Free Press: "Welcome Campbell died at his home in Royal Oak Sunday. Mr. Campbell was born in Canandaigua, N. Y., seventy-eight years ago. He came to Michigan in 1819, founded the village of Oakwood, Oakland Co., and twenty-five years ago removed to Royal Oak, where he bought 1,800 acres of land, now six miles from Detroit. He was well known in Michigan, having at different times been connected with Detroit business houses and also with extensive lumber operations. He leaves a large first-class farm to each of his five sons and two daughters. His sons will be his pall bearers at his funeral today." Nov 14 1881

He leaves a son and daughter, aged 17 and 12 years, who live at Hillsdale. The funeral was held from the Zion Episcopal church last Friday, under the auspices of Pontiac Lodge, F. & A. M., of which he was a member, a preliminary church service being held by the rector, L. S. Stevens.
