication and increase cost effectiveness.

Another team of representatives focused upon wanting the public to be aware of existing partnerships. The idea

Murder trial underway BY JAMES MARTINEZ

Clarkston News Staff Writer The trial of two Independence Township men charged with seconddegree murder resumed this week after the holiday weekend recess.

Last week, with jury selection complete, prosecutor Greg Townsend and

probation for repeatedly kicking and punching Richard, a Lapeer resident, after a verbal dispute near the drive-thru window at McDonald's on Sashabaw. On March 4, 2004, a medical examiner ruled that a pulmonary embolism causing Richard's death resulted from a blood clot in his leg which formed after

ongoing process which, if found guilty of the allegations, could result in Fortinberry's removal from office.

Paul Fischer, the executive director of the Judicial Tenure Commission, said the complaint filed contains two counts consisting of charges against the district judge.

Circumstances surrounding the case date back prior to the August 2004 Primary Election. Reportedly in July 2004, Fortinberry made misrepresentations in the July 2004 letter and earlier at a police lodge meeting in March 2004.

In Fortinberry's response, she admits writing the letter to a friend, which was never meant to become public.

In her response, Fortinberry also admits she wrote: "Kelly Ott had an affair with Robert Kostin while he was





The bike was made to specially fit Cody. In the end, his day of sorrow turned into an unforgettable moment.


"We would like to thank the Clarkston community, Clarkston Paving and Kinetic Systems Inc. for their support," said Gualtieri.

As the breeder and myself stood at the podium in front of the judge, I was confident my story would speak for itself. When the breeder began to discuss her side, I knew the case was going to take a while.

The breeder, we'll call her Lisa, completely misrepresented the facts under oath. Instead of defending Sasha and her

misbreeding, she personally attacked me. I decided to simply let her speak.

As it turns out, the more she spoke, the better my case. She denied all allegations, but did not know what she was in for as I prepared my side of the case. I was prepared with everything to prove her statements false from phone records to vet bills.

As the table turned my way, my emotions overflowed and I began to speak – not as an angry person, but a person who lost their puppy. I became a little girl in that court room, as I looked to the judge with nothing but wonder on my face.

To the Clarkston Community, my coworkers, friends, family and the Troy Veterinary Hospital, I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I feel as though we were in this together.

Death by hamster

I can't help it. I know it's not funny. I know it's not a joke. But "death by hamster" just sounds funny to me.

I am bad.

I'm going to Hades.

I can't help it. I can't stop thinking about those three folks who died because they received donated organs infected with some sort of yucky hamster disease.

The actual circumstances surrounding their deaths is sad. How and what did they die from? Read on.

According to a report from the Boston Herald of May 24, "Three critically ill patients -- including two from the Bay State -- died from what they thought were lifesaving transplants because the organs they re-

ceived were infected by a virus transmitted by the donor's pet hamster, health officials said ...

"Four people -- two from Massachusetts and two from Rhode Island -- underwent transplant surgery on April 10 and 11, after receiving the organs from a woman who died from an embolic stroke.

"The only other known incident of LCMV-infected organs causing a death occurred in Wisconsin in 2003.

"Humans become infected with the virus when they come in contact with rodent urine, feces or saliva. In healthy people, LCMV usually only causes flu-like symptoms.

"But organ recipients get drugs that suppress their immune system to help prevent organ rejection. The downside, officials said, is that they are more vulnerable to infectious disease. Officials would not identify the donor or victims, citing privacy laws."



had initial difficulty with the timeline and causation of the injuries," Arnold Weiner, attorney for Stapleton, said.

At the request of defense lawyers, there was a severance of the jury, so that each defendant will have their own jury.

Before the jury for Schmidt and later for Stapleton, Assistant Prosecutor Greg Townsend discussed the prosecution's theory of causation behind the pulmonary embolism. Townsend explained how a fracture to Richard's back was identified by an x-ray but suggested that a herniated disc would not have appeared from the x-ray and was only diagnosed after an MRI conducted well after the original incident.

The herniated disc Richard was having operated on is what the prosecution claims led to the clot and his death.

"When you're stomping the L3(the fractured area of Richard's back), you're crushing the entire area. No one checked. If they had done an MRI they would have found the herniated disc with the fracture." Townsend said.

Near the end of Townsend's opening statement, jurors saw the surveillance tape of the two defendants beating Richard near the McDonald's drive-thru.

As Townsend has stated before, there is little doubt in his mind that the juries will come to a guilty verdict on the second degree murder charge.

Both defense lawyers questioned the linking of the herniated disc to the beating their clients were involved in.

Michael McCarthy, Schmidt's lawyer acknowledged his client was on the tape and addressed the medical debate in his opening statement to the jury.

"This is not a case about who done it. It's about why Peter Richard died in 2004."

Weiner questioned the validity of the surveillance tape in regards to location of the blows Richard received.

"Only four or five of the punches and kicks shown in the tape come from Joey. The tape does not show where."

The trial will continue this week before Circuit Judge Denise Langford-Morris.

married to Judie, Judie found out about the affair shortly before her death, and the police investigation was conducted 'quietly' by the White Lake Township Police Chief." She also admitted the police investigation was inconclusive and the case closed as a suicide and sealed.

Fortinberry's statement denies she wrote Judie Kostin's death was a murder with a cover-up involving Robert Kostin, Kelley (Ott) Kostin and local police officials.

The formal response also states a neighbor, not Fortinberry, said Kelly Ott moved into Kostin's house less than a month after Judie Kostin's death.

Fortinberry acknowledged she did not attempt to independently verify the truth of the representations and under the circumstances, had absolutely no reason to disbelieve or question the truth of the representations.

A law enforcement officer and a fellow member of the Bar were cited in the response as providing the statements she admits making.

Fortinberry also admitted she had no firsthand knowledge the police investigation had reached an incorrect result. Fortinberry admitted statements presented in her letter raised questions about the moral fiber of Mr. Kostin and Kelley (Ott) Kostin, but she denies having stated either or both were involved in the Judie Kostin's death.

Fortinberry's response cites the First Amendment of the Constitution and Article I, Section 5 of the Michigan Constitution as evidence to bar the complaint against her for engaging in political and/or protected speech.

The response also references Michigan Supreme Court case In Re Chmura, 464 Mich. 58, by stating "the complaint does not sufficiently allege that Judge Fortinberry's purported resentations were false, the Judicial Tenure Commission cannot sufficiently establish the falsity of the purported representations, and/or the purported statements on which the complaint is based are, in large part, statements of opinion.'

The Judicial Tenure Commission requested the Michigan Supreme Court appoint a master to hear and take evidence in the matter and report to the commission.

According to Fischer, the Supreme Court holds jurisdiction for naming a master. Fischer would not speculate on a time frame for the hearing or naming of the master, but said masters are often retired judges.

According to the procedural guidelines from the Judiciary Tenure Commission's website, (http:// jtc.courts.mi.gov/) the commission may recommend disciplinary actions against Fortinberry to the Michigan Supreme Court if a preponderance of the evidence shows misconduct.

Matthew F. Leitman, attorney for Judge Fortinberry, was contacted, but did not wish to be quoted.


I wanted to be."

Expect to see Sandy Timulak and various members of her family working – especially since Timulak said she couldn't have started this business without them.





Star Wars Spirituality

Grab your Darth Vader mask and light saber, the final installment of the "Star Wars" trilogy has arrived! Undoubtedly, the "Star Wars" trilogy has incredibly affected our culture. The impact can be seen from toys and game play, to catch phrases (i.e. "the Force is with you") and gaggles of crowds who are willing to camp out for weeks on end to be the first in line to see "Revenge of the Sith." But does the double trilogy draw a spiritual parallel to our everyday lives? Maybe more than we know.

The story is simple: good guys versus bad guys, a princess in distress, and a boy (actually a boy and his father) who must make the choice of which path their lives will take. In the story of "Star Wars," the conflict of good and evil comes to a climax in "Return of the Jedi," a mirror story of "Revenge of the Sith," in which order is restored to the imbalance of light and darkness. This is also true of our world and future. Although darkness is a current force prevalent in every day life, the Bible says that one day the darkness that has fallen on our world from Lucifer's decision will be snuffed by the light and truth of Jesus Christ.

Today, millions around the world stand in lines to see the fall of Anakin Skywalker and the birth of Darth Vader. But one day, billions around the world will bow on bended knee to see the final fall of Lucifer and the return of Jesus Christ. What a day that will be! Instead of walking out of a darkened theatre and adjust

Julian was presented with an engraved bronze medallion recognizing her selection as a Distinguished Finalist in the 2005 Prudential Spirit of Community Awards program.


"I was pretty surprised. It wasn't something I really expected," Julian said.




