Members of the family thought an inquest in the case of Daniel Fuller, recently found dead near Rochester, unnecessary, but the requisite number of Avonites were of a different opinion and petitioned Justice Dewey to hold an inquest. O. H. P. Griggs, W. H. Barnes, Jos. Reimer, Silas Douglass, Clark Cox and Jos. G. Toles were empaneled as a jury and rendered the following verdict: "That the said Daniel Fuller came to his death in the public highway about two-hundred rods west from the center of the village of Rochester, where he left the vehicle in which he was riding, and, being overcome by excessive heat, and while under the influence of liquor, voluntarily laid down upon the ground, and then and there died." *July 20 1887*

Mrs. Geo. Green died at the asylum last Thursday aged about fifty years, and next day funeral services were held at the Methodist church, Farmington, and the remains interred in the Farmington cemetery. *July 20 1887*
