MAR 21 Obituary. 1883

Died at the home of his parents in Commerce, March 5th, 1883, brother Archie D. Hosner, in the 25th year of his age. He was a loved member of the Walled Lake Juvenile Temperance Union, and the second member of our union that has been called away by death since its organization, May 1879.

The following resolutions were voted by the J. T. U. at their last regular meeting:

WHEREAS, Our Heavenly Father has in His loving wisdom taken from us one of our number; Therefore

Resolved, That in the death of our beloved brother, Archie D. Hosner, our union has lost an earnest worker, a faithful officer and one who gave us sympathy, when his health would not permit his meeting with us.

Resolved, That we have lost from our number one who by his pleasant ways and noble christian character had endeared himself to all who knew him, and his family have lost a loving and beloved son and brother.

Resolved, That while we accept this loss as coming from Him who "doeth all things well," we strive to profit by the memory of his beautiful patience in bearing his great sufferings.

Resolved, That we extend to his family our heartfelt sympathy, although we realize our condolence can do little toward lessening their grief, we look forward with them to a happy meeting "over the river" where Brother Archie has exchanged this life of sickness and pain for one of peace.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family and one sent to the county papers for publication.

Hon. Ferris S. Fitch, father of Sup't Fitch, of this city, died at his residence in Bunkerhill, Ingham county, last week Tuesday, of heart disease, aged 67 years. "He was a life-long Democrat," says the Mason News, "and filled various offices. He was Supervisor of his township in 1853-4, and again in 1864-5; in 1850 he was Justice of the Peace; in 1860 he was appointed deputy U. S. Marshal, and took the census of the eastern part of Ingham county. He was elected to the lower House of the Michigan Legislature, serving two terms. He was often favorably mentioned in connection with the nomination for State Senator and Representative in Congress, and his name was twice presented before Democratic State conventions for the gubernatorial nomination."

Mrs. Mary Davie, daughter of A. Doig, died Sunday, of consumption, aged 34 years. Funeral from the house yesterday. This is the second daughter who has died of that dread disease, and the family have the sympathy of many friends in Pontiac and elsewhere. **APR 4 1883**
