

### PONTIAC BILL POSTER

STATE OF MICHIGAN, County of Oakland ss.—At a session of the Probate Court for the County of Oakland and holden at the Probate Office, in the city of Pontiac on the 31st day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty five.
