Monday James Parshall, of Waterford, was notified of the death of his brother, C. Parshall, at Cadillac. He was found dead in his bed, was a single man, and the remains will probably reach Pontiac to-day. ^{APR 25 1883}



The funeral services of the late Allan Parshall, of Cadillac, were conducted by the Rev. F. Rae, Pontiac, at the residence of his brother, James Parshall, Waterford, last Thursday afternoon, taking for his text Luke 12:35. At the close of the services the funeral procession formed and accompanied the remains to the Drayton Plains Cemetery. ^{MAY 2 1883}

Henry Windiate, of Pontiac, who started for England with Wm. Newton, died on the way over, April 9. The captain refused to allow the body to remain on board till Mr. N. reached his destination, and funeral services were held and the remains buried in the ocean in the usual way. Richard Vaughan died yesterday morning at his home on Auburn Ave., of heart disease, aged 70 years. Funeral services from the house this (Wednesday) afternoon at two o'clock. ^{MAY 2 1883}

C. Hull, of Detroit, died last Friday, aged about 78 years, and Monday the remains were brought to Pontiac and interred at Oak Hill cemetery. Mr. Hull was the father of Mrs. C. B. Mabley, and Mrs. Thos. Mabley. ^{MAY 2 1883}

Oxford Globe: "The funeral of Mrs. Phebe Axford, widow of Hon. Samuel Axford who died about one year ago, was largely attended from the M. E. church on Sabbath last, the Rev. S. Snyder officiating, assisted by Rev. H. O. Parker. Mrs. Axford was an old resident of this township, having resided on the Axford farm, north of the village, since 1835. She was born in Oxford, New Jersey, in 1811. Her maiden name was Summers, she being a daughter of Hon. Jacob Summers, who, in lifetime, resided near Utica, Macomb county." ^{MAY 9 1883}
