We are pained to record the death of William Jones, of Ortonville. He died last Thursday with typhoid fever in his 17th year, he was only sick two week, had of late been in the employ of Marks in a store in Ortonville, up to the time of his sickness and death. He was the only son of Henry Jones, a harness maker in Ortonville. He was a young man of excellent reputation, beloved by all who knew him. At the time of his death he was secretary of the M. E.
