

PONTIAC BILL POSTER

Ben. Baldwin and Geo. Case, of Holly, went out gunning last Wednesday afternoon, and when north of the village both started to climb over the same length of a rail fence. Baldwin reached the top rail and evidently drew his gun up after him for the hammer caught, the piece was discharged, the whole load striking the unfortunate young man in the left side of his lower jaw and passing out through the back of his neck. He was instantly killed, and his companion bespattered with blood and tissue. Mr. Case at once summoned assistance, a jury was impaneled and a verdict of accidental death rendered. The remains were carried home and the feelings of the family can better be imagined than described. He was about nineteen years old; the son of Harry Baldwin, village marshal, and a young man highly respected. Funeral was held on Friday last. *Sept 20 1882*
