

## PONTIAC BILL POSTER

*MAY 21 1884*  
The funeral of Judge Crofoot last Wednesday was largely attended, and prominent lawyers from all over the State were in attendance. A special train brought out members of the Detroit bar and citizens generally. At a meeting of members of the Oakland county bar, president Chas. Draper presided, and the following attorneys were appointed a committee to draft resolutions, and report the first day of the special term: Chas. Draper, A. B. Cudworth, L. B. Taft, A. C. Baldwin, and G. W. Smith.

The committee of the G. A. R., to whom was committed the arrangement of the Decoration Day services, tender to the public a general invitation to participate with them in the proper observation of the day. A special invitation is given to ex-soldiers and their friends to join them in remembering their dead comrades. They solicit from all parties contributions of flowers. Mrs. Phelps, a sister of Mr. E. W. Frances, died yesterday morning at the residence of the latter, aged eighty-six years. Funeral services will be held at the house to-morrow (Thursday) morning. No farther particulars obtainable. *MAY 25 1884*

Miss May Burlingame died last Friday night, of consumption, at her home in the second ward, aged 18 years. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the house, sermon by Rev. J. Joslin, and the remains were taken to Washington, Macomb county, for burial. *JUNE 4 1884*

Robert Crawford, of Farmington, one of the oldest pioneers in Oakland county, died at his home in Farmington last Saturday, aged 97 years. Mr. C. was born in Greenfield, New York, came to Michigan in 1828, and settled in Farmington. Deceased was widely known and highly respected. He was a valient soldier of the war of 1812, and voted as he fought—always being an unswerving Democrat. *JUNE 4 1884*
