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heart and received a blow on the head which caused concussion of the brain, from which he never rallied.

Funeral services were largely attended from the M. E. church yesterday afternoon, sermon by the pastor, Rev. C.-T. Allen.

Oneida county, New York, August 18, 1810, and coming to Michigan in 1831 located and settled upon what is now known as the Williamson farm, in Bloomfield. He was married August 31, 1834, to Mary Ensign, and twenty years later moved to the farm in the first ward now owned by G. M. Trowbridge. In 1866 Mr. P. concluded to take a rest from the labor and cares that come to every successful farmer and removed to the place on Saginarw street where he continued to reside up to the time of his death.

Uncle George leaves a widow, one daughter (Mrs. Rob't Dawson) and hundreds of friends to mourn the loss of a kind husband, father and neighbor. Deceased was a consistent member of the M. E. church for over half a century, but on account of the infirmities brought on by age was not always able to attend as regularly as he would have liked. Mr. P. was the last one of a family of thirteen children, all of whom died between the ages of seventy and seventy-eight.

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
