A look back at the year 2016

Voters had much to decide on in 2016, and campaigns started early. Nationally, the presidential race was heating up, while the school bond drive was in full swing for an August election.

Jan. 6

School policy for violence: Revised school safety policies were approved at a December school board meeting. The policy was made to include threat assessments at school, which include crime and violence inside and outside the school system.

Jan. 13

\$20 billion embezzlement: CFO of Clarkston/Brandon Credit Union Michael Anthony LaJoice was charged with 14 counts of embezzlement over a 12-year period. The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office charged LaJoice with one count of Embezzlement-Financial Institution/ Felony-20 years and 13 counts of Embezzlement-\$100,000 or more/Felony-20 years and/or a fine up to \$50,000 or three times the amount embezzled, whichever is greater. A later article said LaJoice confessed to taking \$20 million from the bank and stated an independent federal agency took control of the bank during the embezzlement investigation.

An Independence Township family found their well contaminated by petroleum. Township officials tested the water and made motions to monitor gas stations and stations with underground tanks, as well as investigate legal action against polluters. A later article said private wells in Independence aren't protected by the water treatment system protecting the 14 township wells. In Independence, the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality confirmed 16 leaks form underground storage tanks.

Feb. 17

McLaren ribbon cutting: After a four month closure, McLaren Oakland celebrated its new Clarkston Emergency Center with a ribbon cutting on Feb. 15. Flint: Jim McNulty, owner of American Water in Clarkston, headed to Mission of Hope in Flint on Feb. 15 to deliver a truck filled with hundreds of gallons of bottled water to help people in the Flint water crisis.

March 9

Copter assists in Border Patrol search: An Oakland County Sheriff's helicopter and patrol deputies helped the feds track down a suspect in Independence Township. U.S. Customs and Border Protection apprehended two suspects around Pine Knob Ski Resort for violating U.S. Code 1325, Entry Without Inspection.

Budget fix

The Independence Township Board voted, Dec. 20, to approve a budget fix for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.

Budget Analyst Rick Yaeger plans to make one CDBG amendment in January to apply to the whole year. The amendment will adjust the 2017 budget based on what is needed and what CDBG funds are available.

New system for DPW

The Independence Township Department of Public Works (DPW) is preparing to add a new asset management computer system in the next couple weeks, Cityworks, for an amount not to exceed \$30,000.

Cityworks will help the township manage all township assets including water, sewage, street lights, sidewalks, buildings and rooms. It can also account for labor and material time.

DPW plans to roll out the system in January and, once all the bugs are worked out, they'll start to introduce it to other departments as soon as possible.

Township Supervisor Pat Kittle said the system will improve accountability with their labor and material cost.

Research grants

The Amyloidosis Foundation in Independence Township recently awarded its 2017 Research Grants to four researchers in the field of amyloidosis. Each will receive \$50,000 toward their grant proposal.

They awarded grants to Emily Martin, PhD - University of Tennessee Medical Center; Lorena Saelices, PhD - Regents of the University of California, Los Angeles; Petros Moustardas, PhD -Linkoping University, Sweden; and Carolina Lemos, PhD - University of Porto, Portugal. 



\$1,000,000 cash or surety bond. He is currently on parole for two counts of armed robbery and habitual offender. fourth offense, paroled on Feb. 18, 2015, out

of Wayne/Detroit Metro district. He pled guilty to two armed robberies in Detroit in 1993, 15-30 years; car theft in Detroit in 1989, eight months-2 1/2 years;

Detroit car theft in 1988, 1-5 years; and burglary in Detroit in 1986, two years. He is accused of robbing the jewelry store

with another suspect on Dec. 17, at which the owner of the store, Dan Chiappelli was shot at and wounded. The suspects took cash, jewelry and a handgun, and fled the store. Chiappelli pursued the suspects in his pickup truck, locating them on White Lake Road at the entrance to Lakeview Cemetery. Shots were fired at Chiappelli, who rammed the car driven by the suspects, causing them to flee on foot.

Genright was found by deputies near the water tower northwest of the intersection of Dixie Highway and White Lake Road. The second suspect fled across Middle Lake, which was frozen, and stole a 2014 Jeep Cherokee from a home in the 6000 block of Middle Lake Road. Search continues for the second suspect.

Chiappelli was treated and released from McLaren Oakland for the wound to his back from gunshot fragments, and cuts and bruises suffered when he was pistol whipped.

Anyone with information on the second suspect is asked to call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAK-UP. There is a minimum of a \$1,000 cash reward.



Truck driver found dead

A truck driver was found dead on Dixie Highway, 7:02 a.m., Dec. 13. A representative from a metro-area trucking company had been unable to reach the driver, a 63-year-old Belleville man, for several hours and used the tractor-trailer's GPS to locate him. Oakland County Sheriff's deputies and Springfield Township firefighters found him inside the tractor-trailer, which had been parked north of Big Lake Road. He was obviously deceased. Paramedics provided telemetry to McLaren Hospital - Oakland where a physician pronounced the subject deceased. A detecive and an investigator from the Oakland County Medical Examiner's Office responded to continue with the investigation. There were no signs of foul play and the victim has had a history of high blood pressure. The Medical Examiner's Office took custody of the deceased, an autopsy was scheduled, and the family of the deceased was notified.

Improper plate

A deputy on patrol stopped a truck with an improper license plate, 10:25 a.m., Dec. 9, on Dixie Highway at Deerhill Drive. The plate showed it was improperly registered as a pickup truck. The driver's side brake light was also not working. The truck company was cited for improper plate, no medical certificate for the driver, and equipment violation.





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


