Nov 1, 1882
Mrs. A. Graham of Oakland, died on Friday last, and was buried from the M. E. church last Sunday morning.

Nov 1, 1882
Mr. John Bamber, an old pioneer, died last week at the residence of his daughter in Milford. Mr. Bamber had lived in this vicinity for many years and was widely known throughout the county. He leaves a wife and nine children together with a large circle of friends to mourn his loss.

Nov 1, 1882
Thomas Fogety died at the residence of his mother, on School street Friday morning last, of consumption, and funeral services were held Sunday morning at St. Vincent's church.

Nov 1, 1882
Romeo Democrat: "Rev. A. Sleeper, a christian minister, who has lived in Romeo for about four years, died on Monday, aged fifty three years. He was buried at Pontiac on Thursday."

Nov 1, 1882
Mrs. Sarah A. Rockwell, aged 77 died at her home in Pontiac Monday forenoon, of inflammation of the lungs. Funeral from the house at two o'clock this (Wednesday) afternoon.

Nov 1, 1882
Mrs. Frank Glasple, of this township, died at her mothers' in Oxford last Wednesday, and was buried on Friday in Oxford cemetery.

Nov 8, 1882
Gazette: "Mrs. McGiffert, wife of Rev. W. H. McGiffert, formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church, of this city, died at Albany, N. Y., on the 30th ult."

Nov 4, 1882
Died, at Davisburg Nov. 6, Simon L. McQuigg, in his 84th year. Mr. McQuigg was father-in-law to W. H. Elliott of this city.

A Detroit paper Nov., 2, contains the following: "Bhugart Rusch of Royal Oak township, died at his residence, on Sunday last, under circumstances which led some of his relatives to suspect foul play. Complaint was accordingly entered before Justice Chas. M. Fay of that township, who called a jury and held an inquest over the remains. A post mortem examination was made by Drs. H. K. Lathrop, Carlos Glazier and S. Holcomb, and the jury returned a verdict that Bhugart Rusch came to his death through unnatural causes, and, in their opinion, he had been poisoned, either by his own hand or by a party or parties unknown. The stomach and liver were sealed up and sent to Ann Arbor for analysis. Considerable excitement prevails over the affair, and rumors are rife about alleged domestic difficulties."
