

## PONTIAC BILL POSTER

\*Saturday's Detroit Journal: "Harvey King died on his farm near Pontiac last night, aged 71 years. He was a native of New Hampshire, came to Detroit in 1838 and was for years a dairyman of the Cass farm, having been a close friend of the old general. He built the old Brighton house, the Grand River Ave. railway, and established King's cattle yards. He was appointed sewer commissioner by Mayor Moffat. He was in life a plain, everyday man, with a disregard for dress and a due consideration for the Democratic party. He always told with pride of having cleared 250 acres of land on the Cass farm with his own hands." *JUNE 19 1889*
