and the farm became widely known as the "Ingomar Stock Farm." Years of faithful work in breeding horses that were better instilled a love and faith that never wavered, and so when Mr. Ellis could no longer carry on the work, his son, G. N. Ellis, with confidence that the horse would always be of service to man, took up the task where his father dropped it.

The younger man turned later from the heavy type and became interested in the show and pleasure saddle horse, for the years had changed man's faithful friend and helper in large measure from a business necessity to a popular and luxurious pleasure.

The saddle horse of today must possess a wonderful disposition, perfect manners, good gait, and, above all, he must be a picture pleasing to look upon. Kentucky develops a distinct breed that possesses all of these qualities, a type that responds to training and makes a perfect horse for the show ring and the saddle.

The Ingomar barns now have 20 of these animals, many if not all of them listed in the American Saddle Horse Registry. "Lyart Peavine" is a recent arrival and "Flashy Peavine," both registered animals of the Peavine line, a breed noted for animation and personality and perfect behavior in the show ring and on the bridle path.

"Somebody," "Nobody," and "Jane Adams," also registered, are there, with others.

Mrs. Archie LaPointe, of Mt. Clemens, became the owner of "Spotlight" this week and will exhibit him in the coming show at Lansing.

As soon as one or two horses go Mr. Ellis is off for Kentucky for others to fill their places, returning with raw material that takes weeks and months of patient, kindly and studied training to develop into trustworthy animals, and Ingomar Stock Farm is noted for this high standard.

Mr. and Mrs. Ellis, and their son and daughter are all enthusiastic riders and lovers of horses and are on the most intimate terms with every horse in the barns.
