SUDDEN DEATH SHOCKS FRIENDS

Carbon Monoxide Fatal to William W. McFarland

William W. McFarland was found dead at 5:30 Wednesday afternoon, September 2, overcome by carbon monoxide fumes from the exhaust of his car. The machine was parked in a lot near his home and the engine was still running when he was discovered.

Mr. McFarland was born in Detroit on March 13, 1869. He attended school there and has always been a member of Schovel Memorial Presbyterian Church in that city. He located on a farm in Groveland Township eleven years ago and then moved into Clarkston four years later.

William McFarland was an electrician by trade. He had been connected with the Yellow Taxicab Company until recently. Friends are of the opinion that he had been brooding over his lack of work and other personal problems.

Funeral services will be from the home at 2:30 p. m. Friday afternoon with burial in Lakeview Cemetery. Reverend R. H. Prouse of the Clarkston Methodist Church will be in charge at the home, with the Wolverine Lodge No. 484 of Detroit conducting the services at the grave. Mr. McFarland was also a member of the Low Twelve Club, Detroit.

Surviving the deceased are his mother, his widow, three children, Lee R. of Clarkston, Mrs. Mark McCollum of Cleveland, and Miss Bernice at home; three grandchildren; and five sisters, Mrs. E. V. 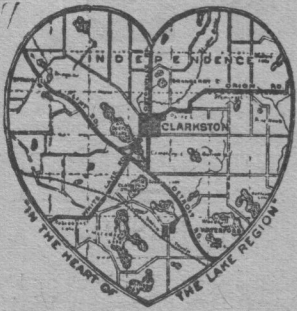

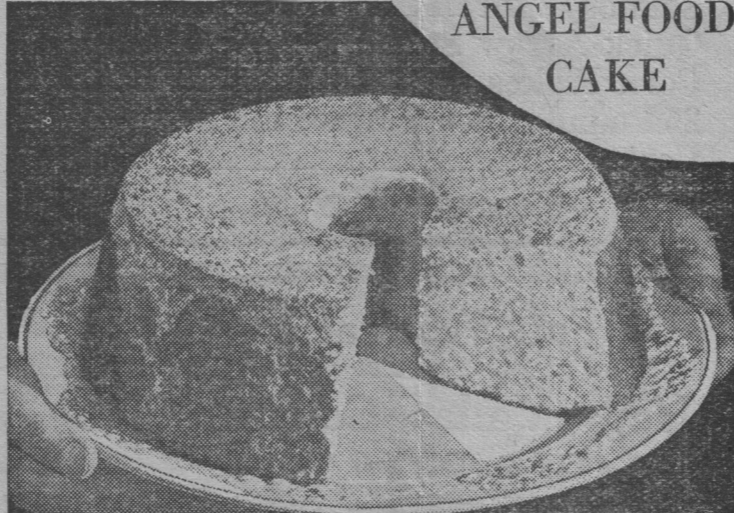

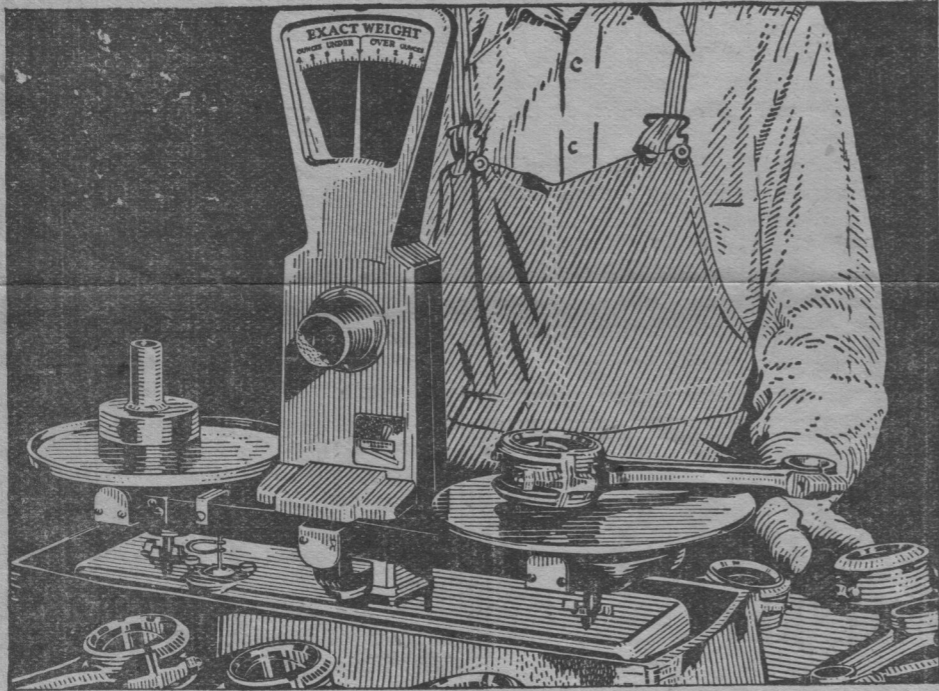

CEDAR CREST SCHOOL REPORT

White Lake Township, Oakland County
June 9, 1931.
Annual Meeting of School District No. 7, White Lake Twp., called to order at 8:30 P. M. by the President of the School Board, Lewis Stites. Members of Board present—Stites, Trempe, Collier, Shotwell and Hayes. Absent—none. Budget for coming school year was submitted and after much discussion it was moved by Mr. Hawkins, seconded by Mr. Giroux, that the matter be referred to the School Board and their decision be final. It was unanimously carried and so ordered. The meeting then proceeded to elect officers to replace those whose terms had expired. The name of Mr. Frank Shotwell, who had previously been appointed by the School Board, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Chas. E. Monroe, was placed in nomination. There were no other nominations, a ballot was ordered and Mr. Shotwell received 26 votes, Mr. Trempe one, Mr. Stites one and Mr. Bay one. Mr. Shotwell was declared elected for one year, filling the unexpired term of Mr. Monroe, aforementioned. Nominations were asked for candidates for a term of three years to succeed Mr. Stites. Mr. Stites was the only candidate and received twenty votes, being all that were cast. Nominations were then asked for candidates for three years to succeed Mr. Trempe. Mr. Trempe was the only nominee and received all the votes cast, (Except one blank) which were 17 and was declared elected. It was moved by Mr. Flohr, seconded by Mr. Hawkins, that the School Board start proceedings against Mr. George W. Needels to collect the money paid for the School site that he had previously so (Generously Donated.) Moved by Mr. Hawkins, seconded by Mr. Flohr, that the School Board pay but the legal tuition for pupils attending schools of higher grades, which is sixty dollars—\$60.00.
Meeting adjourned at 11:10 o'clock.
