NOU2 1881 Loren M. Cowles died at his home in Pontiac, Monday morning at 9:20 o'clock, of consumption, in the 62nd year of his age. Funeral services will be held at the M. E. church te-morrow (Thursday) afternoon, at two o'clock. Deceased was born at Auburn, New York, and with his parents came to Michigan in 1832 and his boyhood was spent in a hotel his father kept on the Grand River road, near Detroit. Mr. Cowles afterwards clerked at Farmington and Rochester and in 1865 purchased the grocery and crockery store, of Dan, Curry in the Hodges House Block. The late C. R. Mabley effered more rent for the store than Mr. Cowles thought he could afford to pay and hence the latter removed to the Gray block across the street when he did business till the fall of 1879. On account of failing health Mr. Cowles gave up his business and went to Denver but only staid a few months, and returning to this city became the popular clerk of the Waverly House. In 1881 the deceased also went into the livery business with Geo. Hicks under the firm name of Hicks & Cowles. As a man and citizen Mr. Cowles was always kind, pleasant, agreeable and generous to a fault, and the sorrowing family and friends have the sympathy of all in their irreparable loss.
