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ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Administrative Services Division of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department is an essential unit and provides services for all members of the Department.

Included in its functions are personnel records, accounts payable and receivable, bonds and fine/costs, ordering and maintaining all supplies, along with the Civil Unit and Training.

The Civil Unit is comprised of one Sergeant, two clerks, five Deputies and two Para-Pros. The unit is responsible for serving summons and complaints, garnishments, subpoenas, show cause notices, executions and mortgage foreclosures and judicial (sales). They handle both Civil and Criminal cases.

The Training Unit is staffed by a Sergeant who is responsible for the scheduling and training of all Department personnel including the Reserve Officers. He maintains files on each person and updates them as training or schooling is provided. He is responsible for keeping abreast of all new laws or rulings and seeing that Department personnel are made aware of same and provided with the necessary information to enable them to function properly and efficiently.

TRAINING UNIT

The Training Unit is staffed by a Sergeant who also coordinates the Reserve Program, Crime Prevention and talks and tours. The Unit further assists the department in determining Training needs, scheduling, record keeping, designing programs, instructing and coordinating all training activities.

The P.A. 302 State Training Fund and the County Training Fund are the two primary sources of revenue for both the In-service and Academy Training Courses.

Following is a complete listing of all recorded training activity for this department for the year 1984. This training has been broken down into Road Patrol, Corrections and Reserves. All supervisory and communications personnel have been included in the Road Patrol assignment classification.

The total hours of instruction are as follows: 11,795.5 for Road Patrol, 7,606 for Corrections and 2,386 for Reserves for a grand total of 21,787.5 hours.

CORRECTIVE SERVICES DIVISION - 1984

This report includes the Main Jail, Courthouse Detention Facility, Southfield Facility, Trusty Camp, Work Release and all Out-County Housing Facilities.

Operating under the guidelines of the Federal Consent Agreement of 1982, the division was able to make substantial compliance except in the areas of overcrowding, exercise and staffing. Overcrowding impedes the proper management of prisoners and exposes the County to continued liability. Use of Out-County Jails has given some relief, but this procedure is costly, and falls short of actual needs. A commitment to jail expansion has been made by the new administration, and the issue of court ordered exercise is being studied through the County processes. A complete staff study will be made early in 1985 to fully learn staff shortages, and/or possible changes in assignments.

MAIN JAIL

The Jail is located in the complex on Telegraph Road, and is the receiving area for new arrests. Pre-trial prisoners and sentenced inmates are held in this facility.

COURTHOUSE DETENTION FACILITY

The detention area is located in the basement of the Oakland County Courthouse in the complex on Telegraph Road. It functions as a holding area when inmates are to appear in one of the Circuit Courts.



SOUTHFIELD FACILITY

Under a mutual contract, the Sheriff's Department operates the 36 bed Jail in the Southfield Civic Center. This Jail is staffed by Deputies, and houses women inmates, both pre-trial and sentenced. New arrests made by the Southfield Police Department are housed only until court arraignment.

TRUSTY CAMP

The Trusty Camp is located on Brown Road in the City of Auburn Hills, and is designed to house 120 sentenced male inmates under minimum security. These inmates are assigned work details, and may be held on sentences up to and including one year.

WORK RELEASE FACILITY

The Work Release Facility is located on Telegraph Road in the County Service Center, and is a facility for sentenced male inmates. The capacity is 107 beds for males. They leave the facility each day for work, and reimburse the County at a rate of \$8.00 per day for their care. These inmates are selected for the program by the Courts.

OUT-COUNTY JAIL HOUSING

Due to overcrowding the following Jails are utilized for Oakland County inmates as space becomes available.

1. Allegan County - Allegan
2. Arenac County - Standish
3. Monroe County - Monroe
4. Shiawassee County - Corunna
5. Washtenaw County - Ann Arbor

The total cost to Oakland County for out-county housing fees in 1984 was \$308,622.50.

OAKLAND COUNTY JAIL HEALTH CARE PROGRAM-1984

The highlight of 1984 was the reaccreditation of the Jail Health Program in August. With only a few minor discrepancies, the accreditation went very smoothly. The award was presented to the clinic in October at the correctional Health Conference in Chicago.

In 1984, the clinic saw some changes in the medical officer staffing. In May we saw the leaving of Robert Hope and Mark Scanlon and the arrival of Marshall Lyons and Maureen Reynolds in July. It took a few weeks for replacement officers because of the lack of interest in the position working here in the infirmary. The main reasons for the lack of interest is the increase liability and the bonus pay is not enough for the added responsibility. Hopefully, through education and possibly an increase in the bonus pay, interest can be increased. More time for training is also needed to help prepare the new medical officers.

The negative aspect of 1984 were the lawsuits which were served to us. First the Michael Secrest case was settled in Federal Court. The county settled out of court and Dr. Avci won his case, no case for action.

RE: OAKLAND COUNTY JAIL HEALTH CARE PROGRAM

We have since been served a new case against Leonard Schubring, PA, Elizabeth Radunz, RN, Mary Legg, RN, and the Oakland County Jail Infirmary for negligence.

Another case is one by the estate of Wilburena Conley for her death while she was incarcerated here in the jail. The next case is one by Louis Faulkner for malpractice while he was incarcerated at the jail. The following case is by John Denison against Dr. Avci and the Sheriff's Department for an incident in 1983. The last case is by the estate of an inmate who died here at the jail while he was going through alcohol withdrawals.

In comparison to 1983, inmates seen in the medical clinic rose by 500 in 1984 while the number of prescriptions operations were fairly stable as compared to 1983.

In 1985 we look forward to working together with the jail administration along with the Public Health Department in the planning of the upcoming jail expansion. With the increase population, the medical department also will need to be increased both in staff and space.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES

The Protective Services Division is comprised of the Road Patrol Officers and those hired under contract to the various Townships. Their primary function is to provide protection to the citizens of Oakland County.

These officers work assigned shifts and areas. Their immediate supervisor is the assigned Road Patrol Sergeant and then the Lieutenant in charge of Protective Services.

The Road Officer responds to a variety of calls and often times must make split-second decisions based on very little backup knowledge when answering a call. Every attempt is made by the dispatcher to relay all pertinent information when relaying a call, but often times a call will involve much more than what the initial complaint indicated. For instance, an officer dispatched to a family disturbance may arrive at the scene to find a man with a gun is involved and requires backup.

Often the Road Patrol Officer is the only contact a person will have with a police agency. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance that he provide a good image at all times and functions in a professional manner. This is the same regardless of whether he is in his vehicle, on the street, in a restaurant, handling an accident or taking a complaint from a citizen.

CANINE DIVISION

The Canine Division was increased by two during 1984. They are becoming an intregal part of the Sheriff's Department both in use by us and in assistance provided to outside agencies. This report includes suggestions regarding guidelines, equipment, uniforms and future staffing needs.

CANINE PERSONNEL

We currently have three canine units in service. All three are utility dogs and are assigned as follows. Deputy Shields and dog Heidi are assigned to days. Deputy Finney and dog Metchka are assigned to afternoons. Deputy Wickham and dog Eric are assigned to midnights.

Deputy Shields trained Deputies Wickham and Finney in 1984, in a department and M.L.E.O.T.C. certified course. Deputy Tom Cavalier also interviewed and was approved for the position however this dog did not respond to training and was dropped from the program. Due to the time factor and lack of personnel for road patrol duties, Deputy Cavalier was unable to start training another dog. If this slot is to be filled, Deputy Cavalier should be considered for the position. The program presented to the Public Service Committee in 1984 requested four dogs. The committee did approve of the program, in concept, and may not be opposed to the addition of another dog. Training could be handled by our department or through a state course being put together now.

ARRESTS AND RECOVERIES

These calls resulted in nineteen arrests and eight calls where property was recovered.

(It should be noted that thirty three of the total calls were received by our new units in less than three months of service. In addition, for the last two years, canine response has been limited to working hours for outside departments and only one dog.)

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Deputy Shields and dog Heidi, were also involved in nine canine demonstrations before approximately five hundred people. This included the Pontiac and Royal Oak Schools, boy scout troops, and church groups.

PROGRAM PROPOSAL 1984

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department has maintained an active Canine unit for the last fifteen years. The unit has been made up of volunteers and the dogs have been donated. Hundreds of criminals who may have otherwise escaped have been brought to justice. While few in numbers, our Canine section has been considered one of the best in the entire state. We are proposing to expand our Canine unit from one to four dogs.

The applications of a utility Canine unit are extensive.

TRACKING: The dogs are trained to track criminals as well as missing or lost persons.

BUILDING SEARCHES: Instead of sending a police officer into a building in which you suspect a break-in, the dog is used. The dog is much faster and more accurate than a human and greatly reduces the possibility of injury.

PROPERTY SEARCHES: Dogs can search a given area of ground much faster than any other method and without contaminating a crime scene.

MAN WORK: For crowd control or chasing a fleeing felon, dogs are unmatched. The problems are solved in an orderly fashion without fatal force.

PUBLIC IMAGE: Dogs present a positive image of police departments which is especially important in relating to today's youth.

PROGRAM PROPOSAL (Continued)

AVAILABILITY: Even though the Canine units are highly specialized, they are still able to respond to and handle any calls regular patrol units handle.

VENUE: The dogs would be made available to any law enforcement agency within Oakland County, (or adjacent jurisdiction), on a 24 hour basis.

Until 1982, all funding for the program was through donations. (Officers and vehicles were provided from the general patrol force within the Sheriff's budget.) In 1982, thirty-three hundred dollars were allocated, by the county, for canine maintenance. (This was for two dogs.) The same amount was allocated in 1983. In 1984, the amount was reduced to fifteen-hundred dollars for one dog. This is the only dog we have working at this time. We would request that the unit funding be returned to the 1982 level to cover all four dogs. We also request that three station wagons be allocated for the Canine units. (See attached sheet)

COST CONSIDERATIONS

Personnel Costs: None

The personnel will be allocated from existing non-contracted positions so there will be no additional manpower costs.

Training Costs: None

PROGRAM PROPOSAL (Continued)

The personnel will be trained by Deputy Shields, the current dog handler, so there will be no departmental fees.

COSTS OF Dogs: Three Dollars

The Canine section of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department can provide a much needed service for the entire county. Aside from the very positive Cost/Production ratio, the Canine section has the potential to carry out all of the missions dictated by todays society. Any program which can be both cost effective and responsive to the community deserves consideration.

Individual vehicles also allow immediate response to any emergency on a 24 hour basis. Station wagons allow for full service with plenty of room for the dog.)

The cost therefore would be \$26.95 per year.)

The total per dog is \$411.95 or \$1,647.80 for the unit. This sum doesn't include any margin for injury or any specialized equipment.

GUIDELINES FOR CANINE

The following guidelines have been used successfully for many years and I think the additions will clarify any conflict with existing orders as well as add to our professional appearance.

The Canine division has been a support unit to patrol services and assigned to that section. Officers are required to handle all patrol responsibilities as well as canine calls and to comply with all applicable rules and regulations. When possible, canine units are used as circle cars but have been used for contacted positions to avoid overtime. Training requirements (8 hours per week minimum) are handled on the department training day. Should the officer have department training on that day, Thursdays have been used (this is the day that the other Oakland County Canine units train) provided no additional man power is needed. All canine demonstrations are done on the officers regular tour of duty or are denied.

I would request that the following additions be considered for the canine guideline.

1. Each officer assigned to canine should wear a collar insignia with the dress uniform. A patch, "Sheriff Canine" with the likeness of a German

Shepherd should be worn on fatigues.

2. Officers may leave their patrol vehicles with the motor running, however the vehicle doors must be locked.
3. When working the dog, officers may wear a hat at their discretion.
4. When training, the officers may stop for breaks and lunch at the same location.
5. Some provision should be made for those occasions when a canine demonstration is requested and there is no dog working.
6. It would be very helpful if the officers assigned to the unit could attend seminars (Usually one week per year) to help assess our own program and progress.

CANINE EQUIPMENT REQUEST

The following is a list of equipment which I feel would enable us to do a better job and at the same time provide a much higher degree of officer safety. We understand that there is no money allocated for these items in the current budget. However, a strong case can be made future consideration.

1. **Reversible rain coats:** Currently, the only rain gear we have is bright orange. Price \$70 per unit.

2. **Semi-Auto Shotguns/Adapted for Police Work:** We have tried long guns with folding stocks and magazine extensions. Our main problem always comes down to being able to use a long gun with one hand, (the second hand being tied up with the dog and flashlight.) Several departments, including Troy and Detroit, have gone to such weapons for their S.W.A.T and narcotic units. Price per unit approximately \$550.

3. **Hard Body Armor:** There have been many calls in which our canine units should have had hard body armor to pursue an armed felon. The armor the department has for the TAC unit is ceramic and can not be carried in patrol cars for fear of damaging the plates. Several vests are now available which are steel and can be transported or stored in patrol type vehicles. Price per unit, approximately \$600.

4. **Night Vision Device:** A binocular type device which could be used and maintained for canine and TAC unit use. These would be invaluable in cases where there were multiple suspects or a possible ambush situation. The military M-18 binocular is available. Price per unit, approximately

\$1000.

5. Canine Building: Currently the department has no kennel facilities of any kind. A building such as the old laundry could be converted for such use and would offer many advantages, such as kennels at no cost, central supplies, a base for training, etc.

FUTURE

Our immediate goal should be for six utility dogs. This would give us two dogs per shift and allow above average response time. Six dogs would also give us a margin of reserve should more departments begin to use the service.

There are several other areas where dogs are needed but not currently available in Oakland County. The first area is a explosive detection dog. Dozens of bomb threats are received by our department every year. We have to depend on either the State Police or the Detroit Police canines. Rarely are these units available within the response time needed. Training in this area is usually done by the military. Agencies such as the F.A.A. can sponsor civilian departments on a limited basis.

The second area of need is a narcotic dog. (There are no narcotic dogs currently available in Oakland County for road patrol use.) This is a relatively easy behavior and the training could be done locally.

The Canine Section can be the corner stone of rebuilding the Oakland County Sheriff Departments professional image as well as encouraging the spirit of cooperation needed in modern police community. It is a cost

TECHNICAL SERVICES

The Technical Services Division is one of the largest areas in the Department. It is comprised of the Communications Section, Crime Laboratory, Arson Investigation Unit, Detective Bureau, Liquor Enforcement, Marine Division, Polygraph Unit, Range and Property, Record Bureau including the CLEMIS function and Gun Registration.

The following report is broken down by division and is a clear and concise representation of the functions performed by each along with a brief explanation preceding the report. These units all represent support functions which are provided to back up the Road Patrol as well as being furnished to other outside agencies upon request. As you see, these support services are an intregal part of the Sheriff's Department. Some of these areas, such as gun registration, auction of recovered/stolen property, maintainence of records, are mandated by the State of Michigan. Other support services are provided free to the citizens of the County by the Department. Together these support functions comprise all of Technical Services Division.

CRIME LABORATORY

The Crime Detection Laboratory of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, provides professional forensic analyses of physical evidence on a twenty-four hour, seven days a week basis. The Laboratory, a Division of the Technical Services Division, operates a mobile crime laboratory vehicle, which responds to all major crime scenes, accidents, civil disorders, drownings, and processes the same for any physical evidence unintentionally left behind.

Some of the various analyses that are routinely performed by the professional staff of the Crime Laboratory include: forensic crime scene photography, fingerprints, latent fingerprints, firearms, toolmarks, physical matches, composites, explosive devices, bomb threats/de-arming, narcotic and dangerous drug determinations, alcohol, and gunshot residue. We also have a Chemist to perform gas chromatographic analysis of flammable liquids.

This unit is intended primarily to be an agency specializing in physical evidence as an aid to the various divisions of the Sheriff's Department, as well as any other County police department or agency requiring such aid. It is also a source of aid to departments other than those within the County and provide expert courtroom testimony in cases where necessary. A list of the departments and agencies assisted during the year of 1983, are as listed in the following report.

ARSON INVESTIGATION UNIT

The Arson Investigation Unit of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department provides professional expert investigative services on a twenty-four (24) hour, seven (7) day a week basis. The Arson Squad, a Unit of the Protective Services Division, operates two (2) mobile arson vehicles, fully equipped to respond to fire scenes, for the gathering of evidence and determining cause and origin of fires. The two (2) unmarked automobiles are also operated by the Arson Unit to allow for the necessary follow-up investigation and occasional surveillance conducted in connection with their assigned duties.

Members of the Arson Unit, routinely respond to fire scenes upon request, process the scenes for physical evidence, indicating cause and origin, conduct follow-up investigation, including interviews of witnesses, obtaining search warrants and arrest warrants, effect arrests of suspects charged as a result of investigations conducted, and assisting the Prosecutor's Office with preparation of the cases before and during trial. All four (4) officers assigned to the Arson Unit are court qualified and provide "expert testimony" at trial as to the cause and origin of those fires which are investigated by the Unit.

Additionally, officers regularly upon request, provide instruction to fire and law enforcement agencies in and out of the County in areas of Arson Detection/Investigation.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

The Detective Bureau of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department is a unit within the Protective Services Division. It is staffed with a Lieutenant in command of thirteen Detective Sergeants and two Patrol Investigators. Eleven of the Sergeants and a Patrol Investigator are responsible for investigating criminal activity occurring within contracted areas. One Sergeant is responsible for the inspection of liquor establishments and the enforcement of liquor laws. One Sergeant and one Patrol Investigator are assigned to serving warrants.

Personnel assigned to criminal investigations handle major crimes reported to the Department. They are charged with collecting evidence, interviewing witnesses, interrogating suspects, making arrests, and assisting the prosecution in presenting the case in court. Personnel performing the function work closely with other police agencies and often participate in multi-jurisdictional investigations.

Investigators assigned to warrants process in-coming criminal and civil warrants. They locate the named individual and arrange for the individual to appear in court on the matter. The officers often travel within the State to pick up wanted persons arrested by other jurisdictions. They also handle all extraditions with the County of Oakland and the Governor's Office.

LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT

The Liquor Enforcement Division of the Sheriff's Department is operated solely by one Detective/Sergeant Investigator. His duties consist of investigating all liquor complaints, violations of State Liquor Statutes, and violations of State Law.

He is also responsible for processing the form 1800 from the Liquor Control Commission. He investigates and makes recommendations to the L.C.C. concerning new Class C Licenses, SDM/SDD Licenses, Tavern Licenses, Beer/Wine Wholesaler Licenses, new Club Licenses and permits to expand or change present licenses.

This officer is also in charge of the Precious Metal and Gem Dealers of Oakland County. He processes all applicants and investigates any complaints that are received.

All records on Liquor Enforcement and Precious Metal and Gem Dealers, are maintained in this division.

MARINE DIVISION

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department Marine Division was able to accomplish the following during the year 1984. It replaced two of its older Sea Ray Boats with two new Sea Ray Boats and two tandem wheel trailers. The Division was also able to qualify for a special equipment grant from the State of Michigan with which a 16' aluminum boat, 15 h.p. motor, and trailer were purchased.

The Marine Division Dive Team was able to obtain three sets of Scubapro stabilizing jackets, Air II system and regulators. This equipment is a start towards standardization of equipment.

The Marine Division held special training classes for Part-Time Marine Deputies to ensure that new members of the Department and more senior members of the Department were equipped with the necessary information to accomplish the task.

The Marine Division goal of increased service to the citizens of Oakland County was accomplished even with the restriction of manpower and financing within the County. Its main objective has been to make Oakland County a safe, waterwise, enjoyable place to live or visit through education and enforcement.

POLYGRAPH UNIT

The Polygraph Unit of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department provides a very necessary and vital service to law enforcement in Oakland County.

This service is available seven (7) days a week. However, since there is only one examiner, the office is open daily, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, with the examiner being on call for emergency type situations such as homicide investigations, violations of the criminal sexual conduct code, kidnappings, etc.,.

Law Enforcement agencies who take advantage of this investigative tool, saves the taxpayers of Oakland County, hundreds of thousands of dollars. The savings is made possible by cutting valuable man hours, which would be wasted, following leads and suspects, which prove to be of little value during the investigation. It allows the investigator to focus the center of the investigation where it would better meet the needs of the judicial process.

There are approximately fifty-seven (57) law enforcement agencies which take advantage of this very important service. Included, on a regular basis are: Law Enforcement Investigators, Sheriff's Department Personnel, Chiefs of Police, Prosecutors, Judges, Defense Attornys, Fire Investigators and Fire Chiefs, State Police, State Agencies, Correctional Departments and other police and private examiners.

RE: POLYGRAPH UNIT

On an occasional basis, we service elected public officials, research groups, college educators, doctors, and the general public. The Polygraph Examiner, because of his extensive background, in the area of interviewing, has been used as a consultant during major investigations, as well as a instructor, for members of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcements in Oakland County. The training emphasizes the critical need for proper interviewing techniques as they apply to victims, witnesses, and suspects.

GUN RANGE

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department Gun Range, provides firearms training for members of the Sheriff's Department, Prosecutor's Office, Friend of The Court officers, Animal Control, Safety Division, Treasurer's Office, Circuit Court and Auditing Division. Also, provides training for approximately fifteen (15) outside police agencies.

Personnel are required to participate in the firearms training on a monthly basis. The training consists of various types and situations of firearm use with a mandatory qualifying four (4) times per year.

Also, the Range Officer is responsible for issuing and maintaining the departmental weapons. He also has the responsibility of ordering ammunition for the use on the Range.

The Range Officer's function is to also keep records and order various equipment and parts necessary for the proper operation of the Range.

The Range is operated Monday through Friday, with early hours to accommodate the officers who work the midnight shift, and also late hours for the officers working the afternoon shift.

PROPERTY ROOM

RECORD BUREAU

One of the most important offices within a Law Enforcement Agency is the Record Bureau. From within this office a flow of information is maintained concerning: Crime Occurances, Citizen Complaints, and Criminal Records of persons housed within the Jail.

Important also to the agency is communication between this office and the public, for improper or misleading information would be detrimental to its function. Equally important is the release of information to its rightful owner, since our action or in-action reflects on the Departmental policy, either favorably or unfavorably.

In an effort to increase efficiency both the Complaint reporting and Criminal records are now automated (computerized). Automation, at times, presents a problem in that office clerks must be trained in new procedures and applications of this system.

As crime and arrests increase throughout the year so too does the workload within the Record Bureau increase, causing, at times, many frustrations to "keep up" or maybe "just ahead" of the demands.

Both the Criminal and Complaint records are put on micro-film through the micro camera within the Record Bureau. As a criminal returns to the jail, the micro-film containing his history of arrests must be updated. This requires extra personnel to man the micro-camera.

Gun registration is also an intregal part of the Record Bureau and their statistics are included in this report.

GUN REGISTRATION

The primary function of the gun Registration Division is the issuance of firearms purchase permits, applications for carrying a concealed weapon and explosive permits. The service is available to all residents of Oakland County with the exception of those residing within an incorporated City or Village.

Prior to issuing a permit, a criminal record check is made to determine eligibility of the applicant. Upon receipt of the record clearance, a permit is issued. Upon completion of the permit it must be returned and the subject is fingerprinted and the firearm is registered.

The Concealed Weapon Permit application is submitted to the Gun Board for approval upon its completion and a copy is retained in our files for a period of three years. Procedure is the same for renewal of CCW permits.

A daily log of all permits issued is maintained. A cross index file is also kept, namely a name card bearing applicant's name, address, and a numerical file bearing the serial number of the firearm. Guns brought into the State by new residents, must be LEIN checked for prior registration or ownership. If a stolen report is indicated, the weapon is confiscated, an investigation is conducted, and the gun is subsequently returned to the proper authorities.

RE: GUN REGISTRATION

During the course of a normal work day, numerous phone calls are received from the general public requesting information regarding procedures for obtaining the above mentioned permits. Requests are also received by mail for applications to be sent to the residence. Ordering supplies from the County and State Departments (print cards, applications, etc), is done periodically.

A fee is charged for gun registration and also for CCW fingerprinting. A receipt book is maintained for all fees collected for registrations and fingerprinting. Periodically, the money is turned over to Administrative Services.

Fingerprinting is also done for subjects who are applying for various reasons such as citizenship, Air Force applicants, liquor licenses, etc.

ALCOHOL ENFORCEMENT TEAM

On April 10, 1980, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department implemented a Countywide Alcohol Enforcement Project, aimed at reducing accidents, injuries, and deaths related to the drinking driver. Drinking drivers in Oakland County are involved in at least half of the fatal accidents each year. This project began on a 1.5 million dollar Federally funded four year grant, which was state subsidized through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning. It was the first of its kind in Michigan and has served as a model for other communities in this state and others.

Known as the "Alcohol Enforcement Team," this special team was comprised primarily of Sheriff Deputies (6), supplemented with State Police and local police officers that co-operate in this effort, while the "team" is working in their jurisdictions. The team concentrates its efforts in the same way as the selective enforcement unit, by working the times-of-day, and days-of-week that the majority of alcohol related accidents occur. Special computerized data is used to determine the roadways and areas in Oakland County which have the largest percentage of alcohol related accidents. The "team" then rotates working these areas.

Extensive training has been given to all of the traffic officers, both County and local, who work with the Alcohol Enforcement Team. All of these officers were given specialized training on the recognition and

arrest of drinking drivers. Many traffic officers have also been trained as certified breathalyzer operators. This became of critical importance as the Sheriff's Alcohol Enforcement Team placed Michigan's first three "Mobile Breathalyzers" in operation on December 12, 1980.

In the Spring of 1984, after a one year extension, Federal money was no longer available for this special Alcohol Enforcement Project. With the support of County Executive, Dan Murphy, and the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, five AE Deputy positions were financially maintained so that the project could continue. As a result, these Sheriff Deputies continue to patrol for drunk drivers in all areas of Oakland County, Tuesday through Saturday nights. Through voluntary participation a few local departments still provide a car to supplement our "team" effort when we are working in their jurisdiction. In addition, a toll-free number to report drunk drivers (1-800-MI-REDDI), Report Every Drunk Driver Immediately has been placed in the central dispatch area of the Sheriff's Department.

1984 STATUS OF THE ALCOHOL ENFORCEMENT TEAM

1984 was the fifth year the Alcohol Enforcement Team was in Operation. The first five months of 1984 were the extension of our original grant, and consequently funding from the state ended on May 31st of this year. The Alcohol Enforcement grant was scheduled to be a four year grant, and we received a one year extension at the end of that period. This, the final year, when the grant funding ended the County of Oakland Board of Commissioners approved the necessary funds to keep this project in operation. As a result, the Alcohol Enforcement Team will be a permanent part of the Oakland county Sheriff's Traffic Division. There are five Oakland County Sheriff Deputies who continue to work Wednesday through Saturday evenings, from 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. These, statistically, are the days and hours when the highest frequency of alcohol related traffic accidents occur. The team will work a specific area for two or four consecutive days, then move on to another area.

The responsibility for directing the "team" has primarily been with the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County. At the beginning of the project "target areas" were defined as locations or "segments of roadway" in Oakland County which have shown the largest experience in alcohol related crashes. In the first 3½

years of this project, the Alcohol Enforcement Team worked ten such areas. These "target areas" are identified on a supplement included with this report.

In July 1983, a major change in the "target area" distribution occurred. Instead of the team being restricted to those roadway segments defined in the "target areas", with Alcohol Enforcement efforts to cover all roadways within the district.

Another major change in 1983 that came concurrently with the patrol change from "target areas" to districts was the increased participation of local police agencies working with the team. In this last year of grant funding, additional monies were made available to pay overtime costs to participating police agencies. As a result, the number of active participating police departments went from five, to over thirty. After May 31 of 1984, however, funding for overtime ended with the termination of the grant funding and agency participation is now minimal. Only a few local agencies are continuing to pay overtime, at their expense, for an officer assigned to work with our team, when we are working in their area. With the increased area of coverage created by the "district patrol," and the increased participation of local police, the total OUIL arrests rose sharply in 1983, then tapered off slightly in May of 1984 when overtime funds for local participation ended.

Since we no longer operate using the "target areas" as they were originally set up, statistical data included in this report for target areas, are final summaries and include all arrest data from April 10, 1980 (The very first day of A.E. Patrol) through June 30, 1983, which is the last day in which the "target area" concept was utilized. Statistical data from that point on involves "district" totals.

In 1983 Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies made 741 OUIL arrests. Alcohol Enforcement Team Officers made 489 of these, the Road Patrol Deputies made 252. In 1984 Oakland County Sheriff Deputies made 944 OUIL arrests. Of this total, A.E. team officers made 581 and Road Deputies made 363.

In addition to making OUIL arrests, the A.E. Team, while on special patrol, has contact with a great many other drivers who may be stopped for any type of driving violation. Often such contacts will result in the arrest and/or apprehension of persons wanted for other criminal offenses. In 1984 an arrest log for A.E. officers reflected over 160 arrests or additional charges which were brought about by their patrol. Since not all other types of arrests may have been entered in the OUIL arrest log book, it is fair to say that this is just a partial listing of those additional charges/arrests made by the A.E. Team. This, combined with the additional charges/arrests 1980 through 1983 comes to over 1,560 arrests by the A.E. Team members.

1983 & 1984 TRAFFIC CITATION COMPARISON

In 1983, there were a total of 19,864 traffic violations processed in the Traffic Division. This is 8% below last years citation total of 21,686. There was a 9% increase in the number of citations written by the Traffic Division Officers this year, and a 21% decrease in those citations written by Road Patrol Officers.

In 1984, there were a total of 21,931 traffic violations processed in the Traffic Division. This is a 10% increase from last years total. There was a 1% decrease in the number of citations written by the Traffic Division Officers this year, and a 21% increase in those citations written by Road Patrol Officers. This year the Traffic Division Officers (15 total A.E. and 416) wrote 45% of the total citations issued by this department, while the remaining 55% were written by approximately 100 additional Road Patrol Officers.

It appears that the highest percentage of the moving violations are written for "speeding" and in most cases the officers related they were using radar as the means of detection. All of the Traffic Officers and most Road Officers have been given extensive training in radar operation, particularly with regard to its credibility in court. The other traffic violations which are written most frequently in this category

are for "traffic signal" and "driving (operating) under the influence" violations. In "non-moving" violations, those which are written with the highest percentage are operators license violations, vehicle registration violation, and parking violations.

VEHICLE IMPOUNDS

In 1983, 615 impounded vehicles were disposed of in various manners. In 1984, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department impounded a total of 1,567 vehicles. This is an increase of 18% over the 1983 totals. The majority of these impounds are a result of arrests, criminal and accident investigations, title and plate violations, road hazards, and abandoned vehicles. Additionally, there were 175 recovered stolen vehicles in 1984.

Recent changes in law regarding the impounding of vehicles has made this procedure one which requires completion of many uniform forms, and calls for extensive documentation from the time vehicle is impounded until such time as it is disposed of in any number of ways. Every vehicle impounded by the Sheriff's Department is processed in the Traffic Division. Currently, Deputy Larry Scott is assigned to the "autos" section in Traffic, and handles the majority of impound dispositions.

Those automobiles which remain "unclaimed" after being impounded must eventually be disposed of in one way or another. In 1984, "745" impounded vehicles were disposed of in various manners.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS

In 1983, Accident Investigator, Deputy Gallo, reported investigating 31 fatal accidents in which 34 persons were killed, and 40 serious injury accidents. In 1984 there were 28 fatal accidents in which 29 persons were killed. There were also 51 serious injury accidents investigated.

In 1983 there was a total of 29 prosecution cases, including 10 felonies, and an additional 39 cases were not prosecuted. However, in 1984 there were a total of 43 prosecution cases including 9 felonies. An additional 37 cases were not prosecuted. Also there were 7 Sheriff Department patrol car accidents investigated in 1984 and the same is true for 1982 and 1983.

Due to our traffic investigator having received extensive training in advanced accident investigation and reconstruction, the Sheriff's Department was called to assist nine other Oakland Police Agencies with 14 separate accident investigations and reconstructions in 1983, and in 1984 they were called for assistance by six other County Police Agencies in eight separate accident investigations/reconstructions.

TRAFFIC SAFETY EDUCATION

In 1983 there were over 25 Traffic Safety Education Programs presented to over 1,100 persons. In 1983, there were over 35 programs presented to over 2,000 persons. These presentations include the role of traffic accidents, selective enforcement, and alcohol enforcement.

During 1984 MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers), SADD (Students Against Driving Drunk), and other similar groups have once again put a great deal of emphasis on the drinking driver. The arrest of drunk drivers, and the penalties for drunk driving have been a primary concern of the public. As a result, many new laws in this State, as well as all over the nation, have been revised to hold stiffer penalties for the drinking driver.

The majority of presentations on Traffic Safety in 1984 were directed at drinking and driving, with special attention given to the A.E. Unit. Numerous presentations to high schools and civil organizations were made this year along with other public education programs. In January Channel 3, Pontiac Cablevision, filmed an interview with our Traffic Safety Coordinator and she and Sgt. Wark participated in two, half-hour talk shows hosted by WPON on drinking and driving and our A.E. Team. Other members made appearances on local TV and had interviews with the news media. They also conducted special controlled drinking exercises at Oakland and Wayne State Universities. They presented 12 presentations at Michigan Bell to 500 employees in a two day seminar.

TRAFFIC SAFETY EDUCATION (Continued)

In 1984, it is also worth mentioning the Licensed Beverage Association of Michigan. They developed a seminar for bar owners and managers, titled "Techniques of Alcohol Management" (TAM). This eight hour seminar reviews the specifics of owner liability in serving intoxicated persons, reviews common problems in serving, and presents a "color code" system as a means of tracking a persons drinking level. There have been three such seminars in Oakland County in 1984, all of which have been represented by participation of the Sheriff's Department.

In November of 1984, Shirley Girard attended the Michigan Life Savers Conference in Boyne Mountain. This primarily was sponsored by the Office of Highway Planning, and covered seat belt safety and drinking and driving countermeasures. An abundance of information, resources, and educational guidelines for Traffic Safety were obtained at this conference. Other schools included A.E. Deputies Pearson and Herman who attended, and passed, Breathalyzer School this fall, thus making five of the six Alcohol Enforcement Team Officers certified Breathalyzer Operators.

Other Traffic Safety and Alcohol Enforcement presentations were made this year to groups such as; Maplegrove Center on Alcohol Awareness,

Detroit Area Corvair club, Oakland County Legal Secretaries Association, West Bloomfield Optiminists, West Bloomfield Republicans Club (Judge Friedman), and The Central Methodist Church of Waterford.

WARRANT DIVISION

The Warrant Division consists of three (3) Warrant Officers and one (1) Clerk. All warrants received are checked to determine if they are valid and in good order. They are then registered, a card is typed with the subject's name, address, physical description, charge, court and amount of bond. The warrant is then entered into LEIN and assigned to our warrant officers for arrest.

The Sheriff's Department has the responsibility to extradite all out-of-state arrested subjects. This usually takes ninety days, which is processed in Circuit Court. After extradition is approved by the Prosecutor's Office, a certified copy of the warrant and mug shot are sent to the police agency of that state and arrest is made, then subject is extradited. Warrant officers are sent to return the subject to the State of Michigan. When an arrest is made, the subject is booked and housed until he is arraigned by the Magistrate. If the subject lives out of Oakland County, a copy of the warrant is mailed to the police agency in that area to execute the arrest.

Misdemeanor warrants are handled the same as felony warrants except letters are sent to the wanted subject. If the subject does not respond

in ten days, warrant officers will make the arrest. If the subject has moved or we are unable to locate him/her, the warrant is filed. Letters are sent on all traffic warrants. If the subject does not clear the warrant with the court, the warrant is entered in LEIN and filed. We are unable to send warrant officers out on all traffic warrants.

Letters are sent on all civil warrants. If the subject does not make arrangements with the court to take care of the warrant, an arrest is made. Letters instruct the subject of how to take care of the matter pending without an arrest.
