He had been a missionary with headquarters at Aintab for 22 years, and 16 years ago established the Central Turkey College. In 1880 he opened the first hospital in that section of country, and will long be remembered for his noble deeds. The funeral at Aintab was attended by at least three thousand natives and the remains were interred in the College grounds.
