John Watts was threshing for John Boughner at Zach. Seeley's in West Bloomfield yesterday morning. The machine got clogged up with straw and Watts in attempting to remove the obstruction with a fork, was drawn into the machine and instantly killed. He didn't go through the main cylinder, but was struck by it in the back, and his body run through carrier and all, falling to the ground. Of course the thresher was wrecked. Mr. W. was nineteen years old, and his untimely death is regretted by all.

The mother of Sylvester Robbins, of Troy, died last Friday, aged 70, and funeral services were held Sunday.

Mrs. Fenn Weston, of Bloomfield Center, died Monday morning of hemorrhage of the lungs and lung fever, aged 29 years. Funeral from the house to-day, (Wednesday) at one o'clock.
