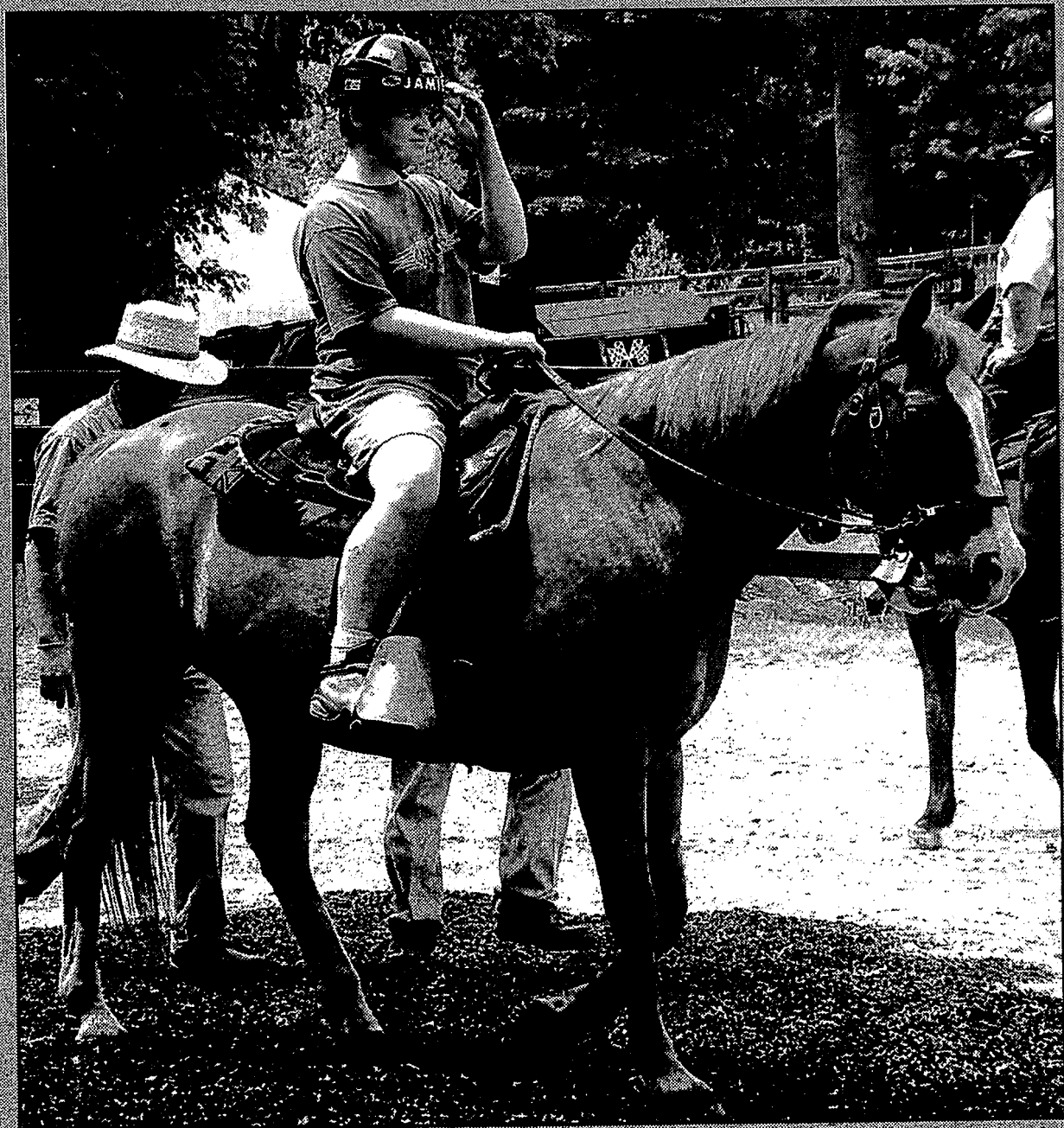

## Auto giant knows horse power

Instead of being forced to slow to a trot as in summers past, O.A.T.S.' (Offering Alternative Therapy and Smiles) riders can now gallop into the hot and dry season — thanks to the generosity of the Ford Motor Company and local dealer Scott Ford.

With close to 34 tons of crumb rubber spread across two riding arenas at O.A.T.S. facilities on June 9, Executive Director Nancy Heussner does not need to worry about dust kicked up by the horses becoming a health hazard anymore.

Heussner and her all-volunteer staff can now focus on helping people overcome their handicaps, which range from muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy,

multiple sclerosis and a wide array of other physical and mental maladies.

"(The crumb rubber) will be like tennis shoes for the horses and we have a lot of riders with breathing problems and it will cut out all of the dust in the air," said O.A.T.S. instructor Beth Pellerito. "My son Nicholas had been riding for seven years. When he started riding he couldn't walk."

In terms of patrons, O.A.T.S. is the largest facility of its kind in Michigan. In summer months riders were escorted along trails, the dust keeping them away from the freedom of the riding arena.

"We used to water the ground at 3 p.m. and by 5 p.m. it would be like the beach," said Heussner.

## Senior Center on the horizon

How to pay for it still a question

The Charter Township of Independence and Clarkston Community Schools are closer than ever to shaking hands over a four-acre parcel located on Clarkston Road.

The goal is to construct a new Independence Township Senior Center on land adjacent to the Clarkston Community Schools Administration Building and Independence Township Library.

Dave Wagner, Independence Township Supervisor, discussed the land trade with township trustees at a closed session on June 7. After the meeting, the board unanimously approved a motion allowing Wagner to negotiate the final details with school officials.

"Now we really have to get to work on this," said Wagner. "We need to come together and get everyone behind this."

## Guilty verdicts in murder trial

On Friday afternoon, separate juries found Joseph Wells Stapleton and Lance Allen Schmitt, both 21, guilty of the second degree murder of Lapeer resident Peter Richard.

The Clarkston men were charged after Richard, 44, died from a pulmonary embolism prosecutors linked to a 2002 beating by the defendants outside the Sashabaw Road McDonald's.

Last week, Schmitt's jury deliberated only four hours, while Stapleton's jury could not reach a decision until Friday.

Although Schmitt's verdict was reached early in the week, the jury's decision was sealed until both juries finished deliberation.

Stapleton stared straight ahead as the jury foreman read the verdict.

"He was fighting back tears," said Arnold Weiner, Stapleton's lawyer.

"This is a travesty. If the jury was allowed to know that he already did 11 months, it would have been different. I can't believe this occurred. I'm shaken," Weiner continued. "We believe we introduced multiple reasonable doubts."

Weiner stormed from the courtroom muttering expletives shortly after the court clerk polled the jury.

Events included a high-angle water tower rescue, playground safety, carnival games, choking education, face painting, smokehouse encounter and other exhibits.

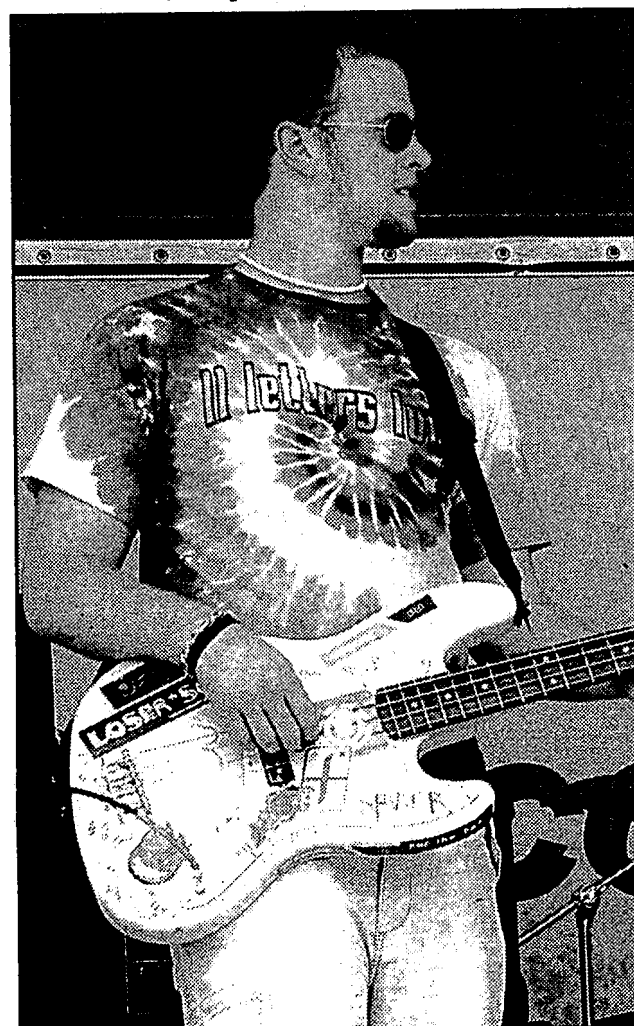

11 Letters Long of Clarkston will open the Clarkston Area Chamber of Commerce's Concerts in the Park series Friday.

The band, composed of all Clarkston High School

students, performs in the Local Talent Spotlight before the headliners take the stage.

Band members include: Jon Brown, drums; Brandon Boozer, rhythm guitar and vocals; Greg Davis, keyboards; Alex John, vocals; and bassist Brennan Haase.

With their current band members set for only six months, 11 Letters Long is busy creating a solid reputation in the area. Last March, in fact, the band placed in the top ten at the *Detroit News*' Battle of the Bands.

"We had five or six original songs and we heard about the battle, but had nothing recorded. We shotgun recorded ourselves at our drummer's church and sent in a copy. We were picked in the top ten and were able to perform at the State Theater," said band member Brian Shepanek.

11 Letters Long promises to offer a unique sound to go with their name.

"We were talking about getting a name. We figured out that 11 Letters Long has 11 letters and so is 'we need a name' and it stuck. 11 Letters Long," said Shepanek.

Classic rock fans should have no trouble enjoying the opening act.

"Our sound is classic rock. We do originals and covers written by artists like the Beatles, Bachman Turner Overdrive and Billy Joel," said Shepanek.

## Master named in Fortinberry hearing

The Michigan Supreme Court appointed Judge Robert A. Benson as master to Formal Complaint No. 78 filed against 52-2 District Court Judge Dana Fortinberry.

Benson is a retired judge from Kent County Circuit Court. This action by the Michigan Supreme Court is the latest step in the formal proceedings against Fortinberry.

As master, Benson will preside over the presentation of evidence in the hearing.

According to the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission's Web site, Benson will file a report with the commission after the hearing. The report will include "a statement of the proceedings and the master's finding of fact and conclusions of law with respect to the issues presented by the formal complaint and judge's answer."

After Benson's report is received, the examiner and Fortinberry will be allowed to file any objections.

Following testimony and the master's findings, the commission may dismiss the matter if insufficient evidence of judicial misconduct exists; or if a preponder-

ance of evidence shows misconduct, the Web site states the commission may recommend that the Michigan Supreme Court discipline Judge Fortinberry.

While the commission has no authority to directly discipline Fortinberry, the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission may recommend penalties including public censure, a term of suspension or removal from office.

After a recommendation is made, the Michigan Supreme Court may accept, reject or modify the Commission's suggested penalty.

Formal Complaint No. 78 was filed May 10 against Fortinberry based on statements she allegedly made at a March 2004 police lodge meeting and allegedly wrote in a July 2004 letter to the Oakland County Deputy Sheriff's Association.

Fortinberry filed her official response to the commission's complaint on May 20, citing First Amendment rights of free and political speech, as well as claiming there to be a lack of evidence she made the alleged statements.

## News from Independence Twp.

The Independence Township Board of Trustees took several actions at the regular June 7 meeting:

- The township approved the purchase of two new mowers for the Department of Public Works at a cost of \$8,959.20 to Weingartz (for a Navigator with 27 hp, 48-inch deck and rear-discharge with bagger) and \$6,701.75 to D&G Equipment (for a John Deere 717A with 19 hp 48-inch deck with bagger).

- The township approved the purchase of a new municipal software package at the cost of approximately \$160,000.

- A new administrative policy was accepted regarding the collection of delinquent billing for emergency medical services through the fire department. In addition, Fire Chief Steve Ronk will return to the township board with an updated rate structure for these services which will reflect non-resident amounts.

- Trustees voted unanimously to allow an additional 45 days for the completion of the Sashabaw corridor planning analysis.

Currently, several proposed developments in the area, including the much-debated "big box" stores from ORCO Investments Inc. of Troy, are on hold as town-

ship officials await the results the study.

The next Independence Township board meeting is June 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the Independence Township Library Community Room.

## Schools look at 05-06 budget

The Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education is discussing the budget for the 2005-06 school year.

During a Board of Education workshop on June 6, board members surrounded the conference table at the administration building and debated the upcoming year's priorities.

Utilizing the 2004-05 school budget of \$69,665,210, officials compared and contrasted the differences between that year and the upcoming projected budget.

"We are probably going to come in a lot lower than last year's budget," said Anita Banach, Director of Communications and Marketing for Clarkston Community Schools.

According to Banach, the formal budget should be about \$2 million lower than the 2004-05 budget. For the last three years, the per pupil funding was \$6,747. According to Banach, the business department of Clarkston Community Schools is projecting the same amount for 2005-06.

Other topics the board gave administrators guidance on included:

- 2005-06 programs – board members discussed maintaining current programs within the school district.

- Staffing levels – because of the reconfiguring project, approximately 20 new employees to be hired.

- Student enrollment projections.
- 22 percent increase on health care and retirement costs.

- Operational costs for the new properties.

Administrators continue to prepare a proposed budget for a formal hearing on June 27. The public hearing begins at 6 p.m. in the Clarkston High School LGI room, and will last 30 minutes.

During the public hearing, local community members have the opportunity to listen to a detailed presentation of the 2005-06 budget and ask questions.

## Consumer is as consumer does

Recently, a game show host asked a contestant how she'd spend her prize money. Her response: "Get some plastic surgery."

This isn't a rant on cosmetic surgery, but a scarier observation.

Decades of technological know-how and good old American ingenuity have left us flawed. Not flawed in a physical sense, God knows we can fix that, but in a thinking sense.

From childhood, we are inundated with advertisements. Starting with the obvious billboards and TV commercials to the small Old Navy insignia on your two-year-old's sock, advertising permeates everything.

Our democratic-capitalistic chemistry experiment has produced a final product: consumers.

To fill our role in the mega-economy, we make hundreds of decisions daily about what to buy. Successful companies figure out how to entice us and make millions. The pursuit for lifelong consumership begins at birth.

Corporate targeting of our children now incubates the economic decision-making process from the earliest thought development. So what do we have? Every decision carries some economic thought process inherent in our thinking.

With choice and unlimited options, a tendency grows to always look for something better. As soon as we buy the next electronic gizmo, a new "must have" gadget appears on store shelves.

Small decisions like this are constantly given to kids: Hey kid, here are 150 channels. Pick a sneaker from these 50.

I love the choices we have and wouldn't want to live anywhere else, but worry about the unintended consequences of the robotic nature at which we sometimes slave over those choices.

If we are always looking for something better, when will there ever be satisfaction? Should I buy this shirt from Gap, or wait until I see what Brooks Brothers has? Should I buy the gas-savvy Volvo or a Denali? Is this relationship right for me or should I hold on in case something else better comes along?

Divorce rates are up, we work more hours than ever and vacations are shorter—but at least we can watch our shrinking hour-long sitcoms on plasma screens.

So do I think we should all stop working, abandon technology and move to huts in the middle of nowhere?

No, of course not, but we should question the long-term consequences of never accepting things as they are.

Today, if we don't accept the way we look or the person we're with we change it. We can attempt to change virtually anything in our lives.

We say, "It's our right as Americans."

## Take note: Property taxes are shifting

Summer property tax bills will be mailed out July 1 as usual; however, your summer bill will be higher than what you may have anticipated.

Summer property tax bills have traditionally related to educational millage rates. Winter tax bills traditionally have county and township approved millage as well as any special assessments.

This year, one third of the county operating millage of 4.19 mills will be moved to the summer tax bill. This is a result of action taken by the State Legislature and Governor Jennifer Granholm. State shared revenue payment to all the counties in Michigan were terminated due to budgetary shortfalls in the state.

To help make up for the cuts, a decision was made to shift the county operating taxes from the winter to the summer tax bills over a three year period. By 2007, the full county operating tax millage will be on the summer tax. At that point, the winter taxes will have township taxes and county parks and recreation, and special assessments.

Summer tax bills run higher than winter bills. In 2004, a home in Clarkston school district with a principal resident classification had 17.9678 mills levied on it. That same home had 11.9817 mills placed on the winter tax bill.

The county operating millage of 4.19 was part of the winter total.

For the 2005 tax year, the home will have a 19.3578 mill summer base and the winter will drop to 10.5917 mill base. Going forward to 2006, another third of the 4.19 county operating goes on the summer bill and correspondingly is dropped from the winter bill. In 2007, the full 4.19 mills county operating goes on the summer bill.

Hard to follow? Put another way — a house with a taxable value of \$100,000 paid \$1,798.17 for the 2004 summer tax bill and \$1,198.17 for the winter bill. For 2005, the summer bill goes to \$1,935.79 and the winter goes to \$1,059.17. By the 2007 tax bills, the summer tax would be \$2,215.78 and the winter would be \$779.17.

Roughly 40 percent of all real property owners in Independence Township have a mortgage with an escrow account. The shifting of tax collection could affect your escrow account balance. You may wish to call your mortgage company to find out how they will handle what they hold in your escrow account.

## Change made in Springfield Fire Department hiring policy

During the Springfield Township Board Meeting June 9, changes were made to the Springfield Township Fire Department application process allowing officials to hire people who have committed felonies.

As Fire Chief Charles Oaks noted, the application was not updated in years, and the paper application and hiring process needed to be re-aligned.

An application for employment with the fire department will still ask applicants to disclose any previous felonies, but will no longer ask if the felonies were committed in the last five years.

The fire department will have the discretion in hiring candidates with a previous felony.

Oaks stressed that the scrutiny of candidates will be kept at a high level.

"In going over the application with the township attorney. We reasoned we should allow for some rehabilitation. We do a thorough background check and will continue to do so," said Oaks. "We do a criminal background check and driving record check. We won't put someone in the department with six points on their driving record. We're not going to hire people with major offenses."

"Before, they could never consider an individual with a felony. This doesn't require them to hire a felon, but leaves it to their discretion," said Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole.

Oaks noted the outdated application needed alteration for some time and the adjustment to hiring a candidate with a minor felony was part of a larger process of cleaning up the application's language.

## Funding of traffic light in Springfield approved

### New signal approved as part of site plan

As part of an agreement approved June 9, Springfield Township trustees approved a plan to pay 12.5 percent of the cost of a new traffic signal at the Andersonville and White Lake Road intersection.

The agreement is contingent on the Road Commission for Oakland County paying 75 percent of the total cost and developers paying the other 12.5 percent.

The new traffic signal will accommodate anticipated traffic to be caused by Prospectors Industrial Park's development. The board voted unanimously to accept the developer's final site plan, including a convenience store and gas station.

Manseel Associates Incorporated estimated traffic signal to cost \$120,000 with a variance of \$10,000.

In order for PIP to have their site plan approved, the developers needed to meet certain criteria.

"Because this is a Planned Unit De-

velopment (P.U.D), the applicant must demonstrate benefit to the community through this development. The developer's contribution for the traffic signal meets that criteria," said Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole.

According to a memo from the RCOC Director of Traffic-Safety Department David Allyn to Township Supervisor Collin Walls, traffic signal installation could be completed at an earlier date if the 25 percent was provided by the township and Prospector group.

The memo provided no specific date for installation, but noted the traffic signal will be in the Road Commission's 2006 program.

Several township board members expressed concerns about the impact of the lighting, traffic and signage with the development.

The site plan was accepted with the understanding that issues dealing with lighting, tenant colors and building signage be resubmitted for approval prior to the granting of a certificate of occupancy.

## Ramp Closure of northbound I-75

The Road Commission for Oakland County has announced road work which may cause delays for motorists in the Clarkston area:

- Maybee Road is closed from Clintonville Road to Rohr road so that developer Zerbo's Equities can pave the gravel road. The detour route is Clintonville to Clarkston and Baldwin through August 29.

- Andersonville Road between White Lake Road and Curtis Lane is scheduled to be closed through July 30 so Independence Township can install a water main and sanitary sewer line.

During the closure, the detour route will be White Lake Road to Maceday Lake Road to Williams Lake Road to Airport Road to Dixie Highway and vice versa.

The Michigan Department of Transportation has listed the following repairs affecting Independence and Springfield Townships on their website: [www.michigan.gov/mdot](http://www.michigan.gov/mdot).

- Lane closures between exits 98-

91 on Southbound I-75 from Holly Road to Ortonville Road. The left two lanes are closed as construction crews make repairs. Traffic is shifted to the outside shoulder and outside lane. Two lanes will be maintained at all times.

- A temporary traffic signal is in effect for vehicles using Davisburg Road as work is being done on the Davisburg overpass until August 20.

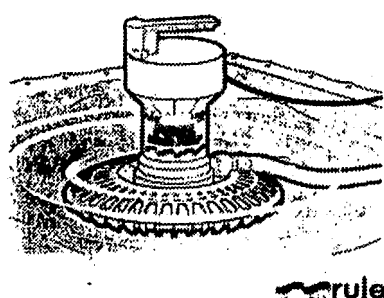
- Two lanes of northbound traffic on M-15 are closed as construction crews reconstruct bridge over I-75, leaving one lane traffic in each direction. Ramps to southbound I-75 and northbound I-75 are closed. The detour for the northbound M-15 to I-75 is from southbound M-15 to Dixie Highway to I-75. The detour for southbound M-15 to I-75 south is I-75 north to Dixie Highway (exit 93) to I-75 south on ramp.

- Ramp closure from June 13 to July 16 for northbound I-75 to M-15 as construction crews reconstruct and widen exiting ramps. Detour is from northbound I-75 to southbound Dixie Highway to northbound M-15.

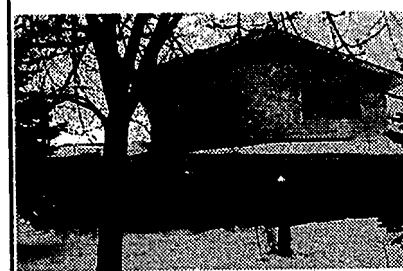

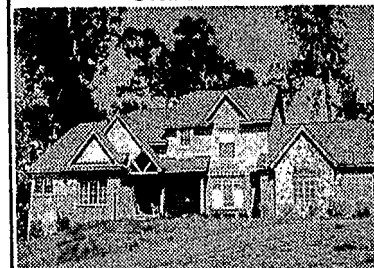

# Neighborhoods deal with increasing traffic

With more development and subdivisions in the Clarkston area, Denise Sprock noticed an increased amount of traffic through her neighborhood. She is particularly concerned with the traffic going by bus stops in the neighborhood.

Sprock is not alone. Many once quiet neighborhoods now deal with frustrations from increased traffic.

"We have people cutting through our neighborhood to bypass part of Clarkston Road. They maintain the same speed on our roads they use on Clarkston Road," said Sprock.

Unhappy with the situation, Sprock and her husband Mike contacted several agencies, including the Oakland County Sheriff and Road Commission of Oakland County, to see what could be done.

Denise explained how suggestions like speed bumps and stop signs were not an option due to various factors. Speed bumps, for instance, interfere with snow removal.

Feeling frustrated, Denise turned to the Internet and discovered Keep Kids Alive Drive 25.

Keep Kids Alive Drive 25 is a non-profit educational organization designed to bring neighborhoods together to promote safe driving.

The organization's Web site claimed it could increase the number of drivers

who respect the 25 m.p.h. neighborhood speed limit caught Denise's attention.

After gaining support in her neighborhood with a letter, Denise organized a bulk ordering of the yard signs designed to slow traffic and create safer neighborhoods for children.

Denise and many of the thirteen households who purchased signs noticed an immediate impact.

"The Web site said that over 75 percent of motorists who drive by the sign will put on their brakes. It's definitely true," said Sprock.

The signs are red, white and black with caricatures of kids and the Keep Kids Alive Drive 25 motto.

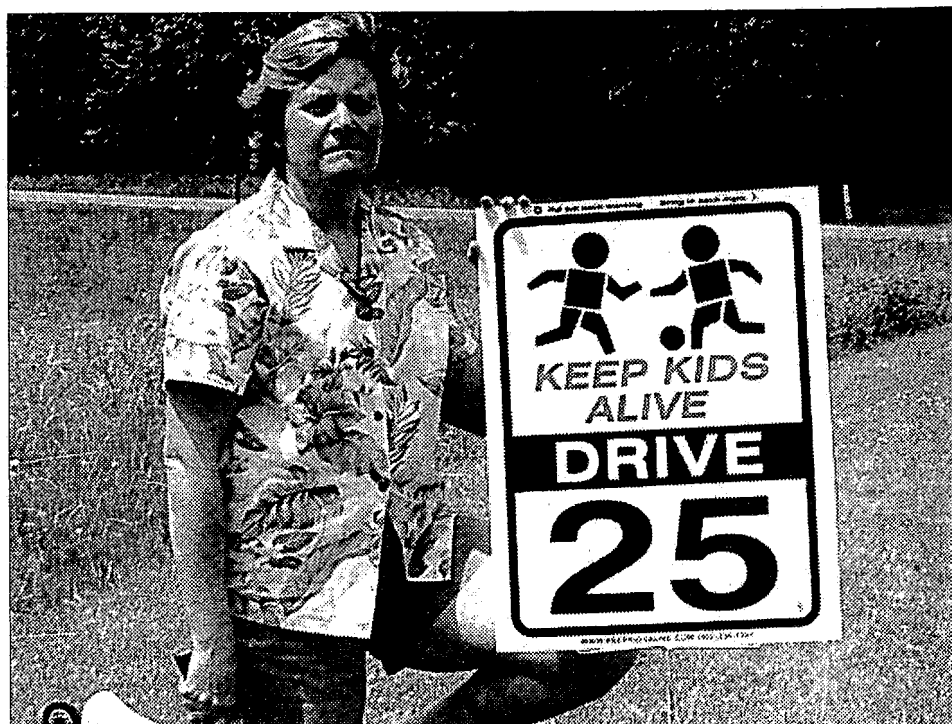
Sprock puts out the 18 by 24-inch yard sign in the morning and takes hers in at night. To her, the effort has been worth it.

"I didn't see any options in making the traffic go away. The only option is to get them to slow down," said Sprock.

Overall Denise said the yard signs have gone over well in the neighborhood.

"I've gotten good feedback, all the people seem to think the signs are working. I think it works well in sequence, having three signs in close proximity really catches the drivers' attention," said Sprock.

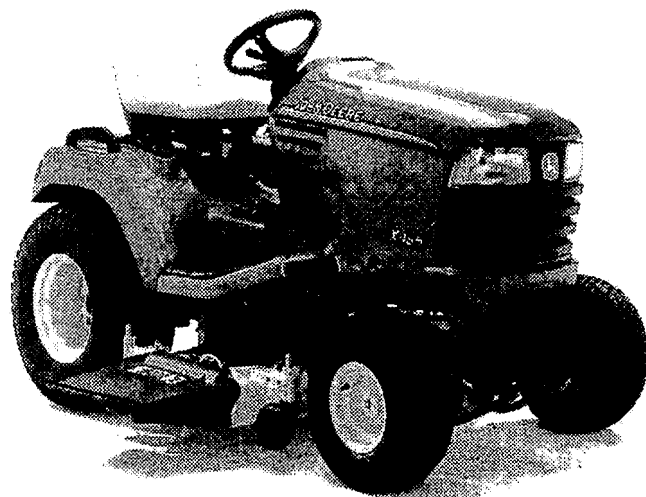

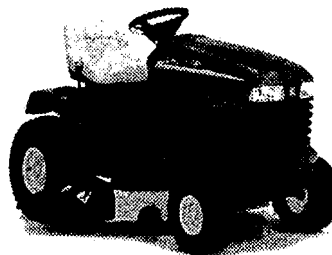

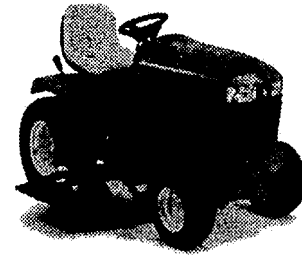

# Is an internet presence right for you?

This is Part II of a discussion I had with Luc Poirier. Poirier is co-founder and chief operating officer of Slick and Bubba's Elite & Expeditious Websites. We discussed the pros of investing in internet e-commerce.

So now, you have a web site and it does a good job answering questions on your behalf about your business. You find you're spending less time addressing mundane inquiries and your client base is coming to you better informed about the goods and services you provide, largely because your internet presence. It is educating the consumer on your behalf, which translates into a decent increase of your most precious commodity: time capital.

However, have you empowered your web site to do everything it possibly can to better your bottom line? Put another way: Can your web site access previously untapped revenue streams normally unavailable to you? Are you e-commerce ready? If not, why not? Remember what I said last month — what you are not doing, your competition is. If you are not on-line, they are. If you're not capitalizing on e-commerce, they are. How long do you think you can manage without an e-commerce ready web site? Rather, do you really want to find out?

I asked Luc why e-commerce is gaining in popularity. "E-commerce, or electronic commerce, allows retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers of goods and services to not only sell their wares in a global marketplace, but gives merchants a chance to get paid, in full, up front, often without any major effort on their part," he said.

If you think your enterprise is not right for an e-commerce, think again. If you are a retailer, wholesaler or manufacturer, this is where you need to be (provided growth, expansion, and financial security are part of your business plan). If you offer services, consider pre-sales: Selling your clients an opportunity to prepay for service blocks now to be redeemed later. This provides peace of mind for your client, future business for you and spending capital you can use now. When the time comes for your client to utilize the pre-paid service, this is an occasion to make good on the arrangement as well as inform your client about other goods and services you have available.

If you own a restaurant, deli, or any business deal-

ing in products with short shelf dates, consider selling gift certificates, meal club memberships, or accepting orders from your on-line menus. "If you're in or near a business district, consider how the busy exec might appreciate paying in advance for lunch and either having it delivered to the office or having it ready for her to eat when stopping by your location. This adds an element of convenience that could translate into steady business," Luc said.

Municipalities can benefit from the convenience of renewing annual permits and other fee-based registrations on line; churches and ministries can reach out to congregational shut-ins and give these individuals the means to tithe on-line; even homeowner associations can collect dues and other fees by directing members to a web site.

Bottom line: If you offer goods or services, "there's some aspect of your business that e-commerce can assist with."

For example, the annual savings in postage alone from mailing invoices, reminder letters, late notices, monthly newsletters and brochures can reach into the thousands of dollars for some entities and in many cases pay for the e-com site or upgrade.

To get a quick idea if this works for you, do the math:

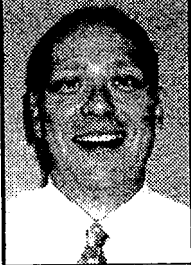
(Number of addresses on your mailing list x Number of mailings made per address annually x Average postage) +

(Number of people doing mailings x Average hourly rate x Number of hours spent) + Materials = Annual savings utilizing e-com web site featuring on-line payment tools.

An e-commerce site is your ideal employee: Never late, never calls off, and works 24/7/365 without missing a beat but, should an e-com site replace employees? "NO!" Luc said. "In fact, it can provide an alternative income stream to better equip your team with the tools to do their jobs more efficiently."

If you are a merchant, how much do you have to sell to cover internal and/or external shrink (shoplifting) or cash handling errors? "In many cases, using drop shipping solutions in conjunction with an e-com ready site will remove this temptation from your brick and mortar.

There is a rich source of web talent locally available with e-com packages that are certain to address your needs.

Remember: Purchasing a web site is a lot like purchasing a car: Both are vehicles that will get you to where you want to go. One gets you to work; the other gets you the work. The only question you really need to answer is how much can you afford not to spend? A business associate once said to me, "Free is worth every penny you've paid for it." This is a universal truth.

Wagner said the township will form a committee in the upcoming weeks to look at ways of gathering money for the new senior center, which he envisions having a gymnasium. He expects the committee to consider a one-mill parks and recreation millage for the spring of 2006.

"We need the relief from parks and recreation at the moment," he stated. "This is a possibility for that."

As part of the negotiations, Independence Township has agreed to do the following, at no cost to the Clarkston school district.

- Pay for the road improvements in front of the Clarkston Schools Administration buildings on Clarkston Road as required by the Oakland County Road Commission.

- Extend the entrance to the Independence Township Library across the approximately four acre parcel to the administrative complex.

- Allow the Clarkston Community School Board to have architectural input into the design of the new senior center complex.

- Independence Township will pay all of the clos-

ing costs associated with the acquisition of the property.

"We have been working to create a partnership that would be good for the community, while also creating the kind of relationship between the schools and the township that our citizens deserve," said Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts in a released statement.

The Clarkston Schools Board of Education took the next step at Monday night's regular meeting. The board members voted unanimously to authorize Roberts to continue developing the agreement.

Anita Banach, Director of Marketing and Communications for Clarkston Schools, expects the board to meet at least one more time to consider a written agreement.

"I believe the tentative agreement will lead to the construction of a senior center that is needed here in Clarkston," said Roberts in his statement. "But as important, the joint effort will be an example that both boards can use to springboard other potential partnerships."

"We're very, very happy," said Senior Center Coordinator Margaret Bartos, "and very pleased at this kind of cooperation. It was very admirable."

Weiner reentered the courtroom and apologized at a deputy's request.

Schmitt sat looking down, shaking his head after the guilty verdict was read. While walking away in shackles, Schmitt said "I hope you all are happy."

Michael McCarthy, Schmitt's lawyer, expressed angst afterwards.

"I have no idea why the verdict came this way. When it goes down to the jury deliberating, you don't know. We made good arguments here," said McCarthy.

Assistant Prosecutor Gregory Townsend had little doubt the evidence would result in guilty verdicts and speculated the defendants would face a minimum of 15 years in prison.

"People should learn from this, everyone is accountable for their actions. They beat him. Death is always an option when assault is involved," said Townsend. "The tragedy is Peter Richard went to get burgers for the nurses and got beat and died."

What happened here today to these two is justice," Townsend continued.

Richard's widow, present through most of the trial, commented tearfully afterwards.

"It's a sad situation all the way around. We will remember the good things. It's tough. I have two little kids who talk about him all the time," said Donette Richard.

Michael McCarthy suggested appeals may be made on behalf of both men.

Sentencing is set for June 30 at 8:30 a.m. before Judge Langford-Morris.

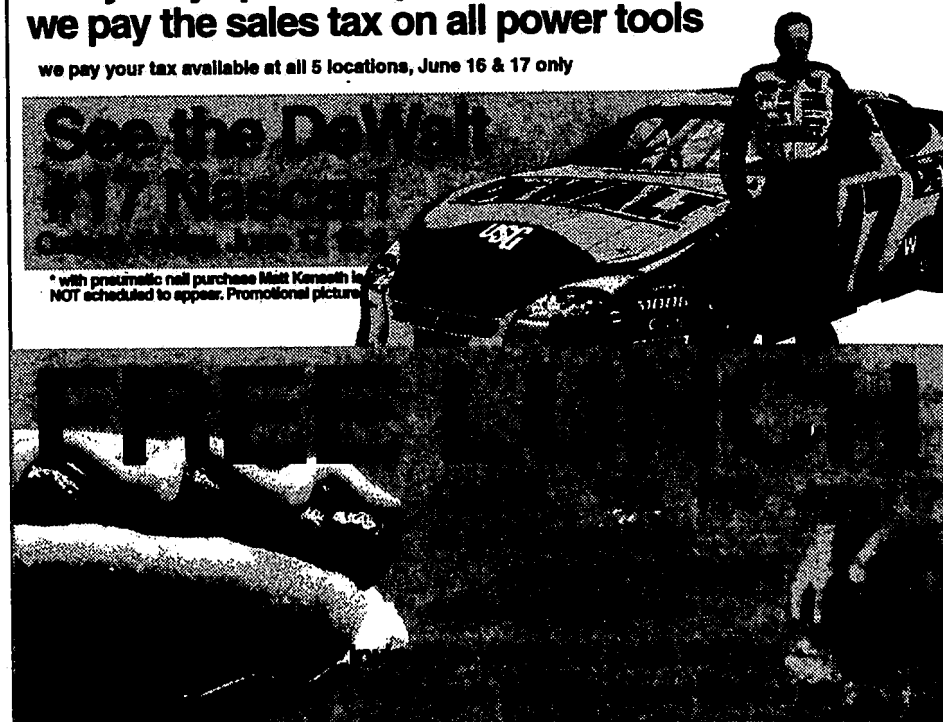

Even though he was not the top winner, Brazeal is proud of his efforts and plans to compete in next year's competition. As a thank you and congratulations, Brazeal was awarded a certificate, a watch and a \$500

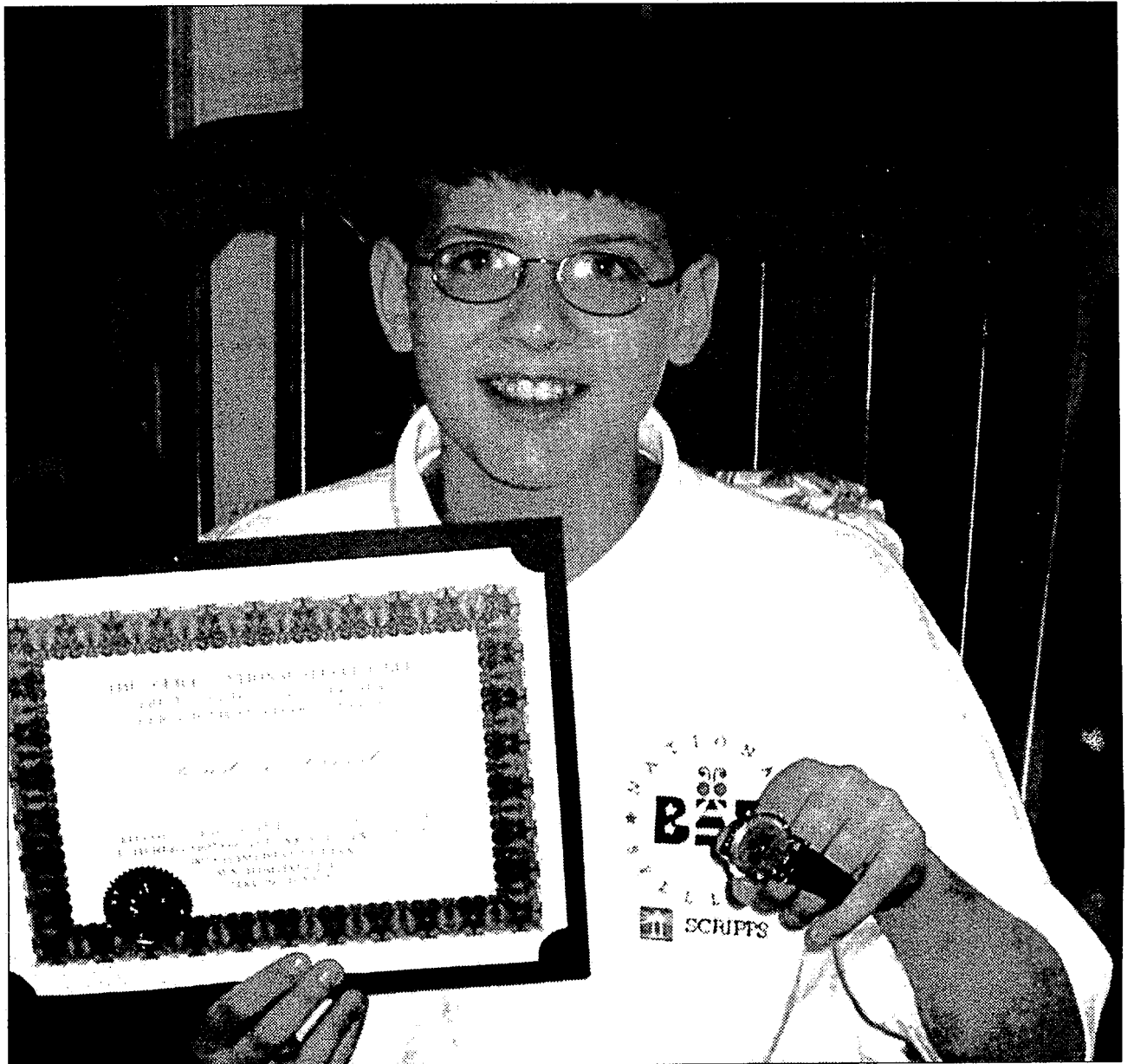
cash prize.

## Wolves forced to play their cubs in regionals

Clarkston lacked not for effort in their 12-2 loss to Groves on June 11 in the regional semifinal – they simply did not have the players.

Due to an unfortunate scheduling conflict, ACT testing pulled seven of Clarkston's thirteen varsity players from the 10 a.m. game, forcing the Wolves to rely on freshman and sophomores from the junior varsity squad.

The players filling in did so admirably, but in the end, the Falcons forced the wheels off the Wolves pumpkin coach and the season came to an end.

"Our kids battled. I'm just so proud of our kids. That last inning we just ran out of gas," said Clarkston Coach Phil Price. "I don't want to get into making excuses – our kids competed."

Clarkston trailed 5-2 until an eight-run sixth inning salvo from Groves' bats ended the game.

At the onset of the game, the only regulars available for the lineup card where Eric Bryan, who moved from right field to left; pitcher Mike Navarre; center fielder Eric Ogg; and first baseman/pitcher J.J. Lange, who donned a catcher's mask in a game for the first time in more than three years.

"We didn't have a catcher. J.J. has a pretty good arm so that's why he caught," said Price.

But after Navarre surrendered two early runs, Lange was called from behind the plate and onto the hill. He struck out the first two batters he faced, ending the first inning with the bases loaded.

"J.J. coming in as relief, pitching after he was catch-

ing, he just did a fabulous job," said Price.

Lange pitched five innings, striking out three, walking one and allowing four earned runs.

Down 3-0 in the third inning, Clarkston's bats came alive as Navarre singled home two. However, the inning's offensive potential was never fulfilled, as two runners were tagged out at home on dusty, zero room for error plays at the plate.

The Wolves loaded the bases in the fourth inning, but a two out grounder found its way into Falcon first baseman Blake Edwards' mitt and the threat idled.

Clarkston did not manage another base runner in the final two innings as Groves' Rob Moffat went six innings for the win, striking out two, walking three and allowing one earned run along the way.

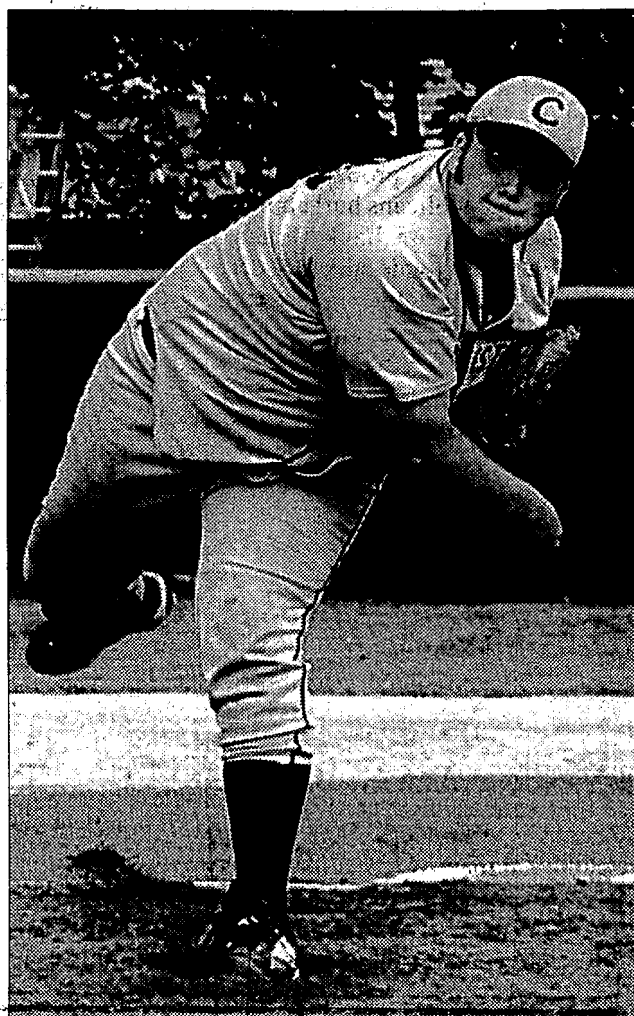
While the loss may sting, Price is pleased with the season as a whole.

"I think we got better and better as the year went on, we just needed experience," he said.

With the Wolves losing 12 players from the 2004 iteration, Price is happy and somewhat surprised to see his team post a 22-11 mark on the year and capture their fourth district title in a row and seventh in eight years.

Next year, the Wolves should return eight of their starters, and Price feels that the young players experience in the regional semifinal will go a long way for their development over the summer.

Nowakowski is thrilled with the experience this conference is going to give her.

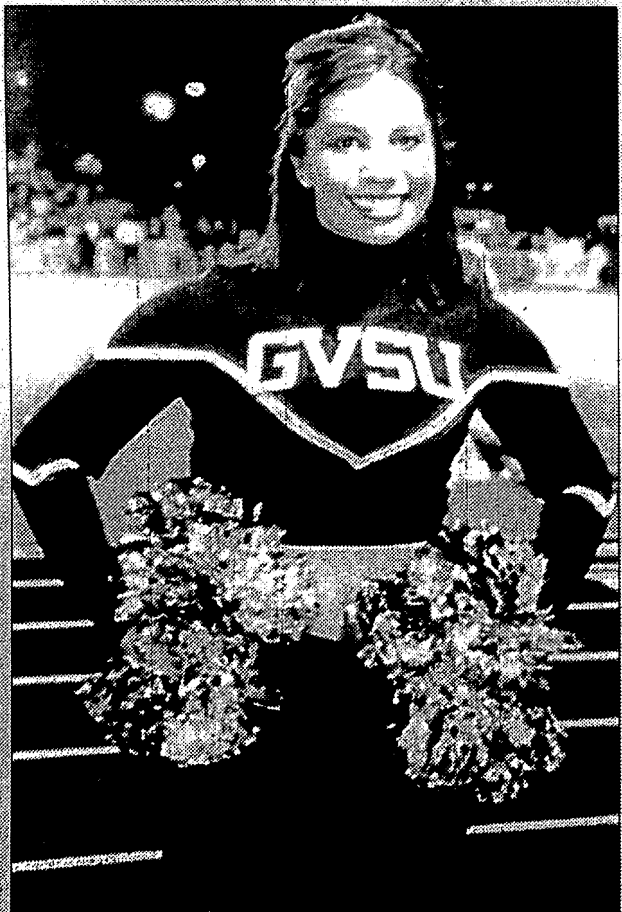
"I will get to meet people that are in my field and that will be important to know," she said.

## Supplementary reading

Imagine a future where employment is determined by a simple blood test. Actually, what I meant to say was: realize that soon a blood test can determine your right to be employed.

A few weeks ago, a funny news item struck me on the way to the sports pages. A bipartisan bill introduced by Republican Senators John McCain and Tom Davis along with Democrat Henry Waxman, seeks to establish steroid use penalties in the four major professional sports.

Here I thought the Senate was divided into bunkers from which Democrats throw proofs of filibusters and Republicans hurl copies of the Constitution back (heavily amended to provide adequate damage). But no, the two halves of the same legislative coin are still working together for the good of this nation's entertainment.

The Clean Sports Act of 2005, if passed into law, would mandate that professional athletes in baseball, football, basketball and hockey have five random drug tests yearly. Athletes get a minimum two-year ban on their first failed drug test and testing positive for steroids again is met with a lifetime ban. Basically, Congress is looking at applying the Olympics' standards concerning performance enhancers to professional sports.

Let me be clear, I hate steroids. I hate them in professional sports and I hate them at the gym. In professional sports I think they destroy all statistical relevance and historical perspective almost instantaneously. And people who use them in a pseudo-recreational manner to "get big" sicken me.

So, my first reaction when I read the specifics of the Clean Sports Act was positive. "Thank goodness for congress," I said to myself. "They will make sure

that sports get cleaned up."

But I got swallowed up in the sensationalistic aspect of the issue. I let my hate for steroids cloud my judgement. I let the end justify the means. In short, I fell into a common trap these days.

The sticking point for me, as I've said in the past, is that professional sports is a business. While baseball might be a pastime, and football is close to becoming a religion, they and the other major sports are part of an industry. I don't understand how congress has the right to simply start regulating that industry.

I can see why the government needs to regulate the airlines, there are a lot of lives at stake. But what threat does an athlete taking steroids pose to our nation as a whole? Slim to none?

If congress wants to argue that they have been forced to maintain the integrity of sports, they should all be voted out of office. Since when do we count on politicians to dictate our culture?

What's next, the government taking over the NHL for the good of the people's viewing pleasure? This is America right, not the USSR circa 1972.

Should there be a ban of two years or more for athletes caught using steroids? Absolutely. Is it congress' place to institute those penalties? Absolutely not.

Now, I do realize that athlete's who take steroids are usually breaking the law, even if the drug they are taking is not on the banned substances list because the Justice Department does not know about it yet. The question of whether or not to take steroids is not only about morals, there are legal ramifications as well.

In any occupation, breaking the law can result in termination. Everyone from a doctor stealing painkillers to a gas station attendant getting high in the store room can be fired from their job for using drugs, they may even face prosecution.

I may not be completely up to speed on the United States drug code but I am pretty sure a gas station attendant is still allowed to get another job at a gas station, even if they got fired for using drugs. Furthermore, if someone gets pinched for possession charges, what right does the government have to tell their em-

ployer they have to fire them.

It is wrong to hold an athlete to a higher standard than that of a doctor (or a gas station attendant) because people pay to watch them do their job.

Today, a basketball player is pink slipped because of steroids. Next thing I know, I grab some coffee to help with making a deadline and I find myself facing a three year ban on writing newspaper articles.

Maybe Congress should look into curbing the development and dispersal of performance enhancing drugs rather than targeting the athletes who use them. Why go after the tree tops rather than the root of the problem?

When a company brings something like ephedra to market, they don't have to prove whether it is safe or not - that's for the massively underfunded FDA to do.

If there was a steroid lobby even half as powerful as the supplement lobby, do you think we would have seen baseball's commissioner in front of Congress?

So while Congress spends weeks regulating our entertainment, we can still walk into a store and buy a product that may or may not kill us and someone is making millions of dollars because of it.

Right now, lobbyists are trying to get the ban on ephedra overturned, and yet Congress spends its time trying to set a nasty precedent for the future.

Sure it's professional sports today, but how long before the Clean Sports Act becomes the Clean Jobs Act?

# CHS hockey stars to become Wolves of a different color

Like many recent high school graduates, Mike Fogg and Trevor Johns are preparing for their first extended stay away from home: wondering how they will get around in a new city, thinking of buying a laptop and mulling over the ins and outs of laundry.

Unlike the rest of their friends in the Clarkston High School class of '05, Johns and Fogg's education will continue primarily on the ice rather than in the classroom.

Opportunity came knocking in the form of the Junior-A Boston Harbor Wolves, who scouted the Clarkston hockey standouts during the 2004-05 season. After seeing them in action at some post season camps the Harbor Wolves brass decided to draft them both to play in the Eastern Junior League.

"Most colleges, either D I or D III, don't look at high school players that much. They look more for the junior players. Everyone who is playing in college has most likely played a year or two in juniors. It's hard to come right out of high school and go right to a D I school or even a D III school," said Johns.

"When we went to the camps, we both played really good. They pretty much told us right there that we would have a spot on the team and then they gave us time to think about it," said Fogg.

Judging from the first time Johns and Fogg met each other though, few would guess the duo would become a lethal on-ice tandem for Clarkston's hockey program.

"One of our friends had a birthday party in first grade and I pretty much knocked the wind out of (Johns)," said Fogg.

"He knocked the wind out of me the first time we ever met. We were playing soccer out in the back yard. I don't know if he didn't like me or was just into the game, but there was a collision," said Johns.

The years passed and the boys met up again in middle school, where they starred on separate AAA

teams. In tenth grade, both made the decision to play for CHS, a choice that went against current thought that the best amateur hockey players often headed to travel teams in order to prepare and be noticed for the next level.

"We didn't really know how it would effect us at that time. We had a lot of older friends who told us to come out for the team," said Fogg. "(Playing for CHS) we got a lot better hockey wise. AAA is just a lot of

traveling and you never have time to do anything because you're always going out of town."

"Everybody said 'Playing for your high school is one of the most fun things in your life.' We had three great seasons so I don't regret it at all," said Johns.

The duo's career included two trips to the state semifinals, where this year Clarkston lost to eventual state champion Detroit Catholic Central. In the 2004-

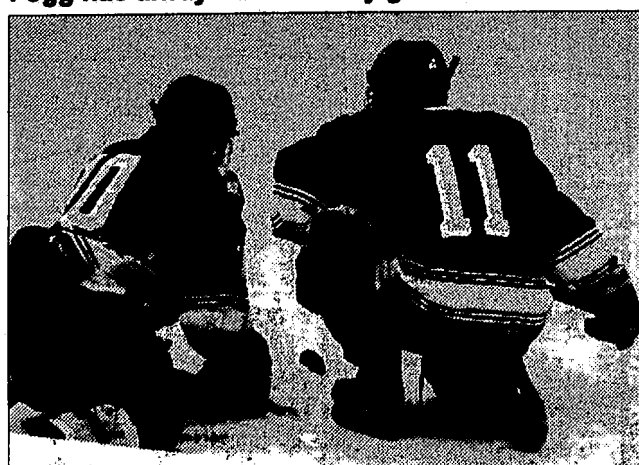

05 season Fogg led Clarkston with 46 points (22 goals, 26 assists) and Johns was tied for second on the team with 35 points (16 goals, 19 assists).

"We are very pleased to have Mike and Trevor next year. These are two players who will flourish in our league. They had options for next year, but decided the exposure and experience of playing in Boston was the best scenario," said Harbor Wolves General Manager Christian Gordon. "We like both of them on their own, but we really wanted them together."

While Fogg and Johns will their finesse on the ice to the Harbor Wolves, the team they are joining wants to make sure the boys have every opportunity to play their way into a college scholarship. The boys will play their games in a veritable hot bed of hockey with top notch collegiate programs such as Boston University and Harvard within spitting distance.

"We had so many things going for us. Alpena was showing a lot of interest in us too, but there is not the opportunity up north that there is out east. Basically we decided that the scholarship opportunities out east were a lot better. That's what it came down to pretty much, is where we had a better shot at going to the next level," said Johns. "Since we've known each other for seven or eight years, and we have become best friends over those years, it means a lot that we'll both be going to Boston."

No one is prouder of the duo than Clarkston head hockey coach Bryan Krygier.

"They will still go through an adjustment period as they play with older and better players, but I think they

will do well," said Krygier.

The boys in turn are ever grateful for the lessons learned from their CHS coach.

"Krygier helped us a lot. He's one of the best coaches I've ever had. He knows what he's doing," said Fogg.

"He definitely knows his hockey," added Johns. "We both loved playing for him ..."

"Because he played like us," finished Fogg.

Krygier also felt that while the duo is not guaranteed to play together in the EJL, the Harbor Wolves are getting two players who feed off each other on the ice and work together extremely effectively.

"We are really going to have to work for our spot on the power play, on the penalty kill, it's not going to just come to us," said Johns. "But we're ready for the challenge."

Both boys are excited to head to Boston but realize leaving home for the first time will be tough. Johns, whose girlfriend Liz Mengyan is headed to Illinois on a cross country scholarship, was already expecting long drives from Western, but the thought of being in Boston is still jarring. Fogg and Johns' friends have not fully adjusted to their plans as well.

"All of our friends are pushing us and pushing us to come to Western but we have these opportunities we feel we will regret later if we don't take them now," said Johns.

The boys will stay with a family in Boston that will undoubtedly soften the blow of being in a strange city. They will also enroll in community college to start work in business classes and general prerequisites.

Whether or not Johns or Fogg is able to parlay this opportunity into a college scholarship remains to be seen, but no one can take away the fact that they have achieved the next level, and everything after this is icing on the cake.

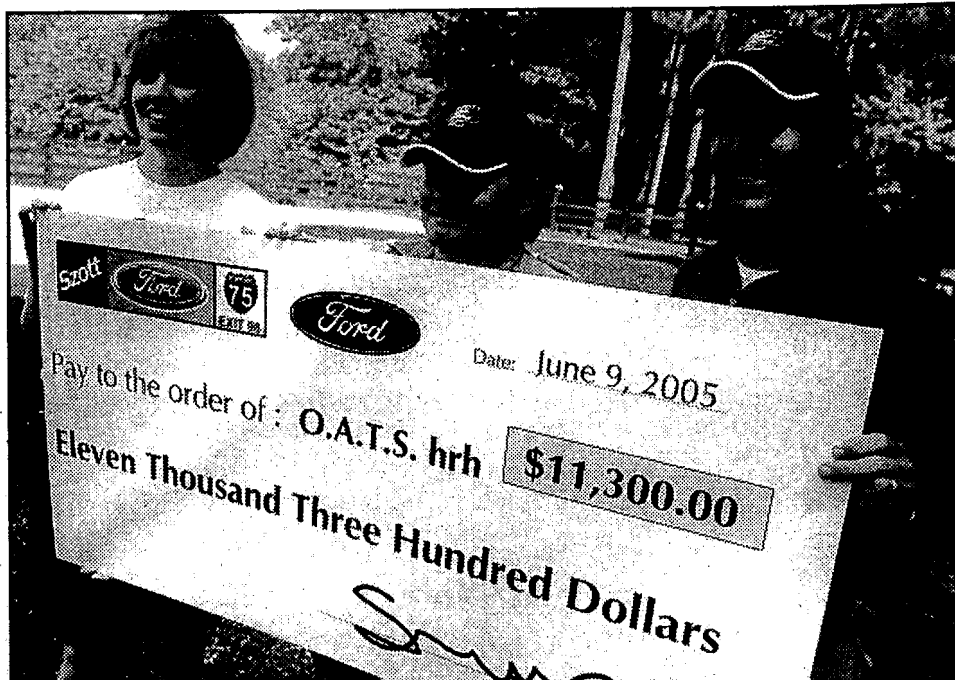

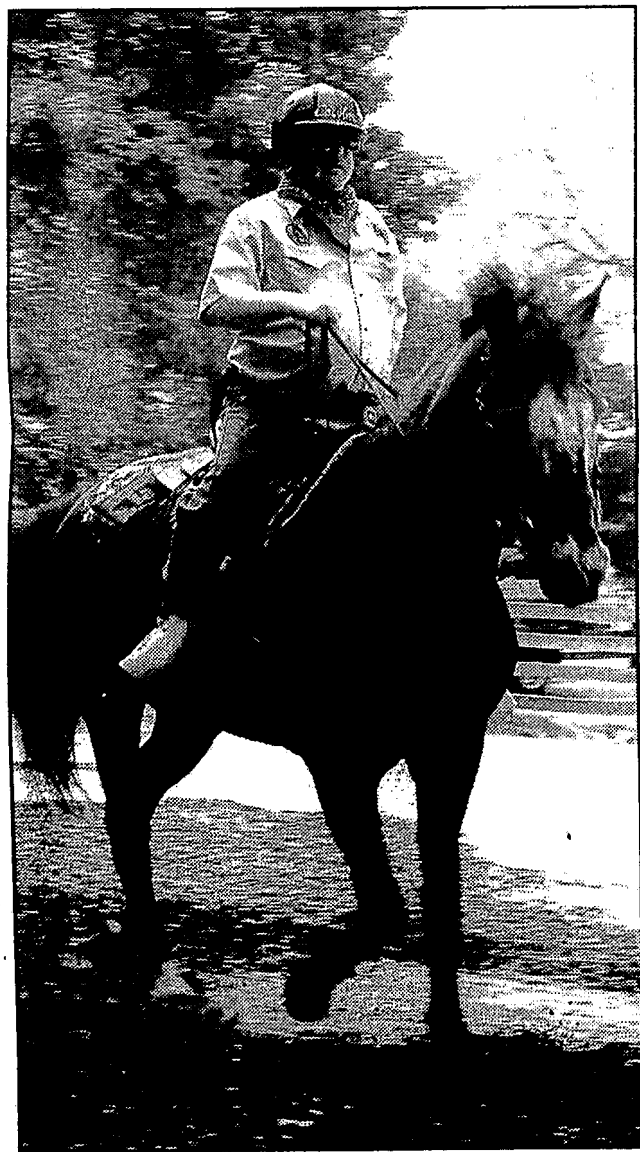

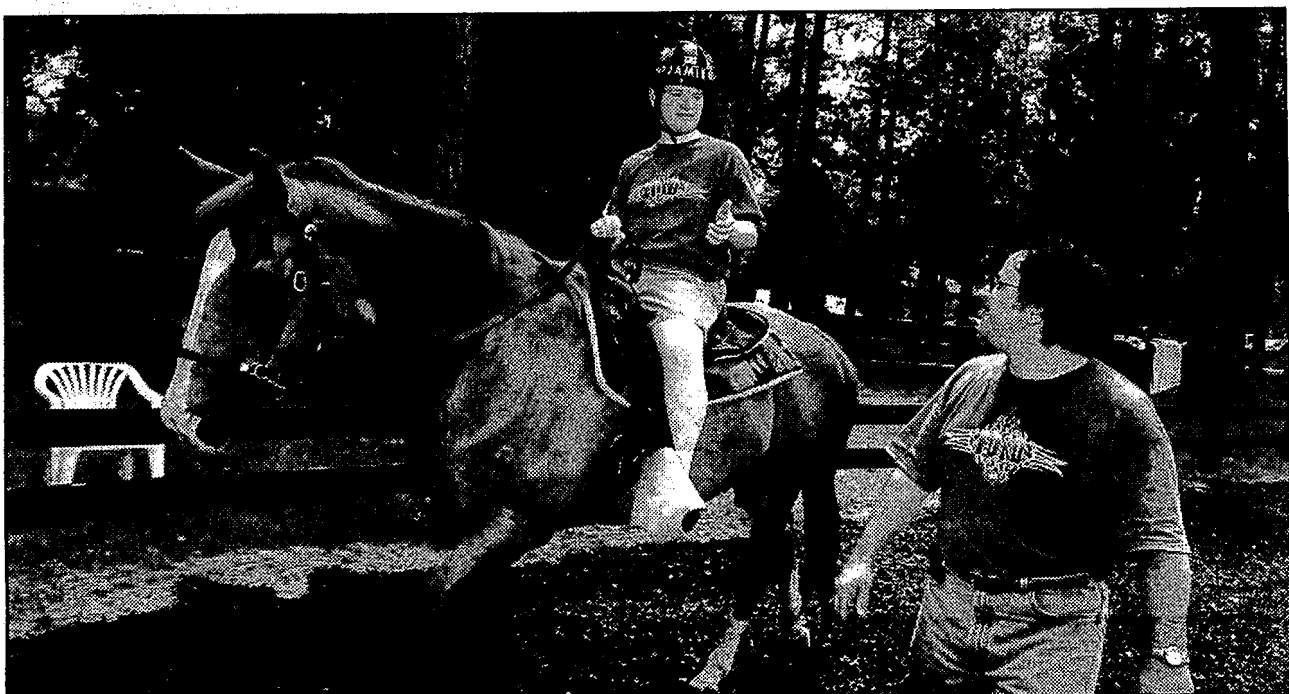

The story of the crumb rubber's path to O.A.T.S. started last fall when Heussner contacted Ford Motor Company after hearing the company installed a new surface at a California-based therapeutic riding facility. Heussner was told Ford would search for a local dealer to help with a grant, which is where Szott Ford came into the picture.

"I jumped at the chance to be a part of this," said Todd Szott, Dealer Partner of Szott Ford. "It's wonderful what (Heussner) does for the kids."

While O.A.T.S. was invoiced for the cost of the crumb rubber, Szott Ford

made sure none of the \$11,300 spent came out of Heussner's pockets.

The raw materials were just the tip of the iceberg however, as employees from Ford Motor Company and Szott Ford volunteered their time to help rake the new surface across the arenas. In total, ten Ford employees volunteered for the project including five from Ford Employees Dealing with disAbilities.

"We focus on the A of abilities," said FEDA Chair Karen Dukatz-DeVitis.

Ford offers employees 16 paid hours a year in which to do community service from an approved list. O.A.T.S. was added this year, which made some in the company very pleased.

"My wife found (O.A.T.S.) once our

son was diagnosed with autism. It has helped him verbally. It's given him a feeling of being in control, something he rarely has," said John Robertson, a Ford employee who volunteered to help and whose son has been a part of O.A.T.S. since 1997.

While the riders and the trained and licensed volunteers at O.A.T.S. will notice the upgrade the rubber brings right away, the horses still need to get acclimated.

"It will take Shadow some time to get used to it," said Warren Anderson of his mount at O.A.T.S..

When Anderson came to O.A.T.S. a year ago, he was in a wheelchair, still stung by the diagnosis he would never ride again after being struck by a car

while repairing a fence ten years ago..

"Riding has always been my favorite pastime," said Anderson, who when he heard of O.A.T.S. said "Let's do it, Let's see if I still have it."

These days, aside from riding high in the saddle on Shadow, Anderson is thinking about making the leap from a walker to a cane.

Also making the installation of the crumb rubber possible were Ortonville's The Landscape Connection and Bostwick Excavating from Fenton whose equipment took care of the extremely heavy lifting.

O.A.T.S. is located on M-15, wedged in between Clarkston and Brandon. For more information call 248-620-0505 or 248-620-1775.

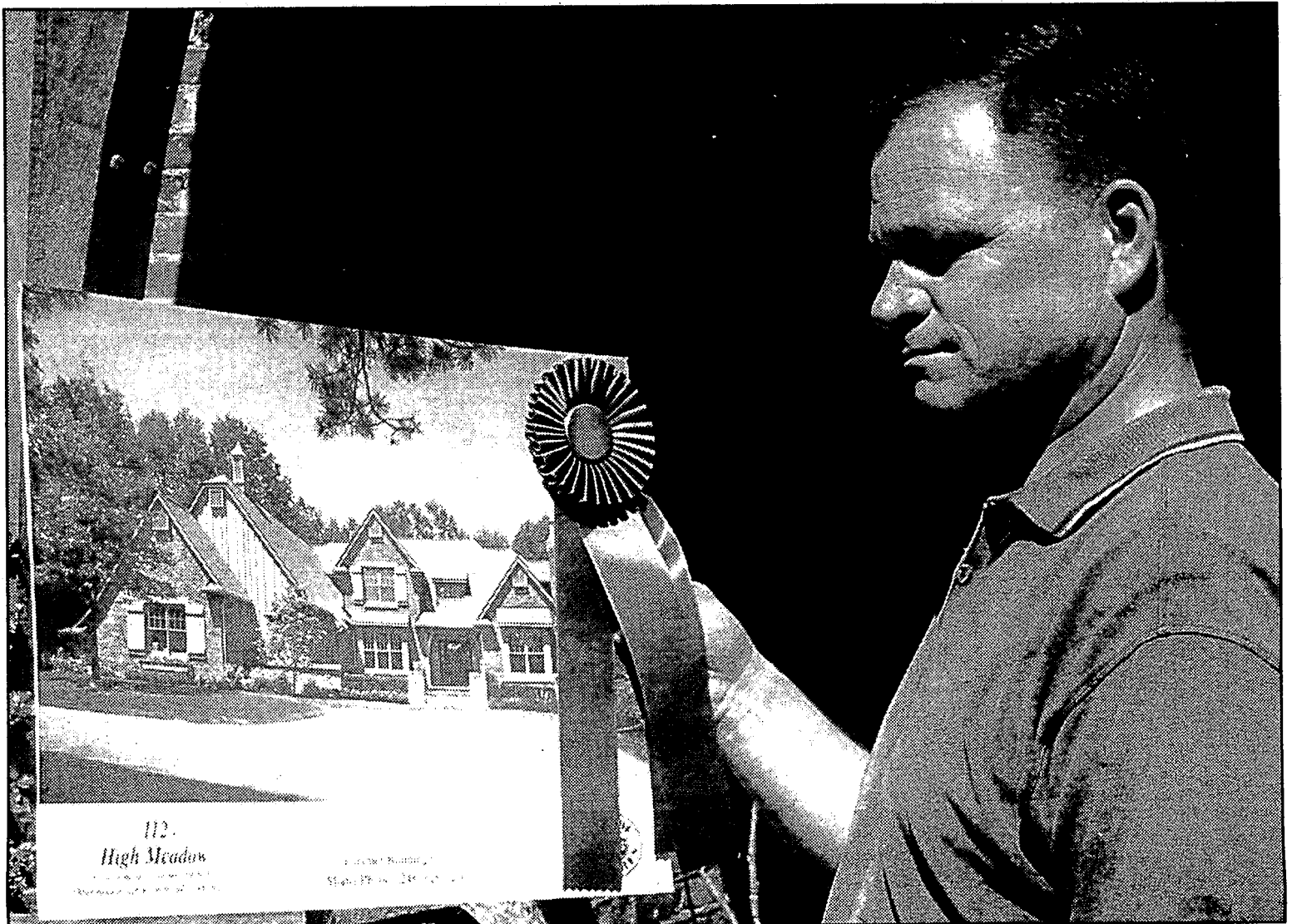

## Safety

Tips

Every summer we treat a number of people at our urgent care for a variety of preventable conditions. As a friendly reminder to keep you and your family from having to visit us, I thought I'd discuss how to avoid some of the more common injuries.

**Eye Injuries:** Actually we treat people year round for eye injuries but it seems when the weather warms people really find ways to traumatize their eyes. Most are minor but some cause permanent disability and most important, all of them are preventable. Sight is our most precious sense so it always a good idea to wear safety glasses.

**Hearing Protection:** Damage to your ears may take years to develop but once it has occurred it is irreversible. This means wearing ear protection every time you're using power tools, operating machinery, or attending a concert.

**Safety Gear:** Not wearing a helmet when biking, rollerblading, skateboarding or riding motorcycles just doesn't make sense. Closed head injuries are devastating both for the individual and their family. Even minor head trauma can cause recurrent headaches and permanent memory problems.

**Insect Bites:** With the emergence of West Nile Virus this has become a hot topic. The basic rules are to cover up near dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active and keep screens

on your home in good repair. Also, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends DEET containing products for anyone over the age of two years.

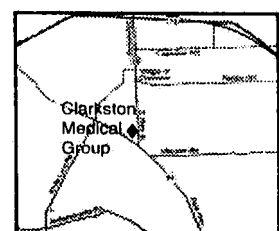
**Lawn Tools:** Removing safety guards and not wearing hand protection are two of the most common causes of injuries we see at CMG. Every time you service a piece of machinery it is important to make sure that no power is supplied to the moving parts and that you wear thick leather gloves to protect your hands.

**Pesticides/Herbicides:** Many of the pesticides and herbicides we use are in fact very toxic chemicals. It is imperative you follow the directions exactly and take great care not to inhale any of these substances or let them contact your skin or eyes. Be smart and use these products in well ventilated areas while wearing a respirator, safety glasses and rubber gloves. It is also a good idea to avoid spraying on windy days as an unexpected wind gust can cause accidental exposure. If you think you may have been exposed notify poison control immediately at 1-800-poison-1

Michael and his family look forward to the future of family, friends and the Lorimer Building Company.



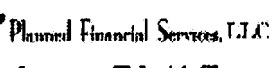
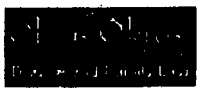

Before they head off into the world of lemonade stands and car washes, Andersonville elementary's fourth graders are being prepared to know the value of a dollar.

In a three week economics unit students learned about supply and demand, the stock market and other basic elements of the economy.

"The kids get an understanding of money they've never had before," said Gary Garyamick, a fourth grade teacher at Andersonville Elementary.

At the end of the three week unit, the students put their knowledge to work as they take turns running a restaurant, hawking goods and making smart purchases. Students fill all the roles from owner to busboy in the restaurant, design and sell their own products and most importantly act as consumers for both food and goods.

For example on June 2, the final day of the unit, Allison Lindsey was the owner of "Allie's Restaurant" a quaint little joint featuring both indoor and patio seating serving a wide array of drinks and food. Lindsey was approved for ownership of the restaurant due to her strong application and interview.

"I practically take care of the restaurant. The biggest challenge is writing the checks," said Lindsey, whose eatery's theme was "people having fun."

While Lindsey sweated out the details of food and labor costs, a dedicated staff busied themselves to ensure everyone got what they ordered in an appropriate amount of time.

"We work as a team and we know

where everything is," said Abby Hartman, a short order cook at "Allies Restaurant."

"She works on one order while I take the other," said Destiny Peickert, another cook.

While the servings of watermelon, pretzels and orange pop looked tasty, some patrons got even more refreshment from their choice of seating.

"Inside it is really crowded and loud," said Tori Coon, while enjoying her meal on the outdoor patio.

After making sure their bellies were full, another classroom offered a bazaar of goods for purchase.

"The kids produce their own product and choose the price. They are given an (imaginary) budget of \$1,200," said Stacey Sielinski, another fourth grade teacher.

The students were given examples of what they could sell, but the final choices, like what product and pricing, were left up to them.

"Business has been really good," said Kenny Teichmann, owner of a balloon stress ball boutique. "I get really mad at my brother a lot, so that helped me come up with the idea (to sell stress balls)."

Other students found out how important a price point can be in relation to how quickly items sell.

"Most people were selling their stuff for \$35. I used to have my plants at \$30, but I changed it to \$25 and now more people have been buying," said Hannah Sentgerath.

By the end of the unit, everyone in the fourth grade rotated from seller to worker to consumer. Some people made money and some lost, but everyone gained important economic lessons.

# Clarkston graduates say good-bye
