Della Hunt, a former resident of this place, dropped dead in the Dime roller skating rink in Detroit last Friday afternoon. Her remains were brought here on Monday last and interred in Greenwood cemetery. *MAR 4 1885*

Miss Annie Merrill, of this city, died at her home Monday morning, of heart disease. Deceased and her sister roomed together, and about four o'clock in the morning the sister was awakened by a strange noise. She thought Annie was dreaming, and by shaking her tried to arouse her, but deceased gave a couple of gasps and was dead. *MAR 11 1885*

Maten took his life by shooting himself in the right temple with a 32 calibre revolver, and the ball caused instant death.
