The Sheriff's Department is responsible for the delivery of law enforcement services to the unincorporated areas of the County; the provision of contractual service for law enforcement as required by participating townships; the provision of support services in the areas of criminal investigation, scientific analysis of evidence, and polygraph testing; the operation of dispatch functions and communication with State data banks; the maintenance of law enforcement records and identification records; and the provision of security and traffic control for contracted special events.

The Sheriff's Department accepts, delivers and serves papers, summons, and subpoenas; executes Civil Court Orders as directed by the Circuit and other courts of the County; collects fees; conducts confiscations; and effects tax sales as directed by courts of competent jurisdiction.

The Sheriff's Department is also responsible for the maintenance of the County Jail; and for the housing, care and custody of all prisoners in the County sentenced to one year or less, all nonbonded prisoners awaiting trial in Circuit Court, and those detained for arraignment or trial in the several District Courts.

The Sheriff's Department police the several courtrooms of the Oakland County Circuit Court and provides for the transportation of prisoners for arraignment and/or sentence from the jail to court, and the delivery of sentenced prisoners from the County Jail to the appropriate Michigan State Corrections institutions. The Sheriff's Department also furnishes transportation to and from the various courts in the County for other departments in the County. The Sheriff's Department has a statutory responsibility for the patrol of 450 lakes in the area for which it maintains a fleet of boats and provides divers for underwater recovery and rescue attempts.

Under the State Secondary Roads Bill, the Sheriff's Department is responsible for providing traffic accident enforcement on secondary roads of Oakland County.

The top three staff of the Sheriff's Department has over 100 years of Law Enforcement experience.

Sheriff John F. Nichols has 47 years of Law Enforcement. He spent 31 years with the City of Detroit starting as a patrolman and promoted through the ranks of Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, Inspector, Deputy Superintendent, Superintendent and finally Police Commissioner. He served as Undersheriff for 3 years, then as Police Chief of Farmington Hills for 7 years. He was elected Sheriff and took office on January 1, 1985 and has been the top Law Enforcement Official since that time. He is a 1968 graduate of Wayne State University, Bachelor of Arts in Police Administration. He is also a graduate of the L.E.E.D.S. Program - F.B.I. National Academy.

Undersheriff Billy J. Nolin has 31 years of service with the Sheriff's Department. He was hired on November 18, 1957 and promoted to Detective in 1965, reclassified to Lieutenant in 1973 and promoted to Captain in 1978. He has been a Commander in every division of the Department. On January 1, 1985 he accepted the post of Undersheriff, and has been in that capacity since. He has numerous professional accreditations in his file, one of the most recent as graduate of the National Sheriffs Institute for Undersheriffs.

Captain James H. Curtis, Chief of Staff, has 27 years of service in Law Enforcement, 3 years with the City of Berkley and 24 with the Sheriff's Department. Captain Curtis was hired in 1964, promoted to Detective in 1968 then to Chief of Patrol in 1973. In 1978 he was reclassified to Lieutenant then in 1980 promoted to Captain. On January 1, 1985, he accepted the assignment of Chief of Staff under the current Sheriff. Captain Curtis has a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (F.B.I.) National Academy.

SHERIPF'S OFFICE

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for the planning, organizing, staffing, coordinating and management of all the law enforcement policies and programs for the Sheriff. The Division acts as the liaison for all other police agencies in the County and is the Command and Control Center for the entire Department.

DALE A. CUNNINGHAM BUSINESS MANAGER

Dale A. Cunningham has 11 years of service with Oakland County, the last two years in his current capacity as Business Manager for the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. Prior to his employment with the Sheriff's Department, he worked 5 years with the Oakland County Budget Division as a Budget Analyst and 4 years as an Accountant with the Accounting Division.

He has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting from Lake Superior State College and a Masters of Public Administration Degree from Oakland University.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Administrative Services Division of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department is an essential Division and provides services for all members of the Department.

Included in its functions are personnel records, accounts payable and receivable, bonds and fine/costs, ordering and maintaining all supplies, the Civil Unit and the Training Unit.

The Business Administration Unit is responsible for the day-to-day accounting, purchasing, and personnel record-keeping tasks necessary to maintain the operation of the Sheriff's Department. This Unit controls the budget and expenditures in excess of \$28 million, processes records on over 560 employees, and maintains all the necessary internal controls to operate a large Department. The Unit records for deposit over \$2.3 million in cash and checks for either the bonds or inmate accounts.

The Civil Unit is comprised of one Sergeant, two clerks, five deputies and two Para-Profs. This Unit is responsible for serving summons and complaints, garnishments, subpoenas, show cause notices, executions, mortgage foreclosures, and judicial (sales) for both Civil and Criminal cases.

The Training Unit is staffed by a Sergeant who is responsible for the scheduling and training of all Department personnel, including the Reserve Officers. Files are maintained on each person and updated as training or schooling is provided. The Sergeant is responsible for keeping abreast of all new laws of rulings, advising Department personnel, and providing them with the necessary information to function properly and efficiently.

TRAINING UNIT

The Training Unit is staffed by a Sergeant and a Clerk II. The Unit assists the Department in determining training needs, scheduling, record keeping, designing programs, instructing and coordinating all training activities.

The P.A. 302 State Training Fund and the County Training Fund are the two primary sources of revenue for both the In-Service and Academy Training Courses.

Training activity for this Department for the year 1986 has been broken down into Administrative Services, Corrective Services, Protective Services, Technical Services and Reserves. All supervisory and communication personnel have been included in the Protective Services assignment classification.

GUN RANGE

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department Gun Range provides firearms training for members of the Sheriff's Department, Prosecutor's Office, Friend of the Court Officers, Animal Control, Safety Division, Treasurer's Office, Circuit Court and Auditing Division. It also provides training for approximately fifteen (15) outside police agencies.

Personnel are required to participate in the firearms training on a monthly basis. This training consists of various situations involving the use of firearms with mandatory qualification four (4) times per year.

The Range Officer is responsible for issuing and maintaining departmental weapons and ordering ammunition for use on the Range.

The Range Officer's function is to maintain records and order equipment and parts necessary for the proper operation of the Range.

The Range is operated Monday through Friday, with early hours to accommodate the officers who work the midnight shift and, late hours for the officers working the afternoon shift.

CORRECTIVE SERVICES DIVISION (MAIN JAIL)

Directed by:

RICHARD W. HUBBLE CAPTAIN

Captain Richard W. Hubble has 31 years of service with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and during that time he has served under the administration of three (3) Sheriffs.

Captain Richard W. Hubble was hired on July 10, 1958 into the Patrol Division. In 1969, Captain Hubble was promoted Detective Sergeant. In 1974, he was promoted to Chief of Detectives. In 1985, then promoted to the rank of Captain.

Captain Richard W. Hubble has served 26 years of his 31 years of service in Protective Services with 11 of those 26 years as Lieutenant. Now he is serving as Captain of the Corrective Services Division.

Lieutenant Barry K. Eriksen, Lieutenant Gerald N. Reeves, and Lieutenant Henry C. Wallace are the three Lieutenants under the command of Captain Richard W. Hubble. There are ten (10) Sergeants assigned to the Main Jail and approximately 176 employees, both uniformed and civilian.

During 1987, there were 31 new Service Agents hired of which 29 of those Service Agents are still here. Also, in 1987, there was a total of thirty-two (32) promotions, twenty-two (22) to Deputy II and ten (10) to Deputy I.

Operating under the guldelines of the Federal Consent Agreement of 1983, the Division was able to make substantial compliance except in the areas of overcrowding, exercise, and staffing. Overcrowding impedes the proper management of prisoners and exposes the County to continued liability. Use of Out-County Jails has given some relief, but this procedure is costly, and falls short of actual needs.

The Oakland County Jail Complex (Main Jail) is a <u>maximum</u> security facility and houses approximately 450 inmates plus 30 inmates in the Holding Tanks.

Completion of the new 244 bed south addition is ten (10) months from completion, also the renovations, booking and medical sections, should begin in the spring. Air conditioning should be ready by the hot weather season.

Classifications was expanded by one (1) Deputy I, to give round the clock classification.

In regards to the Federal Consent Agreement, the major violations still are the OVERCROWDING and the EXERCISE for the inmates.

a. OVERCROWDING

The <u>OVERCROWDING</u> caused violation in the exercise area becaus eof the lack of space available and the air-conditioning system will not be completed until Summer, 1988.

b. EXERCISE

In order to keep no more than 30 inmates in Holding Cells, we housed between 60 and 80 inmates in the GYM between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. When the jail population is over maximum, we cannot get the 60 to 80 inmates out of the gym during the day; thus, no exercise and overtime to watch them.

PRETRIAL SERVICES UNIT

Pretrial Services is a division of the Circuit Court Administrator's Office and began its operations in July of 1986. The staff consists of one director, four caseworkers, two clericals, and a student intern. The office is located in the basement of the Oakland County Jail.

The purpose of Pretrial Services is to provide judges with the most complete and current information about pretrial detainees for bond reviewing purposes. Caseworkers interview all pretrial detainees who do not post bond within two working days after arraignment. Caseworkers then verify information provided by the defendant with community references such as family, employers, and educators. Computerized criminal histories and warrant information are also obtained on each defendant. The results of these investigations are reported to the judge before the defendant's next court appearance.

Pretrial Services also conducts periodic reviews of the pretrial jail population to determine case delays, reasons for continued detention unrelated to the current charge(s), i.e. warrant holds, and other information of interest to the court.

The program is a liaison between the courts, the jail, and members of the community. The staff provides the public with information regarding bonding procedures and court proceedings.

INMATE SERVICES: CURRENT PROGRAM

Inmate Services met with uncommon challenge in 1987. Inmate population drove the numbers of program referrals to unprecented levels. In July, the referral rate reached a maximum of 950 cases. The lowest rate of referral to the program was experience in June when 608 cases were referred to the unit. Monthly average for the numbers of individuals receiving service was 626 persons for 1987 - persons serviced ranged from 569 to 703.

Staff was further stressed during the year through extended leaves, transfer of the Community Mental Health psychologist, and the retirement of our program supervisor. During the months March through December, part-time non-eligible staff were employed by the unit to offset the staff turnover. So too, the responsibilities of the program supervisor, (who was on leave from late March through August) were assumed by the Staff Assistant as were the administrative responsibilities of the CMH psychologist.

Still, throughout this staffing crisis, the provision of services remained constant and the over-time expenses for the unit were carefully controlled.

During the fall of 1987, staff replacement had been well-integrated, an "acting supervisor" had assumed many of the day-to-day supervisory responsibilities, and in December a senior psychologist was transferred to the Jail from Community Mental Health.

In spite of, or perhaps because of this crisis, the <u>Inmate Services</u> program has reassessed traditional "ways of doing business" and is working to increase effective utilization of staff resources.

CURRENT STATUS:

Currently, Inmate Services, working in tandem with Community Mental Health, provides a full-range of counseling, substance abuse and case management to inmates housed within all of the Corrective Services Facilities.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES/SUMMARY:

Just as 1987 introduced change to the Sheriff's Department Inmate Services staff, so too, Community Mental Health staff has undergone significant metamorphosis.

Clinical Psychologist, Rita Datta, M.A., left the Jail in late April and, at that time the program mix was reviewed and evaluated. At this time, the county has formally upgraded the position to a fully-licensed psychologist. In this way, masters' level counselors and graduate students might be given clinical supervision at the appropriate level. Although this position was approved in late summer, CMH has been unable to recruit this level of professional for correctional programming.

Psychiatric staff as well has changed during the past year. Dr. Veluswamy, a long-term member of the jail health care team remains involved in administration and clinical oversight, however direct patient care is currently being provided by Dr. Jaya Madhavan. Dr. Madhavan succeeds Dr. Genoves who was assigned to the Jail during Spring-Summer 1987.

Review of psychiatric activity for 1987 reveals constancy in terms of service delivery.

It should be noted that work overload which was generated by staff vacancies in Community Mental Health - Jail Program must be assumed by Inmate Services staff and Staff Assistant positions. It has been our good fortune to have been able to attract staff who are qualified and experienced in mental health patient management. Throughout the tenure of the Inmate Services and Community Mental Health Programs, these complimentary programs have been closely coordinated. This has been particularly useful and important during the past year.

FOOD SERVICE UNIT

The Kitchen provides 3 meals a day, 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year, year after year. This unit provides special diets, proper food intake, the proper amount of nutrients and did this 974,005 times during 1987. In addition to the number of meals served, they also find time to bake their own bread, rolls, and cookies. This is all done on a very small cost of \$1.16 per meal. At today's food cost, this is a tremendous feat. The Food Service Chief also manages the commissary fund for supplying cigarettes, candy and some durable goods for inmates.

The profit generated from the Commissary Fund buys televisions, exercise machines, etc. for use by the inmates. It also pays for 3 full-time positions and 3 part-time positions for running the Commissary and the Library for the inmates. All of this is accomplished at no expense to the County Taxpayer. The following page details the amount of sales and expenditures this fund generates.

SATELLITE DIVISION

Directed by:

GLENN R. WATSON CAPTAIN

Captain Glenn R. Watson has 23 years experience with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

He was hired October 10, 1967, as a Deputy within the Patrol Division. He was promoted to Detective Sergeant in 1971 and served in the Detective Bureau as well as the Narcotics Enforcement Team. In 1974 he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and served in all divisions of the Department during his tenure. In June of 1986, Captain Watson was promoted and assigned to the Corrective Services-Satellite Division.

Captain Watson has a Bachelor of Science Degree and a Master of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice, and is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) National Academy.

CORRECTIVE SERVICES - SATELLITE DIVISION

The Corrective Services-Satellite Division was created in April of 1986. The new division consists of six (6) units, Southfield Facility, Work Release Facility, Community Work Camp, "D" Building, "L" Building and Circuit Court Operations.

The division is staffed by eighty (80) employees and is headed by Captain Glenn R. Watson.

SOUTHFIELD FACILITY

The Southfield Facility is located in the Southfield Civic Center. Under contract with the City of Southfield, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department provides staffing of the facility where Oakland County female inmates are housed and new arrests from the City of Southfield are detained prior to arraignment.

During the 1987 year 2,981 new inmates were processed through this facility. The average daily count was 29 inmates.

WORK RELEASE FACILITY

The Work Release Facility is located on Telegraph Road across from the County Complex. It has a capacity of 110 male and 24 female inmates.

Inmates assigned to this facility are, by approval of the courts, allowed to commute from the facility to their place of employment while serving their sentence. A fee of ten dollars (\$10) per day room and board is assessed to the inmate for participation in this program.

On July 1, 1987, a portion of the Work Release Facility was sectioned off to accommodate 24 female work release inmates. Due to the minimal number of female prisoners currently on Work Release status, female kitchen trustys are also housed at this facility.

Inmate population during 1987 has ranged from a low of 65 to a high of 125 men and a low of 9 to a high of 19 women. A total of 716 inmates have been housed at the Work Release Facility during 1987. The average daily count for the male population has been 106 while the daily average count for the female population has been 14 Work Release and trusty women. The average number of women actually on Work Release has been six (6).

Fees collected for room and board during 1987 totaled \$414,973.98 returned to General Fund.

COMMUNITY WORK CAMP

The Community Work Camp is located at 1690 Brown Road, Pontiac, Michigan.

This facility was first opened in 1970 and was built by trusties who worked under supervision of County work supervisors. In 1984 the Camp was expanded to hold a maximum of 120 inmates. Placement in this facility is determined by the Oakland County Sheriff's Department staff.

A medium security facility, the Camp provides work details to local governments on request, and provides a work crew to the Animal Control Division on a daily basis. During the year 1987, inmates housed at the camp participated in 1,064 off-camp work details utilizing a total of 5,656 inmates or approximately 16 inmates a day.

During 1987 a total of 849 new inmates were housed at the Work Camp with a daily average population being 110 inmates.

"L" BUILDING ANNEX

In June of 1986 the County Laundry Building finished renovation and was opened as a prisoner housing facility. Originally designed to house 60 male prisoners, the capacity was increased in March, 1987, to accommodate 78 inmates in order to alleviate overcrowding at the Main Jail. Kitchen trustys at the main jail are provided from this facility.

During 1987 a total of 742 new inmates were admitted to this facility with the average daily count being 70 inmates. A total 75,712 trusty hours were spent working in the jail kitchen.

"D" BUILDING ANNEX

In April of 1986 the County Drycleaning Building finished renovation and was opened for inmate occupancy. The facility accommodates 32 pre-trial and sentenced female inmates.

During 1987, the daily average prisoner population was 27.

CIRCUIT COURT

The Circuit Court Detail is responsible for the transportation and guarding of inmates from the Main Jail to the respective Circuit Courts for trial and other Court ordered procedures.

In addition, this unit is responsible for the pick up and delivery of inmates to the various State institutions as directed by the Courts.

During 1987 the Circuit Court Personnel transported a total of 10,751 prisoners to the Circuit Court. Officers guarded prisoners during 170 trials with three of those trials requiring three officers and 47 of the trials requiring two officers. In addition, the officers also transported prisoners to 68 Probate Hearings.

Officers from Circuit Court made 1,145 trips to transport 2,929 inmates to or from various State and Federal Correctional Facilities.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES DIVISION

Directed by:

CARL G. MATHENY CAPTAIN

Captain Carl G. Matheny has 22 years of service with the Sheriff's Department. He was first employed as a patrolman and was promoted to the rank of Corporal; Detective; Lieutenant; and Captain. His commands have included Community Services, Protective Services, and Corrective Services. In September of 1985, he was again given command of the Protective Services Division after serving seven (7) years in Corrective Services.

1987 ANNUAL REPORT PROTECTIVE SERVICES DIVISION

The Protective Services Division contains the following units: Sheriff's Road Patrol, Investigation, Traffic Enforcement, Alcohol Enforcement, Marine and Snowmobile Enforcement, and the Sheriff's Reserve program.

The Patrol Unit is responsible for responding to citizen requests in the townships under contract, and providing assistance to other requesting departments. The Sheriff's Department is able to provide a full program of services from initial response through investigation and arrest. Aside from the criminal activity calls, the Patrol Officers handle several thousand services calls.

The Traffic and Alcohol Enforcement units augment the Patrol Officers by directing their skills in selective areas. While their primary duties are enforcing traffic laws and the apprehension of drunk drivers, they provide a back-up force to the regular officers.

Investigations Unit follows up on all felony crimes and investigates major crimes and criminal activity. An Arson Unit within the Detective Unit specializes in fire investigations.

The Marine Unit provides patrol and complaints on the county lakes. Complaints, accidents, thefts, and drownings make up the bulk of the work in the summer. In winter, the unit provides snowmobile patrol. A dive team is maintained year-round for body and evidence recovery. The Sheriff's Reserves and Explorer Scout programs are also administered through the Marine Unit.

Within this Division is the responsibility for inspections of all Sheriff's Department buildings, equipment, personnel, and the reporting of any deficiencies with recommendations to the Sheriff and Undersheriff. Internal investigations involving any members of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department are conducted as required.

The total number of contract officers increased from 77 to 84. A police millage added six

These additional patrolmen, the largest increase, to the Independence contract.

patrolmen have made significant difference in response time as well as apprehension and

prevention. Two auto theft units were also added through grants, one starting in June,

and one in November. These units will target chop shop operations and should impact the

auto theft problem in Oakland County. The specialized Alcohol Enforcement Team

continued a strong enforcement program, with 411 arrests. These arrests, in addition to

the regular patrol arrests, have contributed to a lower alcohol related accident rate.

The Marine Division had a busy year in enforcement, prevention, rescue, and education.

Over 2,200 young people received a boating safety certificate, an increase of over 600

from 1986. Drownings remained the same as the previous year, at 10. Reported boating

accidents were down, as enforcement (tickets, warnings) were up.

The Sheriff's Reserve Program is also coordinated by the Marine Division, and many

volunteer officers worked thousands of hours during 1987.

In June of 1987, Lt. John Taylor assumed command of investigations. The success of the

investigators continues to improve in our contract areas as well as assists to other county

police departments. Arson, auto theft, warrants, and fugitive arrest activites are

included in this report.

The year of 1987 saw no serious or long term disabling injuries. Thirty-two officers in the

division had perfect attendance or only one sick day. With several new patrol positions

requested for 1988, we will continue to improve efficiency, skill, and service to our

citizens.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

The Detective Bureau of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department is a unit within the Protective Services Division. It is staffed with a Lieutenant in command of thirteen Detective Sergeants and two Patrol Investigators. Eleven of the Sergeants and a Patrol Investigator are responsible for investigating criminal activity occurring within contracted areas. One Sergeant is responsible for the inspection of liquor establishments and the enforcement of liquor laws. One Sergeant and one Patrol Investigator are assigned to serving warrants.

Personnel assigned to criminal investigations handle major crimes reported to the Department. They are charged with collecting evidence, interviewing witnesses, interrogating suspects, making arrests, and assisting the prosecution in presenting the case in court. Personnel performing the function work closely with other police agencies and often participate in multi-jurisdictional investigations.

Investigators assigned to warrants process in-coming criminal and civil warrants. They locate the named individual and arrange for the individual to appear in court on the matter. The officers often travel within the State to pick up wanted persons arrested by other jurisdictions. They also handle all extraditions with the County of Oakland and the Governor's Office.

WARRANT UNIT

The Warrant Unit consists of three (3) Warrant Officers and one (1) Clerk. All warrants received are checked to determine if they are valid and in good order. They are then registered, a card is typed with the subject's name, address, physical description, charge, court and amount of bond. The warrant is then entered into LEIN and assigned to our warrant officers for arrest.

The Sheriff's Department has the responsibility to extradite all out-of-state arrested subjects. This usually takes ninety days, which is processed in Circuit Court. After extradition is approved by the Prosecutor's Office, a certified copy of the warrant and mug shot are sent to the police agency of that state and arrest is made, then subject is extradited. Warrant officers are sent to return the subject to the State of Michigan. When an arrest is made, the subject is booked and housed until he is arraigned by the Magistrate. If the subject lives out of Oakland County, a copy of the warrant is mailed to the police agency in that area to execute the arrest.

Misdemeanor warrants are handled the same as felony warrants except letters are sent to the wanted subject. If the subject does not respond in ten days, warrant officers will make the arrest. If the subject has moved or we are unable to locate him/her, the warrant is filed. Letters are sent on all traffic warrants. If the subject does not clear the warrant with the court, the warrant is entered in LEIN and filed. We are unable to send warrant officers out on all traffic warrants.

Letters are sent on all civil warrants. If the subject does not make arrangements with the court to take care of the warrant, an arrest is made. Letters instruct the subject of how to take care of the matter pending without an arrest.

LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT

The Liquor Enforcement Unit of the Sheriff's Department is operated solely by one Detective/Sergeant Investigator. His duties consist of investigating all liquor complaints, violations of State Liquor Statutes, and violations of State Law.

He is also responsible for processing for form 1800 from the Liquor Control Commission. He investigates and makes recommendations to the L.C.C. concerning new Class C Licenses, SDM/SDD Licenses, Tavern Licenses, Beer/Wine Wholesaler Licenses, new Club Licenses and permits to expand or change present licenses.

This officer is also in charge of the Precious Metal and Gem Dealers of Oakland County. He processes all applicants and investigates any complaints that are received.

All records on Liquor Enforcement and Precious Metal and Gem Dealers, are maintained in this division.

NORTH OAKLAND COUNTY

AUTO THEFT UNIT

In June of 1987, the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority granted funds to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department to creat a North Oakland County Auto Theft Unit. The unit became operational in June of 1987, with five investigators. The City of Pontiac added an investigator on November 1, 1987.

During the six month period of operations, the Auto Theft Unit has made 61 felony auto theft or related arrests. The 61 individuals have been charged with 99 counts of criminal conduct. In addition to the arrests, the unit has recovered 80 stolen vehicles or their component parts worth \$704,756 of fair market value as established by the insurance industry.

The Auto Theft Unit, working closely with the Bureau of Automotive Regulation, has inspected the inventory of 12 salvage yards or repair facilities in Oakland County. Several stolen vehicles have been recovered as a result of this effort.

The unit has investigated 101 cases of auto theft or related offenses. Twenty of those cases were "chop shop" investigations which resulted in three arrests for violation of the chop shop statute.

SOUTHWEST OAKLAND COUNTY

AUTO THEFT UNIT

On November 1, 1987, the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority granted money to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department to form a consortium in the Southwest Quadrant of Oakland County. Participants, besides the Sheriff Department, are the departments of Southfield, Farmington Hills, City of Farmington and Novi. The Auto Theft Unit has not become fully operational during November and December.

During 1987, the unit made one arrest with the individual being charged with five counts. Five vehicles were recovered with a fair market value of \$81,500.00.

ALCOHOL ENFORCEMENT TEAM

On April 10, 1980, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department implemented a Countywide Alcohol Enforcement Project, aimed at reducing accidents, injuries, and deaths related to the drinking driver. Drinking drivers in Oakland County are involved in at least half of the fatal accidents each year. this project began on a 1.5 million dollar federally funded four year grant, which was state subsidized through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning. It was the first of its kind in Michigan and has served as a model for other communities in this state and others.

Known as the "Alcohol Enforcement Team," this special team was comprised primarily of Sheriff Deputies (6), supplemented with State Police and local police officers that cooperate in this effort, while the "team" is working in their jurisdictions. The team concentrates its efforts in the same way as the selective enforcement unit, by working the times-of-the-day, and days-of-the-week that the majority of alcohol related accidents occur. Special computerized data is used to determine the roadways and areas in Oakland County which have the largest percentage of alcohol related accidents. The "team" then rotates working these areas.

Extensive training has been given to all of the traffic officers, both County and local, who work with the Alcohol Enforcement Team. All of these officers were given specialized training on the recognition and arrest of drinking drivers. Many traffic officers have also been trained as certified breathalyzer operators. This became of critical importance as the Sheriff's Alcohol Enforcement Team placed Michigan's first three "Mobile Breathalyzers" in operation on December 12, 1980.

In the Spring of 1984, after a one year extension, Federal money was no longer available for this special Alcohol Enforcement Project. With the support of County Executive, Dan Murphy, and the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, five Alcohol Enforcement Deputy positions were financially maintained so that the project could continue. As a result, these Sheriff Deputies continue to patrol for drunk drivers in all areas of Oakland County, Tuesday through Saturday nights. Through voluntary participation a few local departments still provide a car to supplement our "team" effort when we are working in their jurisdiction. In addition, a toll-free number to report drunk drivers (1-800-MI-REDDI), Report Every Drunk Driver Immediately has been placed in the central dispatch area of the Sheriff's Department.

1987 YEAR END REPORT

MARINE UNIT

1987 proved to be a very active year for the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Marine Division. As in the past, the division continued to provide a high quality of service to the entire county on a year-round basis. Reports of drownings remained the same as 1986, at ten. Reported accidents and complaints were reduced 25%, 15%, respectively. Citizen contacts, in the form of public meetings and lectures, were doubled and the number of students certified rose from 1,658 in 1986, to 2,290 in 1987, a 38% increase. Citations issued by the Marine Deputies showed an increase of 18%. Snowmobile and ORV patrols were also continued, as in the past.

Without a doubt, the most trying event for the Marine Division this past year was a reported drowning on Cass Lake, in May. The search for this subject was unprecedented, in our department's history and included the introduction of new technology and other law enforcement community resources. At present, the investigation of this drowning remains an open file without a body recovery.

It should also be noted that the Dive Rescue Team played a key role in the recovery of a citizen who had been submerged in the frigid waters of Buckhorn Lake for 27 minutes. After recovery, from the lake bottom, this individual made a full medical recovery which brought national attention to the near-drowning.

The division had a real growth in equipment acquisition for 1987. An additional jump boat, with additional capabilities, was added to the fleet. The division was also assigned a PBT to aid in alcohol related complaints. The dive team also made a technological advancement, the addition of a surface supplied air system. This system features a modern version of the old hard helmet system. Along with surface supplied air, the diver can also engage in 2-way conversations with the surface support team. This equipment will increase both safety and comfort on dangerous ice dives or polluted water dives.

In conclusion, the division made both real growth in numbers as well as growth in the role and utilization of the Marine Deputies. From assisting in the Novi tornado, to the

Detroit-Metropolitan Airport crash, to the new Highland Township Marine Contract, the officers of the Marine Division offered professional police service to the citizens. With the support of all the division's employees, it is anticipated that Oakland County Sheriff's Department Marine Division will continue to serve in both our traditional roles and other necessary functions we may be called upon to serve in.

TECHNICAL SERVICES DIVISION

Directed by:

LEWIS M. DOYLE CAPTAIN

Captain Lewis M. Doyle has 22 years of service with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. Prior to his employment with the County, he worked 4 years at the Orchard Lake Police Department.

He has a Bachelor of Science Degree from Michigan State University. He also is a charter member of the American Society of Crime Lab Directors.

He was hired on August 16, 1965 as a Deputy. On January 14, 1967 he was promoted to the rank of Chief - Identification Technician.

He was promoted to Lieutenant on January 1, 1977 which was reclassified to Captain on May 8, 1978. He has served as Captain of Technical Services since that date.

COMMUNICATIONS

Another support unit of Technical Services is the Communications Division. Within this division are the phones, dispatch center and LEIN, (Law Enforcement Information Network).

Most of the information reaching a police department from the public passes through the public telephone system. The majority of cases involve requests for assistance, a request for information or an offer of information to the department. In addition, calls for members of a department other than the complaint operator, may be routed to the proper person. A request for assistance from a citizen may require immediate action, as when the caller reports a crime in progress or an injured person. Many calls from citizens are clearly of an emergency nature. In such cases, the complaint operator conveys the necessary information to the radio dispatcher. (Often, the complaint operator and the radio dispatcher are the same person, eliminating this step in the process). The communications agent, using the two-way radio system, will then assign the appropriate personnel, such as a patrol unit to respond.

Some calls to a department are not of any emergency nature, reducing the need for priority handling. When the Communications Agent receives the information, the agent may for instance, decide to assign the call to a patrol unit which is currently unavailable. Thus, the message waits until the unit has returned to service. Examples of requests in this category are the complaint about a neighbor's dog or the report of an apparently abandoned automobile.

Most complaint calls are not clearly in either the emergency or non-emergency category, however. The agent must avoid the assumption that a complaint is not urgent, for the cost of an error in judgment may be high. The agent must, therefore, treat all such doubtful calls as if they were urgent, representing true emergencies. Every experience communication agent knows of instances in which a routine request was found to be a serious emergency by the investigating officer. A complaint about a noisy party or quarreling neighbors may be a situation bordering on or erupting into violence. A loose stray dog may have bitten a child, a report of a ransacked house may uncover the burglars still in the building and a man staggering or falling in the street may be having a heart attack. Each such call for aid may, of course, turn out to be a routine matter that was not particularly urgent. A small percentage, however, require immediate response. Since

they cannot be predicted, all such doubtful requests must be handled without delay.

In 1975 we became the dispatch center for MEPS (Michigan Emergency Public Safety (Radio) System). This is a statewide radio network that insures direct communication between the patrol vehicles on the road and twenty-four (24) hour base stations in an emergency situation. Presently we have radio transmitting and receiving capabilities with numerous stations within Oakland County and answer the phones and dispatch for several departments after normal working hours.

The police officer cannot function effectively without information. Much of the data he/she needs is maintained in LEIN or other interfaced computer systems. One type of information we are talking about would be vehicle registration information. This could be registration by vin number, partial vin number, license number or partial license number and would be on any type of motor driven vehicle. This file also contains stolen or wanted vehicle data, impounded vehicle data, complete title or insurance information. Another type of information is drivers license information and driving record information. We also have access to criminal records from the State of Michigan or the entire country via the LEIN. Another valuable asset of the LEIN is instantaneous answers to a query from the warrant/wanted data file. LEIN users have the capability of communicating with any police department in Michigan by the direct on-line or real line communication. Any of Michigan's two hundred (200) police agencies may contact each other by any of the following ways: from one point to another, from one point to a multiple point, from one point to an area or from one point to the entire state. LEIN users have direct contact with other agencies such as FBI, the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Internal Revenue Service, all of Detroit, and over fifty precincts or specialized bureaus of Detroit Police Department. Included also are the Michigan Sheriffs' Association, the Provost Marshall, Selfridge Field, Jackson Prison, the Department of Corrections in Lansing, Michigan State, Wayne State and Eastern and Western Universities and any police agency in the United States. LEIN users have direct on-line communication with Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Missourl. The LEIN provides its users with the ability to enter all stolen property, as long as it is serialized, into state and national files (NCIC, National Crime Information Center) and to enter all recovered property into its files as long as there is a serial number available. Through LEIN and NCIC, the police agency can provide public services, one such service provided by LEIN is the participation in the School Closing notification procedures.

The E-9-1-1 System will be implemented in Oakland County in April of 1988. E-9-1-1 is a universal emergency number service, 9-1-1 service is a telephone service whereby a Public Safety answering point, designated by the customer, may receive calls dialed to the telephone number 9-1-1. This service includes special connecting arrangements and equipment needed to answer and dispatch emergency calls originated by persons within the serving area who dial 9-1-1.

CRIME LABORATORY

The Crime Laboratory of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, provides professional forensic analyses of physical evidence on a twenty-four (24) hour, seven (7) days a week basis. The laboratory, a Division of Technical Services, operates a mobile crime laboratory vehicle which responds to all major crime scenes, civil disorders, drownings, and processes the same for any physical evidence unintentionally left behind.

Some of the various functions that are routinely performed by the professional staff of the Crime Laboratory include: forensic crime scene photography, fingerprints, latent fingerprints, firearms, toolmarks, physical matches, paint analysis, composites, explosive devices, bomb threats/de-arming, narcotic and dangerous drug determinations, alcohol, laser techniques, and gunshot residue analysis.

This unit is intended primarily to be an agency specializing in physical evidence as an aid to the various divisions of the Sheriff's Department, as well as any other County police departments or agencies requiring such aid. It is also a source of aid to departments other than those within the County and provide expert courtroom testimony in cases where necessary. A list of the departments and agencies assisted during the year of 1987, are listed in the following report.

During the year of 1988, the Crime Laboratory will be utilizing the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (A.F.I.S.). This new equipment will bring about additional personnel in the Crime Laboratory and will enable this department to assist many more governmental agencies during the coming years with identifying those unknown latent fingerprints which have been left behind at various crime scenes.

POLYGRAPH UNIT

The Polygraph Unit of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, provides a very necessary and vital service. This service is available seven (7) days a week. However, since there is only one examiner, the office is open daily, Monday through Friday, with the examiner being on-call for emergency type situations, such as Homicide Investigations, Violations of the Criminal Sexual Conduct Code, Kidnappings, etc.

There were approximately thirty-four (34) law enforcement agencies which took advantage of this very important service during the year 1987. Included in this, on a regular basis is: Law Enforcement Investigators, Sheriff's Chiefs of Police, Prosecutors, Judges, Defense Attorneys, Fire Investigators and Fire Chiefs, State and Local Social Services Personnel, various State and Federal Investigating Agencies, Correctional Departments and other police and private polygraph examiners. On an occasional basis, we service elected public officials, research groups, college educators, doctors and the general public, also, research and public relations.

The polygraph saves taxpayers thousands of dollars yearly, by eliminating suspects and focusing the investigation in the right direction.

The courts use this service extensively to solve many very sensitive and complex issues, such as in the case of a defendant who despite overwhelming evidence, continues to maintain his innocence. Dollars are saved by cutting down use of witnesses, court time, investigator man hours, prosecutor's time, etc.

PROPERTY ROOM

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department Property Officer, receives all property submitted by the members of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. This includes evidence, evidence for the Crime Laboratory and also found property.

The Property Room must be a safe and secure area and must provide a proper system for maintaining a "Chain of Evidence" on each piece of property that is submitted.

The Property Room Officer has the responsibility of physically storing the property and maintaining a strict record keeping system of the property. Answerable not only to the Sheriff's Department and the Court's, but also directly to the Board of Auditors.

Other functions consist of destroying property when authorized and submitting property for the annual auction.

GUN REGISTRATION

The primary function of the Gun Registration Division, is the Issuance of firearms purchase permits, carrying concealed weapons applications and explosive permits. The service is available to all residents of Oakland County with the exception of those residing within an incorporated City or Village.

Prior to issuing a permit, a criminal record check is made to determine eligibility of the applicant. Upon receipt of the record clearance a permit is issued, which upon completion, must be returned to the office, the subject is then fingerprinted and the firearm is then registered.

The Concealed Weapon Permit application is submitted to the Gun Board for approval and a copy is retained in our files for a period of three (3) years. The same procedure is used for all renewal permits.

A daily log of all permits issued is maintained. A cross index file is also kept, namely a name card bearing applicant's name and address and a numerical file bearing the serial number of the firearm. Guns brought into the state by new residents must be LEIN checked for prior registration or ownership. If a stolen report is indicated, the weapon is confiscated, an investigation is conducted and the gun is subsequently returned to the proper authorities.

During the course of a normal work day, numerous phone calls are received from the general public requesting information regarding procedures for obtaining the above mentioned permits. Requests are also received by mail for applications to be sent to the residence.

Ordering supplies from the County and State Departments (print cards, applications, etc.), is also done periodically.

Fingerprints are also taken in this division for the purpose of security checks for security guards, bar examinations, adoptions and also immigration purposes. Fingerprints are also taken for all Concealed Weapon Permit applications. These are then sent to Lansing for record clearances which are then sent with the application to the Gun Board.

RECORDS BUREAU

Reports received by this department include: Complaints/Recoveries, Arrest/Dispositions, Complaint Comparison, Arrest Comparison, Manpower by Badge, Manpower Statistics, Property Crimes, values stolen and recovered, Event Occurrence, by class and location, Uniform Crime Report, and various other reports too numerous to mention. These items are then entered into the CLEMIS system.

"CLEMIS" (Court and Law Enforcement Management Information System), is a part of Data Processing, generates reports covering all phases of law enforcement; total crime, man hours expended, arrested persons, value of property stolen and recovered, day and hours when crimes are committed and police vehicle usage. "CLEMIS" allows the Sheriff more efficient reporting and expediency of information needed to make optimum use of department resources.

Although it is time consuming to prepare written complaints, it is vital to this department that all criminal complaints be reported. Information gathered from these reports are forwarded to the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit in Lansing who subsequently report to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C. Their primary concern is Part I crimes: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Assault, Burglary, Larceny, Arson, and Motor Vehicle Theft. Reports are then compiled by them which reflects either an increase or decrease in crime throughout the nation.

This department currently utilizes the Incident Report, Person Report, Property Report, and the Activity Log. Information from these reports are entered into the Data Processing System. Accuracy of reporting is extremely important for: geographic area, time of occurrence, complainants name and address, and correct crime classifications.

Inmate files number from one till the present, are processed upon release from the Oakland County Jail. The files consist of booking information, court data, bond receipts, clothing receipts, and money sheets. A name card file is kept for cross reference with date of birth and inmate number. After the inmate files are processed, the inmate files from 3,000 and up, are Microfilmed and filed in a secure storage area. The microfilm is kept on file unless otherwise purged by the Court. This makes it available for us to assist other departments in obtaining information on suspects, such as pictures or fingerprints. The Record Bureau is responsible for putting the ATR forms together and making sure they are correct and forwarded to Lansing.
