 Hon. Loren L. Treat, of Orion, died last week Sunday, of paralysis, aged 67 years, and of the deceased the Detroit Free Press says: "Mr. Treat came to Orion over forty years ago from Cayuga county, N. Y., and commenced the practice of law and also the manufacture of brick. He lived in Orion village for a good many years, and was an active and well-known Democratic politician. For several years he has lived in the township of Oxford, of which town he was supervisor for several years. He also represented Oakland county in the Senate one term during the war."

Mrs. David O. Thompson, of this city, died last Thursday at her home on Perry street, of hemorrhage of the lungs, aged 36 years. Funeral services were held at the house Sunday afternoon, at one o'clock, sermon by Rev. J. M. Gelston, and the remains were placed in the Petrie vault. Surely Messrs. Action of Oakland County Bar on The of Death of Loren L. Treat.

To The Honorable, The Circuit Court for the County of Oakland:

Your Committee to whom was referred the matter of the death of Honorable Loren L. Treat, of Oxford, would most respectfully report that Hon. Loren L. Treat was born in the town of Metz, Cayuga County, New York, April 10th, 1818. He was admitted to the Bar of Cayuga county in 1837, settled in Orion in this county in October 1840 and was admitted to the Bar November 20th, 1844. In July, 1857, he moved onto a farm in Oxford where he resided until his death.

He died suddenly on the 11th day of February 1883. He has been a member of the Board of Supervisors of this county and has represented the county in the Senate of this State and held other offices of trust and responsibility in all of which he has been honest and capable, and has faithfully represented the interests of his constituents.

He was afflicted with a defective hearing which prevented his attaining that prominence in the profession which his abilities would otherwise have commanded. But in the community in which he lived his sterling qualities commanded the respect and esteem of his neighbors. His counsel was much sought, and in that community he will be greatly missed. By his death we are reminded of the flight of time, and that we all must soon join him in the unseen world.

His life and death admonish us that we should so live that when we also shall enter into rest, whatever our station in life may have been, we may, like him, leave behind us the respect and esteem of those with whom we have been most intimately connected.

Resolved, That we tender to his widow and family the sincere sympathy of this court and the members of the Bar.
