Festival of Fun returns to Clintonwood Park

Clintonwood Park will once again host The Festival of Fun on the Fourth of July. The annual festival will feature a softball tournament, arts and craft show, canine frisbee competition, live bands, children's activities and fireworks.

Children's activities include a giant obstacle course, jousting, a moon walk, rock climbing tower and carnival games. The price is 50 cents each or all-play wristbands can be purchased for \$15.

The festival will also feature a local D.J. and four bands. The Jello Shot Band plays at 11 a.m., Legend the Band at 1:45 p.m., Murphy's Law at 4:30 p.m. and The Beautiful Loser at 7 p.m..

Kelly Hyer of Independence Township Parks and Recreation, which organizes the event, said the festival is a great small town tradition.

"I think it's a unique experience for the variety we offer," Hyer said. "If you look around the state, the bigger festivals are put on by huge cities. For Independence Township to put on a nice festival is unique. It's

a family day and a tradition in our community. Lots of residents look forward to it.

"One really neat thing about the festival is the community comes together to support it. We raised about \$12,000 to pay for fireworks and other entertainment. Without the sponsors the day wouldn't be possible."

The park opens at 11 a.m. and is open until dusk. Parking is available at Clintonwood for \$5 or there is a shuttle running from Clarkston High School.

The event also features a variety of entertainment walking around the park including a mime, magician and palm reader. Local vendors will also be on hand.

Hyer said the day is great for families and her family comes to the event each year.

"You often see three generations there," Hyer said.
"I like to see everyone happy and able to enjoy the special holidays. We are really proud of our country and our department really prides itself on continuing to bring this tradition to Clintonwood. We want people to relax, spend a quality day with family and to celebrate our nation's independence. After all we are Independence Township."

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Budget approved

In a brief yet productive Clarkston School Board meeting on June 26, the board approved the budget, appointed a new assistant principal and one school board member said good-bye.

After holding a public hearing, the board voted 6-0 to approve the budget for the 2006-07 school year. Treasurer Ron Sullivan was not present at the meeting. Current estimates by the district expect the budget to run at nearly a \$4.8 million deficit.

The board voted 5-1 to approve personal changes, including naming Brett McCall as the new assistant principal of Sashabaw Middle School. Joan Patterson cast the dissenting vote, saying she does not like the current process for staff evaluations and voted no to continue voicing her disapproval.

McCall replaces Glenn Gualtieri, who was named the new principal of Bailey Lake Elementary in May after Stephanie Mitchell resigned.

The meeting was also the last time Sheila Hughes

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

Twp. board accepts Orco's withdraw

At the June 20 regular board meeting, the Independence Township Board of Trustees accepted the withdraw of Orco Investment's request for site specific relief authorization.

Orco withdrew the request, to the board's surprise, at the May 3 meeting.

The site specific relief authorization was in regards to a 70-acre parcel located in the northwest corner of Waldon and Sashabaw roads, near the I-75 interchange.

Orco's proposal for the property, in regards to this request, was a residential development with 450 single-family homes, townhouses and condos on close to 65 acres, and commercial development on the remaining five acres.

Orco's other proposal for the property – a "big box" proposal involving two large retailers and possible hotel – was denied by the planning commission on April 27.

'Suite' surprise for Chanae

An inspiration – that's how people view 13-yearold Chanae who lives with her adopted parents Jim and Carolann Reed in Springfield Township.

Chanae suffered third degree burns over approximately 85 percent of her head and face as an infant. Despite undergoing yearly reconstructive surgery with her 33rd scheduled for this summer, Chanae remains upbeat, having an impact on everyone she meets.

"She's very special. She's very caring, loving and nurturing. She has brought a lot to our life and other people who have met her because of the kind of personality she has," said Carolann, who explained only one picture of Chanae prior to her burns exists.

"She touches many people. She leaves a lasting impression on them," she added.

In recognition of her determination, Suite Dreams, an organization responsible for creating healing environments for children, teamed up with Schuster Homes, local merchants and tradespeople unveiling a re-done vintage glam room for the teenager.

"I think it's pretty cool," said Chanae, who had no idea what the room was going to look like prior to the June 21 unveiling. "I like it. I love it. I like the whole thing," she said following the room's unveiling.

Additions to the room included new floors, carpeting, closet, bedding, drapery, a desk and a computer for those homework assignments next fall.

"It's beautiful. We're going to have to redo our whole house to match it," joked Jim. "It's surprising. I appreciate people donating it."

"I'm overwhelmed. It's awesome. It's more than what I expected. The decorating is beautiful," said Carolann.

A dancing theme – exemplified by a photo frame on the dresser labeled "Dancing Diva" – dominated

the room. Dancing is one of Chanae's favorite activities since she started in various dance forms from the age of three.

"She's in a lot of activities. She's really improved a lot," said Jim, commenting on Chanae's social personality despite her severe burns and surgeries.

While Chanae enjoys performing for dance, she asked her picture not be used in this article.

During the renovation, which took about five days, Chanae did not see the room. While the interior designers asked her for ideas in relation to her favorite paint color (blue) and bedding, the rest of the room was a surprise.

"I think this is really neat how they're doing this for her," exclaimed Michael, her 11-year-old brother.

"I think it'll help her quite a bit (following surgery). Now it looks like a teenager's room. She's more like an adult now," said Jim.

The renovations marked the first room completed by the Clarkston chapter of Suite Dreams serving North Oakland County, which started last summer with a charity event sponsored by Clarkston resident David V. Johnson of Victor International Corporation.

"It's fantastic. I hope I can do it again. All of us feel that way," said Donnah Milefchik of Personal Touch Interiors, who helped decorate the room.

The selection process began when Chanae was nominated as a candidate by her doctor and then an application was submitted to Suite Dreams.

"She's a child recovering from ongoing medical treatment," explained Leanne Schuster, Director of Marketing and Sales with Schuster Homes. "It can't be very much fun as a kid looking forward to summer break and not being able to enjoy all it has to offer."

"What is unique about children like Chanae is they're kids and have great spirits about them even though they

Several members have come and gone over the years, but since their debut the band doubled in size. Tim Adkins, Lloyd Slaven, Dennis Gabbeart and John Liddell joined the group over the years, and Alexander left for personal reasons.

The group performs music dating back to the 50's and incorporates a little of everything leading up to the hits of today. The result is a variety of music that could not fit into a single category, radio station or music channel.

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
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Don't judge by the cover

Last week, The Clarkston News took a look at the condition or "quality" of the actually senior center building. We reported on the building's continued deterioration and many repairs.

This week in the third article of a series discussing the proposal for a new senior center building and operational millage, we review the many uses of the center and the Carriage House.

Although the Carriage House was not listed in last week's article, the structure is under continuous repair, according to both Senior Center Director Margaret Bartos and Independence Township Building Director David Belcher. Since the structure is commonly used for senior center activities, the Carriage House will be referred to in this article.

All information in this article was provided by Margaret Bartos, who does the scheduling for the two buildings.

The primary senior center building, a two-story farmhouse, can handle 25 people in the dining room and rectangular kitchen area.

In addition to this space, the building also has a small reception office with seating for two; a sitting room with two tables, chairs and a couch; and a pool table room/library with one pool table, book shelves and one computer the event from the main structure to

On the second floor, the home's original bedrooms are converted into mon programs at the Carriage House four offices: two for Youth Assistance; one for the senior center coordinator and one shared by the homechore manager, outreach coordinator and two programmers.

In the basement there are two rooms; one room used for ceramics and the other storage.

driveway is the Carriage House, a 20 by 70 foot single room that accommodates 72 people seated. The area also has a small storage area.

During the day, senior center programs dominate the main building: site meals are made, prep is done for

homebound meals, cards, crafts, ceramics, singing, games and some health programs. Many of these activities are held in the dining hall, which is also the primary entrance for the building.

"The meal delivery and volunteer drivers are in and out, people come in to sign up for programs or gather for trips, young people and their parents come in to find Youth Assistance offices, and the daily participants chat, work crossword puzzles and read or knit there," said Bartos.

For those seniors who require a confidential appointment at the center, Bartos said either a trip up the steep staircase is required or one of the larger first-floor rooms must be closed. Many seniors find the steps difficult to navigate.

"There is no space for confidential meetings because the two back rooms are open," explained Bartos. "The healing touch nurse often hangs a sign on a chair at the entrance to the pool room that says, 'Please Do Not Enter' so she can work in the corner out of sight. It is not unusual for someone to come in to select a book or use the computer while a meeting is being

For large daytime programs, senior center staff utilize the Carriage House - and transport everything for the side building.

According to Bartos, some cominclude a weekly band practice (4-10 players), bingo (18-40 players), Stretch and Stretch (12-15 participants) and a bi-monthly bridge tournament (around 28 players). Parties, theme dinners and speakers are scheduled around the other programs.

"Seniors often are reluctant to Across the senior center's main leave the main building in inclement weather to go to the Carriage House for a party or activity," said Bartos.

Bartos said evenings and weekends are often a scheduling nightmare at the center. Common senior programs include a monthly spaghetti din-

New cop on the beat

An officer of the four-legged variety is joining the Oakland County Sheriff's Independence Township substation.

Boomer, a 14-month old German Shepherd, joins officer Lonnie Mullins to create the new canine unit set to patrol the township following their graduation from the Oakland Police Academy at the end of June.

The duo will work midnights, but be available for other calls, according to Lt.

"I think Lonnie will do a great job with that dog. It gives us immediate access to a tracking and drug dog," said LaBair.

Boomer will function as a patrol utility dog used primarily for narcotics, tracking, handler protection and building searches, explained Mullins, who believes

the unit will add to the department.

"Whether people want to admit it or not, there are drugs in the area and with I-75 going through it he'll have a lot of detection opportunities along 75 and make a positive impact," said Mullins, noting Boomer will be certified to detect heroin, cocaine and marijuana.

Over the last four or five weeks, Mullins and Boomer have trained at the canine academy through the Oakland Police Academy, learning how to work together while conducting tracking and detection exercises.

While Mullins acknowledged there are always growing pains during the training as the two coordinate their skills, he expects all the kinks to be worked out

I was startled to see that the Independence Township Board is now planning to change to a new law firm again. Not much more than a year ago, the then

new supervisor pushed the board to hire a new law firm, though he publicly said there was nothing wrong with the lawyers we had.

Several of the board members expressed their support of the thenexisting law firm, but said they would vote to go along with the change just

because the new supervisor requested it. It should be no surprise to anyone that it cost the township substantial money to pay for the transition from our long-established legal firm to this new law firm.

For sometime now there have been rumors there was dissatisfaction with the new law firm; that work was not being done timely and often not correctly. For such problems to occur so quickly seems to indicate

that this new firm was unqualified/unable to tackle the township business. Apparently, the township did not do an adequate job of screening this new law firm. The problems that led to this change should have been determined before we incurred the significant expense of changing lawyers.

Now, not much more than a year later, we are going to pay for another transition to yet another law firm? Will the process for selecting the new law firm be any better? Is the board some how wiser now so the mistakes in the last selection are not repeated?

Apparently, this means that the supervisor's "experiment" by bringing in new attorneys has not worked. So we are stuck and we need new lawyers. The township board should examine this very carefully to make certain that a year from now we are not switching attorneys again and paying for a third transition.





The suspect was seen being picked up by another white male in a late model burgundy 1980's GM Sedan.

The woman notified police after paying her bill and exiting the store quickly.

According to Detective Tim Hein, police believe the suspects involved are two different men.




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Deputy injured in car accident on Sashabaw

An Oakland County Sheriff's Office (OCSO) deputy for the Independence Township substation was injured and transported to the hospital following an accident at Sashabaw and Maybee roads.

The accident occurred around 4:58 p.m. on June 22 while the 33-year-old male deputy was responding to another accident near that location.

"The officer was responding to an emergency call and got to the intersection with his lights and siren, all of his emergency equipment running and actually came to a complete stop. It appeared

that all traffic had stopped for him. As he got out into the intersection, the other driver came through and hit him in the passenger side," said Major Damon Shields of the OCSO.

Driving westbound on Maybee Road in a fully marked 2005 Ford Crown Victoria, the deputy was attempting to cross Sashabaw Road when he was struck by the southbound 2004 Chevrolet Trailblazer

The other driver, a 62-year-old woman from Clarkston, refused treatment at the scene, according to Shields. Her vehicle's air bag deployed during the accident and she was not wearing a seat

belt, explained Shields.

Due to the impact of the accident, the officer received soft tissue injuries and the patrol car's dashboard had to be removed in order to extract the officer. The Independence Township Fire Department transported the deputy to the Genesys Medical Center in Grand Blanc for treatment and he was released after observation around 2 a.m.

"He was feeling okay, other than some bumps and bruises," said Shields. "This is just one of those things that

happens when you're in our business. I think when you drive as many miles as we do and especially when you have to run emergency calls, it's going to happen," he added. "It's unfortunate. We're just thankful the woman was okay and our officer is okay."

No citations were initially issued, but the accident remains under investigation. The deputy was wearing his seat belt stated an OCSO press release. Alcohol is not believed to be a factor in the crash.



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Racing presents opportunity to fight lung cancer

For racecar drivers zipping through the twists and turns at Waterford Hills race track things can change in a split second with unexpected crashes and equipment failures.

During races this summer, visitors to the track, on Waterford Road in Independence Township, can raise money to fight lung cancer and honor the memory of a local racecar driver whose life off the track was cut abruptly short.

During the six amateur racing events at Waterford Hills Road Racing Inc., Groveland Township's Dan Criss is racing to raise money for "Racing for Jim." The program was started by his friend Sammi Hawkins of Waterford, whose 40year-old husband, Jim, passed away on present, signs of the former mechanical Dec. 17, 2005, about six months after being diagnosed with Stage IV lung cancer, which spread to his brain.

As Criss earns points during the races piloting Jim's dream racecar, donors make pledges per point he earns, all of which go to the Lung Cancer Alliance.

"When he was diagnosed, I was working on-line every day looking for an answer," said Hawkins, who married Jim in August 2005 following a 16-year friendship. "When Jim got sick, I was incredibly overwhelmed and scared."

While desperately trying to help the husband she thought would be in her life forever, Hawkins was impressed by the information and resources provided the Lung Cancer Alliance. The information galvanized her will to both save Jim and get the word out about lung cancer.

"What stuck with me throughout his battle was the chemotherapy drugs are the same ones they used 10 years ago

that didn't save anyone then," said Hawkins, who believes too many people think of lung cancer as a disease restricted

According to Hawkins, that stereotype causes the disease to get less attention than other cancers. She acknowledges Jim smoked, but says the disease is taking non-smokers and smokers much

"People are dying younger and younger. People think this is an old man's disease and it's not," said Hawkins.


Following his June 9 diagnosis, Jim's amateur racing career ended after two races just as he finished his dream racecar and finished driving school in the spring of 2005.

Although Jim is not physically engineer's presence, impact and personality are every at Waterford Hills - many of the race cars sport "Racing for Jim"

Jim's 1982 Ford Mustang, which he owned in college and brought to Michigan from his native Tennessee during the winter of 2004-05 can still be seen on the track driven by Criss. During races, Criss even dons some of Jim's gear and has a large "Racing for Jim" over the glove box.

"To know Jim was to love Jim. He could connect with a 9-year-old or a 57year-old. He covered the spectrum. If Jim wasn't Jim, we wouldn't be sitting around talking about this," said Criss.

While maintaining the car, Criss experiences change from sadness over his friend's death to anger when thinking about what he and Hawkins say are shortcomings in detection that could prevent premature deaths.

"The people are living their life (like Jim) and then they are gone because it's not being detected," said Criss.

Hawkins and Criss hope through the fund-raiser that continued research can result in increased success against lung cancer as people detect the illness well before it includes brain metastasis like Jim experienced.

Up to the race on June 24, Criss accumulated 20 total points in races. This means contributors who pledged \$1 a point would be committed to a \$20 contribution thus far. Last year, Criss finished with 75 points.

Visitors to the June 24-25 racing event could also contribute a \$1 donation and get their picture placed on a souvenir magazine memorializing Jim and calling for a cure.

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
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

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

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Millage talks at Springfield Library

Discussions of educating the public about the library millage question on the August ballot in Springfield Township were held on June 20.

The group, which has met three times this month, included the library board, employees, Friends of the Springfield Township Library and other interested members of the community.

"We met to figure out how to educate the public on why we need the .5 mil. It's been a coming need for a long time, we knew when we got this building (in March 2002) we'd need the other .5 mil," said Library Director Cathy Forst.

According to Forst, the current library millage rate is at .4181 which translates to approximately \$245,000. The additional .5 mills would generate approximately \$330,000 to cover operating expenses and would roll back under the Headlee Amendment after the first year, said

Forst defined operational expenses as anything needed to run the library including staff salaries, materials and programs.

Under the current millage, additional contributions from the township's general fund of approximately \$60,000 help subsidize building costs as part of the Civic Center. According to Township Clerk Nancy Strole, another \$15,000 was also contributed from the general fund the past two years for operational use.

"Without that, we wouldn't be able to open our doors," said Forst, who thinks comparisons of Springfield's library costs to other area libraries would surprise people.

Money generated by the millage would allow the library to assume those costs and potentially include computer upgrades, additional staff and materials, expanded hours and services, such as on-line date bases, and faster internet services.

"With the general fund as strapped as it is, it's a real struggle to keep doing that out of our general fund," said Strole.

While the group chose to focus more on the positives rather than discuss repercussions of the millage not passing, Forst did comment during a phone interview about cutbacks if the millage failed.

"There will be problems," said Forst. "Materials, staff and hours would have to be cut. I can't see any other way around it. But we want to accentuate the positives."

Another meeting to discuss the library millage is scheduled for July 11 in the library's Story Room at 7 p.m.

The library board approved the millage language for the August ballot at a special meeting

The township board asked attorney Greg Need to draft the millage language for the library board at their April 13 meeting.





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

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
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

ner (40-75 attendees), grief counseling sessions (6-20 participants) and seasonal parties.

"Other groups dominate the center in the evenings and on weekends," said Bartos. "Non-profit groups meet in the senior center or Carriage House depending on the availability of space."

Some of the groups using the senior center and Carriage House, in addition to Youth Assistance, are Independence Township Parks and Recreation, Christ Shephard Church (recent past), the Clarkston Lions Club and Clarkston Chiefs. Bartos said the center rents the space in order to help pay for senior programming.

"Courtesy Driving School rents the Carriage House almost daily during the summer in the evenings with up to 40 students. This rental is a large source of income for the center," explained Bartos.

In March of this year, the senior center and Carriage House were used by groups for a total of 425.5 hours. Senior programs dominated the space 47 percent of that time. The remaining 53 percent is broken down as follows: 34.55 percent Parks and Recreation, 15.39 percent Youth Assistance and 3.06 percent other groups or parties.

"Due to a lack of space or space limitations, some senior programs take place in other locations," said Bartos.

Examples are the Tai Chi class, Strength and Stretch, Body Recall, Project Healthy Living and Volleyball. Some of the facilities being rented or donated include St. Daniel's Catholic Church, Calvary Lutheran Church, First Congregational Church and Bay Court Park.

"These churches have been very generous in lending space and time for senior programs. Other churches have offered space, but they are usually too heavily booked," explained Bartos. "The township library includes a large meeting room, but only for one-time events, not weekly or monthly programs.

"Community groups have called the senior center

for years looking for space for meetings or events."

Bartos added the senior center is struggling monthly to schedule existing programs with new ones in the limited space. Bartos said many programs are lost due to space constraints.

Look in next week's edition of The Clarkston News where the history of millages involving the senior center and related programs are explored.

The lost program

While discussing the uses of the senior center building, Senior Center Director Margaret Bartos mentioned a program discontinued at the center due to space limitations.

According to Bartos, the center's woodworking program was held in the basement until 1999 when work was done to waterproof the area.

At this time, the equipment and tools were moved to the summer camp building, in Clintonwood Park, where the hope was seniors would have more room to participate.

"However, parks and recreation and senior center staff soon realized that woodworking and children don't mix," said Bartos. "The equipment was too heavy to move around, so it was hidden behind a wall and rendered unusable.'

According to Bartos, yearly inventories are showing the tools – all purchased through senior center fund-raising efforts - are slowly disappearing. Every year, Bartos said a little more is miss-

"Woodworking is very popular at other senior centers, but Independence Township doesn't have the space," said Bartos. "A wood carving teacher was ready to share his talents until he discovered his large wheel chair wouldn't fit through the senior center."



'It was a good experience," Ronk said. "There is a lot of really good players there. I proved I can play with the best. I also like how it was set up. It was set up like a pro tournament with the ropes and everything."

Ronk will have a busy summer before heading to Alma College to play golf in the fall. Ronk plans on trying to qualify for The U.S. Amateur Championship and The Buick Open.

He said making The Buick Open is probably a long shot, but he is going to give it a try.

"If I qualify that would be by far my biggest accomplishment," Ronk said. "I would be going against pros trying to qualify. Qualifying for that would be awesome."

This summer Ronk has three more Power Built Junior Tour events. He has competed in just two events so far this year and has two top 10 finishes. Ronk has an average of 75 in the two events and said he plans on at least duplicating his first two performances in the last three events.

"I want to average under 75 for the tour and finish in the top 10 in every event I play in," Ronk said.

During his high school days, Ronk helped Clarkston finish in sixth place at the state finals during his senior year and in 10th place during his junior year. According to Ronk, he has the lowest nine hole average in school history and he averaged 76 for 18 holes



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


Planning an international car show generally starts 6 to 9 months ahead of time. Miller often faces issues of design, new product positioning and challenges of new markets and their cultural requirements.



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Island Exotics, not your average pet store

Dogs and cats have things easy. Most pet stores carry everything one would need to take care of their furry friends. But what if their friend has feathers, scales or gills?

In that case, Paul Kraus, owner of Island Exotics pet store, is happy to help them find whatever they need.

Step inside the Island Exotics location at 5899 Dixie Hwy in Waterford and you might find Kraus hand feeding baby birds, something he has done since he was a little boy.

"I've raised birds and reptiles my whole life," said Kraus. "I have probably over 100 different birds that I breed and then I hand raise them."

Having been raised with an affinity for birds and other exotic animals, Kraus found his niche operating a pet store that specializes in exotic pets.

"This is what I've always wanted to do," he said. Birds of all sorts fill cages along one wall of the store, leading back to the reptiles, pond, freshwater and saltwater fish. Along the opposite wall are small containers for animals like mice and guinea pigs, proving having fur is not against the rules in this store.

Sure, Kraus will occasionally sell a litter of puppies or kittens, but he said he only does so on occasion to help out local breeders.

One thing Kraus points out is the temperament of his birds, which he said is a direct result of hand feeding them from the time they are three weeks old.

"They're all bred at my aviary and raised by me and my family, so they're all well socialized birds," Kraus said, adding that his three-year-old daughter helps him and he owns dogs as well, so the birds grow up comfortable around children and dogs.

Though some of the animals Kraus sells might be considered rare pets – blue macaws and Australian frill-necked lizards – he makes sure customers can find all the supplies they need to care for their exotic pet in

one place.

"You've probably seen them on the discovery channel," Kraus joked about the frill-necked lizards, which he breeds. "Not aggressive at all... they make great pets."

Above all though, Kraus said he specializes in birds, and on top of selling birds and the products to care for them, Kraus offers to groom and board birds when their masters leave town for a while. Unlike dogs or cats, Kraus said people are generally better off boarding their

birds when they leave rather than leaving them in the care of a relative or friend.

"Some people are afraid of them and they don't let them out. We let them out and socialize with them," Kraus said, adding that he respects customers wishes who may not want their bird to socialize with others.

A new Section 16.25, Safety Paths, shall be added to Article XVI, General Provisions, to read as follows:

SECTION 16.25 — Safety Paths.

1. For any development requiring site plan or subdivision approval, the following regulations shall apply if the development is located on or adjacent to a proposed safety path as shown on the Township's Priority Safety Path Plan:

a.) All plans submitted to the Township for review shall include a plan and specifications for a safety path.

b.) The safety path shall be constructed as part of the site improvements of the development. The construction of the safety path may be deferred only upon the posting of security with the Township in an amount equal to one and one quarter times the estimated cost of construction as determined by the Township.

c.) The safety path shall be constructed on the property of the development within an easement adjacent to the right of way, or upon the request of the developer and permit from the Road Commission for Oakland County, the safety path may be constructed within the right of

d.) Where unique and peculiar circumstances are present, such as extreme topography, mature trees and/or wetlands, the planning commission shall be authorized to vary the location of the safety path so as to minimize or avoid a safety hazard and/or adverse impact upon naturat features.

e.) Where the Township determines, in its sole discretion, that a safety path, if constructed, would not connect to any other safety path and would not likely be connected for at least ten (10) years, the developer shall pay a sum equal to the cost, as determined by the Township, of the safety path. The Township shall establish a fund into which said payment shall be deposited and which shall be used exclusively to construct safety paths in locations as determined by the Township in accordance with the Priority Safety Path Plan. It is the intent of the Township to eventually benefit each property paying into the fund with a safety path.

2. For any development requiring a site plan or subdivision approval not located on or adjacent to a proposed safety path shown on the Township's Priority Safety Path Plan, the developer shall grant an easement whose location and width is acceptable to the Township which would allow construction of a safety path in the future. Said easement shall be shown on the site plan.

SECTION TWO - SEVERABILITY

Should any provision or part of this Ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the balance of this Ordinance, which shall remain in full force and effect



traveling overseas about 6 to 8 times per year to cities such as Paris and Frankfurt. During busy years, he may travel between 12 and 18 times if needed.

Miller recalled the days of traveling prior to the euro where the borders were less permeable.

"I remember carrying a special wallet that had like six currencies... Just to have walk around money for a day you'd have like four or five hundred dollars in loose change. There'd be days where you'd start in one country and might end up going to two or three countries—particularly on days where you did a site survey or something like that," said Miller.

Working as The George P. Johnson Company's first expatriate, Miller and his family lived overseas in Belgium and Germany from 1996-2002.

While in Belgium, the Millers lived in Waterloo, the site of the June 18, 1815 Allied defeat of Napoleon.

"It was pretty cool living in Waterloo. It was the battlefield. We essentially lived in the shadows of where Napoleon was defeated and there was a lot history there and that kind of stuff."

Taking advantage of living overseas, Miller traveled on both business and recreation nearly filling his passport completely, leaving the packed booklet nearly half an inch thick.

Also while living outside the country, Miller continued his lifelong passion for working with vehicles restoring English motorcycles, one of which he still owns.

Miller's passion for cars started during his younger days when his father, Wendell, spent days working in the garage.

"My father was a tinkerer and always had something in the garage. You always knew where to find him," said Miller.

Carrying on his father's legacy includes maintaining the 1931 Model A pickup truck his father originally restored in 1972.

"It's my task to keep it road-worthy which is sometimes challenging with a 75-year-old vehicle," laughed Miller.

The Miller family – including mother/wife Delia,

While the family enjoyed the opportunity to live overseas and experience the diversity of international schools, Miller said the family knew right where they were moving when they returned.

Among their enjoyment of friends, good schools and a small-town atmosphere, Miller sited his affiliation with the Clarkston United Methodist Church as important to bringing them back to Clarkston.

"We kind of went to Europe with an open contract and weren't sure when we were coming back. When it was time to come back, there was no doubt where proof in the pudd.

we were going," said Miller.


Joining forces with the church's men's group, Miller is using his expertise to help the congregation and community interact in new ways.
