



The Clarkston News has been this community's newspaper of record since 1929. Week in and week out, reporters, editors, publishers connect readers to readers and readers to business owners.



Spring break activities here in town

Students looking to spend spring break serving the community have several opportunities here at home.

Independence Township is planning a Clarkston Community Garden project, April 2-5.

"We hope families will sign up to volunteer a day together. Or, this is a perfect opportunity for students who need to complete community service hours for school," said Kelly Hyer, recreation supervisor for the township.

Volunteers will help finish a permanent fence, placing poles and mesh to keep deer and small animals out of 80 share gardens and two large community garden beds. Volunteers will also clear a space for bee hives.

"With the mild winter, we are anticipating perfect weather to work outside in during the break. Every volunteer will receive a t-shirt and complimentary lunch," said Hyer. "Any Spring Break volunteers will be giving us a 'jump start' for this summer's projects and it is a great way to connect as a community."

Volunteers are needed Monday-Thursday, April 2-5, 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Call Independence Township Parks and Recreation at 248-625-

8223 or download a form at www.itpr.org.

Volunteers can work one day or all four at the garden, northeast corner of Stickney and Pine Knob roads.

Clarkston Coalition for Youth is also offering "Spring Break Clarkston Style."

"Encouraging kids to stay home gives them the opportunity to give back to their community, develop themselves as individuals, understand what it means to be a healthy youth and better themselves as opposed to drinking and partying. That's not going to help their future," said Tonya Cunningham, community organizer for the coalition. "It gives them the opportunity to communicate and meet other individuals they wouldn't have met had they not participated in the event."

The coalition is reaching out to businesses, restaurants and organizations that will provide activities and discounts the week of Spring Break, April 2-6. After receiving 87 responses in on a survey sent out to residents, top activities included going to the movie theater, bowling alley, library, zoo and museums. Ninety-eight percent said they would go out for dinner during spring break week if they had a coupon.

Currently planned is a movie day at the

Independence Township Library, a camp at Stars and Stripes Kids Activity Center, discounted teen and adult yoga classes at Yoga Oasis, discounted meals at Stir Crazy and a "packing day" for overseas troops hosted by the American Legion Auxiliary.

"This is all based off of what our mission is," said Colition President Rebecca McGovern. "Our mission is to 'increase positive youth development through community partnerships, providing every youth with the opportunity to reach their fullest potential.'"



Increases coming for water and sewer rates

Independence Township residents will pay more for water and sewer this year.

Township Board approved a 3.6 percent increase in sewer rates and a 5 percent in water rates on a 4-0 vote, March 6. Trustees Larry Rosso and Mark Petterson, and Supervisor David Wagner were absent.

The 3.6 percent equates to \$2.79 per REU (Residential Equivalent Unit) increase quarterly or \$11.12 per REU yearly. Sewer rates are currently \$77.21 quarterly or \$308.84 yearly. The new rates will be \$79.99 quarterly and \$319.96

Water rate payers currently pay \$1.89 per 100 cubic feet of water the five percent increase equates to 9 cents. The new rate is \$1.98 per 100 cubic feet of water.

"We budgeted in 2012 five percent increase in water and four percent increase in sewer," said Linda Richardson, director of Independence Township Department of Public Works.

Trustee David Lohmeier said the board spent a lot of time working with Richardson, Finance Director Susan Hendricks and Budget Analyst Rick Yeager to walk through expectations over the coming years.

"I would expect over the next few years, based on what we looked at, there will be increases on a regular basis," Lohmeier said. "But I think we got a good plan to keep

them in a modest tempered level and actually eating into our fund balances a bit over the next couple years in order to start building them up on a smooth basis rather than try to fix for all the sins of the past all at once."

Audience member and City of the Village of Clarkston resident Cory Johnston asked why the increase was happening when there is no inflation and people's pay is staying the same and home values are dropping.

Trustee Neil Wallace said part of the increase was due to past boards skipping rate increases "particularly in election years."

"They could do that in part because they relied on the growth of this community and the tap in fees that resulted," he said. "They used, what I believe, should have been capital money because you're buying into the system like joining a club."

Wallace also said it had to do with "deferred maintenance."

"We actually have a formula Plante & Moran (township auditors) developed for us that consists of how much money we need to put into operations, our maintenance, and to have on hand for emergencies," added Wallace. "It's a real straight formula; we're just following it now."

Wallace also noted the \$2.7 million the

prior board borrowed from water and sewer to pay for the current township hall. However, Lohmeier said the board had made a "conscience effort" to offset that added cost internally without it being a burden on rate payers.

"We are affected by inflation because we have labor cost and personnel costs burdened by these," he said. "To a greater degree we're also burdened by how much maintenance needs to be done on the infrastructure, how much improvement needs to be done and how much have been deferred in the past, that's just as important in this factor as just pure inflation."

Richardson noted part of the increases are due to increases received from the City of Detroit and Oakland County to discharge for sewer. The rate was raised 7.2 percent last year and 10 percent the year before. She said the 10 percent was never passed along to the locals. Nor did they raise the rates in 2006 to cover the \$22 million in bonds for water improvements, she said.

"We're still trying to pay \$1.2 million in bond payments, we don't have the revenue coming in, and so it's coming out of the reserves of the water," added Richardson. "We're just trying to level everything out and get to where we should be."

Sewer currently has 5.2 million in reserves and water has \$3685,000. The new rates will go into effect March 15.



Township looks into city dissolution

With "a lot of chatter" around town and in the media concerning the possible dissolution of the City of the Village of Clarkston, Independence Township Trustee Neil Wallace was concerned.

"There is some possibility this could not only have a significant impact on the township, but we may actually play a role," he said. "We may have to take a vote about whether the city should be able to dissolve."

Wallace recommended the board have Township Attorney Steve Joppich look into it and report back with the basic framework at a cost not to exceed \$1,000 so the board is not "caught flatfooted if the city does move forward."

The vote passed 3-1. Treasurer Curt

Carson voted "no."

Trustee David Lohmeier said he "hates to spend money unnecessarily" but also sees it as an "investment."

"Do we want to spend money on the potential we might be faced with this question or do we want to wait until it has traction and then react, in which case we might be caught off guard," Lohmeier asked.

Clerk Barbara Pallotta asked what the status of the petition was. City resident Cory Johnston, spearheading the dissolution, said he had not started yet and was waiting for warmer weather.

"I think there will be a lot of discussion," Johnston said. "I rather do it when it's warmer than colder."

Pallotta said she was in favor of having Joppich look into it because the board will

probably get a lot questions from the public. She felt it was important for the board to have a "basic knowledge" of what they needed to do if things "came to fruition."

"If this should happen, how it will impact us as a community? We need to be prepared for those kinds of questions," she said. "I'm looking at it as educational value more than anything."

Carson felt it was too early to be spending money on "what if?"

"The process is probably a relatively lengthy one and I agree that if we hear there is some sort of traction to this, we can potentially take this up down the road," Carson said. "I don't see where we should be spending the township taxpayers' dollars at this point until we know there is something we should be taking up."

A call to stop using 'the kids' in campaign

Dear Editor,

In the upcoming Clarkston Schools Tax Increase Special Election, voters in the Clarkston School District should send a clear message to the Administration and their four supporters on the School Board. By voting NO on May 8, 2012 (or before via absentee

ballot) voters will be demanding that Clarkston School District officials need to learn how to live within their means - just like the taxpayers of this community.

I am tired of children being used as political pawns to get voters to pay higher taxes "for the kids" instead of properly spending the per student State allocation and the \$138 million in outstanding debt that we already approved in this school district. The proposed \$20 million of new debt, if approved, exceeds certain finance levels so that "non-qualified bonds" will have to be issued with taxpayers having to pay a higher interest rate since the bonds are viewed as more risky investments.

If education funds are so tight, why are we wasting \$35,000 on a special election on May 8, 2012 when this upcoming vote on a proposed tax increase could have been added at no additional cost to the election scheduled for August 7, 2012?

Sadly, the answer speaks volumes about the win at any (taxpayer) cost attitude of School Superintendent Dr. Rock and his backup group of four Board members (The Rockettes?) who dance to every tune he requests.

The May Special Election is a blatant at-

tempt to stack the vote in favor of adding \$20 million of debt to the outstanding \$138 million that is still owed. In May, schools are still in session and likely Yes For The Tax Increase Voters are more easily accessible than in August. Last week's Clarkston News had an article conveniently listing several PTA meetings where voters were encouraged to come and hear one-sided presentations supporting the tax increase.

What kind of lessons in American government and good citizenship are we teaching "the kids" when special elections are purposely scheduled to reduce the likelihood of voting by senior citizens and residents without children attending Clarkston Schools? Clarkston has nine returners coming back for next year and Fife added they need to remember the game against Fenton.

"This moment," he said. "Handling the loss, dealing with it and being able to play in these kind of surroundings."

Out of the roster of 15 players, the team loses six to graduation this year.


"We had six very talented and hard working seniors that showed a great deal of leadership," Wasilk said. "They definitely helped to put our program back on the map."

Everest continued their road to the finals on Monday, taking on Southfield Christian. They lost the game, 64-42.


"It will be a tough game," Lowney admitted before going into the match. "But at this point anyone can beat anybody."



Charity runner heads to Boston

Leah McLean faces a long road in her efforts to help cancer patients – 26.2 miles through Boston, Mass.

"I'm running the Boston Marathon on April 16," said McLean. "I'm running it as a charity runner, meaning that I have to raise money for a given charity in order to gain entry into the race."

She applied to The Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge last September, and was selected for the team.

"I'm honored to be a part of the team," she said. "I wanted to have an impact on something. They do very good work. It's a great program."

Boston Marathon is iconic, she said.

"The energy is amazing – people line the streets the whole way," she said. "They close Boston for the marathon."

The charity also reflects her work as an oncology social worker with Swan for Life Cancer Foundation in Independence Township.

"I meet many courageous people battling cancer," she said. "They share their story and I do my small part to help make their journey less scary by offering them support and resources along the way. This marathon is my chance to continue to make a difference, on a larger scale."

Her goal is to raise \$6,000 for Dana-Farber.

"I have had tremendous support from my family and friends, already raising close to \$2,800," she said. "My professional passion is working with cancer patients and families, making a

positive impact on their cancer journey. My personal interest is running. This is an opportunity for me to pair the two."

This is her second marathon, after running in the Bay Shore Marathon in Traverse City last year.

"My husband is a huge runner. He competes in marathons, Iron Man triathlons – he's a huge inspiration," she said. "This is to teach my children to live out their dreams, small and big, and to aspire to achieve them."

She didn't always love running, though.

"I viewed it as good exercise, but I've had a conversion," she said. "Now I love it. I love the peace. It's kind of a form of meditation for me, a time to process my thoughts, and I feel good after."

She runs at least three times a week, including a long, 15-20 mile run from her home in Springfield Township through downtown Clarkston.

"I try to run the hills around Deer Lake – Boston is a hilly course," she said.


She also cycles 2-3 times a week to give her body a break while still working the legs and heart.

"It's a type of cross training," she said.

She has lived in Springfield Township for 13 years with her husband, Steve McLean, and their children Sam, Emma, Lily, and Elijah.


Ward is new home builder, too. When the new housing market tanked, he wanted to run another business.

While handling the death of a loved one and the grieving process is never easy, the staff at All Saints Cemetery work hard to help make the process go smoother.

A green burial returns to earth as little and simple as possible -- without ornate caskets or preservation chemicals. *The Preserve* is left in a natural state, bordered by wetlands and forest.

"It's not only preserving memories, but also preserving nature," Burns said. "It's nice to have that to offer for people wanting to go back to nature and not leave any kind of impact on the environment. This is their last ecological act they can perform to help keep Mother Earth clean."

In *The Preserve* visitation grave sites are memorialized with field stones from the property. And, for those wishing for interment in a prairie area, All Saints memorialize loved ones on a field stone cenotaph wall.

A trend Burns notices in the cemetery industry is the increase in cremations, which is up to almost 50 percent in Michigan. Along with the cremation niches, they also offer cremates to be memorialized by being buried in the ground.

"In the future, I am going to have some benches here where they can have a private family bench on the ground," he said. "I want to put some down by the lake, so they can actually sit or visit at the lake and contemplate while they're viewing their loved ones."

All Saints is nonprofit, which has its advantages, Burns noted. They don't run into the funding complications like many

municipal and state run cemeteries do.

"We have an endowed care fund that's for the purpose of cemetery care in perpetuity, the principal in that is never touched," he said.

All Saints hosts pre-planning seminars at cemetery's office, churches or organizations. They hold special masses on Memorial Day, and on All Souls Day, which is the first Sunday in November. A Veterans' service is also on Nov. 11. The community is always invited to their annual "Trim the Trees" event on Dec. 1, where people can use materials to create natural ornaments to decorate the trees as well as feed the wildlife at the cemetery proper and *The Preserve*.

The staff at All Saints Cemetery believes in being active in the community -- and are active in both the Clarkston and Waterford chambers of commerce, appearing at expos and contributing sponsors for local events and church activities.

Some people will notice another change at All Saints Cemetery. After 17 years as cemetery director, Bill Burr decided it was time to retire and the reigns were handed to Burns.

Burns has been employed with the Mt. Elliott Cemetery Association, which All Saints is part of for over 30 years. He was director of Mt. Elliot Cemetery from 2002, until coming here to All Saints last 2011.

Mt. Elliott Cemetery Association has served and cared for Detroit and Southeastern Michigan for 170 years. All Saints opened in April of 1979 and services all Christian Faiths.

New View on you from NuView

The idea grew when they wanted to offer something more convenient for their patients -- knowing their patients need care after hours, are busy with families and could only visit after work.



"You don't need an appointment," Mark Thomas, M.D. from Premiere Pediatrics, added. "You can just show up."


Patients of Independence Urgent Care are excited about the treatment they receive from the physicians.



"We use a video screen showing a real pitcher on the mound going through the full wind up and at the precise moment his hand comes through for deliver a ball comes out of the screen."

According to Yared, 35 percent or so of the hitting process comes before the ball is thrown. It's watching and paying attention to the movements of the pitcher that get things started.

"When you are looking at a mechanical machine throwing a ball – you lose all that. You can train with that all day long for weeks but once you play against a real pitcher, you lose it," he said. "All those cues you are working from a live pitcher are different."

Yared said the simulators can throw a ball 40 to 100 miles per hour, as well as most of the basic pitches including fastball, curveball, change up and a slider. They also have a simulator just for dedicated just for softball.


"Some students and kids come in with bad habits and it is retraining the muscle memory from the bad habits to the new techniques," Yared said. "In a few hours time, a student can see as many pitches from the simulator as they might see in a whole season."

He also credited Ed Santangelo, CEO Virtual Baseball for being the visionary behind the idea. According to Santangelo "Virtual Baseball offers high end training for about the same cost as regular training elsewhere, and provides families access to top notch trainers using advanced technology used by many pro teams."

They also have cameras in the batting cages recording the batter, which allows them to use video analysis to break down the hitters swing through a specialized computer program. The program breaks down the batter's swing into 13 steps and allows the batter to view the swing frame by frame.

"The instructors can actually use a character generator tool to draw on the video. This enables him to show the student the angle of the front leg, the relation of the head to the hips, the height of the elbow, all the things they look for," noted Yared. "It becomes a tremendous training tool."

They can also do a side-by-side comparison of the student and a professional ball player and compare the pro hitter's swing step by step to the students in each of the steps in the hitting process. The same video analyses can be used for pitchers too.



Yared said the videos with the character generations and voiceover comments from instructors can be e-mailed to the student, so they can watch their swing, see the character generation and hear the comments the instructor added and be given "homework" drills to work on.

"It is to break the whole process down into smaller elements instead of doing everything at once," he said. "With the video and homework, they will make progress with students faster."

Beyond the batting cages there is an all turf building, where players or teams can work on pitching, hitting, and fielding drills.

Since opening Thanksgiving weekend, Yared said things are progressing well.


"We are getting a great response not just from individual players but from teams," he said. "We have customers that are multi-team organizations – bringing in a range of different age groups from the same organization."

Through design they also tried to create an environment that spoke to baseball with baseball team banners hanging from the ceiling, pictures of fans in the stands along the walls of the batting cages, and tables and a bar to sit at, similar to that one might see in a sports bar.

"We wanted to create a comfortable place for parents to come in. We do have WiFi so they can bring their laptop and work or check email or whatever," he said. They can also sit at a table or counter to see how their children are doing in the cages."

Virtual Baseball, located at 4667 Dixie Highway in Waterford, is currently open Monday through Friday, 3 – 9 p.m.; Saturday, 9 a.m. – 7 p.m.; and Sunday, 10 a.m. – 6 p.m.

Members of the Lakes Community Credit Union, located at 350 N. Park Blvd in Lake Orion, are often greeted by their first names.

In many cases the credit union's staff, many of whom live locally, know them both as valued customers and as their neighbors.

This small-town connectiveness is what separates Lakes Community Credit Union from other larger financial institutions in the area, according to marketing specialist Jim Boehler.


"We're part of this community," he said. "I think we do an exceptional job at making people feel welcome."

The Lakes Community Credit Union was established in 1937 as Pontiac Telephone Employees Credit Union, in Pontiac. Growth and acquisitions precipitated its name change and move to its current location in the late 1990s. The credit union also operates a similar, full-service branch in Waterford, at the intersection of Williams Lake Road and Dixie Highway, plus a smaller office in Mount Clemens.

Boehler said the credit union has approximately 8,000 members, the majority of whom live in the Lake Orion/Oxford area.

"Banks have customers, while credit unions have members," he said. "When a person opens an account here with a \$5 deposit, he or she becomes one of its owners, enabling them to vote for credit union's Volunteer Board of Directors."

The business lobby of the Lake Orion location is open Monday through Friday, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., with the drive-up window staffed starting at 9 a.m.

through closing. On Saturday, both the lobby and drive-up window are open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The credit union also features a No Fee drive-up ATM machine for members. LCCU also is part of the Co-Op network which offers over 28,000 no surcharge ATMs

Because it is member-owned and operated, and not for profit, Boehler said the credit union typically offers

better rates on home mortgages and auto loans, as well as savings and checking accounts, CDs and other investment products and credit/debit cards. He added that the credit union's fees are very competitive or non-existent.


Today, the Lakes Community Credit Union currently is offering auto loans as low as 1.99% APR. Persons locked into a high interest rate and/or vehicle payment are encouraged to visit the credit union and possibly refinance their cars and trucks.

Excellent customer service is the greatest point of pride amongst the credit union's staff.

"When a person calls a bank for help, chances are he or she could be talking to someone in a foreign country," Boehler said. "When when they call us, they're talking to someone who lives and works in Lake Orion or Oxford. There's a connection."

The local credit union also likes to give back to the community, in the form of college scholarships and mini-grants for area teachers. The credit union awards four of each annually, with the scholarships worth \$500 a piece and grants \$250. The teacher mini-grant program just ended, but will commence again this fall. Scholarship applications are being accepted now, available online at www.lakescommunitycu.org, with money awarded in June.

"We're happy to be part of this community," Boehler said. "Pretty much anything a bank offers, we do too, but at better prices and rates. I welcome the public to come check us out."


