No Wal-Mart MTA finds COG ballot proposal 'deficient'

Since submitting their signed petitions to place language for a legal defense fund on the November ballot, members of Citizens for Orderly Growth (COG) have waited patiently for opinions from attorneys.

Now, the wait is almost over.

On Tuesday, Independence Township Supervisor Dave Wagner released an opinion from attorneys with the Michigan Townships Association (MTA) concluding the proposed legal defense fund ballot language "has serious deficiencies and infirmities, and would not successfully pass legal challenge."

The opinion is dated Aug. 16 and responds to seven specific questions from the township board.

The legal defense fund language asks for a one-time, half-mill tax that would raise \$750,000 plus interest. The township could use these funds to pay legal fees if a developer challenges the master plan in court. A copy of a petition COG circulated to support an election on the language is below.

According to the opinion from Bauckham, Sparks, Rolfe, Lohrstorfer and Thall, the township can use a millage to create a legal defense fund and that fund can be used even in regards to an appeal of a Zoning Board of Appeals or Planning Commission denial.

However, several points within the proposal are problematic to the MTA attorneys. For example, the opinion did not find the language "specific enough to avoid court invalidation due to misleading content."

Also, the MTA attorneys believe the requirement for a referendum in the language is a "serious flaw." Attorneys state "there is no statutory authority for a township to have a referendum on a consent judgement or a proposed consent judgement."

In the opinion, this fact leads to later problems. The language calls for the township to return any monies used to the legal defense fund in the case of a settlement without referendum. Since the attorneys found the township not bound by a referendum, returning the funds can not be upheld.

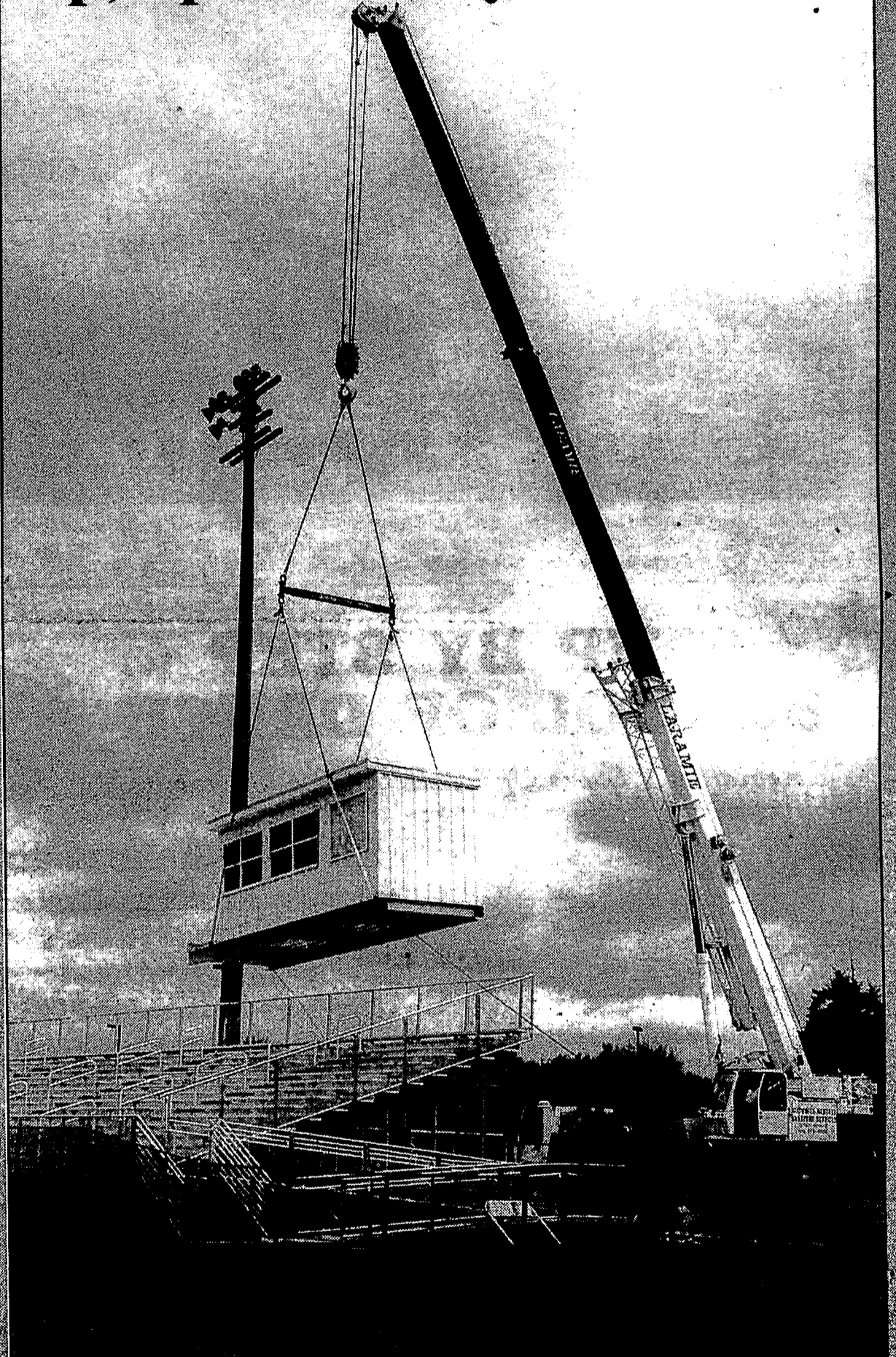
Finally, if the township were to use the legal defense fund to follow through with a court case, and lose, the fund could not be used to cover any damages incurred.

"...while we believe it is legally possible for a township to seek township elector approval to raise extra millage for a legal defense fund, we believe that the ballot proposal submitted with your letter has serious deficiencies and would not successfully pass legal challenge," the opinion states.

"I wish to thank COG for their commitment to the township. It is most beneficial when citizens express their opinions and ideas to the township board," said Wagner in a released statement on Tuesday. "I appreciate

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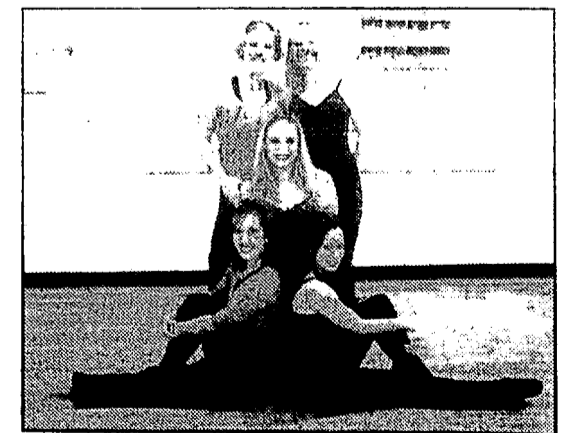

Road woes continue

The Road Commission for Oakland County announced road work sure to cause delays for motorists in the Clarkston area:

- Maybee Road is closed from Clintonville to Rohr so developer Zerbo's Equities can pave the gravel road. The detour route is Clintonville to Clarkston and Baldwin through August 29.

The Michigan Department of Transportation has listed the following repairs affecting Independence and Springfield townships on their Web site which is www.michigan.gov/mdot/

- Lane closures between exits 98-91 on southbound I-75 from Holly Road to Ortonville Road. The left two lanes are closed as construction crews make repairs. Traffic is shifted to the outside shoulder and outside lane. Two lanes will be maintained at all times.

- A temporary traffic signal is in effect for vehicles using Davisburg Road for work being done on the Davisburg overpass until August 30.

- Two lanes of northbound traffic on M-15 are closed as construction crews reconstruct the bridge over I-75, leaving one lane of traffic open in each direction. Ramps to southbound I-75 and northbound I-75 are closed. The detour for the northbound M-15 to I-75 is from southbound M-15 to Dixie Highway to I-75. The detour for southbound M-15 to I-75 south is I-75 north to Dixie Highway (exit 93) to I-75 south on ramp. Completion date is Nov. 30.

- The ramp closure on northbound M-15 to southbound I-75, which began Aug. 15 is scheduled to be completed by 3 p.m. on Aug. 24. The detour is southbound M-15 to northbound Dixie Highway to southbound I-75.

Student wants to promote 'understanding'

In a world troubled by terrorism and fear, traveling to other countries has taken on new meaning. In fact, many Americans now avoid the prospect altogether.

However, a few remain who not only want to see other countries, but also form an understanding of their cultures.

Clarkston High School sophomore Kara Huth is just that type of person.

Huth, 14, was selected for the People to People Student Ambassador Programs. She is invited to travel and study in Australia and New Zealand during the summer of 2006.

"I think it will be a fun experience. I've only traveled in the U.S.," said Huth. "I'd like to see some other cultures and learn about them - have some new experiences."

Huth, who carries a 3.94 grade point average, was selected as a representative from among those students receiving National Achievement Awards. She received a letter in the mail inviting her to attend.

"Why? Why now with everything going on internationally?" said mom Renea, in response to the news. "My first selfish response was I could not let her go, but then I looked into the history of the program and the goal of spreading and learning about peace."

People to People International is a nonprofit organization promoting international understanding through direct person-to-person contact. Established in 1956 by President Dwight Eisenhower, the program was placed in the private sector in 1961, and today is an organization incorporated under the laws of the state of Missouri.

The organization's mission statement is to "enhance international understanding and friendship through educational, cultural and humanitarian activities involving the exchange of ideas and experiences directly among people of different countries and diverse cultures."

Huth said this explains why she wants to go per-

I can't hear you

Have you ever felt like you weren't being heard? What a silly question. Of course you have!

Some of us are so accustomed to not feeling heard that we've developed aggressive habits we use when we feel our message just isn't getting across. Some of these responses include using an overpowering voice, interrupting, being sarcastic or allowing our tempers to rule. Others of us become so discouraged that we fall into passivity and sometimes even allow others to minimize or ignore us.

Reaching agreement with another person can be a difficult achievement and feeling heard is a crucial first step.

Let's explore some tips that can be used when the other person just isn't getting it!

• *Determine* if the other person actually, physically heard you.

For instance... you're in the grocery store and asked for paper bags, yet the bagger is reaching for plastic. In this case, repeating your message, "Excuse me, I asked for paper," is the right thing to do. No need to get upset or to let it go and accept the plastic. Odds are your message truly didn't get through. Others can't meet our needs if they don't know what they are!

• *Explore* if the timing is right.

If you notice that your listener seems distracted, say "It seems like this isn't a good time to talk. What would be a better time?" Don't personalize their initial response! It's likely that this just isn't a good time for them to listen. Acknowledge that and make plans to pick up the conversation later. The important thing is to be sure that you do get back to the conversation. Don't let your message remain unheard.

• *Ask* for clarification that you are being understood, especially if you sense that the listener may not be following your train of thought.

"Do you have any questions or concerns before I move on?" This is especially important if there is an unequal power relationship between you and your listener, such as with a child and a parent or a supervisor and a direct report.

Above all, keep your cool! Use a level tone of voice and maintain eye to eye contact. If you feel you can't remain calm, suggest taking a time-out from the conversation. There is nothing wrong with saying, "I need some time to think about this. Let me get back to you later." Then, be specific about what later means, "I'll call you later this afternoon."

It doesn't matter what a person's age, sex and power position is, everyone deserves to be heard. Practicing these strategies can help. "Yes, I heard you!"

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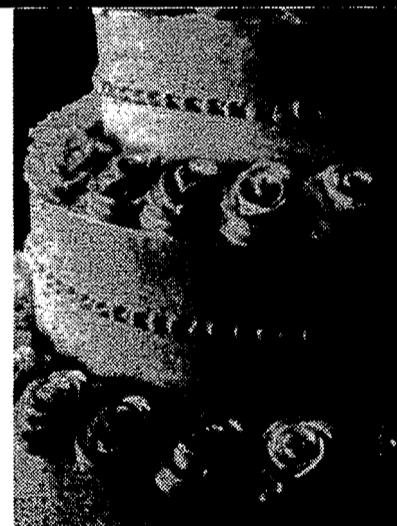

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Bailey Lake's new principal ready to start learning

As a child, Stephanie Mitchell's father would take her down to classes at the Art Institute of Chicago on weekends. She missed the Saturday morning cartoons most kids were watching.

That experience fostered creativity and helped Mitchell take an imaginative approach to solving problems she has employed throughout her teaching career.

Now as the newly hired principal at Bailey Lake Elementary, Mitchell brings her passion and lifelong experience with education to Clarkston.

"My father taught high school and his 5 siblings taught a wide range of subjects at some point, whether it was home economics or P.E. It was wonderful, my father was a teacher and I couldn't get away with anything," she said.

Mitchell spent two years as an art major at the University of Illinois before moving to Boulder, Colorado where she married and had two sons Alex and Josh McLeod.

"I returned to the Midwest to raise my children and

be closer to my family, while having access to my summer home in southwest Michigan," said Mitchell.

After running a state-licensed day care in her home for four years, Mitchell returned to school at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois graduating in 1996 with a double major in elementary education and art.

Mitchell's teaching experience began in the western suburbs of Chicago until she eventually turned to the inner cities, teaching underprivileged children in the Chicago Public Schools where she taught 5th and 7th grades.

Teaching in impoverished areas was rewarding as she saw children either involved with gangs or affected by gang violence and poverty enjoy staying after school to read or strive for improved test scores.

During this time Mitchell developed an integrated arts and technology program with the help of Americore Volunteers in conjunction with Northwestern University's Vittum Theater. This program worked to help students improve reading comprehension and technology skills.

After teaching in Chicago, Mitchell accepted her first administrative job as an assistant elementary principal in East Aurora, Illinois, where she also served as the building coordinator of a three-year comprehensive school reform in a largely minority district.

Mitchell then served as a principal of an elementary school in Burr Ridge, Illinois, an affluent, diverse district in the southwestern suburbs.

She also earned a master's degree from the University of Illinois in educational leadership and earned her Ed.S. from National Louis University.

Now as she focuses on her new job, serving as principal at Bailey Lake Elementary excites Mitchell.

"I'm honored to have the privilege to serve the community and to serve the children and families of the community," said Mitchell.

"People have embraced me and welcomed me wholeheartedly and I plan to do the same."

Mitchell said she is a protector of instructional time

and constantly "thinks outside the box" with a focus on meeting the individual needs of students.

"I'm very lucky to have chosen a career I'm passionate about. It doesn't take much to mentally prepare in the morning because I'm where I want to be," she said.

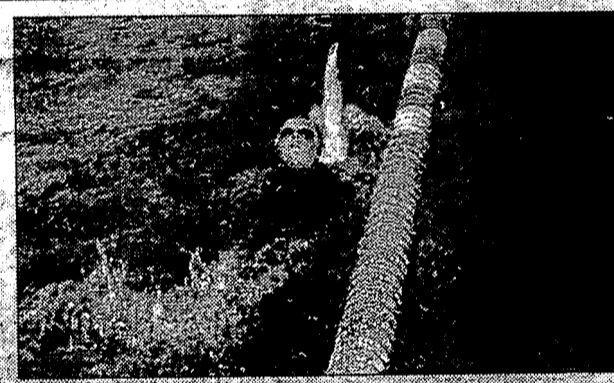

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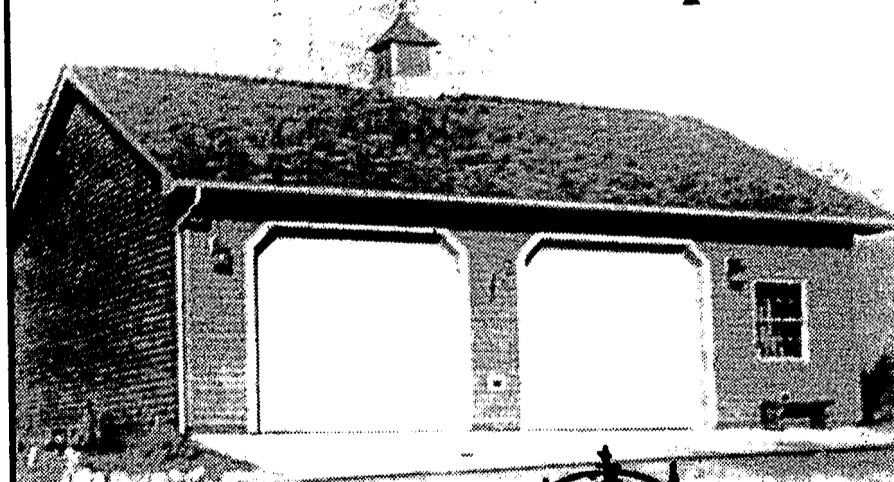

One solution to the gas price problem

The United States is the leading contributor to terrorism in the world. When the U.S. buys oil from OPEC, it contributes directly to the financing of terrorism worldwide.

Indirectly, we are paying for the killing of U.S. Servicemen by being major financiers of countries who support and train terrorists.

Did it ever occur to you that when we purchase a barrel of crude oil from OPEC or every time we fill our gas tank at any pump in the United States, we are ultimately putting money directly into the very hands of countries that support terrorist organizations whose main purpose is to destroy the United States? Slippery when wet

Contrary to what some may believe, when it rains, the road gets wet. And, when the road gets wet, it is slippery. Ta Da!

Pretty simple stuff, aye? That said, reader Diane Estes is peeved at the lack of knowledge, or the ignoring of said fact by area drivers.

"I've been hit twice, rear-ended. I want something written about hydroplaning," she said. "I am angry. I am mad."

Even if she hadn't told me what she was feeling, by the tone of her voice and the speed of her tongue, I could tell she was whizzed-off.

So the story goes. A few Wednesdays ago, it rained. Diane was on her way to a funeral home. The car in front of her stopped. She stopped, the car behind her stopped, but the skidding only ended when her car was rear-ended.

"It's not fair. I stopped in time. I made a promise and I couldn't keep it because of that accident," an exasperated Diane explained.

She's still recovering from her first rear-ending, which "messed up" seven disks in her back. The latest accident pushed back her recovery. She has to receive cortisone shots and, "I can't even work in my garden."

It's not fair, she believes, because it (hydroplaning) is "so preventable."

What is hydroplaning, you ask? It's when your car starts acting like a boat -- floating on water versus terra firma. And, while it is fun to watch Miss Budweiser hydroplane on the Detroit River, it is quite another story when a car hydroplanes over the road. I guess that's why a car is a car and a boat is not.

You don't want anything to come between your rubber and the road. But can it be stopped?

Ever the skeptic (is hydroplaning as avoidable as Diane believes or not?) I called the folks at AAA Michigan. They put me in contact with one Mr. Richard Miller. Dick manages AAA's Community Safety Service. Dick's credentials are solid. He's been with AAA for five years. Prior to that, he was a state trooper for 27 years and spent 11 of those as the Post Commander in Flat Rock. But enough on the wonderfulness of Dick, this is after

all Diane's column about hydroplaning.

Basically, Dick said, hydroplaning sucks because, "Once you're in it (a hydroplaning situation), it's difficult to get out."

His advice: Avoid getting into a hydroplaning situation.

But how do you avoid hydroplaning? Young drivers read on.

One: Make sure your vehicle (no matter if it's a four-wheel drive monster or a puny hybrid) has good treads. These days, Dick says, all manufacturers produce good all-weather tires that do a good job of channelling water out from under the tires.

Two: Don't let your tires wear down -- make sure that tire tread has good depth. Rotate your tires, dangit!

Three: Keep your tires properly inflated. Over or under-inflated tires will impact your hydroplaning experience.

As is true for most of life, knowledge here is also power. Dick shared this factoid: The first few minutes of a rain are the slipperiest. Why? Cuz any oil that has been dripped onto the road mixes with the rain making it more slippery. As the rain continues, the oily mix is washed away (into the lake).

Cruise control -- not a good idea to use during inclement weather (rain, snow or fog), Dick says. So, use common sense and keep your cruise control off during a storm.

If the highway gods are not smiling favorably upon you and you find your car floating uncomfortably down the road, with no control, there's not much you can do, Dick says, except wait it out. Don't turn your steering wheel and don't break.

Take your foot off the gas pedal and ride it out (hydroplaning usually only lasts between one and three seconds).

If you brake or steer, when your rubber hits the road and regains traction, your vehicle will lurch. Not safe.

So there you go, area drivers. Pay attention to the weather, the road, your tires, other folks driving. Be safe. Live long. Read lots. Thanks to AAA, Mr. Miller for the information (I hope you all heed it) and thanks to Diane for calling in the first place. I truly hope she's feeling better.

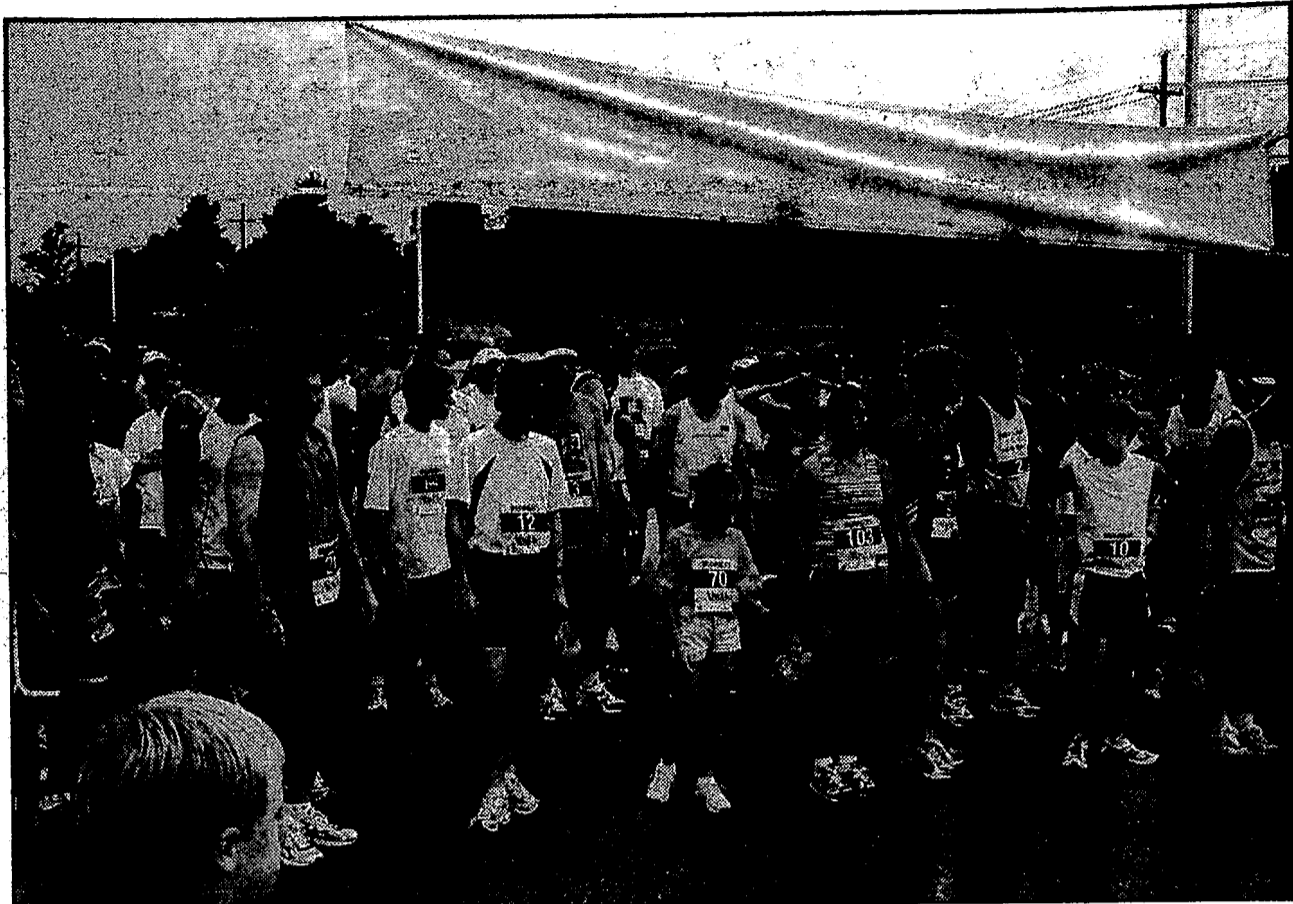

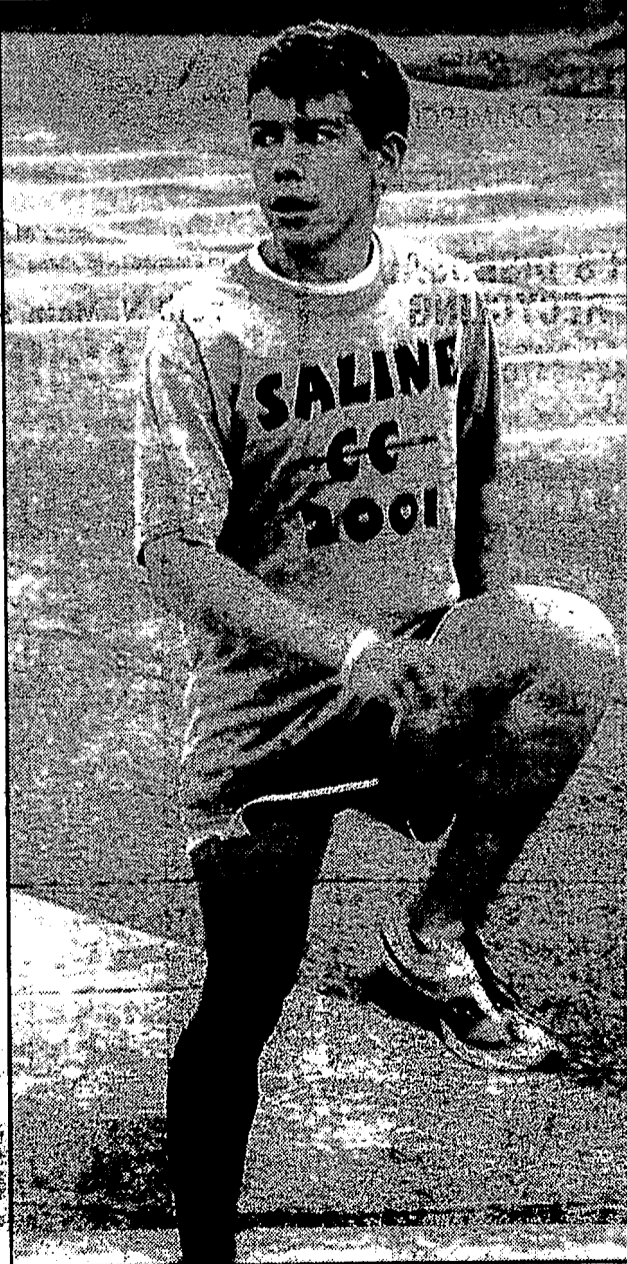

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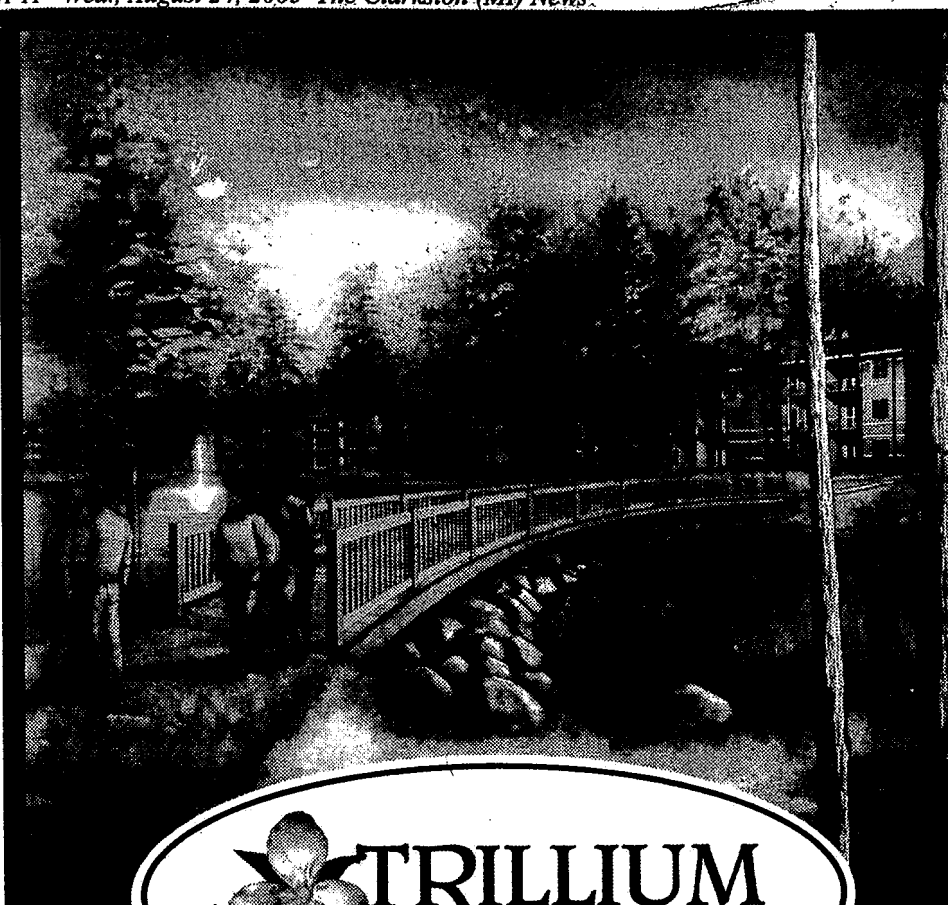


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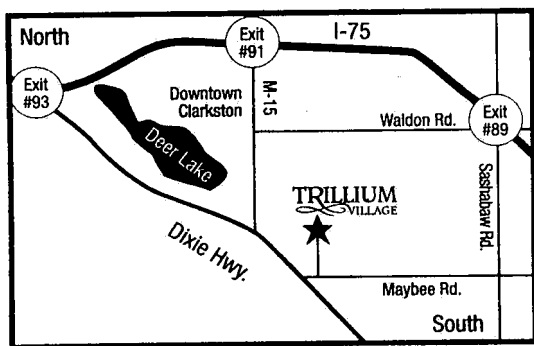
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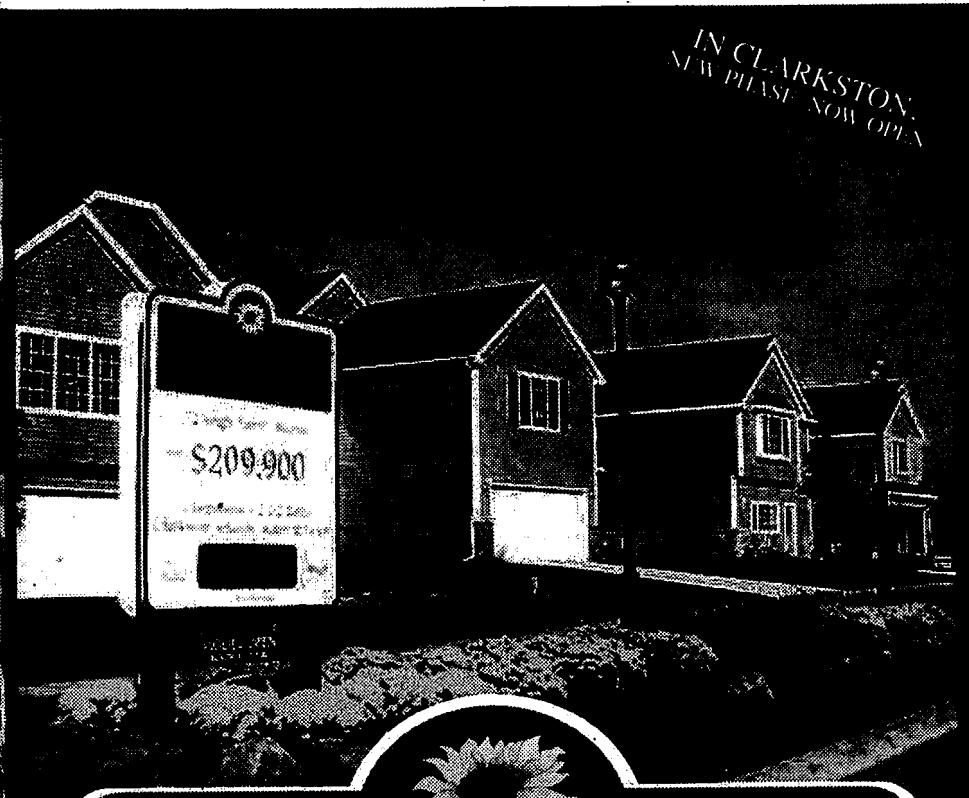
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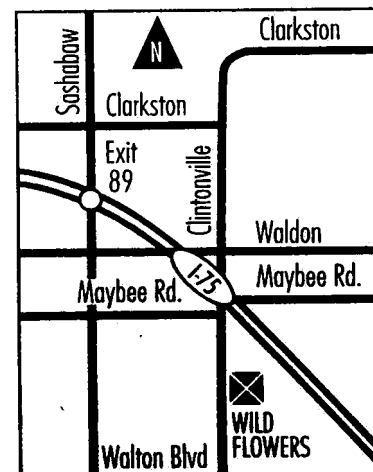
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Church hosts Men of Grace for anniversary

With a history dating back to 1855, the Sashabaw Presbyterian Church continues to celebrate its 150th anniversary.

As church members await the restoration of their historic building on Maybee Road, music performed by entertainers who have completed their own personal restorative journeys, highlight the Aug. 28 Old Fashioned Ice Cream Social.

Men of Grace, a vocals-oriented musical group of men who have completed a year in Grace Centers of Hope, brings a mix of faith-based songs with an upbeat blues and gospel feel.

"The guys of Men of Grace have come through the program. The amazing thing is that these guys have been homeless, eating out of garbage cans and drug addicts. But they have been drastically changed," said Men of Grace director Duren Gutierrez.

"In addition to the music, the guys let the audience know what's happened in their lives and how they've changed," he said.

Gutierrez noted there is a high rate of change over in the group, which serves as one aspect of the center's

aftercare program for patients.

"We try to build a community where there's responsibility, community and accountability... just because they've been clean for a year doesn't mean they're still not struggling," said Gutierrez.

Besides providing aftercare for the men, the group also helps raise funds for GCH. Typically all donations and profits from the group's CD sales go to GCH.

The group has produced three albums of original material and is working on a fourth, said Gutierrez. In spite of concentrating mostly on vocals, performances include Gutierrez on keyboard and member Derek Vulcano on the saxophone.

The church's revival presents another testament of restoring what could have deteriorated into nonexistence without intervention.

The restoration, ongoing for about a year, according to Reverend Laura Sias-Lee, is an attempt to preserve an important part of the area's history.

She said members of the church hope to give back to the area by opening the building for community use.

Sias-Lee said once restored, the church will not host regular services. The building will be available for groups around the community to use for events like concerts or meetings. Events like a special Christmas service or performances by Sashabaw Presbyterian's youth drama club should take place there once the building is restored.

"We would've like having it ready for the 150th anniversary," said Sias-Lee who was unsure of an exact completion date.

Funding for the restoration comes from church members' donations, said Sias-Lee.

The concert and ice cream social take place at Sashabaw Presbyterian Church's current location at 5300 Maybee across from their historic church building. Tours of the historic church and its restoration are offered to visitors following the concert.

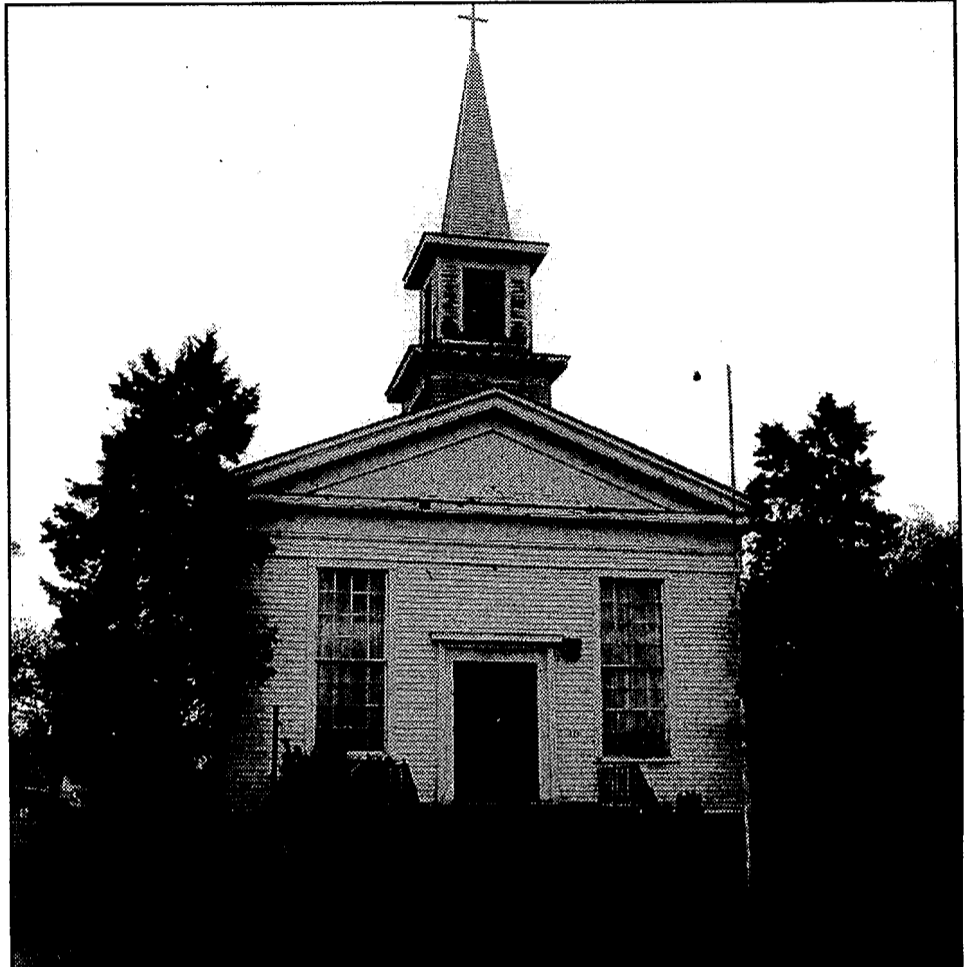

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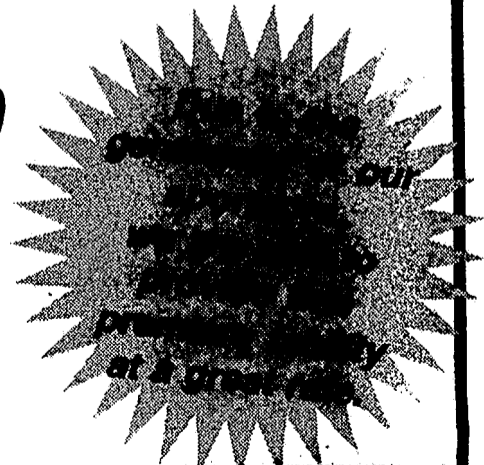

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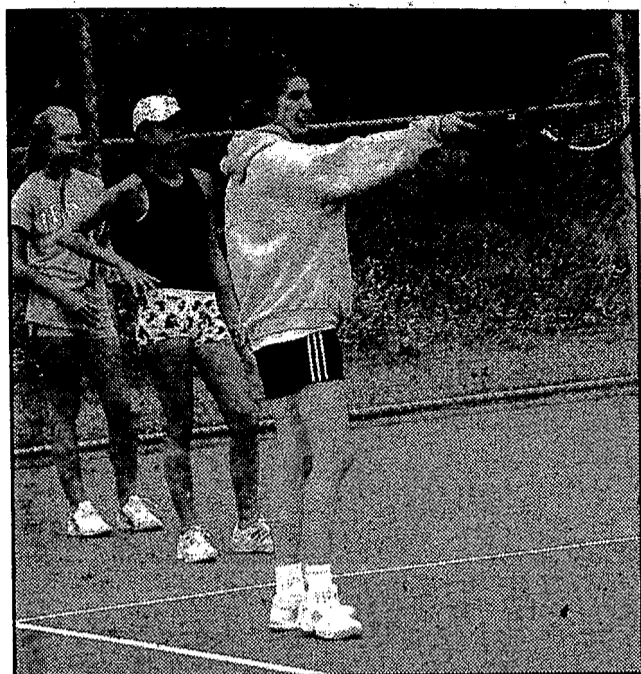
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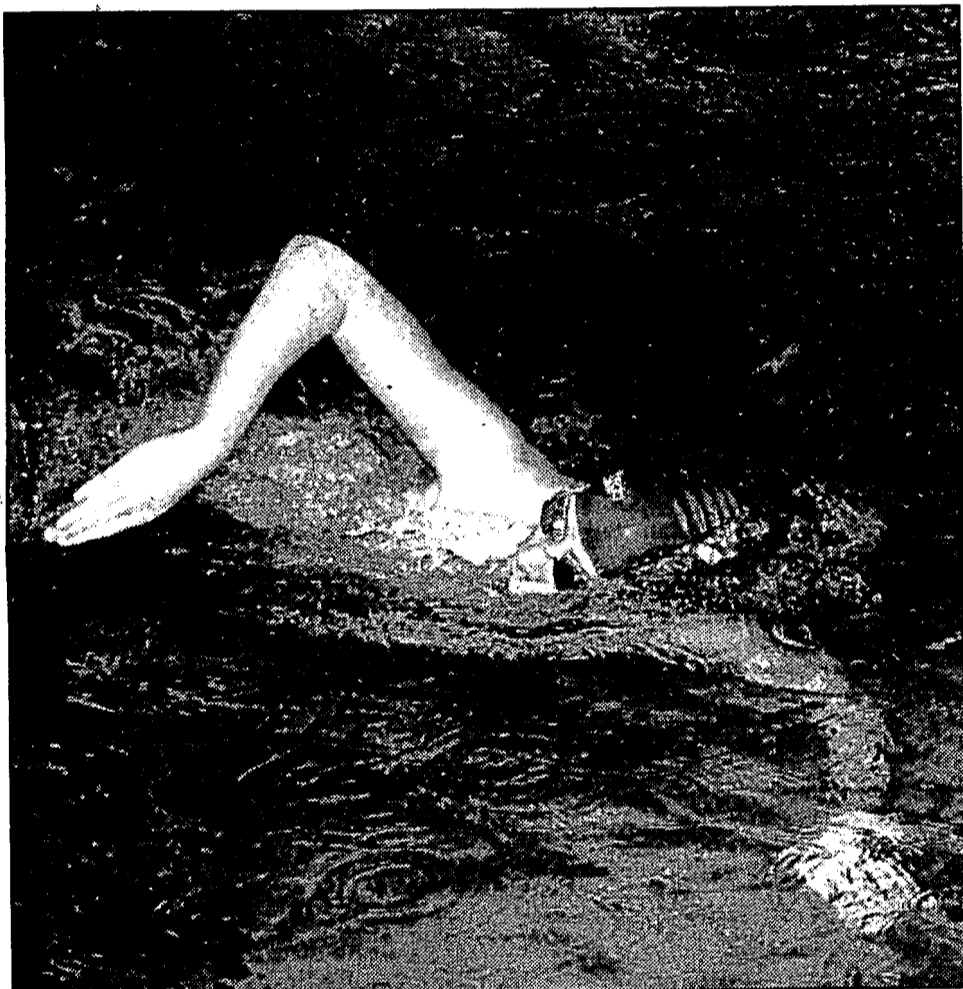

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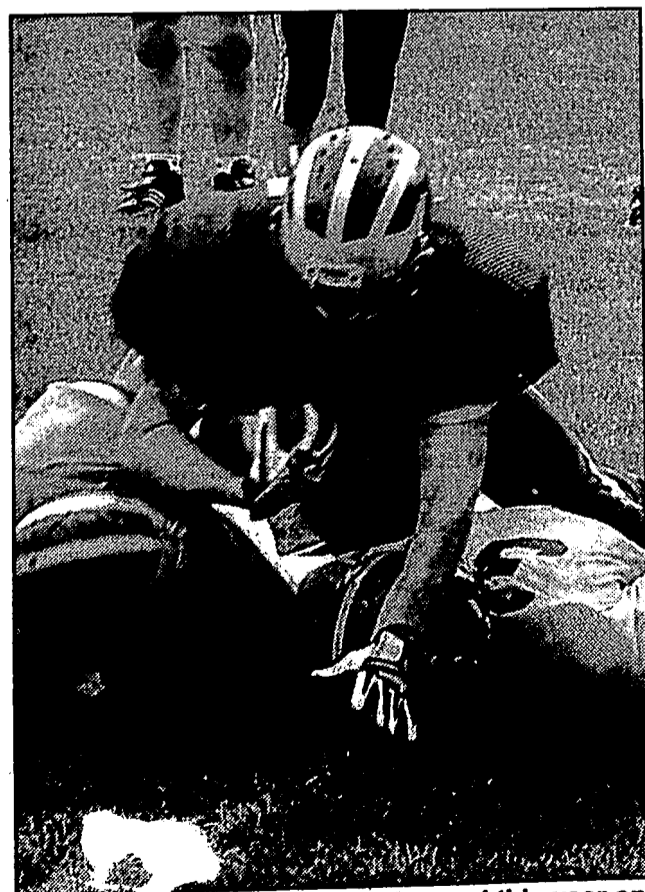

Meningitis Prevention

Meningitis is a relatively rare disease that rears its ugly head in a sporadic fashion in the United States. Often, we read of it in the newspapers when college freshman head off to school in the autumn. There are about 1,200 to 2,800 cases of bacterial meningitis in the U.S. annually. While the most affected group is below the age of two, more than 60% of cases are above the age of 11. Infections with the bacterium *Neisseria meningitidis* cause fever, stiff neck, headache, malaise, loss of appetite, vomiting, trouble with balance, seizures and rash, among others. The diagnosis can be made when the spinal fluid shows evidence of the infection. Treatment consists primarily of hospitalization and treatment with intravenous antibiotics. About 10% of patients who are successfully treated will have some persisting deficit. As a consequence, prevention of the disease not only improves mortality, it can improve the quality of life.

ACIP has recommended routine vaccination of pre-adolescents (defined in this report as persons aged 11-12 years) with Meningococcal vaccine. Currently, few health departments are routinely using this vaccine. Many insurance plans do not cover the vaccine. So, at the present time, this recommendation has not become a reality. By 2008, the goal will be routine vaccination of all adolescents beginning at age 11 years. For those adolescents who have not previously received the meningitis vaccine, ACIP recommends vaccination before high school entry (at approximately age 15 years) as an effective strategy to reduce meningitis among adolescents and young adults.

The following populations are at increased risk for meningitis:

- College freshmen living in dormitories
- Microbiologists who have occupational exposure to meningitis germs
- Military recruits
- Persons who travel to or reside in countries in which *Neisseria meningitidis* is epidemic, particularly if contact with the local population will be prolonged.
- Persons who have certain immune deficiencies called terminal component deficiencies
- Persons who have had their spleens removed

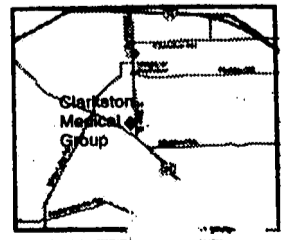
If you find yourself in one of the categories listed above, and are not serving in our armed forces, you will probably need to ask your doctor about vaccination (military recruits receive routine vaccination). If you are caring for someone who has meningitis with *Neisseria meningitidis* or have someone in your household with the disease, your doctor should offer prophylactic antibiotics, which can be taken orally or as an injection. College freshmen who plan to live in the dorms should get a vaccination before they leave for school. As always, best wishes for a healthy school year!

If you are interested in receiving the immunization, Pine Knob Pharmacy, located in our building, carries the serum with a prescription from our office and Clarkston Medical group will only charge a \$10.00 administration fee to give the injection.

As far as coaching philosophy goes, Wasilk wants his team to mirror their coach, someone driven by winning, a fierce yet sporting competitor.

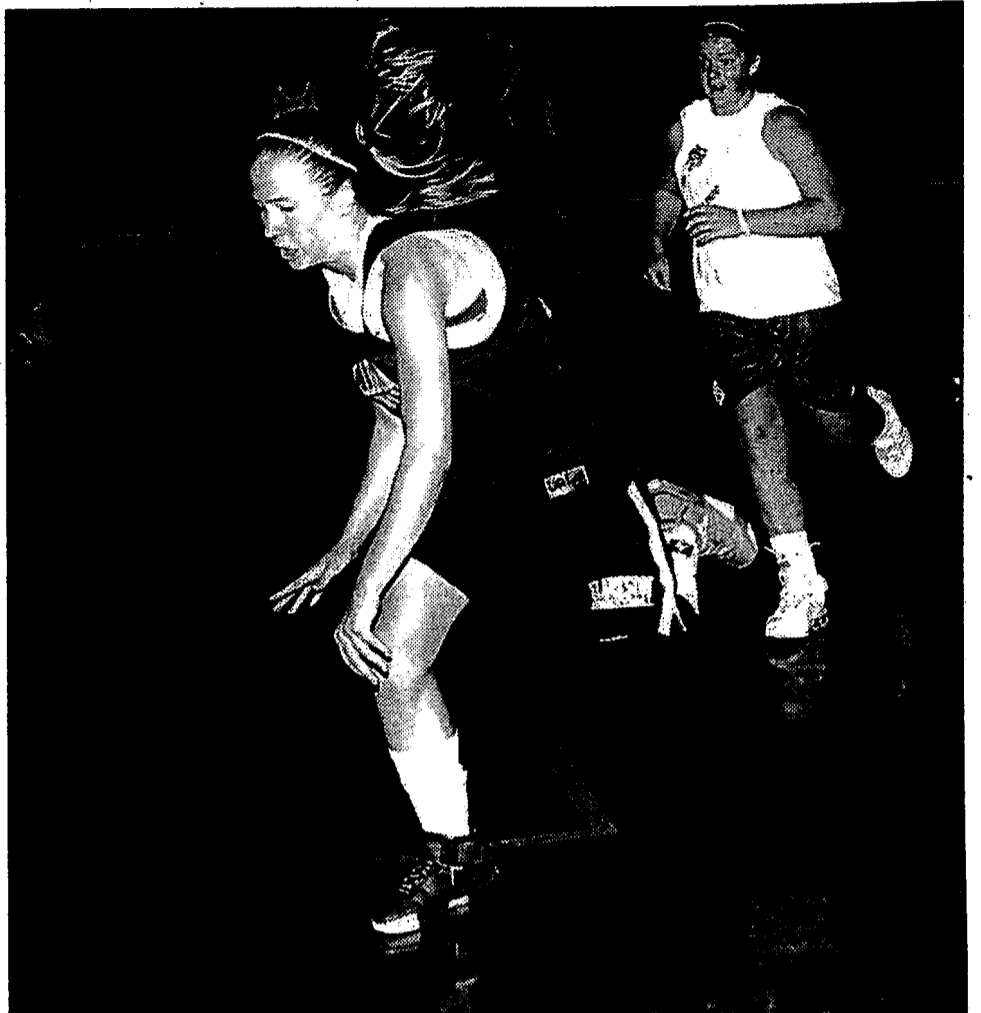

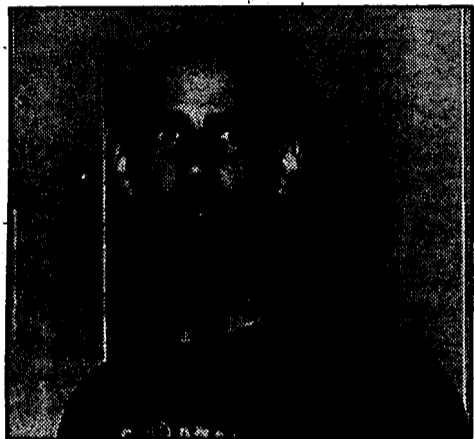

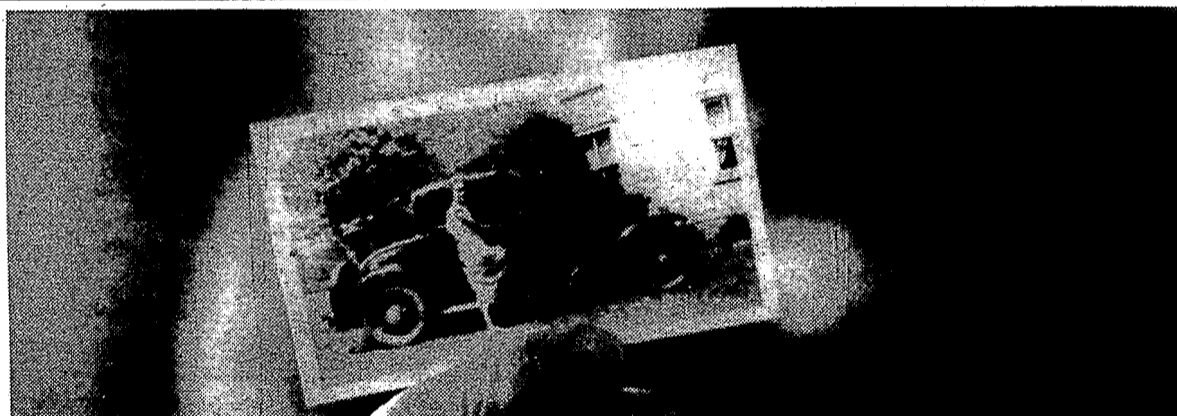

"He's a grinder. Kids can look at the way he approaches the game and learn from it," said Kaul of Ronk, who is the Wolves captain this year.

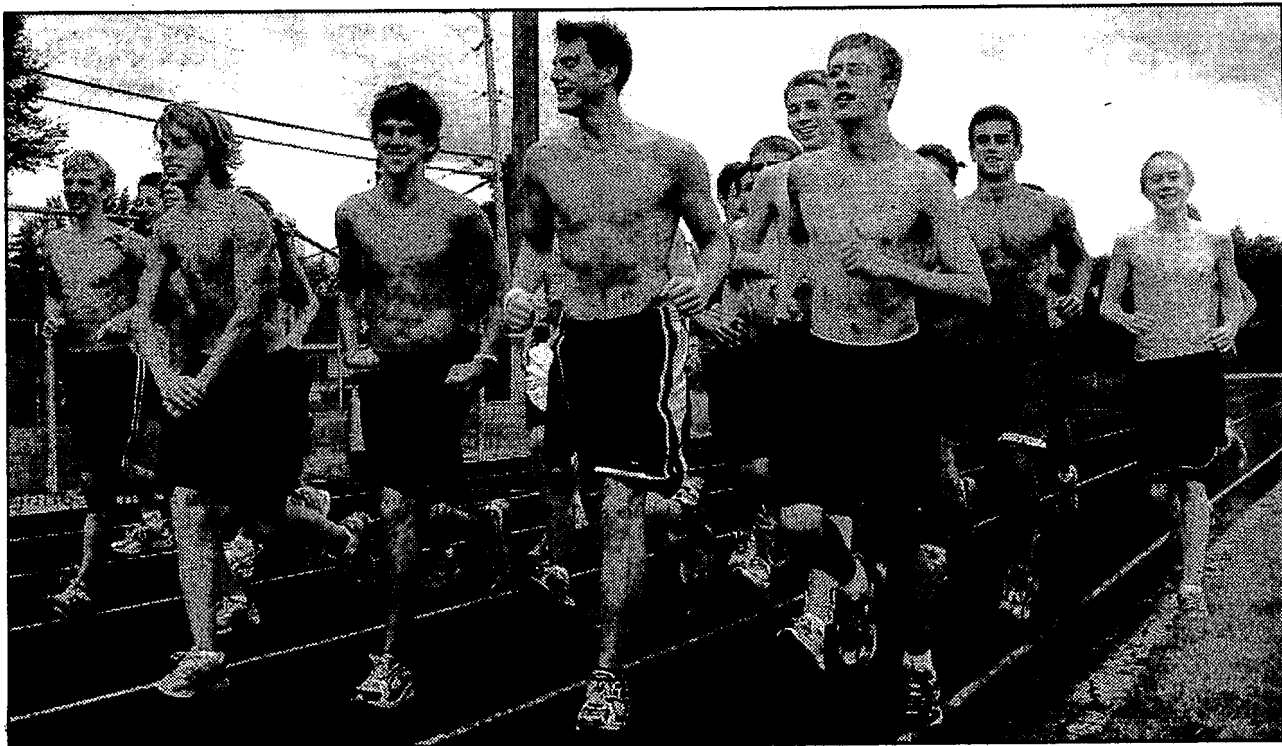
Aside from Ronk, Mike Horn and Zach McDonald both played large roles on last year's team and return

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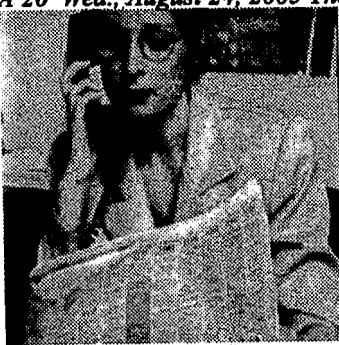

as stopping the payment to farmers for not planting a crop on their acreage (at taxpayers expense I remind you).

Any farm product that can be grown and fermented into alcohol can fuel an internal combustible engine. A country is only as strong as its citizens, and the power they are willing to use to affect change.

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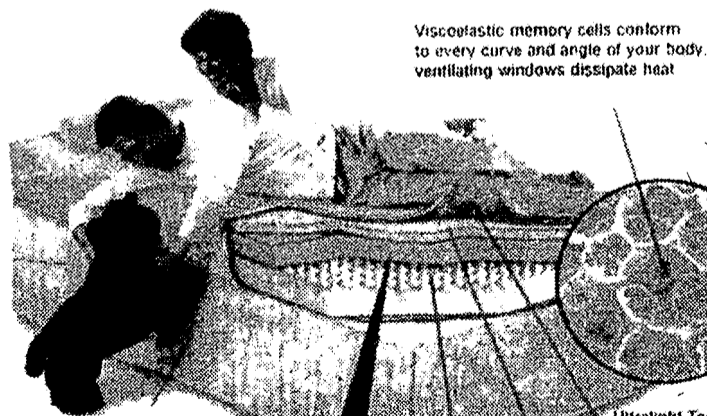
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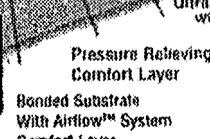

ciate the input and concern of COG members pertaining to our master zoning plan and how to uphold the future vision of the township."

At the Aug. 16 regular board meeting, Wagner made a well received announcement when he was "given permission" from Orco Investments, Inc. to briefly relate plans regarding a 70-acre parcel of land located near the intersection of I-75 and Sashabaw Road.

"Wal-Mart is not happening," said Wagner at the meeting. "No big box is happening on that property at all."

"Nothing has been submitted. I can't tell you what the project will be, but no big boxes. No big boxes at all," assured Wagner.

Wagner confirmed in a later interview that township officials have been in talks with Orco for the past five months.

"I have been asking to release that information for quite some time," said Wagner. "Five months ago, they (Orco Investments) realized the seriousness of the township board. They realized they would have a big fight on their hands."

However, COG member Neil Wallace credits the threat and publicity of a proposed legal defense fund with deterring the developer.

"This is a clear demonstration that the legal defense fund works," said Wallace. "As soon as all of this got out

there through the community and through the press, the developer unilaterally chose to withdraw his plans."

Wallace also received a copy of the opinion and Wagner's released statement on Tuesday. After a brief read through the documents, he argued a couple points.

First, he believes the MTA attorneys made an error in the law when they claim no case law stands in reference to the referendum.

In fact, at the last township board meeting, Wallace made the offer for the board to remove the referendum requirement from the language.

"If you don't like it, take it out," he stated.

Second, Wallace emphasized that reimbursing the legal defense fund is not a requirement.

"It's intentionally set this way to give the board control," he stated in an interview Tuesday morning.

"These two minor things could easily be worked out through a dialogue," Wallace said. "I don't think the board is interested in a dialogue on this. They've been looking for a way to take this off the table, and they've found one."

Wagner stated he expects Orco Investments to withdraw their current rezoning request and submit a new one in the coming week.

He announced in his statement that the ballot language proposal will be on the Sept. 6 meeting agenda.

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The COG ballot language

Shall the constitutional limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes within the Charter Township of Independence ("Township") be increased by 1/2 mill (\$.50 per \$1,000 of SEV) on time, for a period of any one year between 2006 and 2010, for the purpose of creating a legal defense fund (which, together with any interest generated, is referred to herein as the "Fund") to be used by the Township in the defense of litigation brought by property owners or holders of other property interests alleging the zoning classification of their property is unconstitutional, and/or that zoning approval was unlawfully denied, and/or that a regulatory "taking" of property has occurred because of some Township action or inaction? The Fund may be used for legal fees, planning, engineering, appraisal, and other expert witness fees, costs, and related litigation expenses. This millage will raise approximately \$750,000.

A condition of usage of the Fund is that the Township must defend the litigation through a final decision at the Circuit Court level, and that the litigation not be settled through consent judgement at the Circuit Court level without a prior referendum approval of the proposed Consent Judgement.

Any monies generated by this proposal not used for their intended purpose by December 31, 2012 may be used by the Township for the purpose of acquiring land or an interest in land for open space preservation or similar purposes. Should the Township agree to a consent judgement to settle litigation without referendum approval, then any amounts previously expended from the Fund for the litigation shall be repaid to the Fund by the Township from its General Fund.

While the fairy tale image of the Big Bad Wolf may lose appeal after childhood; real life disasters like tornadoes and explosions can leave damage much worse than portrayed in the Three Little Pigs.

As part of a structure collapse rescue class, firefighters from across Oakland County and 15 different departments gained experience in managing a collapsed structure while retrieving trapped victims over the last couple of weeks.

The class, focusing on wood structures, is a prelude to a class Sept. 9 in Howell, dealing with concrete and steel structure collapses more common in cities, Independence Township Fire Chief Steve Ronk said.

Training occurred in either two weekend classes Aug. 13, 14, 20, 21 or day classes Aug. 15 - 18, said Ronk.

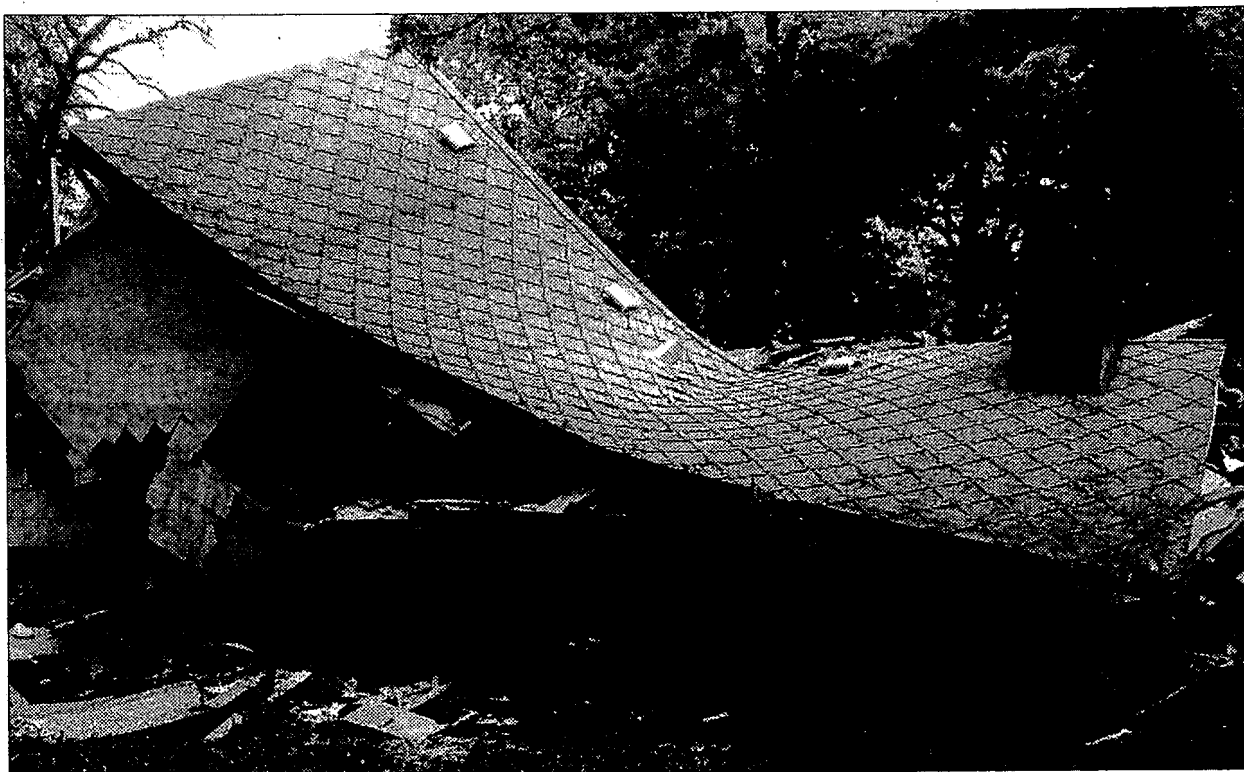
"This is part of building a technical rescue team that we've been building for the last year and half," said Ronk.

Ronk credited Deb Bayer, director of the Combined Regional Emergency Services Training at Oakland Community College, as being a big part of bringing the training.

"We developed classes through grant funding to do this. Independence Township threw in a lot of equipment," said Bayer who also expressed gratitude to the Michigan Urban Search And Rescue Instructors on site.

The houses used in training sessions were provided by Steeplechase Development and the Square Lake Group.

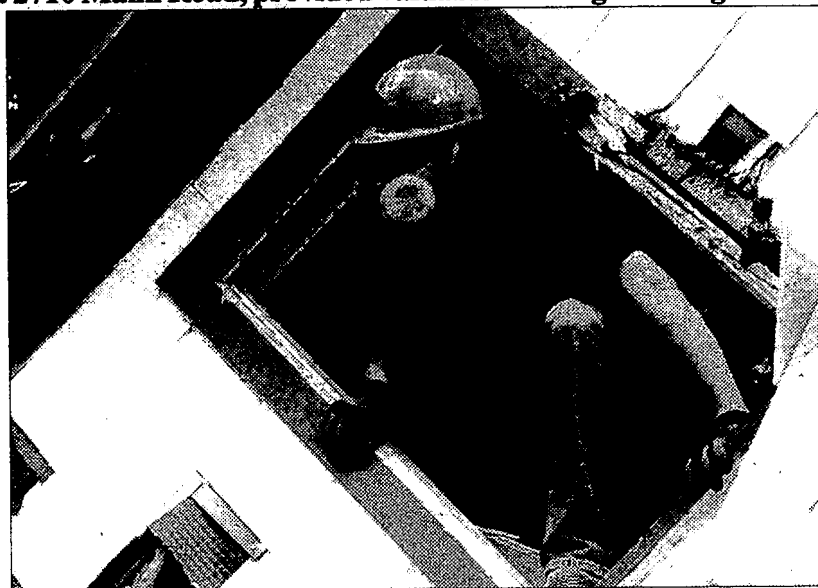
"It sounded like an excellent idea. We could kill two birds with one stone and get rid of the houses and get the fire department some training," said Mike Clark of the Square Lake Group.

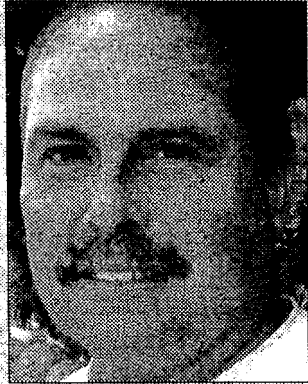

mer to Italy and Greece, the ancient architectural sites stood out to him. The reconstruction of the Parthenon in Greece amazed him.

In the next few years, Bair hopes to go on a trip through Ireland, Scotland and the Netherlands.

Although Bair enjoys going to places out of state and overseas, he also enjoys seeing what is going on in the community.

"On a mini-scale, I like to go on long walks whether I'm at home, in the office or visiting a city. I like to see things like houses and buildings. I like to experience new things. That's part of growing up traveling, seeing different things," said Bair.

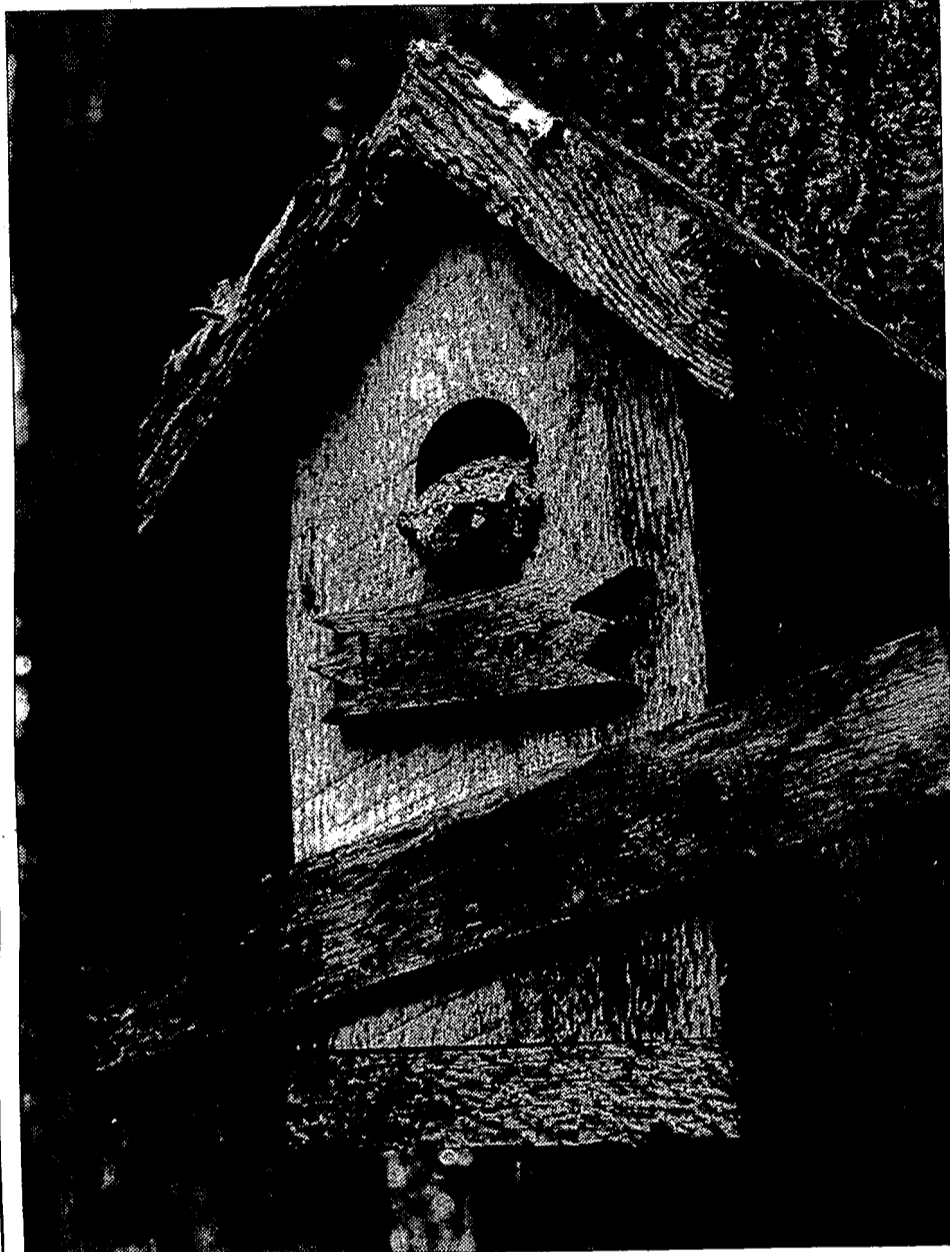

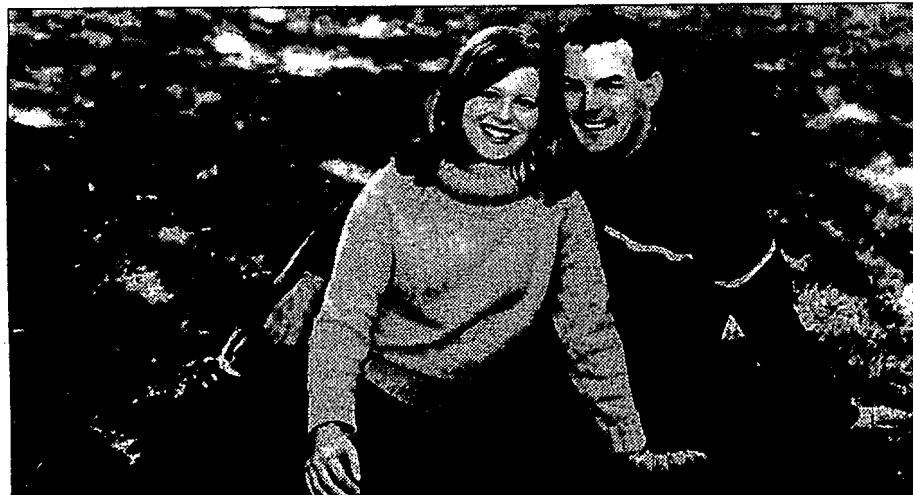

The search for common beliefs

St. Daniel will host Imam Mardini from the American Muslim Center and Mr. Allan Gale from the Jewish Community Council for an Interfaith Panel on Sunday October 2, at noon in St. Daniel's Cushing Center. The presentations will be brief, but we hope to better understand the basic values and beliefs we have in common. We will explore possible ways we can work together for peace, human dignity and the good of the world.

There is a confluence of sacred moments in October in many of the world religions. October 2 is the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi. Gandhi is a powerful witness to non-violence. (Bishop Gumbleton will visit St. Daniel on Wednesday, October 5 at 7:30 p.m. to speak on conversion of the heart to non-violence.) October 3 is the start of holy days for both Muslims and Jews. October 4 is St. Francis of Assisi's day when we in the Christian faith honor a saint who saw God's loving presence in all of creation. Catholics also celebrate Right to Life Sunday, on which we encourage respect for all human life and human dignity.

Gone are the homogenous communities of yesteryear where everyone shared the same basic belief system. Today we face broad diversity of religions, not just in our country, but even in our own neighborhoods. How should we respond as Christians?

On one hand, it is crucial we are firm in our own

faith and secure in our identity as Christians. On the other hand, we need to become conversant with persons of other faiths and work together for peace and justice.

The Interfaith Panel on October 2 at St. Daniel is meant to engage us in dialogue with our brothers and sisters of other great world religions, especially those with whom we share a common ancestor in faith, Abraham, the first to believe in the one God. This is the God to whom Jews, Christians and Muslims all pray.

A 2002 article in St. Anthony Messenger lists 10 "Truths that Jews, Christians and Muslim Hold in Common." One God, divine assistance, daily prayer, weekly worship, fasting almsgiving, holy places, sacred writings, Abraham as our father in faith, and Jesus and Mary. Yes, Jesus and Mary grew up Jewish and worshipped at Jewish synagogues. They are also mentioned in the holy writings of Islam; Jesus is considered a prophet and Mary is the only woman mentioned in the Quran.

Pope John Paul II encouraged dialogue and cooperation between religions. "True religious feeling leads...to a perception in one way or another of the mystery of God, the source of goodness, and that is a wellspring of respect and harmony between peoples: indeed, religion is the chief antidote to violence and conflict." (1/24/02). I hope both the Interfaith Panel and Bishop Gumbleton's presentation will encourage us to work for harmony and understanding. In the words of Pope John Paul II: "May Christ be the light

Candle factory keeps dipping

The Davisburg Candle Factory casts a spell on young and old alike.

Former owner Barbara Johns recently self-published a children's book about the factory and a cat that lived there.

The current owners thought enough of the building after shopping there to buy it, despite having no experience in the candle business.

"Our husbands said 'you don't know anything about making candles,' but we learned. It's trial and error, practice makes perfect," said co-owner Melissa Beznitz.

"One thing about working with wax is if you goof you can just melt it down again, there's no waste. You very seldom have to throw away wax," said co-owner Phoebe Bojanzyk.

The three person ownership team of mother Phoebe and daughters Laurel Bojanzyk and Beznitz bought the factory in 2000. They try to keep the business running like it did when first opened over 30 years ago.

Everything in the factory is done by hand, said Beznitz. She pointed out even when the taper line and ball machine are used, they are hand operated.

The taper line is the factory's defining feature. Crediting previous owner Charlie Going with making the line from old bicycle sprockets and roller skate wheels, Beznitz said the line can hold up

to 176 pairs of taper candles. A run on the taper line takes approximately three and a half hours, not counting time to load and unload the candles.

Tucked under the taper line is a candle rack built around a bicycle wheel, which is also credited to Going's ingenuity.

While not knowing too much about Going, Phoebe Bojanzyk recalled a story she heard about him.

"His wife went to get a vacuum out during a party and the chord was cut off. He probably used it to build something," she laughed.

In the basement, which is often used for its cooler temperatures, is the ball machine, used to create ball candles that can burn from 30 - 35 hours.

While Bojanzyk admits the candle factory may produce candles at a slower pace than larger companies, all the candles there are of a high quality due to the nature of production. Bojanzyk said the ball machine squeezes air completely out of the candle, allowing it to burn much slower than what might be found on competitors' shelves.

The candle factory has a wide variety of candles, ranging from votives to tapers for all occasions and coming in any one of 150 scents.

He came to Michigan in July 1977, taking a job as Transportation Planning Coordinator with RCOC.

In 1983, the same year the Bairs moved to Independence Township, he became director of the Planning and Development Department. Bair was promoted to Deputy Managing Director in 1988 and appointed Managing Director in 1993.

In a career filled with accomplishments, Bair is recognized as one of the founders of the Michigan chapter of Intelligent Transportation Society of America and served as president in the past.

Bair highlighted RCOC's program called FAST TRAC as something he takes great pride in. FAST TRAC is RCOC's ITS project involving the nation's largest adaptive signal program and the largest deployment of video imaging cameras (2,000) for vehicle detection in the world.

Bair said these signals change to adjust to traffic at an intersection using video imaging cameras to detect vehicles and give more green time for certain directions based on traffic flow.

In addition to FAST TRAC, Bair also initiated the Southeastern Michigan Snow and Ice Management (SEMSIM) ITS project involving deployment of ITS equipment on the 500 winter maintenance vehicles operated by the four largest road agencies in southeast Michigan.

"In general, being part of the RCOC has brought me a lot of satisfaction... It's the largest road commission in the state. We have 556 employees. More importantly, we have the second largest public road system in the state. We have 2,700 miles of county roads and the only system larger than that is the state highway sys-

tem which has 9,800. We have 1,100 more miles than both Macomb and Wayne counties," said Bair.

"We have very capable people, partially because we invested in them, putting a lot of money in training. It's an agency I'm very proud of."

One of the biggest challenges facing the RCOC said Bair is road funding which comes mostly from the state collected gas tax and license plate fees.

"We've ranked in the bottom ten states per capita in road funding for over 40 years. We just don't spend money on roads. We spend it on education, health and welfare. Which is okay but our roads show it," said Bair.

"With the bad economy, people aren't driving as much and don't consume as much gas, especially if they're laid off. They also don't buy cars," he said.

Prior to becoming RCOC's Managing Director, Bair served on the Independence Township Planning Commission. Bair said he served from 1986 to 1993 and was chairman the last five years. During this time, he also served on the Zoning Board of Appeals, of which he was vice chairman for the last five years.

"When I became Managing Director, my job occupied so much of my time I could not continue that volunteer effort, but I miss it," said Bair.

"I liked having a hand in the decision process of how the township evolved. I could drive by developments, commercial and otherwise, and say I was part of the decision that made that happen and it looks pretty good."

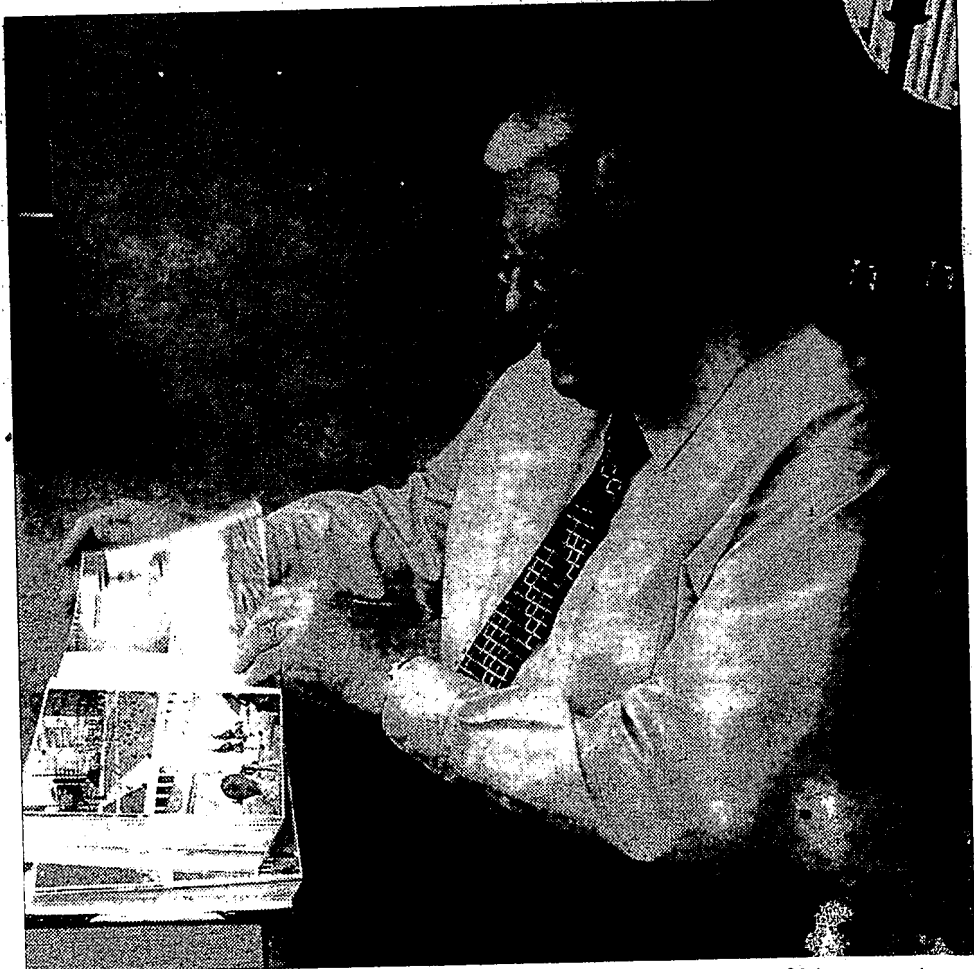
