Township auditors fired over 2012 cost overruns

Independence Township severed relations with its auditing firm over billing irregularities stemming from its 2012 audit.

The Township Board of Trustees voted, Nov. 18, to deny a request by accounting firm UHY LLP of Farmington Hills for \$20,000 in overage charges for the 2012 fiscal year audit. The 2012 audit was completed and presented to officials at an August 2013 meeting.

Trustees also voted to sever the relationship with the firm.

When the township first voted to enter a contract with UHY, overage costs had been expected, but were required to be approved before any fees were incurred, said township Supervisor Pat Kittle.

Each year, the township must follow state law, which mandates an audit be conducted on government entities. UHY's request for payment was over 11 months after close of the year. The firm requested a payment for the overage charges weeks ago, Kittle said.

The township should have been notified of the charges much earlier, he said.

The supervisor said UHY offered to settle for less than \$20,000, but he was not authorized to make such a payment.

After the audit was completed last summer, an executive summary detailing work performed was requested and received from UHY.

However, the summary did not detail additional work which would have resulted in overage charges, said Trustee Ron Ritchie.

Township Clerk Barb Pallotta said the township recently received a statement of charges broken down at an hourly rate. The bill was reviewed and summarized by the township's finance director, and Pallotta recommended officials review the

Kittle said he found it rather disturbing the fees were just recently requested.

Before awarding the work to UHY, the Township Board opened it up to bids by other companies, said Trustee David Lohmeier.

UHY was chosen by the township to do the work in part to save money, but to also give the firm a chance, feeling they would do a good job, Lohmeier said.

Contracting with UHY saved township money, but the work was not up to caliber, he said.

Pallotta said ending the relationship with UHY was a tough decision, but audits they performed were very difficult due to a lack of communication between auditors and the township's elected officials including herself, Kittle, and Treasurer Paul Brown.

In addition to denying payment and severing the relationship with UHY, the trustees also voted to have the Audit Advisory Committee review the issue and make their future audit recommendations by the Dec. 23 meeting.

Generator to power township in emergency

Officials have been considering a new generator for Independence Township Hall for the past 18 months, and on Nov. 18, they voted to approve the purchase.

The complete cost of the unit is \$64,000, which includes installation of a gas line, as well as additional landscaping around the unit and other work.

Township Building Director Dave Belcher worked on bids and specific needs for the generator to sustain operations at the building in a power outage. Belcher recommended purchasing a natural-gas unit from Generac.

Township Treasurer Paul Brown said he explored purchasing a generator a year ago, and the quote he obtained was over \$140,000. Brown credited Belcher with having skills needed to efficiently purchase the

In addition to allowing the building to function in an emergency, gas and electric lines installed in the building to accomodate individual occupants will be consolidated into one line. Over \$180 a month in rental fees to utility companies will be saved by consolidating lines.

Installing the generator is important to ensure township hall is up and running for township business and residents in case of an emergency like the winter storm earlier this year, which knocked out power for more than a week, said Supervisor Pat Kittle.

Emergency operations would include a warming center for residents, Kittle said.

"We want you to be able to get a cup of coffee and recharge yourself," he said. "We want to make sure the community knows services are available at Independence Township in an emergency. We also want

to let other communities know Independence Township will be up and running so they too can conduct business.'

In the summer, hopes were high to receive a \$150,000 grant for the generator and other improvements for an emergency operations center for the township and surrounding communities.

Independence Township Fire Department Deputy Fire Chief Mitch Petterson applied for the grant in the State of Michigan Competitive Grant Assistance Program.

The grant request was denied, however. In July, when speaking about the grant, Petterson asked how business would be conducted if power was lost for a long period of time.

He also said the state has encouraged governments to create efficiencies and has created grants to accomplish such goals.

GPS trackers OK'd for township trucks

Officials hope a new GPS system for township trucks will increase fuel savings and safety.

Independence Township Board voted for a three-year contract with Fleetmatics, Nov. 18, to equip township vehicles with the fleettracking system.

Township Treasurer Paul Brown said Fleetmatics is a reputable company that oversees numerous large fleets.

"They are a big company with the right experience," Brown said.

He added Fleetmatics' bid was not the lowest, but paying less does not ensure the best company to provide quality service.

The cost for the system is \$38 a month each for up to 63 township vehicles – up to \$2,457 a month. Some vehicles in the fleet may not be equipped with the service depending on input of department heads.

Brown estimated about \$1,235 a month in savings after expenses, mostly in fuel and hourly labor. He said projected savings are a conservative figure and he believes fuel savings will be greater than projected.

The Global Positioning System uses 27 satellites transmiting information about vehicles every 90 seconds to receivers around the world.

They provide real-time snapshots of location, mileage, speed, and other information about each vehicle in a fleet. Management can also customize reports for particular vehicles.

Brown said statistics show employees driving vehicles with systems installed are

more efficient, and do a better job getting where they need to be when the system is installed.

After systems are installed, each department head will be able to retrieve information on each vehicle. Information on aggressive driving, like speeding or braking hard, will also be available.

Convenience for certain services, like senior center busing, will increase because exact arrival times, which are now estimated, can be calculated almost exactly, Brown said.

Insurance costs may also decrease because installing the system helps lowers liabilities and accident risks, he said.

"That alone is a good reason to put them in," he said.

Trustee David Lohmeier was curious

about how employees may feel about implementing the plan to install the system.

"We don't want to be a watchdog," he said. "We want to give our employees tools and change harmful behaviors. It's safer for employees and safer for residents."

Notification about driving monitored vehicles will be disclosed in employee handbooks. If certain rules and policies are violated, the employee may face consequences, Brown said.

Details like who has access to information on each vehicle is another detail that must still be worked out, he said.

Lohmeier said major companies continue to invest in fleet systems for their fleets too.

Every three years, each vehicle in the program will get a new system.

Clarkston Board of Education changed its December meeting dates. The board's regular meeting was rescheduled for Dec. 15 at 7 p.m. A closed-session meeting for evaluation of Superintendent Dr. Rod Rock was set for Dec. 8 at 7 p.m.

The changes were approved by unanimous vote, Nov. 24.

School bonds upgraded

Clarkston Community Schools' finances were upgraded by Moody's Investors Service, Nov. 24.

Moody's removed its "negative outlook" on the district's \$19.9 million, 2015 Refunding Bonds, and assigned an A1 underlying rating and Aa2 enhanced rating.

Moody's said the upgrades on the general obligation, unlimited tax bonds are due to financial improvements from spending cuts, above-average socioeconomic indicators and recovering tax base. The ratings had been downgraded in November 2013.

"With a high rating, we are better equipped to borrow at better rates," said Superintendent Dr. Rod Rock.

"It make us look better to investors," said Mary Beth Rogers, executive director for business services.

The district's outstanding general obligation debt continues to have an Al underlying rating. For more information, visit www.clarkston.k12.mi.us.

DPW needs new facility

The Clarkston Facilities Committee met on Nov. 19 to discuss recommendations for a new DPW facility.

City Manager Carol Eberhardt said the committee will consider a proposal by an architect to use part of the parking lot at Deer Lake Beach on White Lake Road. Findings will be presented, Dec. 8.

The DPW is looking for a new building because its current location on Church Street off Main, a building leased by the city, is for sale.

City seeks citizen input

City Manager Carol Eberhardt said she has been working with Treasurer Sandra Barlass to create a five-year, long-range plan for the city.

Eberhardt will survey residents to find out their priorities, and email results to council members. The survey will be included with the winter tax bill.

Treasurer Paul Brown was explaining how, over several years, our township has been paying thousands of dollars of sales taxes on utility bills government entities are exempt from.


Our treasurer went on to thank one of the trustees.

Like I said, I still have some of the pictures. There's the one of Uncle Gene drinking a beer by the fireplace. There's the one of Aunt Pat drinking a beer in the dining room. There's the one of Grandma sitting daintily, a cold yellow brew in a clear glass tilted to her lips.



It only took four plays for the Hornets to take the lead as they kicked a 39-yard field goal from William Breen as the quarter ended.

The Wolves headed to the locker room to prepare for the second half and a plan not to change a thing - to stick to the game plan.

"These kids have taught me something," Richardson said. "The old Kurt Richardson would have blown up at half and at two turnovers. I just told them 'we are fine. We didn't play well. We are getting the ball so everything is fine.' I learned it from these guys."

"In big games like this you can overthink it so much," senior quarterback DJ Zezula added. "You can watch film until your eyes bleed but what you need to do is get back down to the basics."

The Wolves opened the second half with a 52-yard touchdown pass play from Zezula to senior wide receiver Merrick Canada, putting the score 13-10.

Nolan closed the third quarter with a 2-yard run touchdown with 47 seconds remaining.

The Wolves' next possession in the last quarter began with a bang as Zezula held onto the ball and broke past the Hornets' defense. He ran 70 yards before he landed in the endzone.

"I couldn't be happier with my offensive line," Zezula said. "If you watch that play it just opens up great. Our tackle, Adam Matich, pulls around and he just creates a huge hole and no one is there. There was nothing on me but running fast. They all did the hard work. All I could see was the end zone."

With 1:57 remaining in the game, Nolan

scored his third touchdown on a 22-yard run, finishing the game with 173 rushes on 28 carries.

"I don't have much to do with the offense besides say 'give Nolan the ball,"" Richardson said

Zezula carried the ball 17 times for 129 rushes. He completed 6-of-9 passes for 100 yards. Canada caught two of the passes for 66 yards and senior Austin Egler also caught two passes for 11 yards.

Senior Jack Selke led defense with three tackles and five assists and Canada had four tackles and two assists. Egler had two tackles and six assists.

Senior Dayne Rogers had seven assists plus one sack and senior Bryce Witherspoon had four assists and one sack.

The Hornets had a hard time getting past senior Cole Chewins as well, as he had one block and broke up three passes.

The senior class has gone 39-2, with a winning streak of 27 games since the second game of 2013. It's Michigan's longest winning streak

"Only losing two at Clarkston is pretty amazing. I want to pave the way to the younger kids," Zezula said.

Richardson added the bar was raised for the younger players.

"They watch these kids and they see how it's done," he said. "Hopefully it sets a great example for them to follow. They are hungry for it."

"They broke the mold and created their own model," said Defensive Coordinator Tony Miller. "Clarkston Football is going to be around for a while. The talent we have coming up is exceptional."

"Last year was to break the mold and break the dark cloud over Clarkston that we would never win," added Zezula. "This year was building a legacy, building a tradition we were going to do it the hard way. We are going to do better if we put in 100 percent. We are just going to do it simple and do it the Clarkston way. Coach Richardson and all the coaches do a great job – just working on the little things"

Clarkston fans filled the stands at Ford Field and were also rallying behind their team around the nation.

"Our community is awesome," Richardson smiled. "They show up and anytime we need something they are there for us. This is my hometown and I love it to death.

"I want to give kudos to my assistant coaches," he added. "They do a tremendous job. I would be lost without them."

Adam began with the Clarkston Chiefs in third grade where he met his current varsity teammates and the class who graduated last year.


"I have really made a chemistry with them," he said. "We have clicked as a team through the years and that's why we are so good."





He added the team is just not scoring


"You have to score goals to win a hockey game or at least tie it and we aren't doing it. We practice scoring goals. We just have to execute it at game time."




Cagers set for home opener







Family, schools partner for bone-marrow donor drive

For the Hamilton family, paying it forward could mean saving more than one life. In this spirit, Clarkston native Karrie Hamilton Jolly is on a mission.

The Lake Orion High School graduate helped organize a Bone Marrow Registry Drive in honor of her mother, long time Lake Orion resident Linda Hamilton, in an effort to find Hamilton and others in her position a potential stem-cell transplant donor.

Hamilton, who has worked in the Clarkston Community Schools district for 25 years, was diagnosed with leukemia in September. After two rounds of chemotherapy, Hamilton is in good shape, and very happy she was able to spend Thanksgiving with her family.

To help register more potential stem-cell transplant matches for her mother and others, Jolly contacted the Michigan Blood Be the Match program in an effort to rally the local communities to step up and register as donors.


Be the Match is an organization that works with Michigan communities and families with a personal connection to blood disease or blood cancer patients, and supports those patients by hosting a bone marrow registry event and fundraiser.

Hamilton's Bone Marrow Registry Drive is on Thursday, Dec. 11, at the Clarkston Community Education building from 2 p.m. until 7 p.m. The education building is located at 6558 Waldon Road.

The purpose is to add as many donors to the registry as possible, and to raise funds for an organization with a mission to save lives, Jolly said.

"It's a pay-it-forward kind of thing. My mom needs a stem cell transplant, and there is no one in our family that is a match for her," she said. "If there is one stranger out there who could help, why not add them to the registry so we can help someone else out too."

Interested participants must be in good health and be between the ages of 18 and 44. During the event, donors will be asked to fill out a consent form and will be given a swab test. The swab test includes four cotton swabs that will be

scrubbed on the inside of the cheek and placed in a secure envelope.

If a donor is a potential match for a patient, they will have the same DNA markers or tissue types, known as Human Leukocyte Antigens (HLA), according to Be the Match Community Engagement Representative Katie McClain.

If there is a match, a Michigan Blood representative will contact the donor with more information.

About one in every 500 donors is a match, McClain said. "There are over 11 million potential donors on the registry who have committed themselves to making a life-saving donation if ever matched. Although this number seems high, there are still patients who cannot find a match in the registry," she said. "The more who join, the more hope we give to searching patients."

As part of the fundraising effort, the entire Clarkston School District is hosting a Be Casual fundraiser Dec. 11 to help pay for the swab kit tests. Each swab kit collected at the registry costs Be the Match \$100 to configure.

Jolly's family is supporting their mother and wife every step of the way, and is not wasting any time.


Her father, Dale Hamilton, has been a volunteer Orion Township Station 3 firefighter for more than 35 years, and is head custodian for Clarkston schools. Because he has been an employee there close to 40 years, the district has graciously offered to open up their gym for the fundraiser, Jolly said. Both Linda and Dale Hamilton graduated from Clarkston High School in 1973 and 1972, respectively.

The Hamiltons moved to Lake Orion after growing up in Clarkston, and both Jolly and her sister Stacy Hamilton Cary graduated from Lake Orion High School, Jolly in 1994 and Cary in 2000.

This is the first step to helping find a donor for their mother, whether from this particular event, or events organized in the future.

With five little grandkids to play with, Linda Hamilton has much to look forward to, and needs the Lake Orion and Clarkston communities' support.
