City admits error, rolls back millage

City residents are getting a property tax refund after residents pointed out a budgeting mistake.

"It's not our money," agreed Mayor Pro Tem Eric Haven at the June 13 meeting. "We made a commitment. We



need to keep our commitment."

Clarkston City Council voted unanimously to reduce its 2016 operating millage rate from 12.5069 mills to 12.1056 mills. One mill equals \$1 tax for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation, or



one-half market value.

SteveWylie, resident and former council member, told council this year's proposed 12.5069 city operating millage, from which its general fund gets its revenue, is higher than the city promised two years ago.

"I'm giving you a chance to honor the commitment to taxpayers you made in 2014," Wylie said. "The language is crystal clear."

During the 2014 run-up to the Clarkston Independence District Library millage vote, City Council approved a resolution to "reduce its general operating millage levy by 0.691 mills from the level that the city would otherwise have imposed."

The township approved \$50,000 for gravel to supplement county road repairs.

Independence Township Board voted 6-1 to approve the purchase. Trustee David Lohmeier was the lone "no" vote.

"I don't like the condition of our roads, but we don't collect taxes (at the township) to maintain the roads. It's not our responsibility to do the basic maintenance," Lohmeier said. "I know \$50,000 is a lot higher percentage of our budget than it is the road commission's and others. I just don't think *Please seeTownship on page5*

Drug bust after house fire

A 33-year-old Independence Township man was arrested for delivery and manufacture of marijuana after a house fire in the 4900 block of Cecilia Ann Drive, 1:23 a.m., June 9.

Independence Township firefighters were called to extinguish the blaze, which appeared to be accidental and started in the kitchen as a result of a cooking mishap.

While inside, a firefighter found marijuana and a large amount of money in the master bedroom. The evidence was turned over to deputies. The residents, which included the 33-year-old, 36-year-old man, and 4-year-old boy, fled the residence before firefighters arrived.

An OCSO Fire Investigations officer and NET investigator were called to the scene. The 36-year-old was taken to McLaren Hospital in Pontiac for treatment of minor burns. The child was permitted to return home with his grandmother. The investigation continues.


Free park concerts

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

DPW supervisor resigns

Clarkston is in need of a new Department of Public Works supervisor after Jason Miller submitted his resignation.

During the hiring process, the DPW department will have one full-time and a part-time employee.

"The problem is the wage rate is not great – it may take awhile find someone," said City Manager Carol Eberhardt at the June 13 City Council meeting. "I'm going to need someone with same skill sets as Jason."

Miller knew how to get the best deals on supplies and equipment, the city manager said.

"He could find free stuff like you guys wouldn't believe," she said. "Without Jason, we're going to have more in expenses."

Request to move clock

James Schneider, owner of former Clarkston State Bank building at 15 S. Main Street, wants to relocate the Village Clock, which is located in front of the building.

"We'd pay to move it to other side of our property," he told City Council at its June 13 meeting.

Council member Mike Sabol, also a member of the Planning Commission, said a revised site plan may be needed for the property, which is being renovated into a restaurant.

A special meeting of the planning commission could be set to expedite the matter, Sabol said.

The building owners suggested moving the clock off the property to Washington and Main streets, but council members were against that idea.

"I like it in the center of the business district – I would prefer keep it in your area somewhere," Sabol said. Washington and Main would expose the clock more to weather and traffic, said Council member Jason Kneisc. "I like landmarks that are there for a long time," Kneisc said. "Small town charm, I think it's a big part of it. To me, it's part of the building."

Continued from page 1 it's appropriate."

The extra gravel will go towards 4.80 miles of road, which include 1.69 miles of Hadley, .66 miles of Perry Lake, 1.02 miles of Shappie and 1.43 miles of Stickney, Sashabaw to Michigamme.

"You always hate spending township money when it comes to the county taking what's supposed to be their responsibility," said township Supervisor Pat Kittle. "But at the end of the day we got to do something because they don't have enough and our residents deserve better in my opinion." what RCOC would do as the roads get potholes and washboard. Lohmeier was told the roads would get graded.

"They're not going to ignore complaints from residents as they get a lot of dangerous situations," he said. "They're going to go out and grade the road, what they're not going to do is add material which is what we would be paying for here."

"Quite frankly I think we're enabling the wrong behavior by doing that. I think we let the residents continue to push the road commission to do what it's supposed to do, that's where the taxes are collected," Lohmeier continued. "I would feel differently if we collected taxes for this and we've talked about road millages before, the problems with doing those. What we're doing is taking money that was collected for one purpose and subsidizing a much larger budget. You just don't get to the end result you want by covering up the problem." "It's going to take a couple years, when that \$1.2 billion starts to trickle down and get down to the local level," Kittle explained. "I think you're going to see the business model change and you're going to see a lot more cooperative effort being done. I think that will benefit everybody. That's my opinion based on what I'm hearing and reading in the tea-leaves."

Trustee Jose Aliaga asked if the county

The township has used taxpayer money to purchase extra gravel from Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) forthe township's dirt roads for the past several years, Kittle said.

"Our dirt roads are a wreck this time of year, we're not kidding anybody," he said. "Although RCOC increased its 2016 budget in an attempt to repair potholes and grade dirt roads, their efforts are still insufficient to meet the needs of our community."

Lohmeier said he spoke to Steve Printz, contract administrator for RCOC, and asked Kittle didn't disagree with Lohmeier, but believes they will see a change in the RCOC business model when state funding for roads gets passed down. wasn't collecting enough from the state for road repairs.

Trustee Andrea Schroeder said that they weren't.

"I'm sure nobody at this table likes this idea and thinks this is the ideal thing," she said. "But what we're offering to do is actually add material so that it's not just graded, but kept at a higher maintenance standard than just basic maintenance."

Lohmeier said he also believes doing this puts townships in not as good of financial shape as Independence at a disadvantage and "is not exactly fair."

"If I had an extra \$50,000 to spare," he said. "There are a lot better things I can do than buy (gravel)." If recommended for approval by the planners, the proposal would then have to return to city council.

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
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

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


Clarkston High School students Grace Nolan and Alexander Gavulic talk to the middle school students about the writing program.

However, the Detroit Opera House has installed a translation screen above the stage, making it understandable and very enjoyable to the inexperienced opera goer, like me.


I'd hardly entertained the thought of seeing an opera. Ignorance is a great rejector. But when friends asked if I'd like to see Carmen I quickly nodded.

Unicorn fest



The Wolves finished the season with a loss to Rochester Adams in the finals, 6-4.


They started out with a 3-0 lead on the Highlanders with brothers Jack and Joe Kuczmanski bringing in runs.



Millage reduction based on 2014 library resolution

City Manager Carol Eberhardt remembered.

"We said to the citizens, if the library millage passed, we would reduce the millage rate by that number, which we did," Eberhardt said. "It was removed from the general operating millage."

The city manager said the city kept its promise, when voters approved the library.

"We simply rolled it back based on amount voters passed and left it at that number -12.5069," she said.

0.691 measure)," Johnston said. "There was plenty of time to argue it at the time. It's quite understandable – take the maximum amount allowed from the county and subtract .691. That is what it says."

The promise was part of what the library millage was sold on, he said.

At the time, Johnston called for an amendment to the city charter to guarantee the .691 roll back, but council made it a resolution, which can be voted away if desired.

"You can do it, and then see if people care," Johnston said County Equalization Department.

The maximum allowable millage levy was reduced again for 2016, to 12.9168.

However, the City of the Village of Clarkston again proposed a millage rate of 12.5069.

"The last three years, the starting point was the 2014 Headlee number," Wylie said. "It should be the 2016 number."

The 0.691-mill is what the city used to pay to the township for the library, Wylie said.

"We used to pay Independence Township for use of the library," he said. "We don't have to do that anymore. That's why the resolutionwas passed. It's only fair for us to give it back to the citizens. That's what you voted on. If you pass this millage, you're not doing it."

member Sharron Catallo voted "yes." "Costs have gone up," Catallo said. "Didn't we already give it back?"

"It's not a one-year deal," said resident Karen Eckert.

Haven said he agreed council promised to reduce the millage by 0.691.

"We need to keep the differential," he said. "The council committed to reducing the rate and we need to live up to the commitment," Avery said.

Bentoski said revenues at the 12.5069 level was budgeted to add more than \$12,000 to the city fund balance.

Susan Wylie, Steve's wife, said the resolution calls for adjustment every year.

"It says the city will reduce its general operating millage levy by 0.691 mills from the level that the city would otherwise have imposed," she said.

"I don't think so," Eberhardt responded.

City attorney Tom Ryan, who was the city's attorney in 2014, said he didn't know how the 0.691-mill-reduction measure got into the resolution.

"The language shouldn't really be there," Ryan said. "It doesn't make any sense."

Cory Johnston, city resident and former council member, said the 2014 resolution was clear.

"I can't believe Tom Ryan is sitting here saying he doesn't understand part B (the in 2015 to 13.0777, according to the Oaklan

The city's maximum allowable millage was 13.1979 mills in 2006, and remained at that level for the next eight years, until 2014.

The city set its millage at that rate, 13.1979, every year, with the exception of 2007, when the millage was set at 12.8943.

City and township voters approved the district library on Aug. 5, 2014. Council then reduced the city millage by 0.3455, for the second half of the year, from the maximum allowable level of 13.1979 mills to 12.8524.

The following year, 2015, council approved a millage rate of 12.5069, which is 0.691 mills lower than the 2014 maximum rate. However, the maximum rate was reduced in 2015 to 13.0777, according to the Oakland The city's new Treasurer Caitlin Bentoski, who is preparing her first budget for the city, said she agreed with the residents' analysis.

"I think Mr. and Mrs. Wylie have a valid point based on the way the resolution was written," Bentoski said.

A resolution to accept the proposed 12.5069 operating millage was defeated 5-1. Haven, and City council members Al Avery, Jason Kneisc, David Marsh, and Michael Sabol voted against the resolution. Mayor Joe Luginski was absent. Council Longer term, she expects more revenue . through the state Act 51, which created the Michigan Transportation Fund, and other factors.

The 12.1056 mill rate will reduce the fund balance by about \$4,000, "to fix last year's mistake, too," Wylie said.

Sabol made the resolution to set the millagerate at 12.1056 – the maximim 12.9168 minus .691, as well as .1202 to compensate for last year.

"We owe the city for what we missed last year," he said. "It's basically a refund to city residents for what did not do last year."

Catallo called for the record to reflect the reason for the reduction, "make it known so it doesn't always go down that far."

Seek conscious awareness of God

My grandmother was a long time Truth (our father) is essential to effective prayer. Student. During the Great War, 1914 -1918, she worked in The War Department in Washington D.C. This was also the time of the Great Flu Pandemic of 1918-1919 which killed over 20 million people worldwide.

At one point my grandmother was very ill with the flu. She heard of a woman, a healer, who was in town offering a series of lectures and private healing sessions. She took a cross town bus, missed her connection and arrived

late for the lecture. The woman was on the phone when she arrived and asked her to wait.

After a while, the woman came to my grandmother asking why she was there and then quickly proceeded to pray with her.

It was a very deep and spiritual prayer according to my grandmother. On

her way home on the bus she suddenly realized that she was well, the disease had left her.

The woman's name was Dr. H. Emilie Cady a Naturopathic Physician and the author of Lessons In Truth, a basic text book for Unity and the New Thought Movement. My grandmother was a big influence on me and on my decision to follow the spiritual path.

"He was praying in a certain place, and when he ceased, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples'" Luke 11:1. What follows is a version of what has come to be known as The Lord's Prayer or The Our Father, only a little different than the version found in Matthew 6:9-13. In Matthew's version Jesus begins by saying, "Pray then like this:" What follows is a model for prayer; rightly understood, it is a model for positive affirmative prayer similar to the Shepherd's Psalm #23. It's interesting to note that he did not say, "Pray this prayer" but "Pray then like this:" The words we use are not as important as the consciousness within which we pray.

"Your Father knows what you need before you ask him" Matthew 6:8. Our goal is not to pray to God necessarily, but to pray in God; we pray in a consciousness of the all knowing, ever present, all powerful, essence of Being that we live and move and have our being in (Acts 17:28.)

In the Our Father, we express our willingness to open our minds of what is (earth) to an awareness of what can be (heaven), we affirm that all we need and desire (our daily bread) is readily provided and ask forgiveness for our belief in lack and limitation (debts or trespasses) knowing that in forgiving we are forgiven.

We acknowledge that we are tempted by our senses to believe in lack and limitation and that raising our awareness to the light of God dispels this darkness (evil.)

This results in an attitude of gratitude. We are grateful for the greatness of God that fills our minds, hearts and lives with infinite blessings "thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever."

We conclude with a positive statement of acceptance: Amen. This word comes from an ancient Chaldean word, "Ameyn", which includes the concept of planting it in the ground and watching it grow. Simply put it means, so be it or it is so. I believe it. I receive it, and it is so!

My grandmother lived to the age of 97. In her final days she was not very conscious of the outside world, her body was failing fast.

But, if you listened closely, you could hear her reciting her positive affirmations

The Charter Township of Independence has determined it is appropriate and necessary for the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Township to amend Chapter 38 - Secondhand Goods of the Code of Ordinances, Charter Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, by adding Article III entitled Pawnbrokers Ordinance, and to provide penalties for violation

thereof. Therefore, THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE ORDAINS FOR INCORPORATION INTO THE TOWN-

SHIP CODE: Section 1. SHORT TITLE. This Ordinance shall be

known as the "Pawnbrokers" Ordinance. Section 2. PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordi-

nance is to regulate and license Pawnbrokers; and reduce and/or eliminate the acceptance and resale of stolen or unauthorized property.

Section 3. AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 38. Provides that Chapter 38 of the Code of Ordinances (Secondhand Goods) is amended by adding a new Article III Pawnbrokers; Divisions 1 and 2 as follows:

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY is divided into Section 38-60 through Section 38-68 which provides the general requirements for operation of a Pawnbroker business and penalties for violation thereof. Specifically

State Law Adopted. Section 38-60 adopts by reference the State Pawnbroker Act being Sections 446.201 through 446.219 of the Michigan Compiled Laws as amended

Inspections of Business Premises. Section 38-61 provides for: a. inspection of business premises during and after business hours to assure compliance with applicable laws and ordinances; b. display of license on premises; c. any change of licensee information be furnished in writing to the Township Police Agency within seventy-two (72) hours of change.

Procedures and Forms for Fingerprinting, Statements and Recording of Transactions; Inspection of Records. Section 38-62 provides: a. forms to licensee for fingerprinting and furnishing additional information required by regulations; licensee maintenance of records on forms provided by the Township Police Agency which are subject to inspection; b. maintenance of a record of all business transactions, and electronic transmission to the Township Police Agency for direct entry into the Township Police Agency's computerized system.

Business Operations. Section 38-63 prohibits Sunday operation of a Pawnbroker business. Section 38-64 prohibits Pawnbroker business between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. of the following day.

Prohibited Purchases. Section 38-65 prohibits business transaction with intoxicated persons, any person

License Fees/Bond. Section 38-74 requires prior to issuance of a license, applicant pay the Township Treasurer an annual license fee and give a bond to the Township as required by MCL 446.202.

License Denial Refund; Probationary License. Section 38-75 provides partial refund of license fee to applicant denied license.

License Term. Section 38-76 provides for an annual Pawnbroker license ending December 31st. License is not transferable and is subject to suspension, probation or revocation

Section 3. AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 38. Provides that Chapter 38 of the Code of Ordinances (Secondhand Goods) is amended by adding a new Article IV Precious Metal and Gem Dealers; Divisions 1 and 2 as follows:

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY is divided into Section 38-77 through Section 38-84 and provide the general requirements for operation of a Precious Metal and Gem Dealer business and penalties for violation thereof. Specifically

State Law Adopted. Section 38-77 adopts by reference the Michigan Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act as amended being Sections 445.481 through 445.492 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

Definitions. Section 38-78 utilizes the same definitions as provided in the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act, MCL 445.482 as amended

Records of Transactions; Compliance with MCL 445.484 as Amended. Section 38-79 requires a Dealer to maintain a permanent record of each transaction on record of transaction forms provided for in MCL 445.484. Within forty-eight (48) hours of receiving or purchasing a precious item, a Dealer shall electronically transmit record of the transaction to the Township Police Agency in a format capable of direct electronic entry into the Township Police Agency's computerized system. Records of transaction forms and precious items are subject to inspection by law enforcement agencies.

Precious Item Retention; Alteration or Defacing Unlawful. Section 38-80 requires a precious item received by a Dealer be retained for nine (9) calendar days without alteration, except for appraisal.

Precious Items which are Prohibited and Unlawful. Section 38-81 prohibits business transaction with any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years; a known thief and/or person without proper identification

Compliance with State Law. Section 38-82 requires Dealer to comply with the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act, MCL 445.481 through 445.492, as amended; and where applicable the State Pawnbroker Act, MCL 446.201 through 446.219; and Secondhand Watches Act, MCL 445.551 through 445.555, and any amendments thereto

Compliance with Zoning Ordinance. Section 38-83 requires Precious Metal and Gem Dealers to comply with all Independence Township zoning ordinances.

Violation; Penalty. Section 38-84 states violation of this Ordinance is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment of not more than ninety (90) days and/or a fine of \$500.00, or both, in addition to any other remedies available to the Township

DIVISION 2. REGISTRATION is divided into Section 38-85 through Section 38-92, which provide specific requirements and procedures for obtaining a certificate of registration, certificate revocation, and appeal for denial of certificate.

Certificate of Registration. Section 38-85 states that no person shall carry on the business of a Precious Metal and Gem Dealer in the Township without first having a certificate of registration. An internet drop-off store in compliance with certain conditions is exempt from registration as a Dealer

Application; Prerequisites. Section 38-86 requires an applicant apply to the Township Clerk for a certificate of registration and pay a fee not to exceed \$50.00. The application is then forwarded to the Building Department and Township Police Agency for review.

Review by Building Department. Section 38-87

Certificate of Registration; Appeal. Section 38-92 provides that any person aggrieved by the grant of denial or a certificate under this Article may appeal to the Township Board by written request within twenty (20) days following the grant or denial. The appeal will be placed on the agenda of a regularly scheduled Township Board meeting.


Clarkston High School Class of 2016
