# Wolves give Oxford the cold shoulder BY WENDI REARDON Clarkston News Sports Writer

Clarkston High School senior Josh ierce and the gridiron heroes stretch on a snowy field as they prepare for a showdown with Oxford last Friday.

Competition rises to a new level Friday as the Wolves fight for the MHSAA District title. They host the Lapeer Lightning (10-0),

which is a new program after combining the Lapeer West and Lapeer East high schools.

"They are good," said Tony Miller, Clarkston defensive coordinator. "They are as big as we are. They are as skilled as we are. I don't know if they have played the same competition we have, but on film they look very good. We are going to have to answer the bell. But it's playoffs. You have to answer the bell every Friday if you want to be the champion."

Lapeer had four shutouts during the regular season with all four of them over 40 points. Miller added Wolves' defense is ready to slow them down and they have the strengths to do it, including their size and speed.

# Photo by Larry Wright New homes, businesses coming to Independence

Special to the Clarkston News After almost a decade stall, growth is

back in Independence Township. Last year, 170 new home building permits

were issued, and 111 permits for new homes were issued through October 2014. Subdivisions platted and started in the mid 2000s are now being completed, said David Belcher, township building department director.

The Oakhurst subdivision off Clintonville Road was completed in 2013, Coulter Lakes subdivision off of Oak Hill

and Dartmouth Roads in the northeastern part of the township added 13 new homes, and Morgan Lake subdivision off of Maybee Road added 18 new homes, Belcher said.

Residential building permits numbered about 200 during 2003, 2004, and 2005, but fell to four in 2009, he said.

"In 2007, 2008, 2009 these subdivisions were under construction and the developers lost some of them to the banks when the economy tanked," Belcher said.

Other subdivisions finished around the township include Robertson Builders' 32 homes in the Links of Independence, and Brookstone Hills off Allen Road.

New subdivisions in the approval process at the Planning Commission include 57 homes in Eagle Ridge subdivision Phase I off Maybee Road, with 236 homes in Phase II and Phase III; Ardmore subdivision off Clarkston Road, with 27 new homes; as well as a proposal for 57 homes on Waldon Road near Pine Knob.

The average new home in the township is 2,500 square feet and sells for about \$300,000, Belcher said.

With new homes in the township and a growing population, the building director said commercial space is filling up.

A new Starbucks is proposed on Sashabaw Road, and other new small businesses include gyms, hair salons, weight loss and nutrition stores. A sign of the times is older strip malls such as Waterford Hill Plaza on Dixie Highway is filling with tenants, he said.

"While the residential market stabilizing at about 100 permits per year, the commercial market is taking off with permits to reutilize Please see More development on page 5





A strong wind and flurry of snow wasn't going to stop Clarkston Varsity Cheerleaders from a time-honored tradition.







# Local business wants to help vet for holidays

Clarkston News Editor Local business owners Julie and Robert Bise have an idea for a Christmas project, and they need readers' help.

They're looking for a veteran who has perhaps recently returned from tours of duty in Afghanistan or Iraq, in need of a wheelchair ramp at home. They'll build and install the ramp for free.

"We have just been blessed with our lives and our business," said Julie, who founded the Great Lakes Barrier Free Remodeling business in 2012. "We'd really like to share some of the goodness we've received."

Located in Davisburg, they want to hear from someone in the community who is or knows a wounded veteran in need of a wheelchair ramp. They will choose the recepient from the responses they receive based on need. The team of medical professionals and licensed builders help families in need and charities such as Lighthouse every year for Christmas.

This year, they decided to help a veteran. "These are men and women who have

sacrificed so much," Julie said. The family-owned, Springfield Township business has helped veterans before, including a man who was discharged 25 years ago and needed a ramp, but didn't meet criteria for federal assistance.

"We were able to help him," Julie said. "That's what we want to do now."

Also, an employee of six years, Tim Terry, is a sergeant in the 1460<sup>th</sup> Transportation Company of the National Guard and recently returned from duty overseas.

"He served two tours in Afghanistan – that really hits home," said Robert, who founded Great Lakes Insurance Restorations

The team of medical professionals and in 2000. "This is a way to give back to ensed builders help families in need and veterans."

"I'm proud, happy to be a part of it," said Jay Bise, their son. "I'm honored to do something for them."

The plan is to complete the project in one day, with help from the entire staff and lumber donated by Home Depot.

Julie, a registered nurse who worked at St. Joe's for 23 years in Pontiac, was inspired to build a business providing mobility assistance, such as ramps, bathroom safety, and home modifications, by her mother, the late Nancy Johnson, who used a wheelchair because of a spinal cord injury.

"She met every obstacle you could meet – even a step is detrimental to someone in a wheelchair," Julie said.

# More development on Sashabaw Road

#### Continued from page 1 space," he said

The township is working to support commercial development on Sashabaw Road north of 1-75.

With roadwork planned for the new south exit onto Sashabaw Road, the township is considering extending sewer and water service to the area on Sashabaw Road between Clarkston Road and Flemings Lake Road.

Supervisor Pat Kittle said current thinking regarding the proposed sewer and water district is for the township to fund it and, as businesses come on board, they pay their fair share.

Presently, the first business to request sewer and water funds the line to their business. This was a deal breaker in the past for a proposed Cracker Barrel restaurant at Sashabaw Road and I-75, Kittle said.

With the new plan, businesses pay their fair share, he said.

A Comfort Inn is coming to the township, just east of the present Ruby Tuesday restaurant in the Sashabaw corridor, the supervisor said.

"There are 192 acres in the Sashabaw Corridor commercial development which does not include the McLaren properties," Kittle said. "The area is a bit paralyzed waiting on the approval of the proposed

hospital. If the hospital is approved, those properties will be high-end medical and knowledge based use, but if the hospital is not approved, Plan B is for a lesser rich mix." Both Belcher and Kittle said residents moving into the township generate business for local companies, so both areas are experiencing growth.

### School program OK'd

Clarkston Board of Education voted 7-0, Oct. 27, to approve a Word Study pilot proposal for K-5 reading and writing.

The total cost of the program is \$19,265.32, including materials and guest teacher costs during training.

The program includes reading and writing workshops, interactive reading and writing, and shared reading. Focus is on word study, which includes phonics, grammar, derivation of words, vocabulary, spelling, and punctuation

The school board will receive a progress report in January, and recommendation for the program will be presented in May, said Kimberly Fletcher, teacher trainer and data consultant.

### Road work

The Tindall Road and Rattalee Lake Road intersection west of I-75 in Springfield Township is expected to close intermittently this week for a paving project.

Road Commission for Oakland County workers are paving the gravel approach from Tindall to Rattalee Lake. Detour route is Bigelow Road to Davisburg Road to Eaton Road and back to Rattalee Lake.

Work should be complete by Friday, Nov. 7.

etiquette tips, no doubt born from years of experience on the road Runners individually are awesome, but group hundreds together and there's a bit of mob mentality that can take hold.

"Please be mindful and do not run three across on the trails/roads, especially if there is oncoming vehicular traffic. There are portions of the trail that would suggest you stay single file and to the right unless you are passing, on the left."

I've seen this before, runners side by side, blocking the road. I usually take that opportunity to catch my breath before threading my way through. And good idea, watching out for traffic.

"Line up according to how fast you plan to run or walk the event. Slower runners and walkers should move to the back of the race pack. Just because you arrived early does not mean you should be at the front of the starting line!"

Yes. At the Crim race last August, slower runners were like an obstacle course to maneuver through.

"Be respectful of residents' property and use the port-a-potties at the start line and on the route rather than private yards."

Yikes! Yes, we should not behave like dogs off the leash.

"Emergency vehicles have the rightof-way at all times. The police and traffic control volunteers have YOUR safety in mind, and deserve to be treated respectfully by runners and spectators alike."

### 15 years ago - 1999

"Clarkston voters re-elect incumbents" Voters returned three incumbents - Dan Columbo, Dave Savage, Walt Gamble - to office for two-year terms. City manager Art Pappas said 127 of the city's 927 registerd voters went to the polls to cast their votes.

"Trying to ease downtown traffic" Clarkston Police Chief Paul Ormiston told city council after December 22 traffic jams at eastbound Washington and Main Street in downtown should lighten up. He added a left-turn arrow added to the White Lake and Dixie Highway will ease traffic flow as drivers will use Dixie to get to I-75 and not Main Street.

"Boys clear regional hurdle" After three years of near misses at the regional county meet the Clarkston Boys Cross Country team qualified for the state finals in the first time in school history with a second place finish.

### 25 years ago - 1989

"Bond, 2 proposals highlight ballot" Independence Township voters would see a \$2 million fire bond and two state proposals designed to raise money for education on the ballet. The fire bond issue was defeated in March by 55 votes but Fire Chief Gar Wilson believed the lower turnout in spring wouldn't be the case in November.

"Man, 17, charge with wall smashup" A 17-year-old Independence Township was charged with backing into a brick garage wall twice, destroying two trees and damages throughout at neighborhood as he destroyed mailboxes, trees and lawns.

"'Big kids' tell youngsters to say no to drugs" Bailey Lake Elementary third graders listened to Clarkston High School Just Say No club members Ted Fletcher, Debbie Truba and Julie Brazel talk about drugs and alcohol. Then, the third graders shared their stories - nearly all had something to say.

### 50 years ago - 1964

"New shopping center in township" The Pine Knob Plaza, located off Sashabaw and Maybee Roads, the new shopping center in Independence Township consisted of five stores with four more proposed and 220 parking spots.


So, what did I learn from visiting the Movember website?

# Uber latest tech work for Davies

Five years after retiring from General Motors, Kevin Davies of Clarkston was up for a part-time gig to supplement his pension.

"I was looking for a hobby job – even cutting the grass," said Davies, whose name is pronounced the British way, "Davis."

Working with technology his entire life, he found something fitting the bill online – Uber, the San Francisco-based ride sharing program using smart phones to connect drivers with riders.

"There was a lot of press about it, so I looked into it," he said. "It was fairly simple."

After a background check and vehicle inspection, he was approved and is now online as an Uber driver, but only when he wants to.

"If I'm feeling under the weather, I just don't go online," he said. "It's interesting to meet people I wouldn't normally meet."

Uber users book rides through the smart phone app. When they want a ride, they log on and the app searches for available drivers in the area. If Davies is online, the system would match them up and the rider would have the opportunity to book it. So far, he hasn't booked many rides in Clarkston, but there have been some in Auburn Hills.

He has lived in the Deer Lake subdivision for 28 years with his wife, Trish, who will also soon retire from her job with the Independence Elementary before- and after-school program.

They raised two sons, Rick, who lives in Rochester Hills with his wife, Karen, also of Clarkston; and Simon, who lives in Orchard Lake Village with his wife, Michelle, of Lake Orion.

"When I moved in, it was a sleepy town, a car every few minutes on Main Street," Kevin Davies said. "Now, it's unbelievable, very busy."

He grew up in England, and worked in the aerospace industry on computer aided analysis before moving to the United States in 1982 to work with General Motors.

# Tax evader sentenced

Bradley T. McKouen, president of Delta Staffing, LLC, an employee leasing company, was sentenced, Oct. 30, to 18 months in prison for income tax evasion.

U.S. District Judge Gershwin A. Drain also imposed a two-year term of supervised release and ordered the 41vear-old Clarkston man to pay the U.S. Treasury \$319,000 in restitution. McKouen pleaded guilty to the charge in April.

According to court records, during the 2008 tax year, McKouen was supposed to report Delta Staffing's profits on Schedule C as part of his personal federal income tax return. In 2008, Delta's gross receipts were approximately \$5.7 million. However, McKouen reported \$0 gross receipts on his return. He also reported no business income, no taxable income, and no income tax.

In 2008, McKouen's actual taxable income was approximately \$299,000 and his tax due was approximately \$110,000. Under the terms of his plea agreement, McKouen is also being held responsible for filing similar zero-income returns for the years 2004-2007.


In all, he failed to report \$15 million in gross income and evaded \$319,000 in federal income taxes for the years 2004-2008, according to court records.

"The prosecution and sentencing of Mr. McKouen, who intentionally concealed his income and evaded taxes, reinforces the message to the public that the IRS-CI will continue to work to detect and investigate anyone that believes they are above the law," said Special Agent in Charge Jarod Koopmanof the Internal Revenue Service, Criminal Investigation.


The case was investigated by special agents of the Internal Revenue Service and was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Stephen Hiyama.




Tristan Greenlee, Singles No. 4, and Mitch Rogowski and Andrew Gibson, Doubles No. 1 finished in second place with silver.

# Achievement equals inspiration, success for students

"I want to be an independent thinker." "I want to inspire others." "I want to be proud to be me and help others do the same." "To have any job I want." "To contribute positively to the world." These are examples of what 17-year-old Clarkston seniors wish to achieve as the result of their education in our schools.

"Student achievement" as a political term drives many national, state, and local educational decisions. After all, isn't *this* what we want for our children: to achieve? The bigger question is what, exactly, does achievement mean?

Some might argue achievement is documented in the form of scores on state assessments, such as the MEAP. Research suggests these tests don't truly measure learning.

Still, the Michigan Department of Education uses them to determine how much money the district gets as a reward for achieving a success in ... testing. So should our Clarkston schools make such achievement a priority?

Some in a position of power might answer – yes. Schools do have expenses and infrastructures. Budget is important. But so are our kids. If we make this our priority, what really will our children achieve?

Schools don't manufacture goods. Our

children are not products. How do we price our children's hopes, confidence, perseverance, abilities to reason, problemsolve, and form relationships? How much is the mind worth?

What we, as a

community, see as our children's achievement at school is reflective of our Perspective

beliefs about intelligence, knowledge, success and failure, work ethics, and the future. It's a reflection of what we value in our kids. Academic knowledge is

undoubtedly important; just maybe not as a self- Arina Bokas containing entity, but as a

way to achieve what is really meaningful to us.

As our fast-paced world could throw anyone off a familiar path, the reason some people become successful is more about attitude than knowledge of facts. By the time our children leave school, a lot of what they learned may already be headed toward obsolescence.

Often, when the focus is on what is meaningful to learners, the test scores follow. On June 5, 2002, Director-General Koïchiro Matsuura awarded the UNESCO Prize for

children are not products. How do we price Peace Education to the City Montessori our children's hopes, confidence, School in India.

This school was established on four essential principles: universal values, excellence, global understanding, and service to the community. Its students systematically score higher on exams than the national average.

Our district administrators and teachers, led by superintendent Dr. Rod Rock, are continuously exploring new educational concepts that could impact our children's life achievement.

Just recently, on October 10-12, 2014, nine CCS educators presented at the Project Zero conference, co-hosted by Lick-Wilmerding High School in San Francisco. The overarching theme of *Making*, *Thinking*, *Understanding* invited participants to reflect on ways to create and sustain engaging, enriching, and rigorous learning opportunities.

Clarkston schools are gaining a reputation for innovative thinking and meaningful approaches to learning among the leading educational communities in the world.

Sadly, standardized tests-driven "student achievement" seems to prevail every time our district's priorities are being discussed. Some see it as the only priority. The words of Rear Admiral Grace Hopper cannot be more timely: "The most dangerous phrase in the language is 'We've always done it this way'."

Perhaps we need to take our focus from student achievement and put it on student success, measured by meaningful knowledge and lifelong skills that will stand the test of time.







- Add dual left turn lanes on eastbound and westbound Waldon

### **Freeway Improvements**

- Construct a new off-ramp from northbound I-75 to southbound Sashabaw Road
- Add a lane to the on-ramp from northbound Sashabaw Road to southbound I-75



### **PROJECT SCHEDULE**

The project is expected to start construction in spring 2015 and be completed by fall 2015.

### **PROJECT COST AND FUNDING**

The project is expected to cost approximately \$4 million. Funding for the project includes a Michigan Transportation Economic Development Fund (TEDF) grant for \$672,000, with the remainder being funded by the Sashabaw Corridor Improvement Authority, Charter Township of Independence, McLaren Health Systems, RCOC and Oakland County general government. MDOT provided technical guidance, oversight and obtained all project approvals for the planned improvements.


