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Wm. Harshaw, formerly of this county, died at South Saginaw, Mich., Nov. 29, in the 47th year of his age. The immediate cause of his death was a complication of heart disease and pneumonia. He leaves an aged invalid mother, wife and one child, three brothers and two sisters, to mourn his death. The remains were brought to this city for burial last week Tuesday, Rev. L. H. Stevens performing the burial services. Through the kindness of Mrs. Bascom, the remains were deposited in the Bascom vault. The deceased was a native of the county of Down, Ireland, came to Michigan in 1849, and for many years resided in this county where he was well known and respected by his many friends.
