R. B. Stevers, a brother-in-law of John Dowling, of Pontiac, died at Niles last Saturday and the remains were brought to this city for interment. *July 14 1886*

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Fenton Courier of July 7: "Died, June 20th, at his residence in the village of Fenton, Samuel Coleman, aged 74 years. He was born in Oxford, Eng., February 14, 1812, and removed to Fenton in March 1865, where he resided until the time of his death. The funeral services were held at the residence on Thursday." Deceased was the father of Ed. Coleman, of this city.

Robert Grubby, of White Lake, died July 19, aged about 70 years, and funeral services were held at the school house near by last Wednesday. Could learn no further particulars. *July 25 1886*

Andrew Haddley, of this city, died last Wednesday, of consumption, and was buried Friday. *July 14 1886*

John Holser, of Waterford, died July 6, aged about 80 years, and funeral services were held at the school house last Thursday. *July 14 1886*

On Monday last, Hon. Isaac I. Voorheis, a former well known resident and pioneer of Oakland county, died at the residence of his son-in-law in the city of Lapeer. For many years Mr. V. was among the foremost men in the county. He represented the county in the first constitutional convention in the first legislature that convened in Lansing in 1848. For some years he has been a resident of Lapeer, and toward the last of his extended life had been kindly cared for by his daughter and family. His remains will be deposited by the side of those of his family in Oak Hill cemetery to-day. *Aug 4 1886*
