AUG76. -Mrs.-A. R. Beckley died at her late residence in Pontiac, Aug. 9, aged 57 years, 5 months and 18 days. For the following history of the life of the deceased we are indebted to the Gazette: The deceased was sorn in Barre, Vermont, (as were both her father and mother) in 1825. In May, 1837 she came ,with her parents to Michiganand settled in Ann Arbor, where she lived until October 1852, when she moved to Pontlac. The spring following she moved into the premises on Hill street, where she lived continuously for twenty-nine years; and until her decease. Since the death of her mother December 4, 1873, she lived alone. In the spring of 1861 she instituted a select school, primary grade, which she conducted successfully for about twenty years, being compelled from all health to relinquish it in 1880. Her disease, was of a scrofulous nature, rendering her Illness painful in the extreme.
