### More challenges for recall group

Independence Township Trustee David Lohmeier was not enthused when he found township attorneys wrote a legal opinion concerning recall petitioners using public access channels.

"Frankly, to me that's a personal expense, that should have either come to the board for approval or it should be an expense of yours. If you want to use Mr. Joppich that's fine, that's involving us and township monies in a recall issue, so I think that should "opinion regarding whether this is a go back to you," Lohmeier said to Supervisor

Dave Wagner (the recall target) at the April 6 board meeting. "I don't think we should be paying for it out of township funds. I don't think it's appropriate."

The first paragraph of the eight-page legal document written by Secrest Wardle Attorney Kristin Bricker Kolb addressed to Wagner states:

You have expressed concerns over the use of the public, education and government (PEG) access channels by the group advocating the recall and you requested our permissible use of the public access

channels, or whether the township would have any basis to prevent the airing of such political commentary, in this or in any other

Despite how the opinion reads, Wagner said there was never a question about whether or not the show could be aired, but rather a "question of content."

"What can or cannot be talked about, so the township itself would not get in trouble and there be a possibility of slander," he said. "As far as myself, I feel I was doing the prudent thing for the township as the

## Pink slips for 50 teachers

### New trustee seals deal for layoffs, promotions

Newly appointed Trustee Elizabeth Egan's first action on Clarkston Board of Education was to break a 3-3 tie, promoting two administrators and sending lay-off notices to 50 teachers.

Brief discussion focused on the process leading to promoting Clarkston Junior High School Principal Shawn Ryan to deputy superintendent, and Communications Director Anita Banach to human resources director.

No discussion addressed the teacher layoffs, which didn't sit well with Brooke Davis, president of Clarkston Education Associa-

"I didn't hear any comment from anybody up here about what a travesty it is," he said. 'You are our leaders we need you to say something on the record that says we hope not to do this."

He asked Superintendent Dr. Albert Roberts and the board to look at early retirement incentives proposed by the state, which would allow younger teachers to stay.

We understand cuts are going have to be made and teachers are going to be asked to come up to the plate to discuss it," said

Egan was one of six candidates interviewed prior to the regularly scheduled meeting to fill former board member Joe Armstrong's seat.

Her business background, passion for learning and community involvement were a few attributes setting her apart from the other candidates, board members said.

"I was very impressed," said Trustee Joan Patterson. "She brings a strong financial background."

Her business background and understanding finances can help as the board continually looks at the district's budget.

She graduated from Michigan State University with a degree in packaging. She worked for DOW Chemical for 18 years, first starting out in marketing and product design.

She continued her education at Central Michigan University and earned her masters in business administration allowing her to go into strategic planning for DOW.



### Lights out with smoking ban

Starting May 1 it will be "lights out" at many local businesses, due to the statewide smoking ban.

Gov. Jennifer Granholm signed the ban into law Dec. 18, 2009, which makes it illegal to light up in restaurants, bars, theaters or any other public place—with the exception of cigar bars, tobacco specialty stores and casino gaming floors.

Rich Vogt, a regular customer and smoker at Hamlin Pub said the ban "was coming sooner or later.'

'I could certainly go with not smoking as much," he said. "It made me upset at first, but I think it will be a good deal for everyone."

Karen Kubicki, owner of Hamlin Pub said she is looking forward to the ban and feels it gives a "fair and even playing field."

"I hope it increases business," she said. "I think a lot of people stay away from bars because of the smoky atmosphere."

Curt Catallo agreed if it's a universal ban he doesn't see a problem.

"If someone figures out a loophole or decides to not enforce it, then I think it's going to be problematic," said the owner of both the Woodshop and the Union. "I just want to make sure nobody else has an unfair advantage because it's hard to be a restaurant on Main Street and go against the big chains when you can't give away anything to them."

Catallo said both of his establishments are split down the middle in terms of smokers and nonsmokers.

"Even with our good smoke ventilation systems, it's going to be nice to go home and not put your sweater outside," he noted. "We've had so many servers who have worked late into their pregnancies. I'm glad they can do that again and not worry about

followed by a 75-30 House vote- With passage of the new law Michigan joins 36 other states with laws against smoking; some states have similar statewide bans while others opted for partial anti-smoking laws.

'I don't give a crap," said regular smoker Sean Redenz. "It's going to be like Chicago and Manhattan."

Vicki Alonzi Guest said on the Clarkston News Facebook site what a "happy day" it will be and she can't wait.

"I quit smoking 24 yrs ago," Guest said. "Best thing I could have ever done for myself and my children."

Fellow Facebooker Sheryl Buttrey Miller

"I think it's great," she said. "I can't wait to not smell like an ashtray when I go to a restaurant/bar."

However, Supervisor Dave Wagner who quit smoking 35 years ago said he struggles with it because "it's one more right that's been taken away" and believes policing it will be a problem.

"It's the same thing with alcohol we tried to ban alcohol years ago, it didn't work. The health problems with over consumption is huge, maybe we should ban that or just like with eating, maybe all restaurants should only serve 200 calories with any meal they bring out because of obesity. Where do you go with this," Wagner asked. "I just have mixed emotions on it."

Treasurer Curt Carson said he is against 'making a law to tell businesses what they can and cannot do."

"If the business owner wants to allow smoking," said Carson. "I as nonsmoker have the right to decide as to whether I'm going to go into that business or not."

"It might change the complexion of business a little, but if everybody has to play by the rules," Catallo said. "I think after awhile it will equalize, like other cities it didn't affect business in the long run."

### Parks director takes leave of absence

Due to a stress related illness, Independence Township Parks and Rec. Director Mike Turk has been ordered by his doctor to take time off work immediately.

"I can no longer endure the continual miscommunication, the lies, and distrust that has caused me to be stressed beyond imagination," Turk stated in an e-mail to his employees. "Much of this is caused because people who we work for just don't care for anyone except themselves. E-mails written, phone calls made that are the easiest way to communicate were not returned. False statements at board meeting are another norm

Supervisor Dave Wagner said he has not

talked to Turk personally, but from reading his e-mail he is trying to understand where Turk is coming from and his situation. who's

"Anybody around here knows there is a lot of stress," Wagner said. "Hopefully Mr. Turk will. recover and get back to

work. He's been an employed here for over 30 years, a very good employee and we miss

Turk further stated in his e-mail he would

not return until he can "work under 'normal' working conditions."

"My intent is to be off as long as it takes to be a stronger person when I return," he said, "I have to tell you that if this problem does not go away, I will not return to something I love just because of money. I would rather be poor and happy, than make a few bucks and be around this type of atmosphere outside our (Parks and Rec.) office."

Wagner said there is a lot of "loose ends" in the parks department, which needs to be addressed. Wagner was going to meet with Kelly Hyer from Parks and Rec. and Susan Hendricks to come up with a game plan. He said and update will be given at a later time.

township supervisor and I have distanced myself from some of these things because of an appearance that might arise out of this."

However, recall group Citizens Against Independence Township Waste (CAITW) member Joel DeLong asked why Secrest Wardle didn't address slander in their opinion.

"We were told what we could say or what we could do as far as the presentation and I think we adhered to that," Delong said. "I don't think Andy (Reish, program director) or any of the public access had an issue with it, so I think we complied with what the guidelines were given to use."

The legal opinion concluded there is no legal basis to prohibit it from being shown on public access.

Wagner again said there was "never an intention to censor the content."

"It was strictly a legal issue regarding the safety of the township and what could transpire from this broadcast," he said.

Lohmeier feels "it's pretty cut and dry."

Putting all the law and everything else aside it's just not right," he said. "It's obviously to his benefit, whether it was him or any other board member placed in a recall you're not allowed to use township assets or funds for your personal

use period, that's just the law."

Cost for the opinion has not been given yet. Wagner also said one of the problems he had with the legal opinion was that all legal opinions are marked with a "privileged and confidential" statement at the top and this opinion was not.

Kolb did not respond to the call or e-mail sent by the Clarkston News seeking comment

The group CAITW, who has spent the past seven weeks in front of the post office collecting recall petition signatures, were told on Saturday by Oakland County Sheriff Office Deputy they could no longer collect signatures at the post

"The deputy told me it was on the bulletin board over there and any deputy that saw us over there were supposed to come over and tell


us the post inspector says we can't be there,' DeLong said. "I question it. I don't think the post office has any jurisdiction over the property.

He said they had already talked with the Clarkston post master who had no problems with the group being there, but DeLong said he's not going to dwell on it, but continue on with business elsewhere.

"We're up here at the library, we got subdivisions we need to do, and we got the township hall," he said. "Over 80 people are gathering signatures, I'm pretty confident we're going to get there."

The group has until April 22 to get at least 3.500 signatures.

Neither Wagner nor Independence Township Substation Lt. Dale Lebair returned calls seeking comment and further information.


### It's time Mr. Wagner step down



## New tech helps find truth

Dep. Jim Bowie knew the driver he stopped for running a stop sign at Sashabaw Road and Bella Rose Boulevard, 8 p.m., April 8, was lying about his identity.

Since the 27-year-old Waterford Township man failed to produce a driver's license, Bowie could call his bluff by checking his fingerprints. A few months ago, that would have meant a drive to Oakland County Sheriff's Office headquarters in Pontiac.

But instead, Bowie pulled a MP3 size device out of his belt and checked the driver's fingerprints right there on the side of Sashabaw Road.

"I think this is probably one of the most useful tools we've received in a while," Bowie said, April 16. "It's very helpful."

The Clemis Web ID system, funded on a trial basis through a federal grant, uses Bluetooth technology to link up with criminal databases.

"It checks fingerprints against the criminal data system for wants and warrants," Bowie said. "If there's a hit, it comes up with warrant information and a picture."

Use of the device is subject to normal search and seizure laws, he said.

"We can't use it randomly to fingerprint people," he said. Caught by the fingerprint system, the Waterford Township man admitted he tried to pass off his brother's name as his own. He had a criminal bench warrant out of Oakland County for disorderly conduct, expired driver's license, and three license suspensions. He was cited for driving with a suspended license and lying to police.


# Cold puts damper on Tea Party stop

The Saving America tour protests recent federal health care, financial, and other initiatives, and calls for a return to capitalist and free market ideals.



"It was a blend of diverse flavors," he said about the international race.


The photos are for sale for any enthusiast to take home but Kelly priced them with caution.

"I can tell you that if I am maligned in the paper again I will seek legal council in terms of libel," said Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts, responding to Independence Township resident Dawn Schaller at the April 19 school

board meeting. "Please do not malign the school district that has won multiple awards, and passed every audit we have received with multiple commendations."

Speaking during public comment, Schaller questioned several purchases made by administrators, information she purchased through the Freedom of Information Act.

"I was very shocked to see some of these and I'm still working on the credit card statements and check registers," Schaller said. "I have a group of people who are helping me with this. I just hope in the future the district is going to use better judgment in how money is being spent."

Examining credit-card statements for this past October and November, she noted \$149.78 to Kroger in three purchases for "office supplies," \$642.82 to Clarkston area res-

taurants, and \$356.46 to Radisson Hotel in Lansing.

Other questionable line items, she said, include \$752.72 for supplies/refreshments charged to "teaching supplies/materials," \$279.58 for refreshments charged to "of-

fice supplies," and \$350 to Hard Rock Café for "teaching supply/materials."

Roberts defended the district, saying it stays within legal limits and Plante Moran auditors praise its finances every year.

"You are simply wrong to say we are misspending dollars," he said. "Our accounts pass multiple tests, they go through a process – if you haven't done school funding, you not going to understand that. I certainly accept that."

Schaller plans to create a website and upload her findings so everyone can see it.

"The truth will come out, one way or the other," she said.

Superintendent Dr. Albert Roberts earned a round of applause when he announced he was taking a pay cut.

"I wanted to match the 18 percent cut custodians and bus drivers made," he said, to the applause of school employees at Monday's Clarkston Board of Education meeting.

The 18 percent includes salary cut of 3.9 percent for \$6,000 on his current \$154,000 salary, as well as giving up five paid days off, switching from HRA to HMO health insurance and paying \$1,300 out of pocket for his medical insurance. The total savings is \$27,653.02.

June for \$6,000 this year, as well as next year.



"It was an extremely windy day," he continued. "I stress to the players to keep grinding and battling through their round. The players know every shot counts and we won the tournament by one stroke."


Seniors Taylor Walker and Nick Robeson led the team with a par of 79, tying for third place out of 36 players.





## Band brings big sound to town

Funky, fun, horn driven rock is the name of the game for the Rhythm Kings.

"It's really working out – great feedback so far," said Russ English of Clarkston, who plays alto/tenor saxophone with the eight-man band. "The goal is to keep the dance floor full – keep the ladies happy and that keeps the guys happy."

For Scafone, music is in his blood.

"T'm the senior member of band, or, as I like to say, its elder statesman," said Scafone, 52. "My dad (Dominic Scafone) was a drummer, for Jack Scott, my dad's cousin. That's where I got it from I was 12 when I started playing on bass."

The band recruited additional members off Craig's List, said Collica.

"I like the size of the band - it has a big

sound," said Link, 46, who has a music degree from the University of Michigan School of Music, Ann Arbor. "We're all good musicians with great experience."

Cancelmo, 41, grew up in New England and toured with original bands throughout the 1990s. A classically trained singer, his influences include Elvis Presley, Barbra Streisand, Iron Maiden and Kiss.







"Networking's good – you meet a lot of really nice people and learn about local businesses," Hathaway said.


He will display his artwork at the ABC Harley-Davidson Open House, April 24, at 4405 Highland Road in Waterford.



WIND ENERGY CONVERSION SYSTEM (WECS) shall mean any structure such as a wind charger, windmill, or wind turbine that converts wind energy to a form of

- usable energy.
  a. Private WECS shall mean any WECS that is accessory to a principal dwelling or use located on the same zoning lot, is designed and built to serve the needs of the principal use and that provides power to an electric utility's grid as a function secondary to supporting electricity to
  - the principal dwelling. Commercial WECS shall mean any WECS that is designed and built to provide electricity as an

ongoing commercial enterprise.

ARTICLE XVI – GENERAL PROVISIONS, Section 16.10 - Exception to Height Limits is hereby amended to

SECTION 16.10 - Exception to Height Limits: No building or structure shall be erected, converted, enlarged or structurally altered to exceed the height limit hereinafter established for the district in which the building is located. Exceptions shall be subject to the following provisions:

- Roof structures for the housing of elevators, stairways, tanks, ventilating fans, or similar equipment required to operate and maintain the building, and fire or parapet walls, skylights, towers, steeples, stage lofts, and screens, flagpoles, chimneys, individual domestic radio and television aerials, energy conservation devices, roof-mounted Wind Energy Conversion Systems, water tanks, or similar structures may be erected above the height limits herein prescribed However, no such structure may be erected to exceed by more than fifteen (15) feet the height limits of the district in which it is located; nor shall such structure have a total area greater than ten (10) percent of the roof area of the building; nor shall such structure be used for any residential purpose or any commercial or industrial purpose other than a use incidental to the main use of the building.
- Public communication or public utility microwave tow-ers shall be subject to the provisions of section 16.09.
   ARTICLE XVI GENERAL PROVISIONS, Section 16.27 Wind Energy Conversion Systems is hereby amended to read as follows:

- SECTION 16.27 Wind Energy Conversion Systems.

Intent It is the Intent of Springfield Township to permit the effective and efficient use of Wind Energy Conversion Systems (WECS) by regulating the siting, design, and installation of such systems to protect the public health, safety, and welfare. - For a private WECS, A permit is obtained from the Township.
- For a commercial WECS, A Special Land Use has been obtained pursuant to Section 18.08 and
- General Standards The following standards shall apply to all private and commercial wind energy conversion systems in Springfield Township: a. Design Safety Certification. The safety of the
  - design of all private and commercial WECS struc-tures shall be certified by a Professional Engi-neer registered in the State of Michigan and reviewed by the Township. The standard for certification shall be included with the permit application. If approved, the Professional Engineer shall certify that the construction and installation of

the private or commercial WECS project meet or exceeds the manufacturer's construction and installation standards, and any applicable State and Federal regulations

- Controls and Brakes. All commercial WECS structures shall be equipped with manual and auto-matic controls to limit rotation of blades to a speed not to exceed the designed limits of the WECS. The Professional Engineer must certify that the rotor and overspeed control design and fabrication conform to applicable design stan-dards. No changes or alterations from certified design shall be permitted unless accompanied by a Professional Engineer's statement of certifica-
- tion: Brakes are not required for a private WECS. Setbacks; All private and commercial WECS structures must be setback from property lines at a distance equal to or greater than one and one half (1.5) times the height of the structure, measured from the base of the structure to its highest point, including any blades.
- Climb Prevention, All private and commercial WECS structures must be protected by one or more of the following anti-climbing devices as determined by the Township:
  - (1) Fences with locking portals at least six (6) feet high:
  - Anti-climbing devices twelve (12) feet from
  - base of pole; or Anchor points for guy wires supporting tower shall be enclosed by a six (6) foot high fence or shall be located within the confines of a
- yard that is completely fenced.
  Interference, All private or commercial WECS structures shall be designed and operated to mini-mize or mitigate interference with existing electromagnetic communications, such as radio, tele-phone, microwave or television signals.

- the standards set forth in Section 17.03 Noise. Signs, Use of the WECS shall be limited to conversion of wind energy to a form of usable energy and shall not provide any other function, including signage for purposes other than safety. Additional Standards for Commercial WECS Struc-
- tures The following additional standards shall apply to all commercial wind energy conversion systems in Springfield Township.
  - Color. Towers and blades shall be finished in a permanent non-reflective neutral color that is approved by Springfield Township or otherwise required by law.
  - ance with FAA. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to obtain the appropriate FAA permits for the WECS structure, or to obtain a determination of no significant impact to air navigation from the FAA.
  - Warnings. A visible warning sign of High Voltage shall be required to be placed at the base of all commercial WECS structures. The sign must have at a minimum six (6) inch letters with %-inch stroke. Such signs shall be located a maximum of three hundred (300) feet apart and at all points
- of site ingress and egress.

  Annual Inspection, Every commercial WECS Annual Inspection, Every commercial WECs structure must be inspected annually by a Professional Engineer to certify that it is in good working condition and not a hazard to the public. Such records shall be submitted to Springfield Township and considered a part of the continuing cial use permit.
- Liability Insurance. The owner or operator of a commercial WECS structure shall maintain a current insurance policy with coverage limits acceptable to the Township to cover installation and operation of the WECS project. The amount of the policy shall be established as a condition of special use permit approval.

The application shall include a description of security to be posted at the time of receiving a building permit for the facility to ensure removal of the WECS when it has been abandoned or is no longer needed, as provided in section 4. In this regard, the security shall be in the form of each or inevocable letter of credit.
- Removal: A condition of every approval of a commercial WECS structure shall be adequate provision for removal of all or part of the facility by users and owners upon the occurrence of one
- or more of the following events:
  (1) When the WECS structure or portion of a structure has not been used for 180 days or more. For purposes of this section, the removal of equipment, or the cessation of operations shall be considered as the beginning of a period of non-use. - termined by the Township.

Section 2. Balance of Ordinance Remains in Effect
The balance of Ordinance No. 26 shall remain in full force and effect, except as specifically modified herein. Section 3. Repealer

All ordinances and portions of ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. Severability Should any provision or part of this Ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the balance of this Ordiwhich shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 5. Effective Date This Ordinance shall take effect following publication in the manner prescribed by law. This Ordinance shall be published in the manner provided by law.




