

## Back-ups OK'd for schools

Two of five technology critical needs are set to be fixed by the time kids return to the classroom.

Clarkston Board of Education voted 7-0, Aug. 11, to approve two new data backup systems.

Eversync will replace the 7-year-old backup units, one at Clarkston High School and the other at the district administration building, for \$24,900 – \$1,500 for two licenses and \$23,400 for two upgrade packages.

"They're getting old," said Network Administrator Angela Harrison, who placed the new backup systems among her department's top five critical needs. "Drives fail pretty regularly."

The systems store financial, student, staff, and personnel files, she said.

"We were notified in April 2014, Eversync will no longer support hardware beyond July 9, 2014," she said, "The backup is critical to the district's disaster recovery plan. If there were a catastrophic event, the district would not be able to recover from the data loss and continue business."

An alternative, Cloud backup, is not recommended.

"It's not really secure," the administrator said "Due to the amount of data we currently backup, I am concerned about the amount of time and bandwidth usage for backups."

## Family business owner's legacy to continue

Longtime Clarkston business owner David McNeven planned to retire years ago, but he never did.

"He could never stop working," said Christina Calka, his stepdaughter. "When we thought he would retire, he'd wake up and go back to work. He lived and breathed this place."

The owner of Coach's Corner and Village Apparel and Gifts on Main Street for 36 years, McNeven passed away suddenly, Saturday, Aug. 16, 2014, at the age of 74.

"He loved Clarkston," Calka said. "He'd go to Village Bakery for breakfast, for some banana nut bread and a cup of coffee. He'd go to the Village Cafe. He always loved it up here."

## Donation for new Depot Park bridge

Bart and Diane Clark have been active and generous residents of the community since they moved here in 2005, but their latest commitment, to fund a new bridge in Depot Park, has left some amazed.

City Manager Carol Eberhardt said city council members were speechless after Bart announced at the Aug. 11 Clarkston City Council meeting he and his wife Diane were donating up to \$80,000 to build the new bridge in the south end of the park.

The bridge has been a source of complaints, controversy and conflict. Earlier this year, City of the Village of Clarkston spent about \$4,000 to have the bridge inspected by an engineering firm to determine structural integrity.

Although the bridge may have been a source of conflict in the past, in the future it will represent a symbol of generosity made in the honor of love.


Bart and Diane are making the contribution to honor Bart's brother, Jeff, who succumbed suddenly to leukemia on July 15, 2013. Jeff was 64 years old, and lived in California when he passed away. Jeff always planned to move to Clarkston to be closer to Bart and Diane. "He passed away before he made it," explained Bart.

Before he passed away, Jeff requested a tree be planted in his name in Depot Park. Bart and Diane obliged the request and planted an oak tree for Jeff, but the pair were searching for a bigger project.

One day while he was out on a walk, an activity he loves, Bart came to the bridge in the back of Depot Park and noticed the wooden boards preventing visitors from crossing.

"I walk a lot and one day I noticed the bridge was closed, and that is when it oc-Please see New bridge on page 3

curred to me that a new bridge would be a good project," he said.

Aware of controversy over the bridge, the city council discussions regarding its repair, Bart spoke with Diane about funding a new bridge. The pair agreed it was a great idea, and exactly the kind of special project they were looking for.

Bart and Diane requested the bridge be constructed in the same style as another bridge that connects the east and west side of Depot Park. That bridge, installed in 2007, is 40 feet long, made of steal and wood, and is a simple and classic design.

Before deciding how much to donate for the bridge, Bart consulted with resident and business owner Ginny Schultz, who led a fundraising effort to raise money for the \$70,000 cost of the bridge installed in 2007.

After talking with Schultz, the Clark's decided they would provide up to \$80,000 for the project.

The Clark's wanted to do something nice to honor the memory of Jeff, but they also wanted to provide funding because they love Clarkston. "Clarkston is a wonderful place to live," said Bart. "Diane are very proud to call Clarkston our home, and we are happy to be able to contribute to our community."

Bart said as children he and Jeff would come to Clarkston from Detroit to visit their grandfather, Lee Milton Clark.

Bart's family lineage is deeply rooted in Clarkston, and he is related to Jeremiah Clark, a founding father of Clarkston.

Many members of the Clark family, including Jeff, are buried in Lakeview Cemetery on White Lake Road and Dixie.

In 2005 after retiring from an impressive career, which included serving as commander of a nuclear submarine in the U.S Navy, Bart and Diane started searching for a new home.

Their search began in southern states, but Bart and Diane said nothing clicked during that search.

"It just did not feel right," Bart remembers.

Then on a whim, Diane thought of visiting Clarkston. When they searched in Clarkston, the pair knew this was home.

"It's just a great place," smiled Bart. "There are a lot of good things happening."

## Sidewalk flags for construction

Clarkston News Staff Writer Robertson Court residents spotted colored plastic and metal flags sticking out of

the ground and wondered what they were. Yellow, red, orange blue and green flags

mark underground utility lines in advance of two projects. One yard on Robertson was painted and flagged for a landscape project. Another at the corner of Main and Robertson is set for a sidewalk project on Main Street.

Paint and flags let construction workers know where utility lines are located to prevent damage and service disruption.

Underground utility lines include main, services and transmission lines providing gas, electricity and water.

Damages to some lines can cause explosion, electrocution and death.

Removing flags and paint can result in a \$5,000 fine and/or one year imprisonment.

Public Act 174 requires that individuals doing any type of excavation work call "Miss Dig" at 811 to submit a request three days in advance so utility companies, or their contractors, can identify underground lines.

If a homeowner has hired someone to do any type of underground digging, the contractor is required to call in a request. Homeowners performing their own work must submit the request.

Tim McArthur locates utility lines for the Independence Township DPW. When a Miss Dig request is called in at a location with underground utility lines in Independence Township, McArthur visits the work area and uses special equipment to identify water and sewer lines.


McArthur said paint and flags are important, and urges anyone who sees markings to be respectful of them.

"There are a lot of utilities underground like gas, electric and water," said McArthur. "It is important these lines be identified to protect public safety."

Even when planning a project that only requires minimal digging, utilities should be marked by calling 811. Some utility lines, like cable television, are extremely shallow and often just an inch or two underground.

"Private" lines like gas lines to grills and pools, electricity to street lighting and sprinkler systems are not located by utility companies.

Identification colors for utility lines include yellow for gas, oil, steam, petroleum; red for electric; orange is communications; blue means water; brown, sewer; green, storm sewer; and white, survey and proposed construction.

## Consultants to help with technology plan

The new systems include a one-year warranty, and would cost about \$2,000 for maintenance per year.

This summer, the district is also installing a new firewall, purchased earlier this year for \$60,000. Replacing the old firewall was another critical need. The purchase means not having to spend \$16,000 for web filter software maintenance on the old system, as well as \$14,000 in antivirus software maintenance this year. Maintenance for the new system will be about \$5,000 per year starting in 2015.

Other critical needs are wireless internet access, computer equipment, and network upgrades.

Installing a wireless internet system districtwide would cost about \$600,000. New computer equipment for students would be about \$1.2 million. Network upgrades, which would be needed for wireless internet, would cost about \$600,000, Harrison told the board.

"The majority of the district's computers were purchased between 2004 and 2007. Hardware is old, slow and failing," she said. "The Windows XP Operating System is no longer supported by Microsoft or other software companies whose programs run on a Windows system."

#### Tech consultants

The district is looking to hire a consultant to develop a three-year plan to meet critical and other technology needs.

Administration is considering Convergent Technologies and Plante Moran for the job, with its recommendation going to Convergent.

The consultant could finish the plan by

December at a cost of about \$20,000. The district's technology department would take 6-8 months to develop the plan because of limited staff, Harrison said.

A proposal by board President Rosalie Lieblang to have the board, or a committee of board members, meet with the consultant before hiring met with resistance from other board members.

"I don't particularly think this needs to be done as a whole board or even by a couple board members," said Trustee Steve Hyer. "This board is made up of community folks, not IT."

Trustee Cheryl McGinnis said the board should let the professionals in administration decide on the recommendation.

"Fewer meetings are better," McGinnis said.

The board ran into micromanagement issues during workshop meetings with previous technology consultants, coming to a head at a June 23 meeting, said Trustee Elizabeth Egan.

"They ended up walking out on us," Egan said.

The board should make sure there's a clear understanding of the outcome this time, the trustee said.

Board Treasurer Joan Patterson said she is interested in meeting with the consultants.

"The board or subsection of the board should spend time up front to make sure we're on the same page as we move forward," Patterson said.

Lieblang said the board needs to meet with the consultant to make sure they know what information to provide.

## Crim runner, finally

It was nice to read in the paper about local kids training with the Crim folks from Flint.

Maybe I'll see some of them this weekend at the race. I've been training for the Crim for months now. It's a great course, with hills, long straightaways, and lots of enthusiastic supporters, some offering beer.

My training's been good, too, not like before, when I'd barely work up to four miles the weekend

And for max safety, I can use the Clarkston Junior High track. I went up there for a run a couple weeks ago - 30 laps, which gets pretty tedious.

As I ramp up my training-run distances, I'll start coming down to Clarkston on Saturday mornings more, to run with the fleet-footed Wolf Pack club members. I ran with them last weekend, and was almost able to pretty much keep up with the guys in the lead.

They run in the street, but there's safety in numbers, I guess.

### 15 years ago - 1999

"Roberts' superintendent contract approved for next five years" Dr. Al Roberts, board superintendent, continued to serve the Clarkston school district for another five years following a 7-0 approval from the school board of his new contract with a yearly salary of \$125,000. Roberts said a contract of 2-3 years is the norm for superintendents and he was pleased with the unusual length of his contract.

"A very 'self-determined effort" Jeff Jacks of Davisburg took third place when he constructed a 1/8-scale working model of his dream skateboarding park as an exhibit in the self-determined catergory at the 1999 Oakland County 4-H Fair. He said he hoped such a park would soon be offered in the area with no cost for kids. At the time, several area parks charged between 5-8 dollars for entry.

"'This is our year to shine'" Clarkston High School senior Kevin Breen summed up the anticipation for the 1999 fall season as athletes went into their first week of practice with six words-"This is our year to shine."

### 25 years ago - 1989

"Students pay, sports programs stay" Payday didn't become doomsday for Clarkston Community Schools as it instituted its first pay-for-play program. Although there was a two percent drop in student turnout.

"Citizens band together for against groundwater threat" About 25 citizens gathered in a crucial first step towards protecting the area's drinking water. The group discussed threats to groundwater, which is the source of drinking water for about half of Michigan's population.

"Play on" For 30 years, music has been food for hundreds of students at Clarkston Conversatory Music. Ivan Rouse, the founder and director, celebrated the 30-year annivervarsy with music and dancing.

### 50 years ago - 1964

"Divisional races" Over 150 top sports car drivers from a seven state area competed for the Sports Car Club of America points and trophies at the Waterford Hills Michigan road racing course.

**"Junior champs listed"** The Clarkston Area Jaycees and Independence Township Recreation Department held their first Junior Champ Track Meet. More than 50 boys and girls participated.

## Tea for preservation of Brady Lodge

Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) of Michigan State Board recently sponsored the Brady Lodge Tea at Independence Township Hall, hosted by several chapters including Sashabaw Plains of Clarkston. Fifty-one guests from 16 DAR chapters attended, including several from Traverse City.

All wore summer attire and donned lovely hats suitable for the occasion. The ladies enjoyed cucumber and watercress sandwiches, strawberries dipped in chocolate, and scones garnished with Devonshire cream.

Hostesses served tea from silver pots, and guests drank from hand-painted china. Zandra Baker has made the Brady Lodge her State Regent Project, and DAR of Michigan committed to fund the restoration of the windows in the Brady Lodge at a cost of \$30,000.

Restoration has begun, and when completed, the DAR of Michigan name will be posted in the lodge, which will available to the public. Baker said DAR of Michigan supports many projects in schools and at National Headquarters in Washington, DC, but none of these projects were in or for Michigan. She said this is an exciting Historic Preservation project for DAR of Michigan.

Ron Campbell, principal planner and preservation architect for Oakland County Planning & Economic Development Services, presented a program about the lodge's history.

Ken Elwert, Independence Township director of Parks, Recreation and Seniors, provided transportation for the ladies to tour the Brady Lodge, which is located in Bay Court Park.

Children of George Nexsen Brady built the current lodge in 1926. It was used by many organizations including the Boy Scouts. Independence purchased the property in 1988 and is currently restoring the building for use by the public.

Captain John Brady and Hugh Brady Jr. were Revolution War patriots. Brigadier General Hugh Brady III was born in Pennsylvania and served in the War of 1812. He came to Michigan in 1827, and became one of Michigan's most prominent and respected military leaders. He has been referred to as the "Father of the U.S. Army" and was the oldest person to serve in the Army until he died in a carriage accident at age 82. The "Brady Guard" is considered to be the first flag of Michigan.

## Letter to the editor... Voters duped by library campaign, reader says

#### Dear Editor,

The letter "congrats on vote" (Aug. 13) congratulating the Clarkston Independence District's library's "overwhelming victory" by holding its second vote in less then two years in a August primary "stealth election" failed to mention the fact that 10,860 fewer voters voices were heard in the Aug. 5, 2014 primary vs. the 2012 general election, where half the township's population, or 18,918, people voted. Disenfranchising 10,860 voters is hardly something to be proud of!

What is "overwhelming" is the fact that this township ignored 10,860 voters in 2012 when it chose to put this back on the ballot in an August primary when the township should have honored the wishes of voters in 2012 by negating the agreement and starting the process from scratch.

In the spirit of fairness I suggest that township officials do the right thing for township taxpayers by renegotiating the agreement and then putting it back on the November 2014 general election. Why not go with the best two out of three? Those who complained about this proposal failing in Nov. 2012 by a "small margin" surely wouldn't object to another vote knowing that 10,860 voters didn't vote in the August primary, right?

But, the this time around lets do it right. Give us a proposal that offers voters a renewal, and an increase. Not an all or nothing proposal that blackmails voters with threats of closing . The third time around lets tell voters that the Clarkston Independence Library agreement gave away control of almost half (43%) of our library and it's assets to three board members who are appointed by 2% of our population. Do ya think township taxpayers would vote differently with this knowledge?

The Clarkston Independence Library Board is comprised of seven appointed board members, four appointed by the Independence township board, which has

over 36,000 residents, one board member for every 9000 residents, and three appointed by Clarkston City Council, a city of 800 residents, one board member for every 266 residents.


Something is clearly wrong with an agreement that gave away control of 43% of our library to a city with just 2% of the population. This agreement doesn't fairly represent township taxpayers because we can't vote for the city council that is appointing those who will control 43% of our library. Two percent of the population should never have been given 43% control of anything that is getting 98% of it's funding from township taxpayers. Yet not a single member of the new township board looked over the library agreement and corrected this inequality in the agreement before you voted.

The present district library agreement gives our Independence Township library and control of all of its assets to an appointed, unelected library board who answers to no one. Passage of this agreement not only increased your taxes by 81%, it gave you a board that has absolutely no accountability to you. Yet, if you look at other district library agreements, you'll find that a majority of district library boards are elected by the people. This agreement could have done the same.

People were "overwhelmingly" duped and blackmailed by an agreement that didn't fairly represent them and now we're stuck with an agreement that will never give you the opportunity to recall or fire a single library board member. I'm overwhelmingly disappointed in our township board and our local papers for not pointing this out, or correcting this. Not only are we stuck with an 81% tax increase, township tax payers have now lost control of almost half of our library. Not exactly worth cheering about is it?

## Teen arrested after critically injuring man at concert

A 55-year-old Westland man was critically injured when he was pushed during a Hank Williams Jr. concert at DTE Music, 8:55 p.m., Aug. 17.

A 15-year-old Wayne boy was arrested after witnesses told deputies they saw him push the man. The boy tried to leave the scene but was restrained by the witnesses until officers arrived.

The teen and his father were taken to the Independence Township Substation to be interviewed. A detective and evidence technician responded to assist in the investigation.

Witnesses said the victim was pushed once and hit his head on the concrete when he fell. He was transported priority one to McLaren Oakland Hospital in Pontiac in critical condition, where he remained in grave conditions, Tuesday morning. The suspect was lodged in Oakland County Children's Village, but later released pending a review by the Prosecutor's Office.

## New weigh master for Independence

Ticketing truckers breaking laws and township ordinances in Independence Township has been so successful, the township added another Oakland County Sheriff deputy to cover the night shift.

Weigh masters watch for a slew of violations from improper and unsafe working equipment to overweight loads that damage roads. Independence Township Supervisor Pat Kittle said some companies traveling through the township would rather pay a fine than fix the problem.

"We have also had truck drivers stop the deputy and request a ticket be issued because their company would not fix a problem with the trucks break lines," said Kittle.

Revenues collected from tickets and fines issued by the weigh master since April 2014 is estimated at \$80-\$100,000.

Previously, tickets were issued during daytime hours only, but now the night shift will be covered too. Cost for the new weigh master will be funded by fees collected.

Since a weigh master began patrolling township streets, benefits included increased safety on the roads and more funding for road improvements.

A Neighborhood Road Incentive Program, funded by weigh master fees, was created to help offset up to \$15,000 per project for road improvements in neighborhoods. In July, the township presented a check for \$7,852 to Wealthy Street residents to help cover 5 percent of the cost to remill and re-pave 1,700 feet of the street.

It was the Pink team to prevail during the Gridiron Heroes' Sixth Annual Football for a Cure this year with a 23-14 win.


But it was the entire team which bonded together wearing Pink and Blue jerseys as they raised money and awareness for cancer.

During half-time, Brent Wheeler, Vice President of Ancillary Services at McLaren and Clarkston resident, explained all the donations stay in the area for patients fighting cancer and goes to patient services at McLaren Breast Center and McLaren Cancer Institute - Clarkston for transportation and nutrition.

"We honor those who fought and those who are fighting," he said. "Our goal now and for the future is to find a cure for everyone to win."

Rachel Mason, a cancer survivor of 10 years, shared her journey with cancer. While she was attending Ferris State University she started having shoulder pain, which she explained was not from the cancer but it did lead to a chest x-ray. The x-ray showed a tumor – she had Hodgkin's lymphoma.

"My first chemo was after my 18th birthday," she shared and added during her fight she almost died from a blood infection. "When I was sick my community came together. You are coming together as a com-







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

## Beat allergies with Dr. Reba Johnson

#### What are allergy shots?

When medications fail to adequately control allergy symptoms and avoidance of the trigger is not easy or possible, Dr Johnson from Advanced Allergy & Asthma, may recommend immunotherapy or "allergy shots." This treatment consists of a series of injections containing small amounts of the substances to which a person is allergic. After a course of allergy shots, 80 to 90 percent of patients have less allergy symptoms, and in many cases their allergies have completely resolved. Allergy shots can be given for allergic nasal and ocular symptoms, allergic asthma and insect sting allergies.

#### Are allergy shots experimental therapies?

No. Allergy shots have been given for nearly 100 years and are FDA approved therapies. Numerous well-designed medical studies show the efficacy of allergy shots. And allergy shots do not contain steroids, which can have adverse long-term side effects.

#### How are allergy shots given?

Injections are initially given once to twice a week until a maintenance, or constant dose, is achieved. This usually takes approximately 3 to 6 months. Once the maintenance dosage is reached, the allergic symptoms are largely resolved in most patients. Thereafter, the injections are given every two to four weeks.

#### How long must I take allergy shots?

Therapy is continued for 3 to 5 years total, after which the patient continues to get benefit for another 5 to 10 years or longer, even after the shots are stopped. If the shots are stopped prior to a total of 3 years, the allergic symptoms typically return more quickly.

#### Are there special considerations for children?

For children with allergies, allergy shots may prevent allergy-related asthma later in life and keep kids from developing Advanced Allergy and Asthma are new allergies as well.

#### Should I take allergy shots?

This is a question that you and Dr Johnson can discuss. There are many reasons to consider allergy shots:

 Medicines don't work: Many patients go to the allergist because they still have symptoms despite having tried numerous

allergy medications, with little to no relief of their symptoms. Sometimes allergy shots are the only therapy left for these patients.

· Patient wants to reduce allergy symptoms: Some patients like to idea of "getting rid" of allergies, and opt for allergy shots for that reason. Immunotherapy is the only option for allergies that fixes the underlying problem of the immune system, much like a vaccine.

• Don't like medicines: Some patients experience severe side effects from medications, or don't like taking medications on a daily basis - the idea of a "once a month shot" is a better option for them.

 Cost of medicines: Medications can be expensive, and since allergy symptoms typically return soon after medications are stopped, patients may require medications for many, many years. Allergy shots can alleviate much of the need for medications and can be a significant cost savings measure in the long run.

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


