The Gazette says of the late Ed ward R. Shimmons: "The deceased was born in London, England, in 1800. He came to America in 1832, coming directly to Michigan and Oakland county, settling on the farm he owned at his death in the town of Pontiac, near Ball Mountain, where he lived continuously until 1876 when he removed to this city. His wife with whom he had lived 54 years, died in the fall of 1878, since which time he has resided with his daughter, Mrs. Thorpe. Mr. Shimmous was a quiet, unobtrusive, industrious citizen. His life and its results is an example of what frugality and application to duty may accomplish. He was one of that class of farmers in this State who have been instrumental by their enterprise and labor in creating and building up the material prosperity of Michigan. They are fast passing away, but the lessons of their lives remain, prompting and-guiding those who follow in the path of success. The deceased leaves five children, four sons and one daughter, to share in his fortune and good name and mourn the loss of a kind and devoted parent." NOV 7/1883
