Another good man has gone. Mr. E. B. Hay, a former much esteemed resident of this place, departed this life at his home in Oxford on the 7th inst; funeral services on the 9th at M. E. Church, conducted by Rev. N. Lyons, of East Tawas. Remains interred near his old home in Seymour Lake county.

July +3 1884 Capt. Isaac Butterfield, of this city, died at his home on Huron street west last Wednesday morning, in the 79th year of his age. Funeral services were held at the house Saturday afternoon; sermon by Rev. J. M. Gelston. Mr. Butterfield was born near Paris, Maine, October 29, 1805, lived in Portland for a number of years, and moved to Pontiac in the fall of 1844. He was engaged in the dry goods business here several years, spent three years in the copper mines of Lake Superior, and was also three years in Saginaw getting out walnut timber. When the California gold excitement broke out in '49. Mr. B. caught the fever, went to the land of promise and was absent from Pontiac five years. In the death of the Captain Pontiac loses one of ber best citizens, but he will be long remeinbered for his excellent qualities of mind and heart. Deceased was the father of Mr. L. S. Butterfield, of the Detroit Paper Company, and Mrs. Dr. W. W. Gray, of this city, and had been failing steadily since the death of his wife in March last. :
