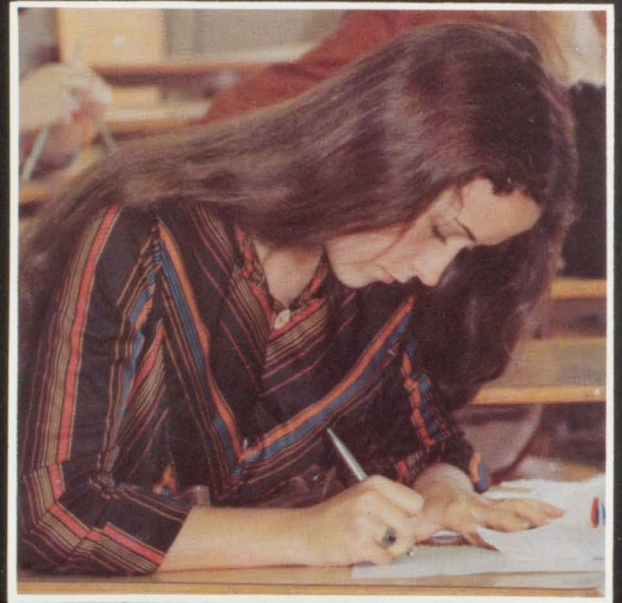
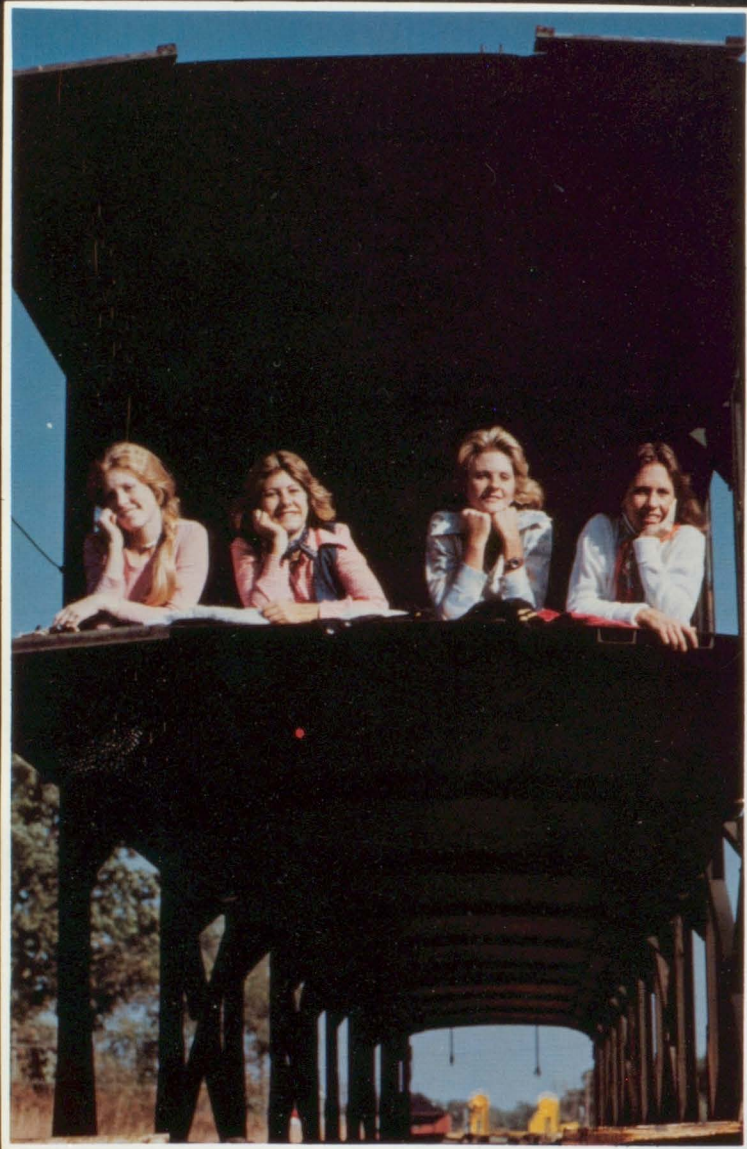


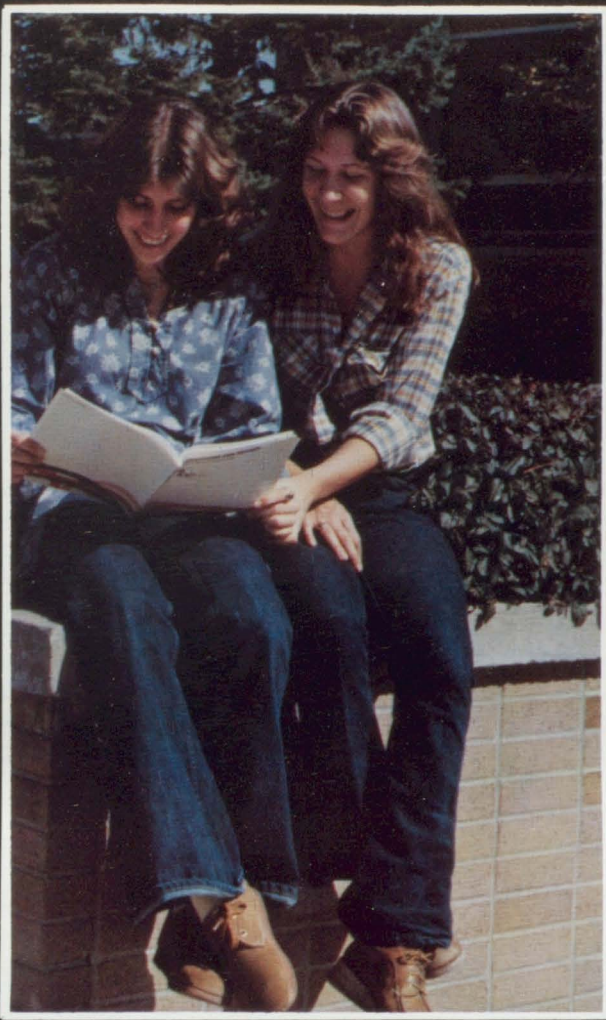






Seniors Work Hard to Receive Their Diploma

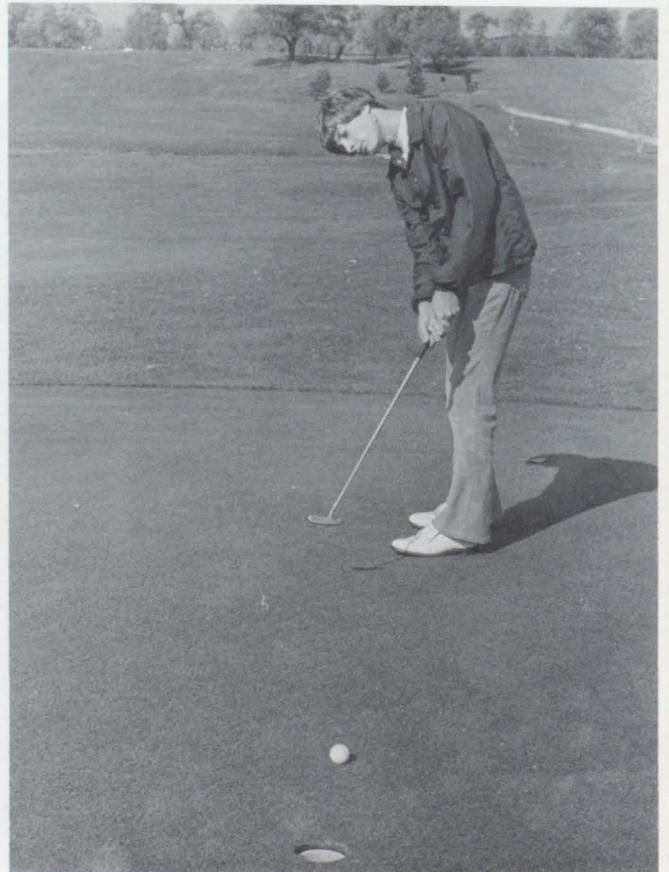
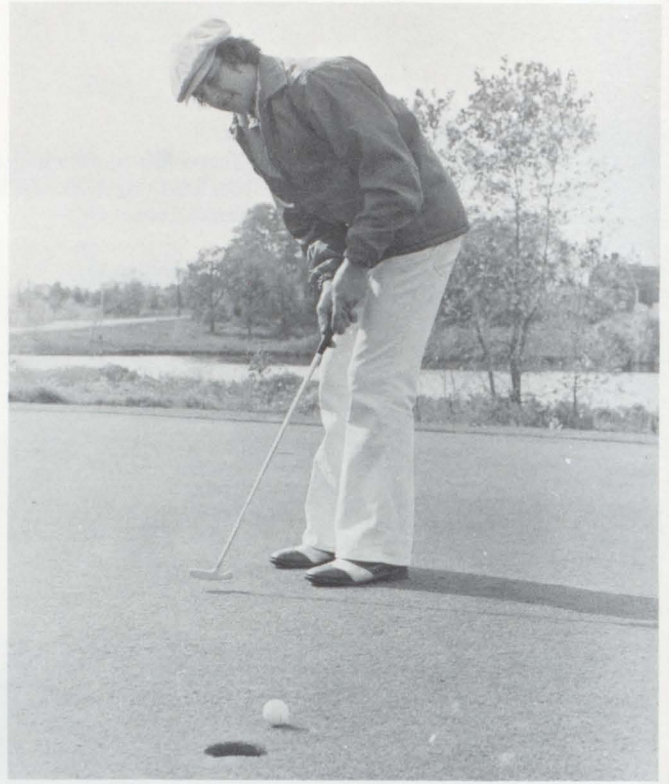


Golf Team Swings Into Action

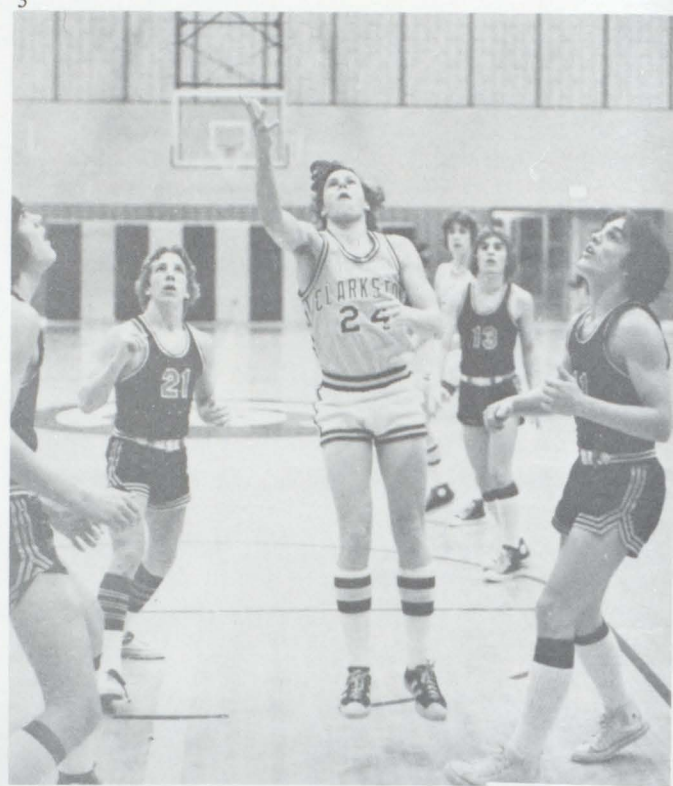
