In the course of a week Wright came to Cleveland, and, calling on the young lady, told her that his wife had caused him no end of trouble. Her extravagant habits ate up his salary, and he had determined to leave her. From Cleveland he went south. Arriving at Lexington, Ky.; he changed his mind and decided to go back and try to persuade his wife to change her course of life. That is the last that was heard from him until the news came of his suicide."
