Many of Deborah Ann Waldo's friends believe she wanted to make it to her 53rd birthday. And she did. Debbie died on May 7, 2004 after a two year struggle with cancer

Debbie was a Lake Orion Police dispatcher for 30 years, retiring in 2002. She couldn't stay away and returned to the dispatch office as a part-time clerk before leaving again because of her illness.



LO Police Chief Jerry Narsh worked with Debbie for 23 years. "I had the privilege and honor of not only working with Deb, but also experiencing her level of friendship," he said.

"Deb Waldo lived, worked and played at a level of intensity that few of us can match."

Narsh described her as defining the dispatch center. "Her personality and her talent are exactly what a 911 dispatcher requires," he added.

"The men and women of this department and people of this community are so incredibly fortunate to have been blessed by Deb Waldo at the helm of our dispatch center. She will be missed."

Former police chief Jim Leach described Debbie as a perfectionist and he used her to train all the people who worked in the dispatch department over the years.

"Things had to be right. She loved her job. She was a concerned person She always worried about our patrols and the fire department when they were on a call. Many times she had the choice of going to Oakland County; she stayed with the village," Leach added.

But it wasn't all work for Debbie. According to Leach, she loved to gamble and made numerous trips to casinos.

Retired dispatcher Pat Fry was one of those trained by Debbie in 1975. What started out as a working relationship developed into a best friend relationship.

"We did a lot of things involving the police department. We were a tight group," she added.

Debbie started dating her husband Bill in the late 1970s. He was active in the LO Lions Club and Debbie quickly became involved with the club.

Pat was Debbie's maid-of-honor and helped plan the wedding. She remembers sitting at work making flowers to put on all the cars in the wedding.

The two women grew even closer over the last couple of years.
