

City digs into reserves for new budget

The new city budget calls for a \$28,456 withdrawal from its savings account.

"Last year, we added to the fund balance. This year, we're proposing we use some of that excess," said Mayor Steven Percival at the June 12 City Council meeting and budget public hearing. "It's arguable you could go further. We still have a lot of projects on the horizon you could use some of the excess on."

Proposed spending items for the upcoming year include \$2,800 for a Building Department software upgrade; \$8,500 for sidewalk replacement on Miller Road; \$10,000 for converting paper archives into electronic files; \$12,000 for repairing damage to Village Hall caused by mice, woodpeckers, and ants; \$16,000 for asphalt overlay on Miller Road; and \$8,000 for parking kiosk.

"There are still a lot of decisions to be made in regards to parking," Smith said.

Council member Jason Kneisc, who is on the city Parking Committee, said paid parking kiosks are still up in the air.

"We're not sure what that's going to be," Kneisc said. "Could it ('kiosks') read 'parking improvements' instead? That seems to make more sense."

"We know we're going to go to paid parking, we just don't know what yet," Percival said. "There will be revenue. We'll




Kittle said the rest of the strip is planned to be takeout facilities, but nothing is confirmed yet.

Gregg's Gourmet Cafe still a few months from reopening

Missing out on Gregg's Gourmet Cafe's pizza specials or just missing their food? Don't worry, they are coming back!

Owner Jeff Ryeson said the ball is rolling and a plan of action is in the works after smoke damage from the business next door closed their doors last month. He hopes the restaurant will open back up within two months.

"It's gonna be remodeled - it's gonna have fresh material as far as the ceiling and the wall and the floors and paint and the look; just updated," Ryeson said. "It takes so long because they have to deconstruct, clean, then replace."

Adding to the reopening excitement, it's also Gregg's 25th year in business. Ryeson said they we're thinking about anniversary plans when the fire derailed them.

"When I'm dealing with the powers that be and how fast they're doing the work, they had to tear a lot of things apart before they could put it back together and sometimes you run into new problems and delays and this has to be done before this can be done," Ryeson said. "Once I get a better scope on when that's gonna happen, then we're going to tie the reopening with our 25th anniversary."

Currently Ryeson is still trying to take care of his Clarkston customers through catering. He also owns a restaurant in Lapeer, E.G. Nick's, and he's been catering out of that location and delivering to the Clarkston area every weekend.

"That's what we've been doing and Gregg's is gonna come back. This is our 25th year, so we're coming back with a new, clean look, we're not going anywhere. We're going to be around for years to come," Ryeson said.


He's owned Gregg's Gourmet Café for the last 12 years, his brother, Gregg, opened the restaurant 25 years ago.

"I was a 1977 graduate of Clarkston High school, so I'm a home town boy," Ryeson said. "I think some people were concerned we weren't gonna reopen, but I want to stress that yes, we're coming back, as soon as we can get it open we'll be back open."

Foreign exchange students heading back home

Three students are leaving Clarkston to return to their home countries as the school year comes to an end.

Eva Meisl, Maria Ubilia and Aylin Cetin are going back to Austria, Chile and Turkey after their school year abroad in America through the Clarkston Rotary's Youth Exchange Program.

"It was exciting, but also sometimes really tiring," Meisl said of her time abroad. "You have a lot to do and you're really into the culture and you go to a lot of events and do a lot of stuff with your friends. Then, there are times where you feel foreign."

Ubilia agreed, saying at the beginning of the program it was hard to make friends, and it took some time to adjust.

"I had lots of American friends and they make me always happy. They were always asking me questions because it was so different," Cetin said. "Sometimes it was kind of hard, because my English barrier. It was a little bit hard because of it, but I had fun."

All the girls said their English improved after spending time in the states despite the language difference.

Clarkston's own Sara Banks is now

conversationally fluent in Spanish after a year abroad in Peru.

"When I arrived I really didn't speak Spanish," Banks said, "It's so crazy how fast you learn a language when you're living it."

Banks explained she did a lot with Rotary International while she was there, including parades in different towns.

"There were a bunch of trips we took while we were down there," Banks said. "We got to go to Ecuador and it was really beautiful. We got to see a lot of beaches and it was so cool."

Banks also saw Manchu Picchu, Colca Canyon and northern Peru, but she stayed in the desert city of Arequipa during her year abroad.

Clarkston had two students go abroad this year and three students come to Michigan through the Rotary's exchange program, Rotary Treasurer Jeff Lichty said.

"The norm is one but through some really nice host families we've been able to go to two," Lichty said.

With this year coming to an end, Rotary is already preparing for next year, with two students coming into Clarkston, a girl from Sicily and a boy from France, and a Clarkston student heading to Germany.

Lichty said there are more students who

would like to come to Clarkston, but there is a lack of host families. They're always looking for more host families.

Youth Exchange General Chair Steve Youtz, who oversees the district program, has been improving the program to help students get over the culture and language barriers.

He has students do online work and assessments to learn the language quicker leading up to their departure. His goal is for students to feel comfortable with the language after about three months, so they can focus more on the culture.

"Students are very unique," he said. "They have a great multitasking mind, they know how to solve problems, and they deal with everything usually in stride."

Not every student and host family is 100 percent perfect, but Youtz said the Rotary is involved every step of the way.

"We do have a great program and if we could just tell our stories more frequently then I think the community would start coming onboard even more so than they are currently," Youtz said.

"It's a way of developing ambassadors to go back home and if there's anything I could think of that will contribute big time to peace worldwide it's these kids."

"Clarkston above average" While Clarkston Community Schools scored above average for the Winter 2002 Michigan Education Assessment Program, they saw dips in some area. Six of the seven elementary schools had scores decrease in writing and three of the elementary schools had a decrease in reading.

"Sixth graders get lesson in charity" A group of sixth graders at Clarkston Middle School learned a thing or two about giving selflessly during the school year as they raised money for PAWS and St. Jude's Children's Hospital.

"Regional title 26 years in the making" One inning was the catalyst for the Clarkston Varsity Baseball team to win their first regional title in 26 years as they scored three runs in the first inning in the regional championship game against Brother Rice. They defeated the Warriors, 4-2.

25 years ago - 1992

"Cityhood wins Supreme Court battle" Independence Township came up empty in a last-ditch chance to stop Clarkston cityhood as the Michigan Supreme Court upheld an earlier ruling by the State Boundary Commission.

"Catallo elected first city mayor" Sharron Catallo was elected as Clarkston's first mayor by 22 votes, edging out Charles Weber, 106-84. At the time Catallo was the village council president

"Hometown couple opens carry-out restaurant" Tired of fast food but not wanting to get dressed up for dinner inspired Clarkston natives Gregg Ryeson and his wife, Michelle, opened Gregg's Carry Out and Catering on M-15 in Independence Township. 

An article by Mark Manson was forwarded to me earlier this month by reader Pam Belding. It is a rather long read with lots of facts cited. The article, dated June 1, 2017 was headlined, "What's The Problem With Men?"

Manson wrote more eloquently than I ever could on the subject and spent a lot more time researching stuff to back up his arguments that mirrored what I just wrote a few lines ago. Wrote he, "Men work far longer hours, take fewer vacations and sick days, and suffer worse symptoms of chronic stress and fatigue. Men even die on the job at a startling rate. In short, most men treat themselves as nothing more than a walking paycheck."

Hey! I was just validated!

Manson's article, with lots of colorful metaphors (aka cuss words) explored why this phenomenon is. The answers he found are almost evolutionary. 


The Lady Wolves finished the season with an 33-10 overall record while winning the OAA Red league, district and regional titles and as Academic All-State team.

"It's been a tough one with the defeat to Bloomfield," said Huffer, adding Clarkston was dominating the game. "We had about 15 really good chances. We played really well both halves we just couldn't finish."

I can't wait for the next performance at the CHS PAC!



"It made it even better," Cooper smiled.


The teammates explained they were nervous going into the meet.

"It gives me more confidence," Billette explained. "Now I know where I stand."


"It is definitely exciting to run with the older kids and see how they run," Cooper added. "They can help us if we need help on something. We can help them if they need help."



Earth."



Riley Kloostra will attend Michigan State University as a Marketing Major.



Smith said. "The interim city manager (Rich Little) didn't draw any salary. We were without a treasurer for 2-3 months."

The property tax millage rate is budgeted at 12.0966, down from 12.1056 this past year. The city's maximum allowable millage for

fiscal year 2017-2018 is 12.7876, rolled back from last year's 12.9168 due to the state Headlee law.

"The Headlee effect has really been kicking in these last four years," Smith said. "It's good for homeowners, bad for the city in terms of revenue."

With another reduction of 0.691 due to the city library millage resolution of 2014, the proposed millage rate for 2017-2018 is 12.0966. The library measure was passed as part of the campaign for the Clarkston Independence District Library.

"The wording is somewhat in dispute was it intended to be in place for one year or every year," Smith asked.

The issue may be addressed by the Finance Committee over the next year, he said. The measure was enacted to avoid double taxation of residents, said resident Lorry Mahler during the public hearing.

"It's very clear," Mahler said.

"It was never the city's money to spend," said Council member Sue Wylie. "We're just channeling it to the library."

"The letter of the law says to reduce it," Percival said.

Clarkston's taxable property value after the state Proposal A cap is \$40,833,740, up 3.57 percent from last year. Tax revenue, which is the millage rate times taxable value divided by 1,000, equals \$493,949, up \$16,665 from last year's \$477,284.

"Home values are coming back," Smith said. "Taxable value is limited by Proposal A -the rate of inflation or five percent, whichever is less."

The state law was passed to make sure people weren't taxed out of their homes when property values increased, he said.

Funding from the state is budgeted at \$75,000, unchanged from last year.

negative growth (in state revenue sharing) over the last 10 years," Smith said. "They're essentially using funds usually directed to communities on its own revenue growth. Unfortunately, we don't see that changing anytime soon."

Spending projects discussed but not included in the budget include full milling of Miller Road before paving, \$34,000; \$6,000 for additional sidewalk replacement, \$420,000 for long term requirement; \$60,000 for additional road paving, \$1.17 million for long term requirement; new office computers, \$21,000; and playground upgrades and marsh walkway in Depot Park, \$12,000.

Council member Eric Haven, member of the Friends of Depot Park committee, said adding \$6,000 to the budget for a parks and recreation plan could yield grant funding from the state Department of Natural Resources.

Percival agreed with the recommendation.

"We're just spinning our wheels here if we don't get the park plan in place," the mayor said. "We can get that plan done and move forward with soliciting for grants."

The final budget will be presented to city council at its June 26 meeting. The city must pass its budget by the end of June, according to state law.

"We're a little late getting this to you but it's still within the statute," said Smith, who is working on his first budget as city manager "Michigan is the only state showing along with new Treasurer Greg Cote'.
