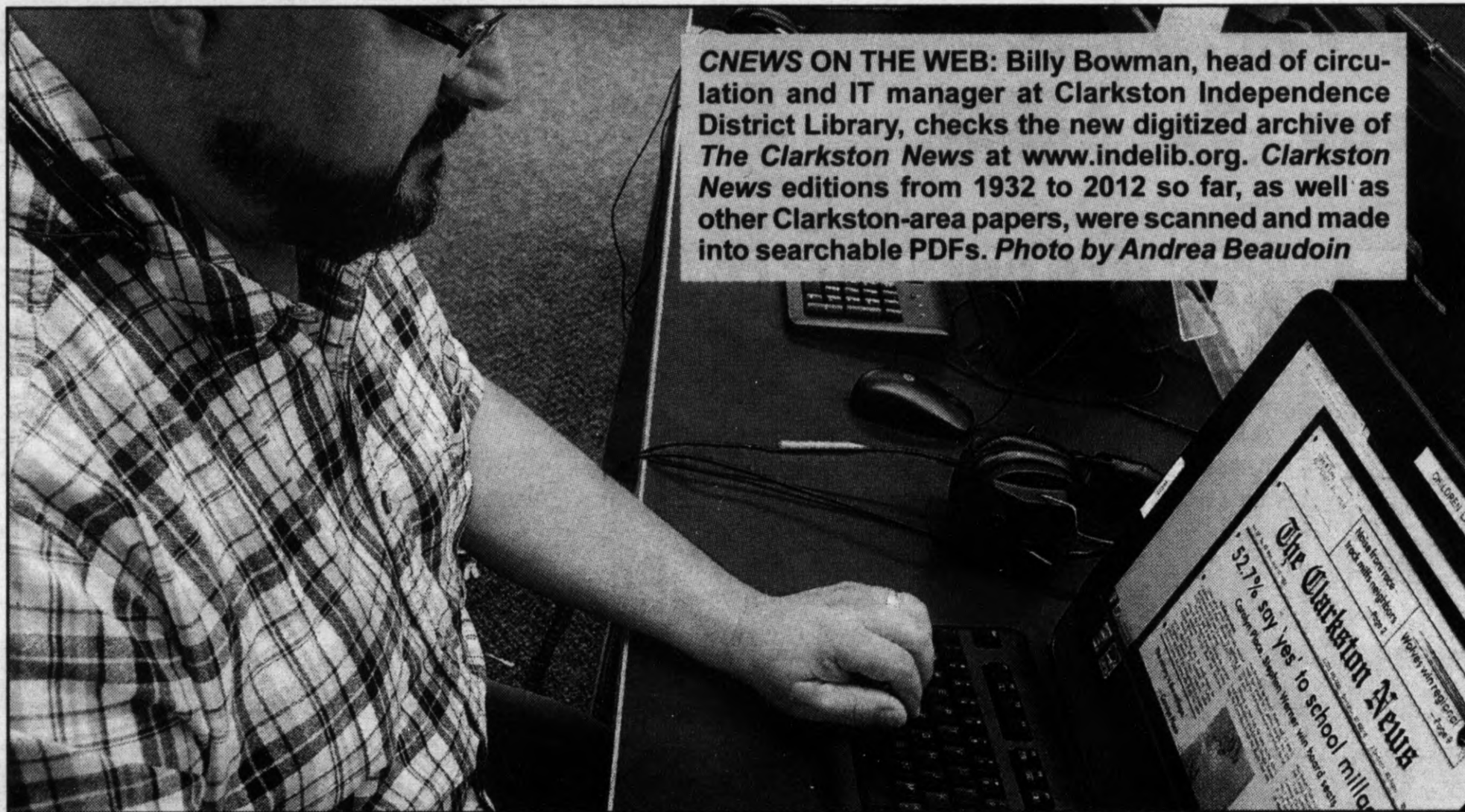

Quest for cure

Last Friday was a special day for Cindy Jenko - it was her birthday and marked one more year of blowing out the candles and enjoying the day and a birthday weekend with family and friends.

Thirteen years ago, Jenko was a wife and stay-at-home mother of three daughters, who are now 24, 26, and 28 years old.

In a moment it changed. While she was scratching underneath her arm, she found a lump and visited her doctor. She had HER2+, Human Epidermal growth factor Receptor 2-positive breast cancer.

Planners OK with 2 of 3 restaurant ideas

It was standing room only at Clarkston Planning Commission's Monday meeting, where planners recommended approval of Special Land Use for Rooftop Dining and Patio at 3 E. Church Street and 28 S. Main.

The two downtown properties are adjacent. The E. Church building is currently rented by the city for its DPW, and 28 S. Main is the current location for Morgan's. The property owner, Union Joints, wants to renovate it into restaurants seating up to 138.

The commission tabled a request to recommend conditional zoning of 59 S. Main, currently an apartment building, to also be-

come a restaurant. This property is owned by CBC Investments of Waterford.

City ordinances require 14-20 parking spaces per 1,000 square feet for restaurants. None of the plans include parking.

The commission recommended city council complete a parking study. Bob Roth, an owner of Washington Management, said he cannot believe parking was not addressed by the commission.

"It's disgusting there are so many rules they don't follow," he said.

In response to a question from city resident Lorry Mahler during the meeting, City Manager Carol Eberhardt denied telling *The Clarkston News*, "The planning commission

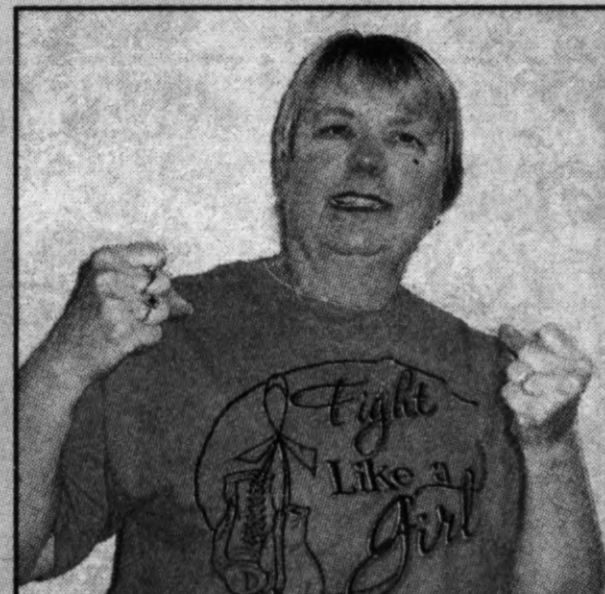
is really the experts when it comes to parking issues and requirements" ("Downtown parking questions up to planners," July 15).

"I don't remember saying this," said Eberhardt in an email, July 21. "I most likely said the council could refer the parking issue to the planning commission - they can."

City council could refer the issue back to the planning commission, order a parking study, or do nothing, she said.

"I don't make a decision, and often what I say is simply a suggestion," she said.

City Council will discuss the issues for possible approval at Monday's meeting. Council meets at 7 p.m., July 27, at city hall, 375 Depot Road.

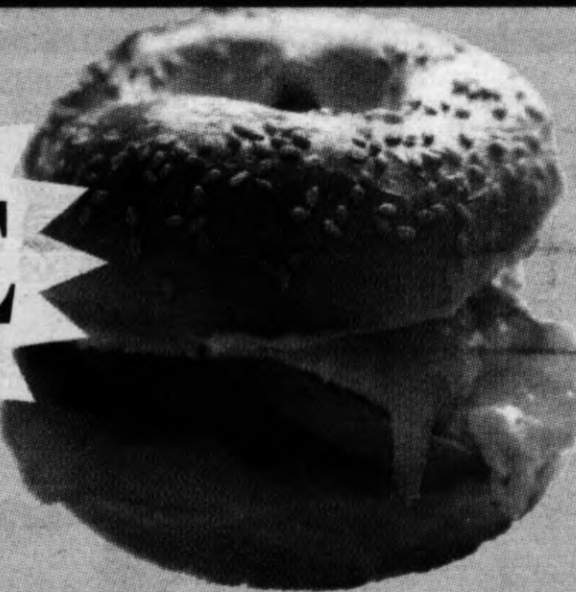

Township considers \$6.8M in improvements

A 10-year plan with more than \$6.8 million for improvements to Independence Township departments and facilities is just preliminary, according to officials.

The Capital Improvement Plan includes major improvements to water and sewer facilities, and Park's, Recreation and Seniors Department.

Independence Township Supervisor Pat Kittle and budget analyst Rick Yaeger presented the plan at the July 15 Township Board meeting.

Kittle said it's time for improvements to the township. The 2016 budget includes \$150,000 in CIP improvements.

"To improve, prioritize and put together a plan that makes sense, \$150,000 is not enough," Kittle said. "A lot of things are aging especially in our parks and recreation, and that's what scares me."

They must also consider salary increases for township services, he added.

Parks, Recreation and Senior Director Ken Elwert was asked to include everything he believed was needed to improve the department, Kittle said.

"I asked Ken to come back with a budget to take our parks to the next level," he said.

Elwert spoke at a board of trustees meeting in June about numerous plans to improve the department.

Meetings to continue discussions about CIP funding will continue.

Major CIP Improvements proposed for 2016-2026 include township infrastructure such as sewer and water, fire, safety paths and cemetery's in Independence Township.

The largest part of the CIP plan is Independence Township Park's, Recreation and Seniors department, with \$6.6 million in improvements needed over 10 years.

In 2016, the plan calls for \$874,000 for im-

provements to Clintonwood and McCord parks.

Upgrades totaling \$176,000 for Independence Township Hall is scheduled in 2017, with \$46,000 in funding to resurface the parking lot and install irrigation.

Cemetery improvements includes \$180,000, with \$94,000 in 2016.

Safety paths improvements total \$59,000 for equipment, with \$20,500 in spending planned for 2016.

Over \$3.2 million was included for sewer facilities, with \$628,000 in improvements starting in 2016. Water facilities would receive \$6.9 million, beginning with \$628,000 in improvements in 2016.

A total of \$5.4 million was requested by the Independence Township Fire Department, with \$430,000 planned for 2016. Future upgrades include improved and refurbished equipment, vehicle purchases, and station renovation.

"They were kind of young, just entering puberty or about to," said Jenko about her children. "It was a crazy year."

She got on the fast track as she did chemotherapy, radiation and was put on Herceptin, which was a new drug at the time and just came on the market.

"Now it is a miracle drug," Jenko said. "At the time it was a clinical drug and the oncologist said he wanted to use it but I don't have a protocol."

Her oncologist called within a week said he found a protocol and he was going to use the drug on her.

"It saved my life," Jenko said, adding he would greet her as his miracle patient. "He wrote about it."

She was in the clear until three years ago. Jenko had to postpone her fall annual mammogram at McLaren Breast Center in Clarkston because a lot of things were going on in her life.

She rescheduled it to March and had her mammogram done. She was called the next day.

"Cindy, we see a little something," she remembered from the phone conversation. "Because of your history we want you to come back. I thought okay, it's nothing. It's been 10 years. I'm cool."

Dr. Linda Lawrenace did a stereotactic biopsy, pulling out some of the tissue to see what it was.

"She was wonderful," Jenko said. "It was a good experience."

Within a couple of days, Jenko received a phone call from her regular OBGYN - the cancer had come back.

Upon hearing the news she went into her manager's office, where she now works as a

legal assistant in Oxford.

"I know I stormed into my manager's office, slammed the door and swore," she recalled, trying not to get choked up. "I never swear. They knew something was wrong."

"I just said it's back and I am going to fight it," she smiled. "Thankfully I had gone and they were so good at looking things over. Because of my history, they were really efficient."

She was on the fast track again as she went to see a surgeon and an oncologist. Her option at this point was to have a mastectomy because she already had radiation. From the mastectomy, they would biopsy. She was warned depending on the size of the lump she might or might not need chemotherapy.

"From that point, we were just praying and praying," Jenko said.

She scheduled the surgery for right after Easter. Then, received good news - it was really small and she didn't need chemotherapy.

"We caught it early," she said. "It was a tiny spot, but it was the same spot as before so we didn't know if not all of it came out the first time. It laid there dormant for 10 years and decided to rear its head. Good thing I was persistent on going. I never missed a mammogram the whole time."

She admitted it was an emotional rollercoaster and everyone at McLaren was there for her.

"I had a wonderful experience," she smiled. "They were really great. Even the girls in the office when I would call."

She said having cancer changed her life.

"You appreciate things a lot more," Jenko reflected. "You know you can get a diagnose

tomorrow or a friend or family member can. You count your blessings a heck of a lot more."

She also helps others out. A few people have come to her saying they know someone who has cancer and Jenko says to give them her number. She waits for them to call, explaining it's very personal and some people don't want to talk about it.

"Other people are like me. I don't care - the more people who could be praying for me, the better," she said. "That's what gets me through. My church family, my immediate family, I have a couple of nurses for best friends, they all rallied behind me. I couldn't have done it without them. It is definitely something I couldn't have done on my own. I know some women do, they just internalize it."

She has participated in Relay for Life and is excited for the Clarkston Wolves' seventh annual Football for a Cure, as the players raise money for McLaren Breast Center and McLaren Cancer Institute in Clarkston.

"It is awesome," she said. "I love them for it. I love it and the awareness it brings. I don't think you can ask somebody the question do you know somebody or has your family been touched with cancer and get a negative answer. It's everywhere. We need these types of things to keep it in people's minds. Sometimes when you hear cancer it is so rapid it is part of everyday life you think 'oh, cancer.' Guess what? If you are the one hearing you have cancer, it is a definite life changer. You are going to forever be changed. I am blessed to use my experience and help."

And with fall right around the corner, she smiled and said, "I am due again to make my appointment."

Sashabaw Road work

Drivers traveling Sashabaw Road may be relieved some construction has wrapped up in the area. The north-bound ramp to I-75 on Sashabaw re-opened on July 8 after reconstruction. Road Commission for Oakland County also completed construction on Waldon to replace a massive culvert. Crews continue working in the area on both widening both Sashabaw and Waldon.

The \$5 million project also includes adding dual left hand turn lanes to east bound Waldon.

Waldon closure delayed

Closure of westbound lanes of Waldon Road from I-75 to Sashabaw Road for road work has been delayed until August.

The continuing road construction project in the area was expected to close the lanes from July 24 through the end of October.

During the closure, traffic will be detoured to Clintonville Road to Maybee Road to M-15 to Waldon Road.

The \$5 million project is funded by Road Commission for Oakland County, Michigan Department of Transportation, Independence Township and the Oakland County Tri-Party Program. Contractors with Iafrate Construction are working on improvements to the Sashabaw and Waldon Road intersection.

Privy dig

Historical artifacts will be unearthed by outhouse archaeologists on July 26 from 1-4p.m. in downtown Clarkston during a Privy Dig. At four different homes, the crews will be digging for historical treasures. On most digs, old relics found include pottery, bottles, shoes, toys, and jewelry.

Tickets will be for sale from 12:45-2 p.m. in the parking lot at the corner of Washington and Main Streets for \$5 a person or \$10 per family. Participants will be given a map to walk to designated sites.

"It's a great way to learn about early Clarkston and we promise you're be fascinated," said Clarkston Community Historical Society Director Toni Smith.

Critical thinking and why we believe

Whilst Don Rush is on vacation, here's a Best of Don't Rush Me from Aug. 3, 2011.

I have often professed in this very spot in your community newspaper, that we really need to spend more time promoting critical thinking.

When we hire a new reporter I try to cram in a lifetime's worth of thought into one little lesson and it goes something like this:

"Even if somebody you admire, respect and agree with all of the time -- even the President of the United States -- tells you something, don't just report verbatim. If, the President tells you that 9,500 kids in America die every 12 hours of every day because they..." (I don't know) "don't have the money to buy a new toothbrush once every three months, and that is why we have to raise the debt ceiling..." don't just report verbatim, do the math.

If my young cub reporter were to be given the above quote and then reported verbatim without doing the math, I would give feedback with snarky commentary: "9,500 kids multiplied by 365 days, times two equals, 6,935,000 kids die a year due to poor oral hygiene, brought upon by poverty, which, if you'd done the math, you would have found the number to be what it is, hogwash."

Then I usually follow that lesson with this quote, "Don't be a sheep. Think."

I must have typed the buzz words "critical think-

ing" enough, that at least one reader thought it would be a good idea for me to read the latest book written by Mr. Skeptic, Michael Shermer, *The Believing Brain: From Ghosts and Gods to Politics and Conspiracies—How We Construct Beliefs and Reinforce Them as Truths*.

I got it on loan from the (gulp) library, cause I didn't want to shell out an Andrew Jackson for the hardcover version.

Now that I have read it, I might buy it. (And, that is a mighty big "might" as I am the cheapest guy this side of Rio Grande.) Shermer has actually put together a solid case for how humans (and some pigeons) come to believe things, all the while being entertaining. I came away with two basic premises... one, we humans are hard-wired to connect the dots and see patterns in the world about us.

Even if those patterns are not really there. And, two, belief (in aliens, conspiracies, Republicans, Democrats, socialism, theology, just pick your poison) comes first to humans, and then we sift through information to shore up said belief.

In other words, "Belief comes quickly and naturally, skepticism is slow and unnatural, and most people have a low tolerance for ambiguity."

I think I used to call this "selective hearing." But, don't believe me, I'm just a 'paperboy, Shermer's the scientist. Shermer uses science analogies to illustrate why we are hard-wired to connect the dots, see patterns and believe.

My favorite was about our ancestors, out there in little bands across the African plains. It is night and

dark out. Our ancestor is awakened by a rustling in the grass. Is it just the wind or a hungry, ancestor-eating critter?

Those ancients who chose to believe it was the wind, went back to sleep when it was really a lion, didn't survive to pass on their DNA.

They became nobody's ancestor. Those who believed it was a lion, even if it was the wind, lived-long, procreated, etc., etc. I think scientifically, this fits somehow, somewhere in there with Darwin's theory of evolution. I could be mistaken and that wouldn't be the first time!

One interesting chapter had to do with politics. Shermer went to considerable lengths to explain through science, neurology and the make up of the human brain (is that physiology or biology? -- as you can see this is way above my pay grade) why we, today in America often say of the "other" political side, "Why don't they get it?"

I won't spoil it for you... you'll have to get the book and read it.

Back to some of the lessons I try to foist upon those who will listen to me.

Regardless of whatever side of the, for example, political spectrum you are on, you owe it to yourself to listen to the other side. In other words, if you are a Democrat, watch Fox News; if you're a Republican, listen to NPR.

What are they telling themselves, what facts do they bring, how are they shoring up their beliefs?

Challenge yourself. Grow.

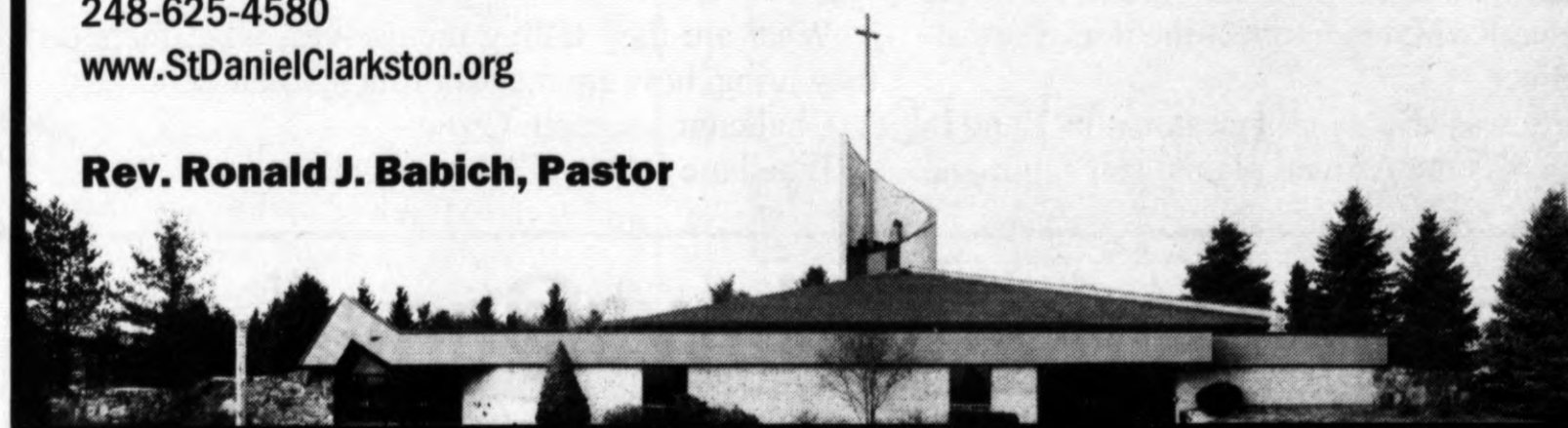

Springfield Township man arraigned on child porn charges

Timothy James Holbert, 31, has been arraigned in United States District Court in Detroit on one count of Receipt of Child Pornography and one count of Possession of Child Pornography.

Oakland County Sheriff's Office deputies and agents from the FBI Oakland County Resident Agency executed a federal arrest warrant on the Springfield Township man for possessing over 8,000 images of child pornography, July 14.

The investigation began in August of 2014 when a witness viewed the suspect viewing child pornography on a computer. A search warrant was conducted and subsequently, a forensic evaluation on the items found was conducted by the Oakland County Sheriff's Office Computer Crimes Unit. During the forensic examination, over 8,000 child pornographic images were discovered.

"Individuals that prey on children and participate in supporting the sexual abuse of minors will not be tolerated," said Sheriff Michael J. Bouchard. "I applaud my investigators and the FBI agents who conducted diligent work to bring this child predator to justice."

Holbert faces a minimum of five years in Federal Prison for these charges.

Asselin.

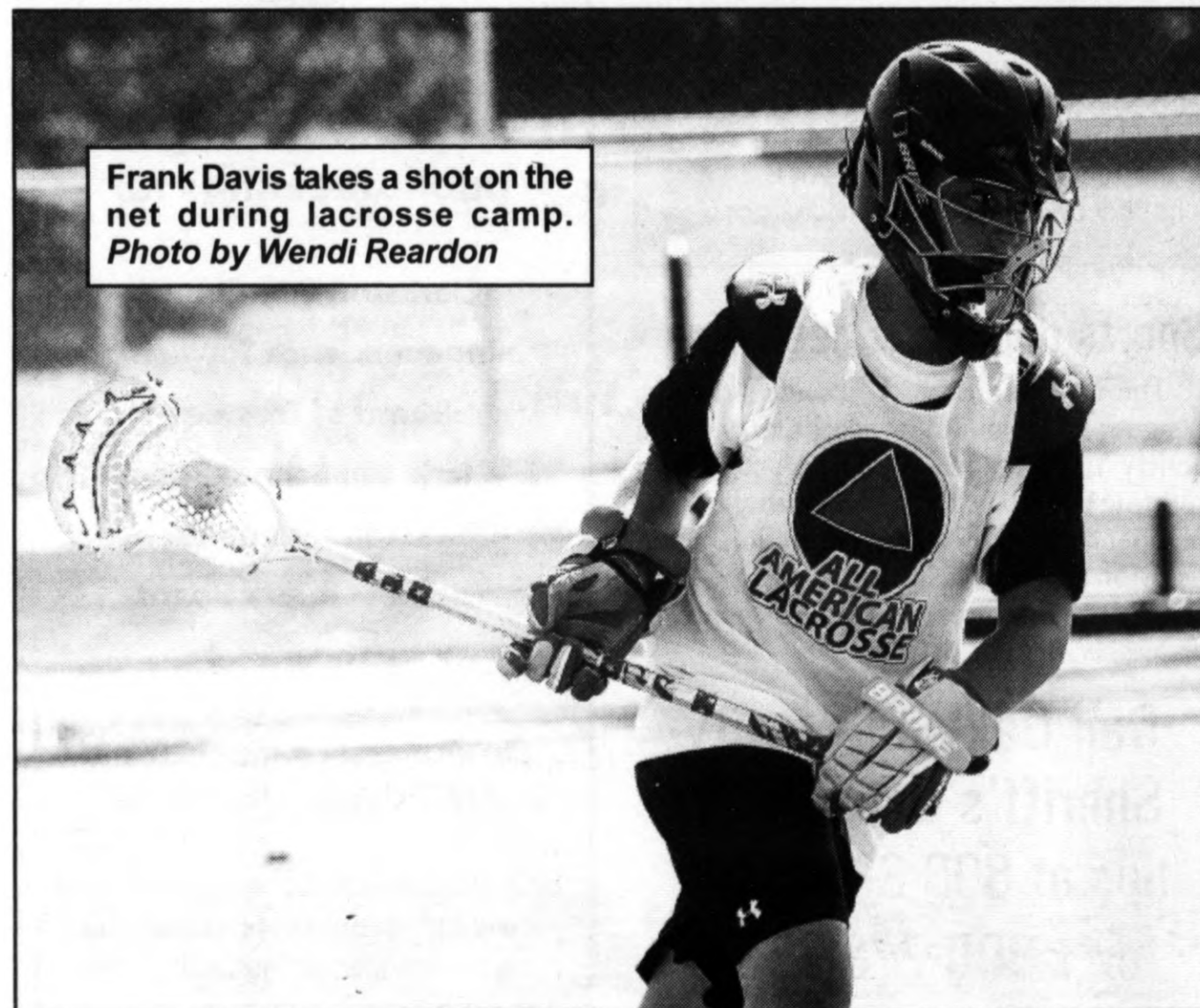
Kaminskas added it was fun to watch their progression from the first day of camp to the final day.

For the week, he batted .400 with an on-base percentage of .667. He also played error-less defense whether he was in the catcher position or playing infield.

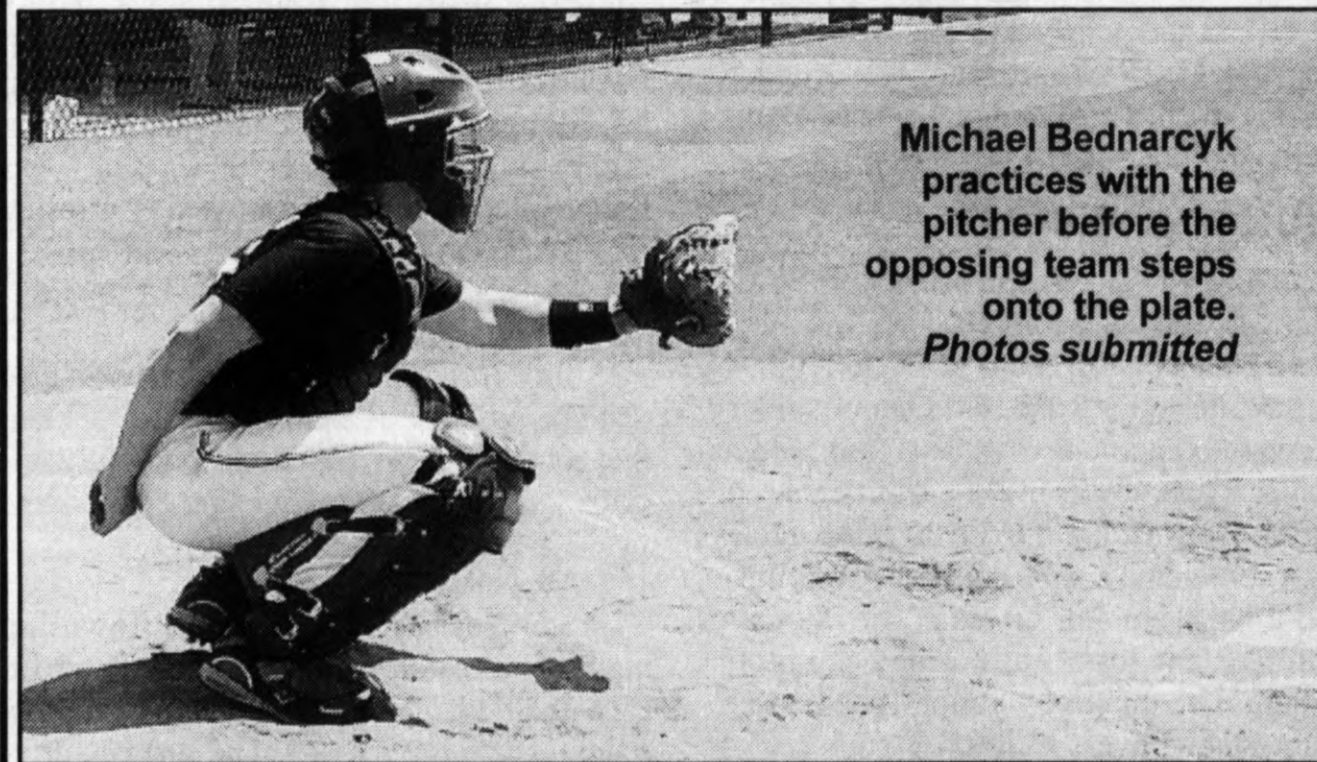
Michael and his teammates competed against teams from Chicago, Vermont, Maryland and Oshawa, Ont.

Michael explained to *The Clarkston News* last year, baseball is a fun sport.

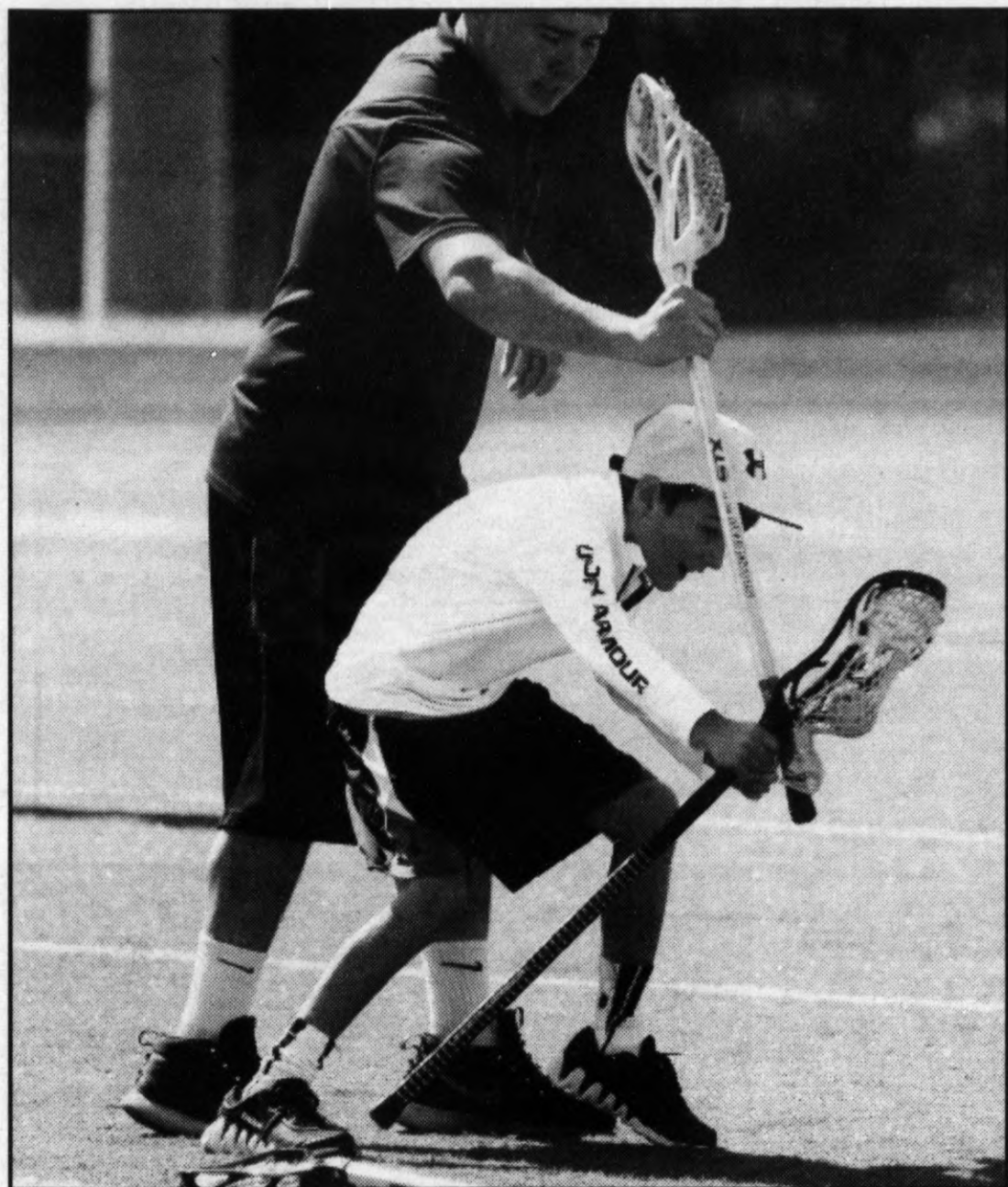

A. A military burial is a right and a privilege offered to all veterans of any branch of the U.S. armed services-Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard, and Merchant Marines. The only requirement is that they were serving honorably at the time of their death or had been granted an honorable discharge. Collect all the records you have on your veteran's military service and then bring them when we plan the service. If there are any missing records, I will work with the Veteran's Administration to obtain them.

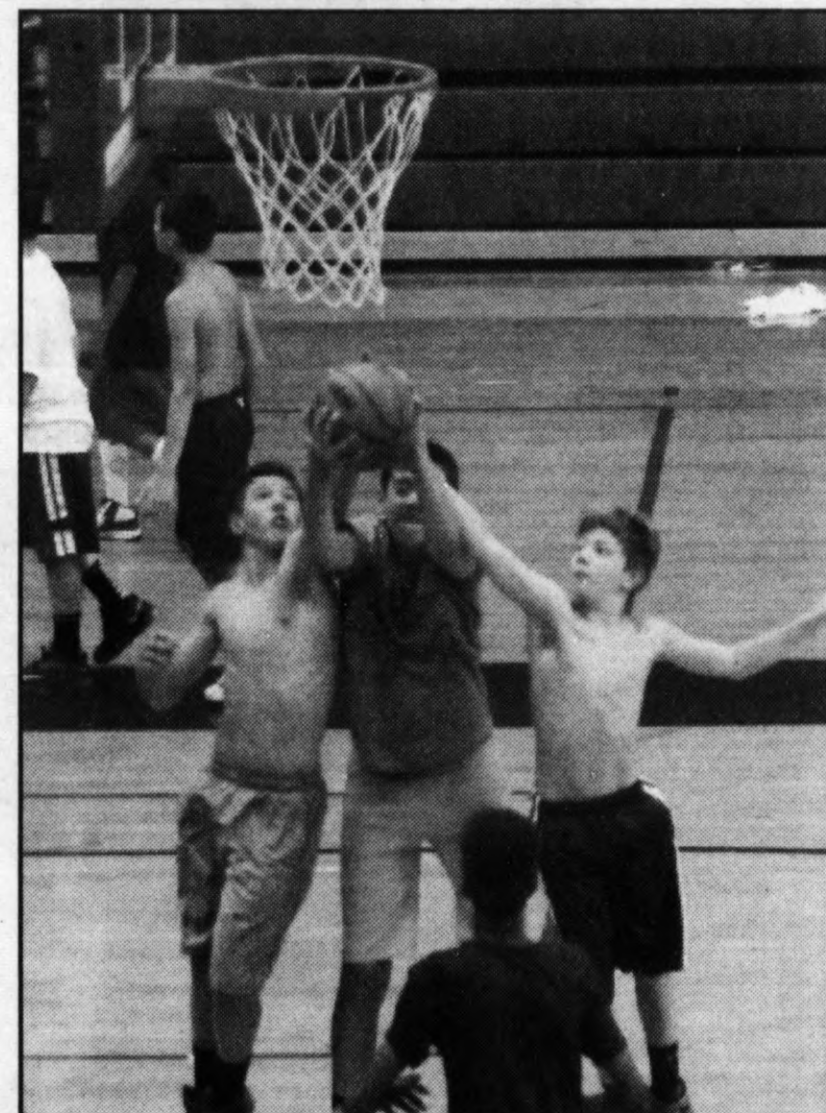
It was an exciting day for Cagers last Thursday at Fife Basketball Camp.

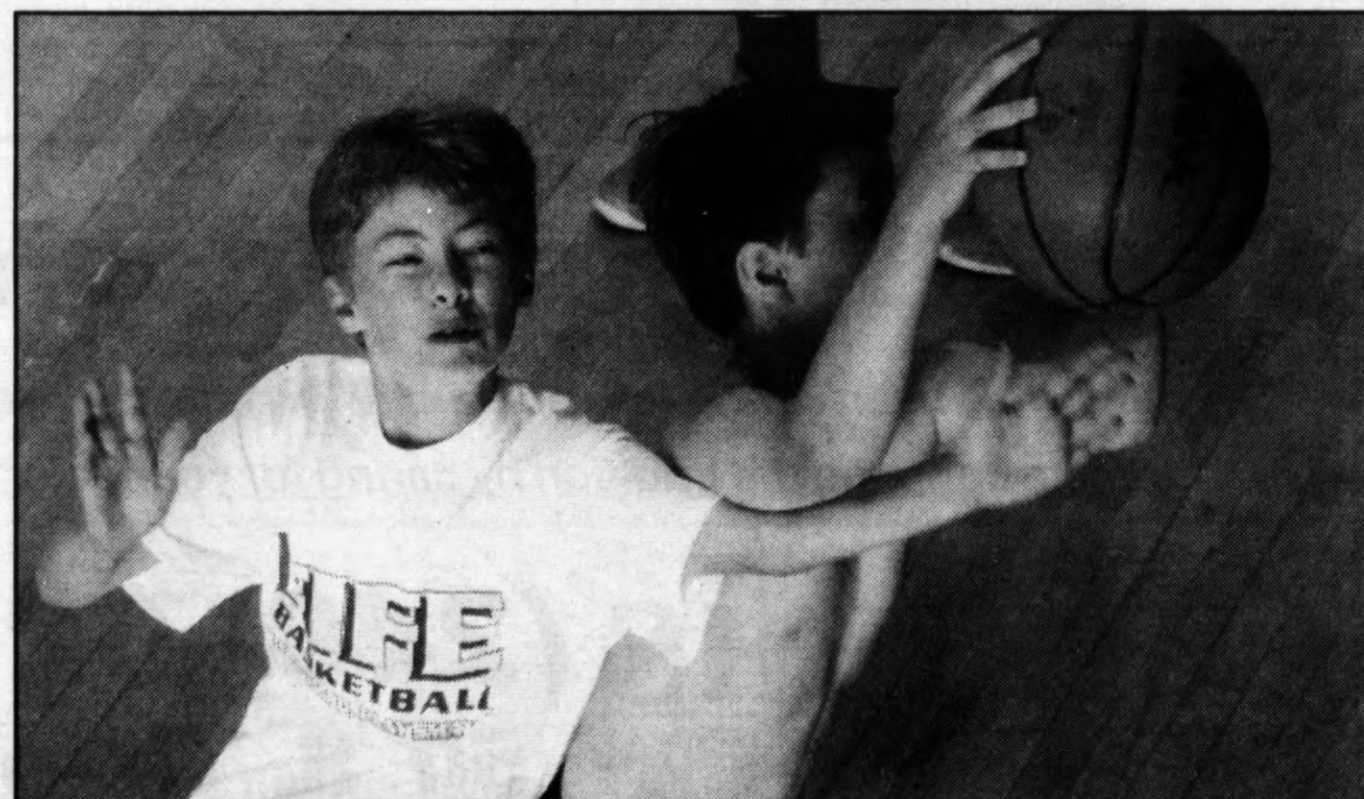
As for the final game for the five versus five, Matthew Nicholson broke the tie at the buzzer for the championship win off a pass from teammate Fletcher Loyer.

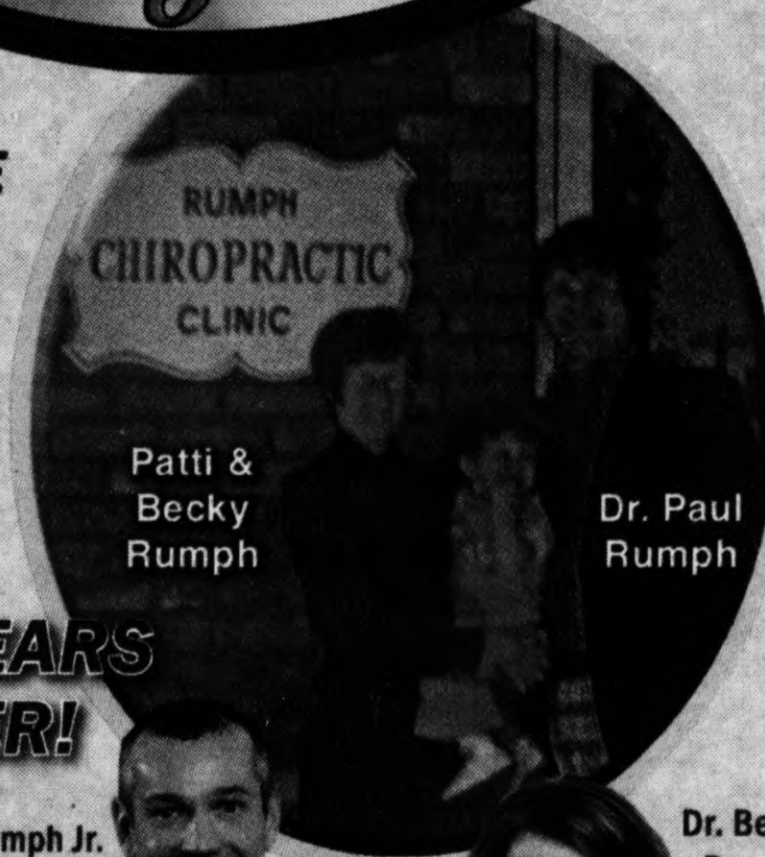

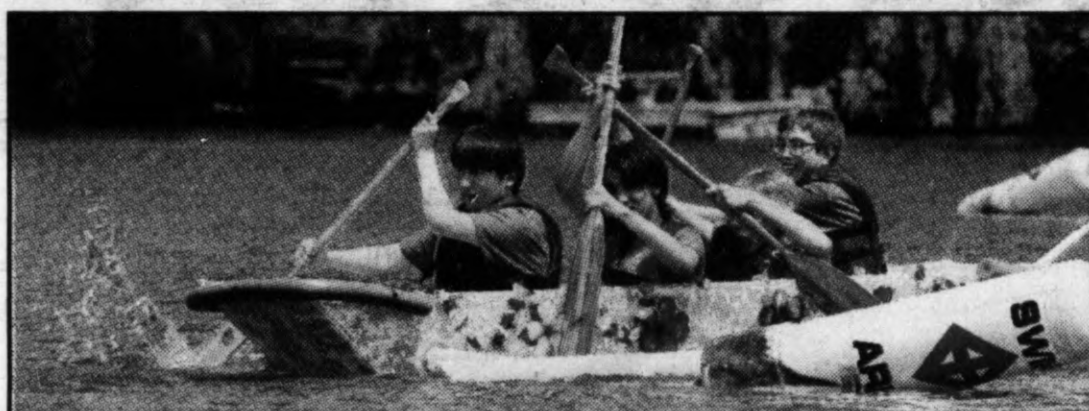
Learning on lake

Team 6 won the Enterprising and Seaworthy Sailors award, and the Cash Crusaders for this year's regatta were Team 4.

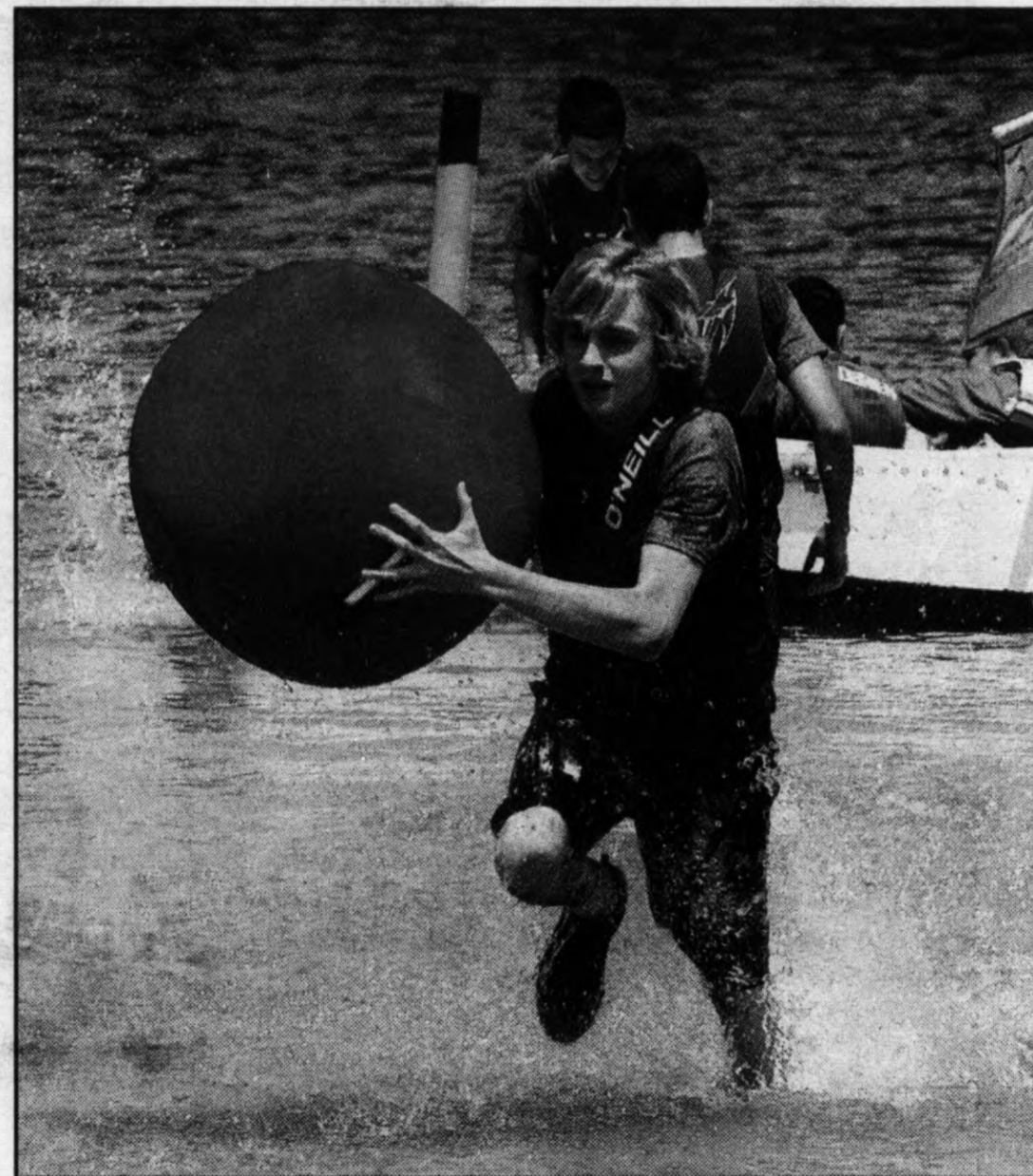

Treatment Courts in Macomb County be-

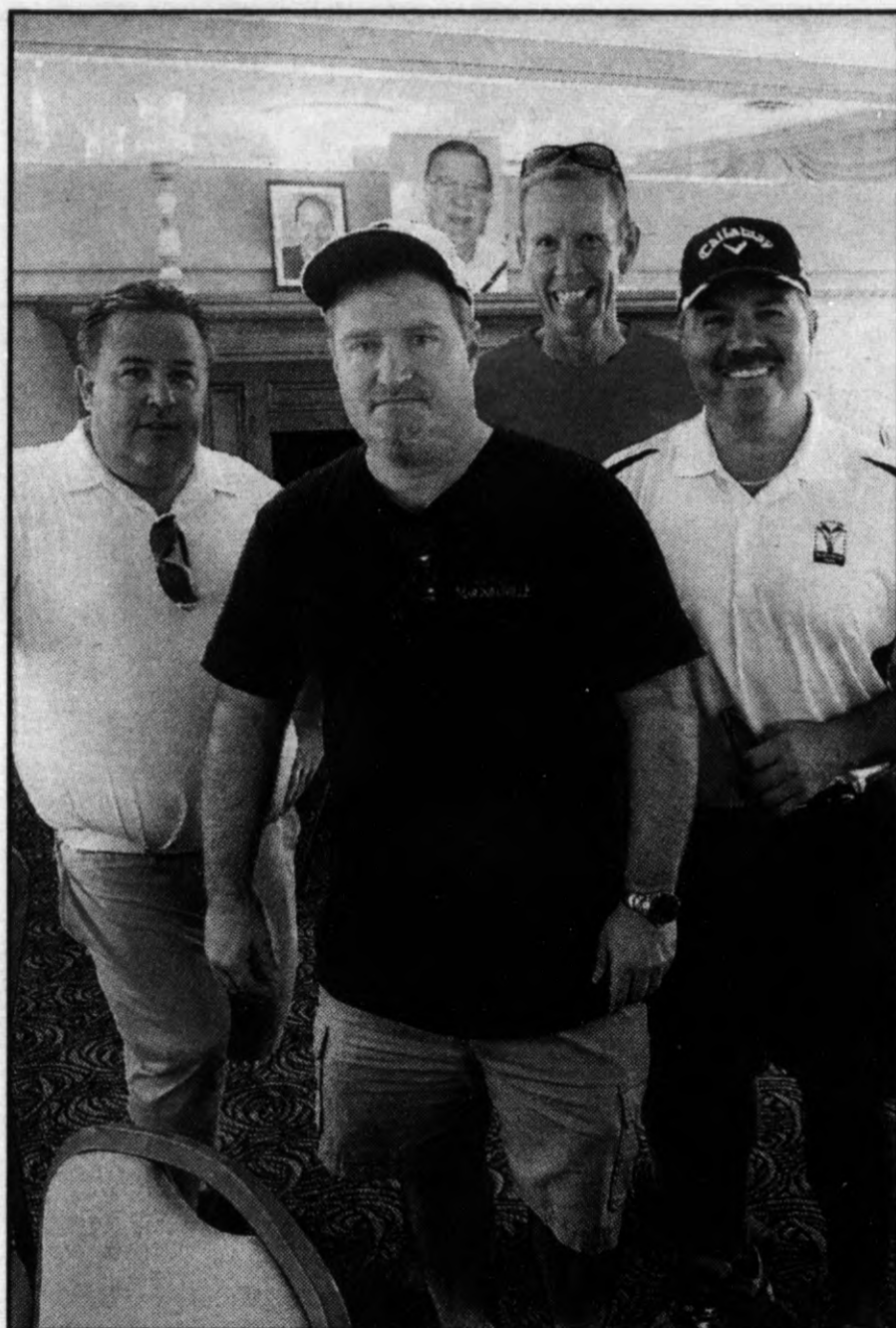
gan in 2012, followed by Oakland County in 2013. Treatment Courts seek to address the underlying issues of veterans in the criminal justice system.

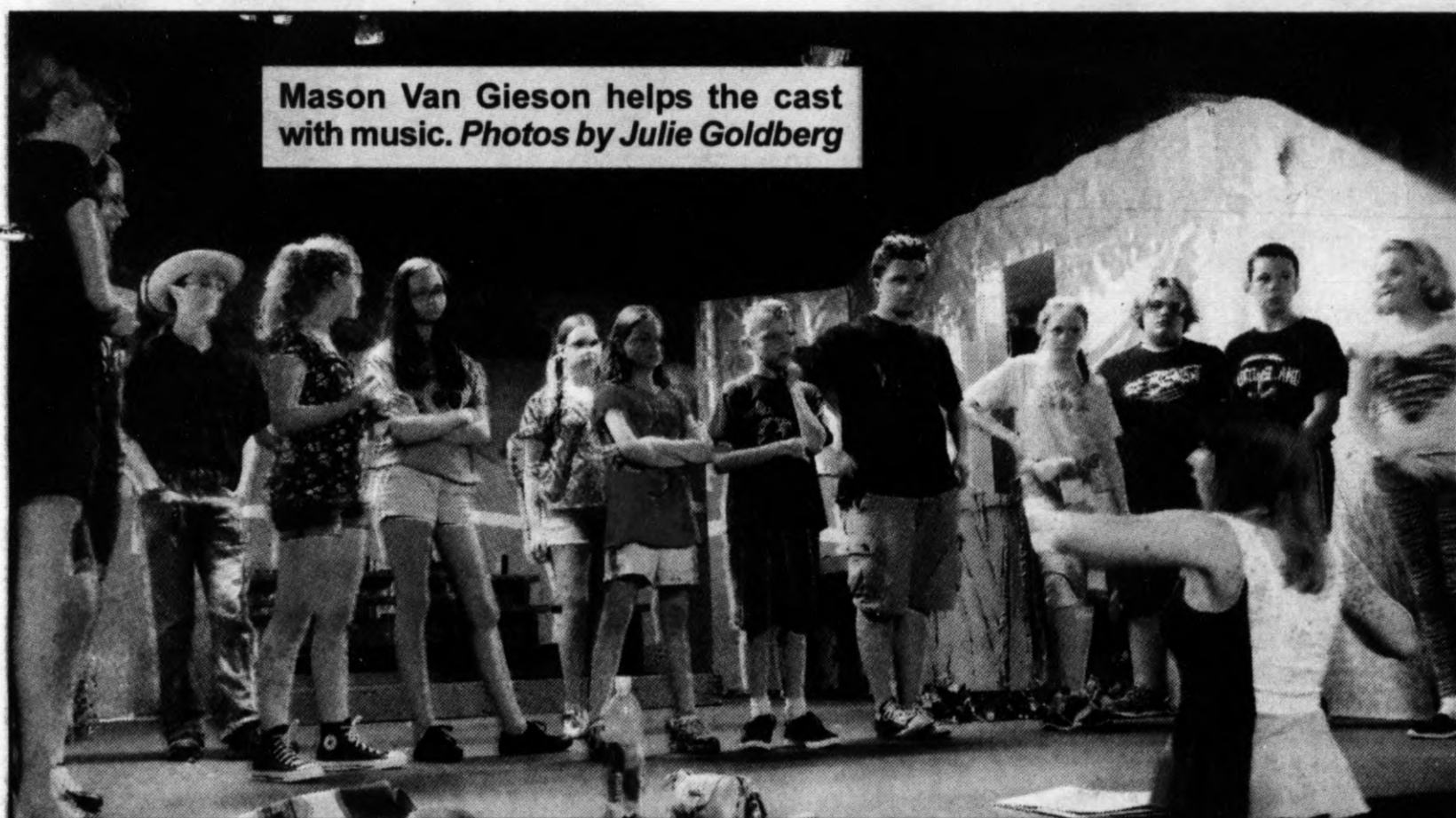
