

## PONTIAC BILL POSTER

Correspondence of the Bill Poster.

The people of Oxford were greatly shocked Monday morning, on learning that Mrs. Wm. Glaspie, had died in the night, after an illness of less than hour. She retired Wednesday evening, in her usual health, awoke at two o'clock, oppressed for breath, and in great agony. Dr. Wilkinson was called, but she only breathed a few times after he reached her. Her children were summoned in haste, to find mother dead. The community both young and old, grieve with them, for to all, Mrs. Glaspie was a sympathizing friend. These are the outlines of her life's history: Deborah Dennison was born in Scott, Carlton Co. N. Y., came to Michigan in 1836, and was married to Wm. Glaspie July 17, of the same year. She has remained a resident of Oxford, with the exception of seven years, from that time, until her death, which occurred Nov. 14 1883, of neuralgia of the heart. She leaves a husband, three sons and a daughter to mourn her loss.
