Township considers road millage

Independence Township wants to know if residents are willing to pay for local roads after the Proposal 1 sales tax increase failed in May.

At a July 21 meeting, the Board of Trustees approved a request by Supervisor Pat Kittle to look into alternative options to pay for road repair.

"The condition of the township

roadway infrastructure is continuing to deteriorate," said Kittle.

"Virtually all of the five primary township roadways identified by the Road Commission for Oakland County have gone downhill quickly over the past few years."

The roads, Maybee, Clarkston, Clintonville, Sashabaw, and Waldon, have gone from "green" and "yellow," meaning "good" and "fair," to "red," meaning "poor," in the county report.

After Proposal 1 failed, the supervisor received numerous calls asking what the township was going to do with local roads.

In recent *Independence Township Times* sections of *The Clarkston News*, Kittle asked readers if they would support a two mil special road millage only to be used to mill and repave 25 miles of primary roads in the township. Kittle received 23 replies – 16 were in favor.

Family most important for vet

Charles Louis James of Independence Township turned 92 this month, so his neighbors threw him a birthday party.

"He is such a personable guy to everybody," said neighbor Sheila Denne. "He has been walking all over the neighborhood for years. Everyone knows him, so we decided to have a block party."

The local Kroger's store on Sashabaw donated flowers, and about 35 people attended the World War II veteran's party, July 12, including 5-6 fellow vets.

"We had a nice party, a really nice thing," James said. "They're very good friends – there were so many friends there I forgot I had."

"It turned out really good," Denne said.

James has lived in Independence Township for more than 60 years, raising his family on Oak Park Drive off Maybee Road.

Born in Lawrenceville, Illinois, he was too young to be drafted when the United States entered World War II in 1941, so he joined the Civilian Conservation Corps and worked at camps around Lake Superior.

A couple years later at the age of 19, he was drafted into the U.S. Army and sent for training at Army Air Corps bases in Mississippi, North Carolina, and Colorado.

He was a left gunner on a B-29 Superfortress bomber, called "City of Omaha."

"The B-29 was the largest bomber in the world at the time," he said.







Mizlow memorial fund awards \$10,000

Thanks to a game of golf and dinner, the Jacqui Milzow Memorial Scholarship Foundation gave away \$10,000 this year to help two organizations.

Checks to SCAMP and The Links were presented by Forrest Mizlow after a day of golfing at Pine Knob Golf Course on Monday, July 20.

During a dinner ceremony that evening at Deer Lake Athletic Club, present owner and Jacqui Mizlow's son, Forrest Mizlow presented two checks for \$5,000 each to Clarkston SCAMP and Oakland County Chapter of The Links, Incorporated.

SCAMP is a five-week long special camp for kids and adults with developmental disabilities held each summer.

Wendi Clufetos, attended dinner to ac-

cept the check on behalf of SCAMP, said Mizlow is extremely supportive of SCAMP.

"He buys them lunch and opens up Deer Lake Athletic Club to let the kids come in and swim at no charge," she said. "There is so much Forrest has done. He donates memberships, he also started our Jingle Mingle annual fundraising event and opened up his own home for it."

Clufetos added it keeps a lot to fund SCAMP, \$450,000 each year. Another check was also presented to The Links representa-

tive Laurestine Hatchett. The Links, first founded in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1946 is a volunteer service organization of nearly 14,000 professional women of color. The organization is committed to enriching, sustaining and ensuring the cultural and economic survival of African Americans and other persons of African ancestry.

Jacqui Milzow, a doctor, owned and operated Deer Lake Athletic Club in Clarkston from 1973 until her passing in 2004. She taught for 29 years in the Pontiac school district, teaching special education and developing curriculum. The scholarship fund was created in her memory in 2004.



Briefly

6 candidates for city council

Candidates for Clarkston City Council include incumbents Eric Haven and David Marsh, both running for two-year terms. Challengers Michael Cascone and Jason Kneisc also submitted petitions for two-year terms.

Alfred Avery, who was appointed to council after the resignation of Richard Bisio, will run against former councilwoman Peggy Roth for a one-year term on the council.

Current councilman Eric Hunter said he will not run for reelection.

The election will be on Nov. 3.

City to review downtown parking

Responding to residents' complaints about how development proposals would affect parking, Clarkston City Council approved the request by City Manager Carol Eberhardt to study the issue.

Clarkston Zoning Ordinance Section 20-8 require businesses to provide parking spaces based on square footage, including: sit-down restaurants with liquor license, 20 spaces per 1,000 square feet or 0.6 per seat, whichever is greater; medical/dental office/clinic, seven spaces per 1,000-square-foot gross floor area, plus one for each examining room, dental chair, or similar use area; and general retail business under 10,000 square feet, three spaces per 1,000 square feet.

Sewer rates going up

Sewer rates in Independence Township are set to increase 9.7 percent.

The increase will offset a monthly increase of more than \$230,000 to the township for sewer services through the Clinton-Oakland Sewage Disposal System. The 9.7 percent rate increase is effective through June 2016, said new DPW Director David McKee.

New sewage disposal rates on the average residential sewer bill will increase \$6.21, from \$69.37 to \$75.58. The maintenance charge of \$28 included on each bill will remain the same.

"This special road millage would sun-down after four years. The cost per mile to mill and repave, which was done on M-15, was estimated at \$500,000 per mile," Kittle said. "To do the same type of work on about 25 miles of primary roadway in the township would cost around \$12.5 million."

A two mill special road tax would collect \$3.1 million annually, or an estimated \$12.5 million for the repairs.

To move forward with the concept and ask voters to approve a local road millage, Kittle will explore various RCOC services, including road rehabilitation projects, meet county representatives to discuss local road millages, grants, and cost sharing opportunities, and other types of partnerships between the county and township.

Kittle will also invite the road commission director to address the board regarding the condition of township roads in the future.

A survey to solicit additional input from citizens regarding the concept as well as a citizens advisory committee and appointees will be discussed at a future meeting. Preliminary work also includes costs and ballot language. The supervisor hopes to have a ballot proposal ready for the November 2016 election.

"Its original name was 'Yankee Doll'ah' – they changed all the names to towns."

He was based in Guam, and flew in about 20 bombing missions over Japan, dropping 500-pound bombs on ammunition and airplane factories and other targets.

"The pilot came in one evening and said, 'they dropped an atomic bomb.' I said, 'What's an atomic bomb?' We didn't know what it was," James said. "He said, 'I don't really know what it is.' The second bomb, everybody knew. That one clinched it."

Japan surrendered on Sept. 2, 1945, after specially modified B-29s dropped atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. James was there, flying in City of Omaha over the USS Missouri, where the surrender signing took place.

"We were one of the ones who did a flyover," he said. "They told us, don't try anything funny."

They were sent home after three months. "We had to clean the island up," he said. "When we reached the Golden Gate Bridge, we were tickled to death. We knew we were back in the states. When I reached St. Louis, I knew I was home."

He earned several medals for his service, including two Bronze Stars, but what was important to him was coming home to his wife, Imogene, to whom he was wed just before shipping out.

With an aunt living in Michigan, they moved to Clarkston in 1950. They were on Dixie Highway looking at properties when Imogene noticed the Ottawa Cemetery at Maybee Road.

"She said, 'turn in here, let's see what things look like,'" James said.

All empty lots and dirt roads at the time, they bought two-and-a-half acres, built a house, and raised their daughter, Susan K. James.

"We had nothing going for us. We took whatever jobs we could get," said James, who now has two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren

James owned and operated Pontiac Overhead Door Company and his wife had an antique business.

Imogene passed away 15 years ago.

"She kept me alive during the war. She was my true love. I loved her so much," Charles said. "I walked to Maybee Road to the cemetery everyday for 12 years, usually crying all the way."

He stopped the walks after a fall a few years ago, breaking both shoulders.

"I can't walk very far now – I'm not looking for sympathy," he said.

He still has her red Pontiac Bonneville, which he bought for his wife in 1971.

"It has a bench seat so Susan could ride up front," Charles said. "I've had it now all these years."

Bored into introspection

So, I took off a week from work last week -- one of about nine or 10 single weeks I have taken off in the last 30 years. I had no plans other than to work on This Crappy Old House. I thought I could patch stucco on the outside of the 99-year-old home.

I soon discovered on Day One of vacation that job was above my pay grade. Damn! Norm Abrams where were you when I needed you?! I contemplated going back to work, but soon discovered maybe, oh just maybe, I could use my time off to relax. For whatever reason, I wasn't able to connect with anybody so the week was to be alone with just Me, Myself and I. Let me tell you, I can hang with Me, but Myself and I are tough cookies. They ask hard questions!

During my seven-day odyssey of the mind, heart and soul I spent about two hours (total) in the company of other, living, breathing human beings -- which included trips to the library, hardware and grocery stores and a hour trip to visit my aunt who was in the hospital.

I went and visited my Dad at the same place he's been since 1996 -- taking the long dirt nap at the little cemetery on Sashabaw Road, across from Sashabaw Elementary School.

"Dad," says I, eyes getting a little squishy. "What do you have for me? Why do I do the things I do? What am I to do? Got any help? I hope you're in peace -- oh and a friend of mine, she says you're a badass."

I stood over his grave a little bit, bent over, picked some weeds and brushed the small bronze U.S. military marker with my fingers. He answered me not.

I wandered among the tombstones, reading the inscriptions, some from as far back as the 1850s. Most of the folks planted there all lived, laughed, loved, cried

and endured hardship during their time on this side of the sod.

It was awesome weather last week, the sun shone brightly in a blue sky. And, I just opened up and let thoughts come and go with no real direction or focus. I reckon I've always been a contemplator -- a seeker for what? Something, I don't know?

When I worked for Independence Township at Lakeview Cemetery, I was given a new nickname (I think by co-worker Jon Territo) for what reason I am not sure. They called me Dhondi and when they would say it, sometimes they would hold out both hands, thumb to middle finger, "OOOmmm."

I have been a sucker for helping people since before I was old enough to drive. I remember when I had my daily paper route, when I was about 12 or 13, the first part of said route was loaded with old-timers. The second half with families.

The second-half folks got their papers way late many times because I felt compelled to stop and listen to the old codgers and then either rake their leaves or shovel their drive -- I even helped Mr. Bassett replace the anti-freeze in his car one evening.

I studied journalism in college and had a burning desire, once graduated, to root out corruption, take on the bad guys, to right wrongs and fix that which was broken. Ah, the idealism of the youth.

I think I have stayed with community journalism so long because I have seen how these newspapers have a direct effect on the communities and people they serve. I felt/feel I could/can do the most good, if I stayed here.

Babies, kids, old timers and fair maidens always have found a direct way into my sense of duty. I wanna help them all, even when I know I cannot and when I cannot, it takes a little skip out of my step, a spark outta my light.

Why do I do what I do? Why am I who I am? Yeah, you can see the week alone started to work on me in

ways I hadn't dared think about for many, many years.

* * *

Sometime during the week, I thought back to Dad. A couple of years before he died, I had written a feature series on sexual abuse of kids. We were at the Clarkston Eagles and he was not sitting at "his" stool at the bar, but rather in a chair at a table in the dark. He beckoned me over to him and with a somber look on his face, he told me he liked those stories. Thought it would help some people. And, that it had happened to him as a boy. "I have told no one else. Thank you, Son."

Those who knew Dad, knew he was full of passion, smiles, but most of all bravado. It served him well in athletics, Korea and throughout his adult life. What he told me explained a lot about the man I knew, loved and respected. I think I loved him more after that, enduring and being the best he could be, while carrying a burden he thought he couldn't share; one no person should have to bare alone.

If only he could have felt safe and secure in himself to reach out and ask somebody for help, would he have lived his life happier? Would he have lived longer than 61 years? (I just thought this as I am typing this column on Monday, July 27, 2015. Dad died July 27, 19 years ago today . . . Whoa, how's that for coincidence!)

Maybe Dad did answer me.

Maybe he said, accept who you are. When you need help, ask those about you whose arms are lovingly open to you. Fix what you break, but know it's hard to fix what you have not broken. A knight of the light goes into battle for no other reason than it's the right thing to do, expecting only to come out of the battle, bloodied and bruised. Anything more is a bonus. If you can do this, Son, you will be all right.

Reckon I will remain me. Bring your problems and your acts of kindness rekindles the flame.




ICE Fastpitch Blue 10U finished their

Is God a grouch?

I love the classic story that C.S. Lewis tells of a young boy playing in a mud puddle.

Imagine this boy who has never been to the beach. He's playing in a mud puddle. There's the mud and there's the water. He's playing with his cars and trucks in a dirty little mud puddle.

As his parent, you come up to him, and you say, "We're going to the beach."

He has never seen the beach. He says, "I can't go to the beach. I'm having too much fun here."

You sit down. What can you say to your child? All you can say is, "You have to trust me. The beach is so much better than this mud puddle! The fun you're trying to find in this mud puddle is nothing compared to the beach! You have to trust me. Come on! Let's go to the beach!"

Your son doesn't understand. He just thinks you are a grouch. Your son doesn't trust you or believe you. So he throws a fit because he wants to keep playing in the mud puddle.

You and I are like little kids. We like our mud puddles. We like our sins. Sexual sins. Gossiping sins. Ego sins. We find a certain fun and satisfaction when we play in those mud puddles.

Our Father says, "I have so much more for you than this mud puddle. I love you! I want you to trust me! Come on! Let me take you to the beach!"

When you and I sin, we are basically saying, "God, I don't trust you. I like this mud puddle and I choose this over you."

When you and I sin, we are basically saying, "God, I think you are a grouch. I don't think you really want what's best for me. So let me alone. Let me play in my mud puddle."

Do you realize that God is a good and beautiful parent? He wants to get you out of your mud puddles and to the beach.

Jesus said, "If you keep my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commands and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. (John 15:10-11)

Notice the connections. Loving God is not a reason to disobey him. Rather, if we love God, we will keep his commands. If we keep his commands, we will experience more joy. Do you see how that flows? Love leads to obedience. Obedience leads to joy.

So the next time you're tempted to sin, say, "God created me for more than this mud puddle! He's taking me to the beach! I trust him. He's no grouch. He has something better for me than this mud puddle."

Planners say 'no' to restaurant

Plans for a new restaurant at 59 S. Main Street will move forward without the recommendation of the Clarkston Planning Commission.

Planners voted 4-1 against the conditional rezoning request at its Aug. 3 meeting.

Commission members said they want to preserve a "buffer" between downtown Main Street businesses and residences to the south. The 59 S. Main property, the Sutherland Building, is currently zoned Village Multiple and used for apartments.

Robert Bondy voted in favor of conditional rezoning to Village Commercial.

"Do we want government to legislate where and how people make money – I do

not believe that is the case," Bondy said. "Government stops people from making money in a lot of ways – minimizing that is a good thing."

Builder Jeff Harrell, representing the owners, said they will present the plan to Clarkston City Council, which has the final vote on it.

"I wish the vote would have gone differently, but it didn't," Harrell said after the meeting. "We think it would fit in nicely with the rest of the community."

On March 2, the planning commission voted unanimously to recommend rezoning from Multi-family Residential to Village Commercial.

City Council tabled the request on March 9. The council referred the issue

New Dixie plan calls for rentals

Developers have a new plan for the east side of Dixie Highway at Deerhill Drive, calling for higher density and a change in use for the 26-acre parcel of land.

Developer Michael Furnari is requesting 92 rental units, up from 69 in his previous plan. The 69 units in the original plans were for individual homes, and would not have been rental units.

Neighbors remain concerned about the development.

"There will be a dramatic increase in traffic without any pre-emptive addressing of current traffic issues on Deerhill Drive," said Independence Township resident Chelsea O'Brien. "There is no guarantee residents in the rentals will be an older population like originally planned."

Another concern is what will happen when 26 acres of land are cleared, she said.

"The lack of environmental impact studies of Deer Lake Watershed, of which the proposed development is a part," she said. "Please seriously consider the long term impact on Deer Lake Farms, Deer Lake property owners, the Knolls community, Independence Elementary School community and others in the immediate vicinity of what will, if approved without changes, become a highly dense transient community."

Furnari is slated to appear on Aug. 13 before the Independence Township Planning Commission on the plan, submitted in April. His original development plan was submitted in 2014.

If recommended for approval by the Planning Commission, the plan would go to the township Board of Trustees for final approval.



Briefly

Election costs increase

Independence Township increased spending on elections in 2016 by 154.8 percent, over \$102,000, from the 2015 season.

Labor increases accounted for about \$38,000 of the increase. Other large increases were for equipment, health care, postage and printing and publishing. So far, three elections are scheduled for 2016, and three scheduled for both 2017 and 2018.

back to the Planning Commission for conditional rezoning, to limit property development to restaurant use.

Commission member Mike Sabol said he changed his vote on the issue after he learned residences south of 59 S. Main Street were once used for businesses.

"If there's not a buffer, we could see rezoning requests coming from them – dominos could start falling," he said after the meeting.

Developer Larry Barnett said he didn't think they were treated fairly, especially with two restaurant plans moving forward at Union Joint properties across the street.

"We filed before both of those," Barnett said at the meeting. "We followed the requests of the city planner as per contract zoning – we think it's appropriate for rezoning."

Sharron Catallo, city council member and mother of Union Joints owner Curt Catallo, said the Sutherland building should remain residential.

"At this moment, it's back where it should have been," Catallo said, speaking as a member of the audience.

Another restaurant has been proposed for the former Clarkston State Bank property at 51 S. Main Street.

Commissioners and residents in attendance also discussed downtown parking – the 59 S. Main Street plan includes 31 parking spaces.

"I recommend we hold off on any rezoning until we can get clearcut enforcement of parking – some type of fee to businesses, a trolley or something to get people in and out of here," said Commissioner Frank Schoebel.

Bondy said parking was not relevant to the rezoning request.

"Parking would be in the site plan portion, not the rezoning portion," he said.

Roof seating OK'd

Clarkston City Council approved rooftop seating for a new Union Joints restaurant at its meeting, July 27.

The restaurant still needs final approvals by Clarkston Historic District Commission and city council.

At the meeting, Curt Catallo of Union Joints showed plans for Hancho's Mexican Cantina.

"Rooftop seating will give people a great view of Clarkston," Catallo said. "It differentiates us from restaurant chains."

The proposed restaurant at Main and Church streets received preliminary approval from city council on June 22 with seating up to 138, with 20 seats on the roof.

Catallo is planning two new restaurants, one at 28 S. Main and another directly behind it at 3 E. Church. The Church Street building presently houses the city DPW and 28 S. Main has housed Morgan's, which is moving to the corner of Clarkston Road and Main Street, for decades.

Buildings would connect in the future via a breezeway.

According to city ordinance, new buildings or those changed or expanded are to provide parking. If located in the city Parking Deferment Zone, however, they can pay the city in lieu of spaces.

The zone is listed in the city Off Street Parking and Loading Ordinance as encompassing the business district from just north of Washington Street to Waldon Road.

Washington Management owner Bob Roth said parking rules are not being enforced.

"Are we just going to keep approving everything without addressing parking," asked Roth, who owns the Clarkston Mills building and its parking lots along with business partner Ed Adler. "When the old Clarkston State Bank building opens, are we just going to say we have enough parking?"

City Councilman Mike Sabol said city administration is in charge of enforcement.

"I'm confused - we discussed parking deferment," Sabol said. "This is all part of everything we have been doing up here since June 1."

Catallo said he understands parking concerns.

"Parking is a valuable conversation to have," he said.

Catallo said his plans follow city ordinance.

The city council has referred the parking issue to the Streets, Sidewalks, and Parking Committee.

The committee will look into commissioning a parking study, a process which will take less than six months, said Sabol.





15 years ago - 2000

"Thumbs up for library" A giant hurdle was cleared when more than 2,000 Independence Township voters approved a three-quarter-mill levy for four years to operate the upcoming library expansion.

"Condos get final approval" A new 56-unit site condominium project was in the works for the northwest corner of Ortonville and Cranberry Lake Roads. The Independence Township Planning Commission voted 6-1 to approve the final site for Brookstone.

"Performances keep three CHS graduates on their toes" Rebecca Abdo, Matt Oliver and Mark Young, 1990 Clarkston High School graduates, performed in a song and dance group while earning money for college in the fall. By the end of the touring season they gave 45 performances, with the last one in Traverse City at the Freedom Festival.

50 years ago - 1965

"Independence women prepare for UF campaign" Independence Township women were busy with preparation for the United Fund campaign.

"Greyhound busses to serve Clarkston area" Peter B. Spivak, Chairman of the State Public Service Commission, said Greyhound bus lines were given authorization to use three new routes and one would run on I-75, through Clarkston.

"Beach phone damaged and coins taken" An emergency phone on Deer Lake Beach was damaged and the money was stolen.

Teen driver takes too many risks

Don't Rush Me

"Everyone, I just spoke with the father who is very responsive to the concerns and he had already seen the FaceBook posts. He has already taken the vehicle from the son and he sounds like he is all over parental control of the 16-year-old. The vehicle actually has electronics which allows him to see all driving data like a Fed-Ex truck," wrote Toth.

Most of the folks who commented on the original post were positive in their commentaries -- they were glad I got involved.

Some said they had seen the same car doing similar maneuvers on other local roads. Some readers thought I had gone too far, that I should have only contacted the police and not publicly embarrassed the 16-year-old.

I see their point, and once the father was contacted and talked to, I did take the post down. What do you think?

* * *

I hopped on the old information highway and found myself reading information from the Centers for Disease Control. Here's what I found.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teenagers. How big is the problem? According the CDC, "In 2011, about 2,650 teens in the United States, aged 16-19, were killed and almost 292,000 were treated in emergency departments for injuries suffered in motor-vehicle crashes. That means that seven teens (aged 16 to 19) died every day from motor vehicle injuries."

Further more, "Young people ages 15-24 represent only 14% of the U.S. population. However, they account for 30% (\$19 billion) of the total costs of motor

vehicle injuries among males and 28% (\$7 billion) of the total costs of motor vehicle injuries among females."

Who is most at risk? The CDC site reports, "The risk of motor vehicle crashes is higher among 16- to 19-year-olds than among any other age group. In fact, per mile driven, teen drivers ages 16 to 19 are nearly three times more likely than drivers aged 20 and older to be in a fatal crash.

Among teen drivers, those at especially high risk for motor vehicle crashes are: Males: In 2011, the motor vehicle death rate for male drivers and passengers ages 16 to 19 was almost two times that of their female counterparts.

And, finally from the CDC, what factors put teen drivers at risk?

Teens are more likely than older drivers to underestimate dangerous situations or not be able to recognize hazardous situations.

Teens are more likely to speed and allow shorter headways (the distance from the front of one vehicle to the front of the next). The presence of male teenage passengers increases the likelihood of this risky driving behavior.

Among male drivers between 15 and 20 years of age who were involved in fatal crashes in 2012, 37% were speeding at the time of the crash and 25% had been drinking.





Nature camp for kids

Local educators Chelsea O'Brien and Chris Hardman are leading Project WILD, a new wildlife-focused conservation education program for students in grades K-12.

The camp, offered through Clarkston Community Education, will include lessons on water cycles, worms and dirt, planting a garden, and other topics.

"This nature camp is something new, and provides a unique experience not just getting kids off their smart phones but inviting a re-engagement in the natural world all around us," O'Brien said. "Our classes are small, but there is still room for campers."

Learning about the outdoors makes the camp special, she said.

"Independence Township is very much about their sports camps, but my mom used to tell us all summer, 'Go out and play,'" remembered O'Brien. "My brother, sisters and I would spend countless hours making forts, catching frogs and climbing trees."

Parents trying to get their kids out of the house often find it challenging to tear kids away from TV and computer screens.

"It harder than one might think to get kids to simply play outside," O'Brien said.

"Project Wild, not only celebrates outdoor fun, but inspires critical thinking and enhances math, science and language arts skills."

Project Wild is inspired, organized and directed by Independence Elementary's Garden Club and Learning Garden, created and supervised by O'Brien.

O'Brien is a certified Project WILD instructor, directing the camp with Chris Hardman.







There are different breeds of Leader Dogs: black, yellow, and chocolate Labradors, golden retrievers, and German Shepherds. Puppy raisers get to choose what breed and sex they want to raise.

The puppies are about seven weeks old when they arrive at Leader Dog, then they go to a puppy foster home until they are a year old. The puppies then go back to Leader Dog to work with trainers until they are one and a half to three years old.

Puppy raisers have to follow requirements

and take the puppy to certain places so they can learn how to socialize with people.

The puppy raiser meets with a puppy counselor once a month. The puppy counselor will support and guide the puppy raiser and make sure that everything is running smoothly.

Puppy raisers are responsible for housebreaking the puppy and teaching good manners. They practice basic obedience commands with the puppy, such as sit, down, stay, heel, and come.

Puppy raisers also socialize the puppies through exposure to many different kinds of people, vehicles, environments, and animals. The puppies learn how to cross the street and think on their own.

Clients receive the puppy when they are a year and a half to three years old.

"A big reward is that you get to meet the clients for around 45-60 minutes when they receive their puppy and hear their stories," said Thompson.

Leader Dogs always need puppy raisers and volunteers.






