Final 4 finish for varsity CHS sluggers

"Every day is a great day" is Don Peters' motto and for him and Clarkston Varsity Softball it was a great season as they ended the year in the Final Four.

"It was a great ride," the head coach said smiling about the young team of five freshman, eight sophomores, four juniors and one senior. "It was very enjoyable to see them grow as individuals and as a team to see them get better and better. We were certainly one of the best teams in the state by the end of the year. I think we proved that in the playoffs."

The Lady Wolves bowed out of the playoffs running after their 2-1 loss to Grandville in the MHSAA Division I Softball Semifinal matchup last Thursday at Michigan State University.

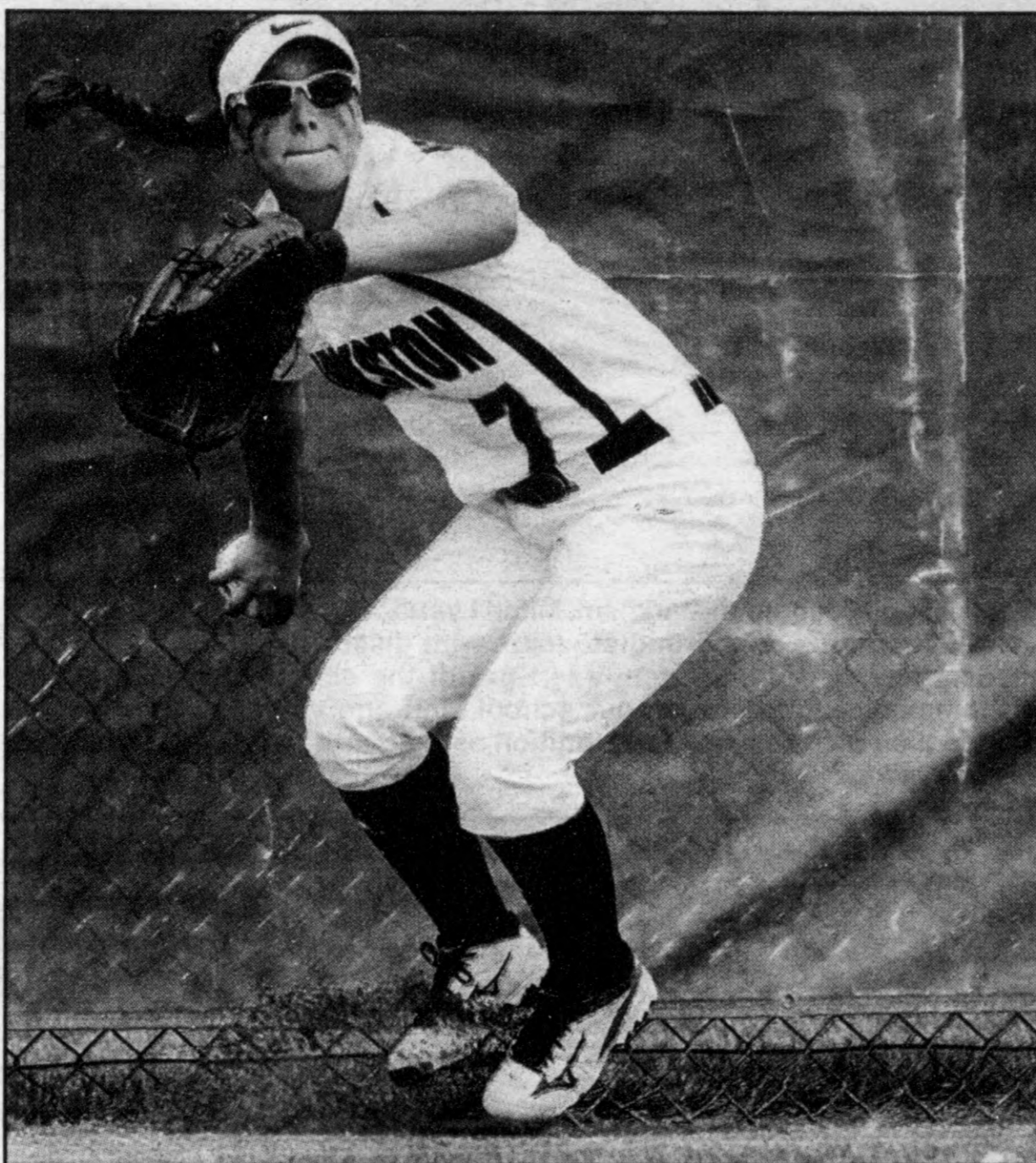
"Right until the end I thought we had a chance to win," Peters said. "It was a great experience for everybody. What a fun time to be in the state semifinals and the conditions were great."

Peters explained he had heard Grandville's pitcher, Ellie Muilenberg, liked to change up her throws.

"That was right," he said. "Like every other team they have good hitters and good defense. You wouldn't be there if you weren't good."

The game was scoreless with Wolf Olivia Warrington and Muilenberg on the pitcher's mound until the sixth inning when Grandville made two runs.

Clarkston loaded the bases at the bottom of the inning and a hit from Sierra

Kersten brought Abbey Tolmie in for the Lady Wolves' lone run.

"I am really proud of them," Peters said. "They played hard. They made some great plays. The play before Hannah Chadwell faked that girl out, Hannah Cady made a great play at the

plate, Sierra stayed on the ball that was bounced off the first baseman's glove, Alex Gladding made a great catch — they came to play. They just didn't score enough runs."

City digs into reserves for new budget

The new city budget calls for a \$28,456 withdrawal from its savings account.

"Last year, we added to the fund balance. This year, we're proposing we use some of that excess," said Mayor Steven Percival at the June 12 City Council meeting and budget public hearing. "It's arguable you could go further. We still have a lot of projects on the horizon you could use some of the excess on."

Proposed spending items for the upcoming year include \$2,800 for a Building Department software upgrade; \$8,500 for sidewalk replacement on Miller Road; \$10,000 for converting paper archives into electronic files; \$12,000 for repairing damage to Village Hall caused by mice, woodpeckers, and ants; \$16,000 for asphalt overlay on Miller Road; and \$8,000 for parking kiosk.

"There are still a lot of decisions to be made in regards to parking," Smith said.

Council member Jason Kneisc, who is on the city Parking Committee, said paid parking kiosks are still up in the air.

"We're not sure what that's going to be," Kneisc said. "Could it ('kiosks') read 'parking improvements' instead? That seems to make more sense."

"We know we're going to go to paid parking, we just don't know what yet," Percival said. "There will be revenue. We'll see some of that coming in next year."

The city's fund balance increased this past year, from \$178,306 to \$225,081, said City Manager Jonathan Smith.

"Some of the things we had budgeted, we just didn't do or came in less expensive,"

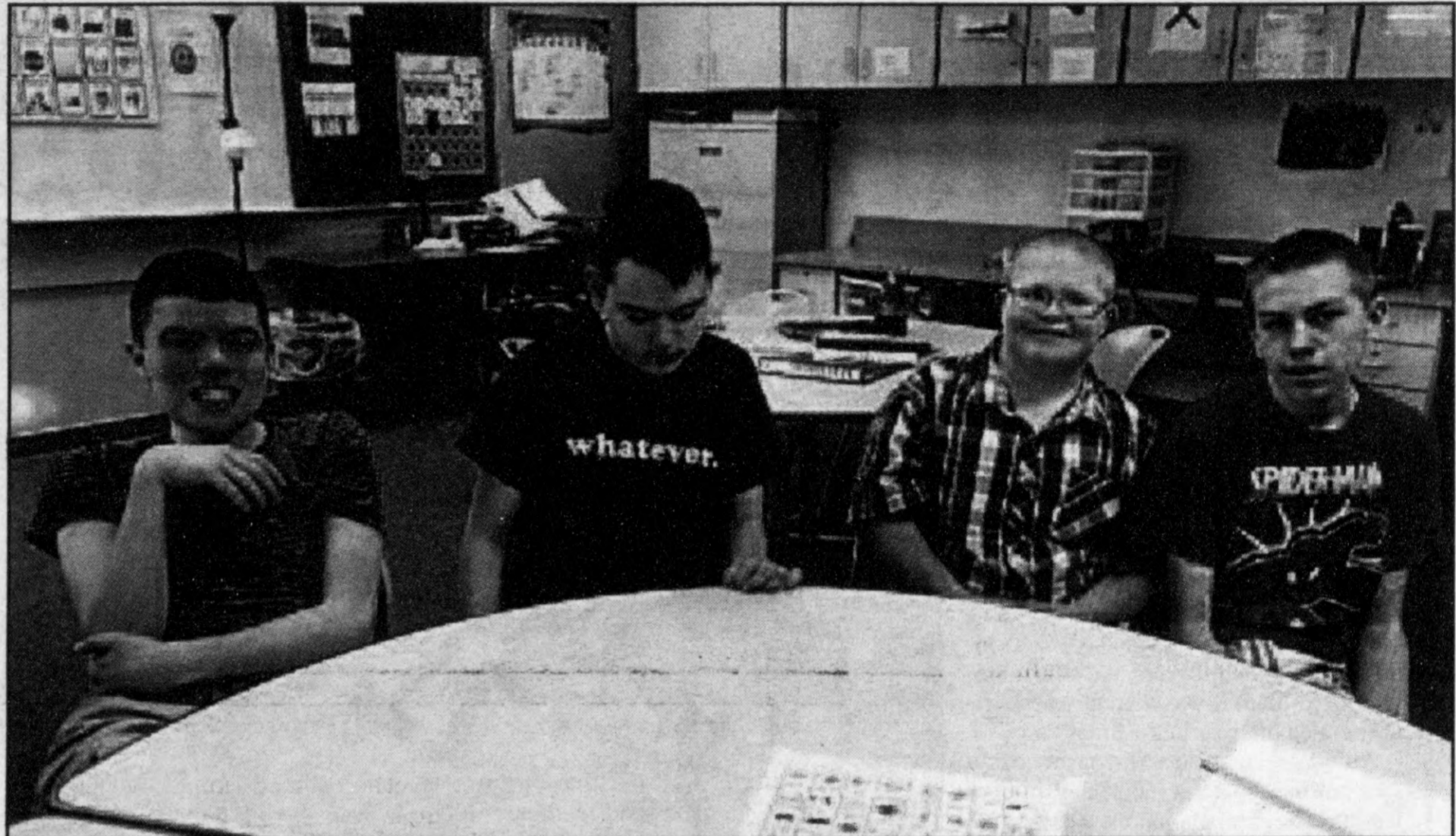

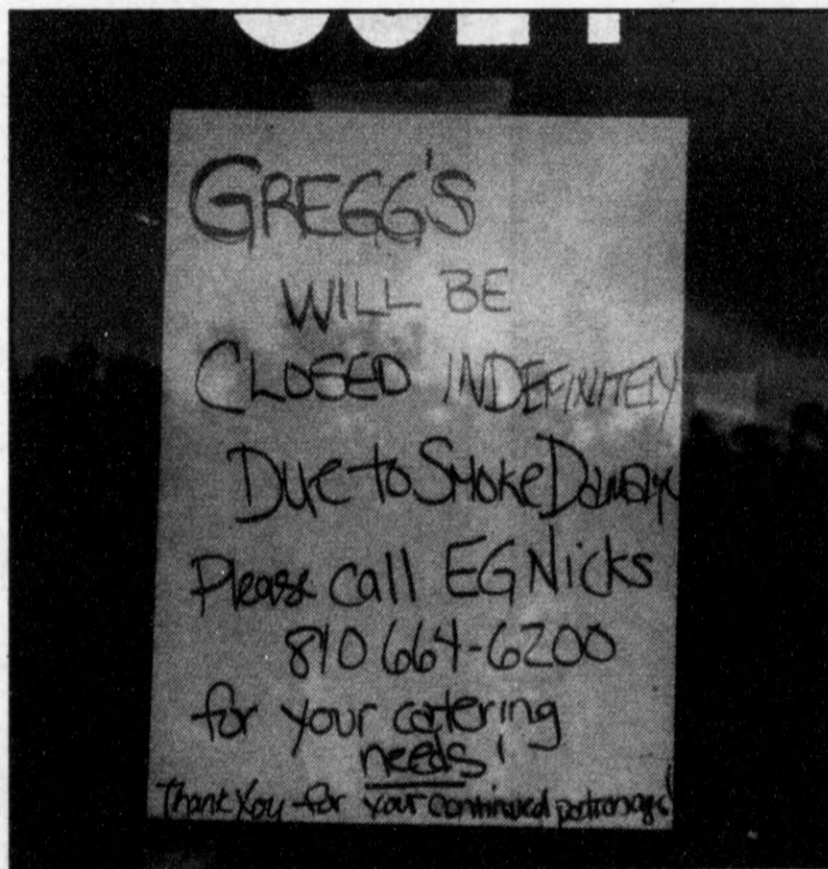
Kittle said the rest of the strip is planned to be takeout facilities, but nothing is confirmed yet.

Gregg's Gourmet Cafe still a few months from reopening

Missing out on Gregg's Gourmet Cafe's pizza specials or just missing their food? Don't worry, they are coming back!

Owner Jeff Ryeson said the ball is rolling and a plan of action is in the works after smoke damage from the business next door closed their doors last month. He hopes the restaurant will open back up within two months.

"It's gonna be remodeled - it's gonna have fresh material as far as the ceiling and the wall and the floors and paint and the look; just updated," Ryeson said. "It takes so long because they have to deconstruct, clean, then replace."

Adding to the reopening excitement, it's also Gregg's 25th year in business. Ryeson said they were thinking about anniversary plans when the fire derailed them.

"When I'm dealing with the powers that be and how fast they're doing the work, they had to tear a lot of things apart before they could put it back together and sometimes you run into new problems and delays and this has to be done

before this can be done," Ryeson said. "Once I get a better scope on when that's gonna happen, then we're going to tie the reopening with our 25th anniversary."

Currently Ryeson is still trying to take care of his Clarkston customers through catering. He also owns a restaurant in Lapeer, E.G. Nick's, and he's been catering out of that location and delivering to the Clarkston area every weekend.

"That's what we've been doing and Gregg's is gonna come back. This is our 25th year, so we're coming back with a new, clean look, we're not going anywhere. We're going to be around for years to come," Ryeson said.

He's owned Gregg's Gourmet Café for the last 12 years, his brother, Gregg, opened the restaurant 25 years ago.

"I was a 1977 graduate of Clarkston High school, so I'm a home town boy," Ryeson said. "I think some people were concerned we weren't gonna reopen, but I want to stress that yes, we're coming back, as soon as we can get it open we'll be back open."

From water balloon tosses to sack races to tug of war, the kids experienced a few hours of pure play outside the school walls.

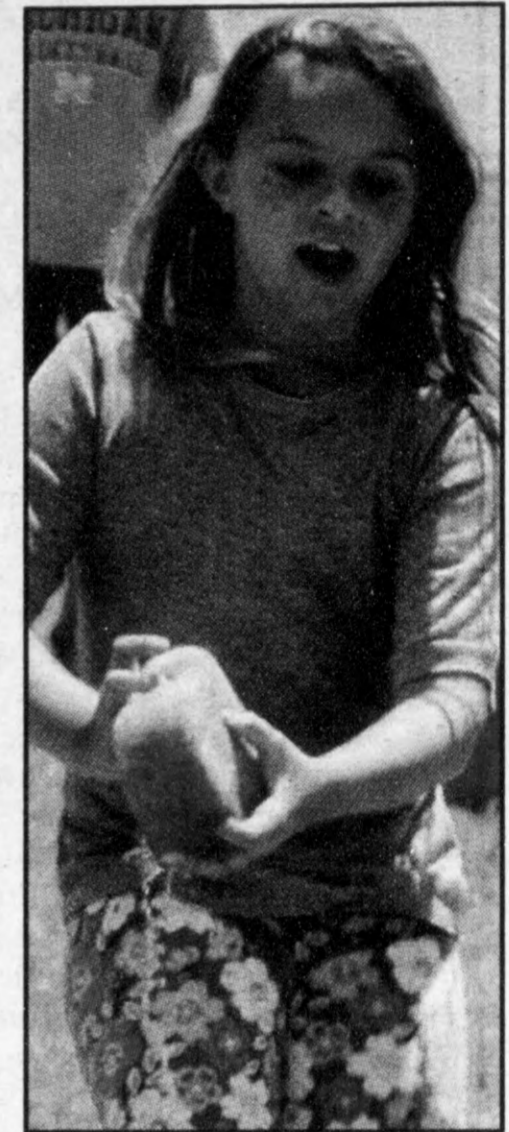
They raced through an inflatable course, passed a hula hoop while linked at the arms and cooled off with snow cones from a Kona Ice Truck.

Foreign exchange students heading back home

Three students are leaving Clarkston to return to their home countries as the school year comes to an end.

Eva Meisl, Maria Ubilla and Aylin Cetin are going back to Austria, Chile and Turkey after their school year abroad in America through the Clarkston Rotary's Youth Exchange Program.

"It was exciting, but also sometimes really tiring," Meisl said of her time abroad. "You have a lot to do and you're really into the culture and you go to a lot of events and do a lot of stuff with your friends. Then, there are times where you feel foreign."

Ubilla agreed, saying at the beginning of the program it was hard to make friends, and it took some time to adjust.

"I had lots of American friends and they make me always happy. They were always asking me questions because it was so different," Cetin said. "Sometimes it was kind of hard, because my English barrier. It was a little bit hard because of it, but I had fun."

All the girls said their English improved after spending time in the states despite the language difference.

Clarkston's own Sara Banks is now

conversationally fluent in Spanish after a year abroad in Peru.

"When I arrived I really didn't speak Spanish," Banks said, "It's so crazy how fast you learn a language when you're living it."

Banks explained she did a lot with Rotary International while she was there, including parades in different towns.

"There were a bunch of trips we took while we were down there," Banks said. "We got to go to Ecuador and it was really beautiful. We got to see a lot of beaches and it was so cool."

Banks also saw Manchu Picchu, Colca Canyon and northern Peru, but she stayed in the desert city of Arequipa during her year abroad.

Clarkston had two students go abroad this year and three students come to Michigan through the Rotary's exchange program, Rotary Treasurer Jeff Lichty said.

"The norm is one but through some really nice host families we've been able to go to two," Lichty said.

With this year coming to an end, Rotary is already preparing for next year, with two students coming into Clarkston, a girl from Sicily and a boy from France, and a Clarkston student heading to Germany.

Lichty said there are more students who

would like to come to Clarkston, but there is a lack of host families. They're always looking for more host families.

Youth Exchange General Chair Steve Youtz, who oversees the district program, has been improving the program to help students get over the culture and language barriers.

He has students do online work and assessments to learn the language quicker leading up to their departure. His goal is for students to feel comfortable with the language after about three months, so they can focus more on the culture.

"Students are very unique," he said. "They have a great multitasking mind, they know how to solve problems, and they deal with everything usually in stride."

Not every student and host family is 100 percent perfect, but Youtz said the Rotary is involved every step of the way.

"We do have a great program and if we could just tell our stories more frequently then I think the community would start coming onboard even more so than they are currently," Youtz said.

"It's a way of developing ambassadors to go back home and if there's anything I could think of that will contribute big time to peace worldwide it's these kids."

A Look Back

15 years ago - 2002

"Clarkston above average" While Clarkston Community Schools scored above average for the Winter 2002 Michigan Education Assessment Program, they saw dips in some area. Six of the seven elementary schools had scores decrease in writing and three of the elementary schools had a decrease in reading.

"Sixth graders get lesson in charity" A group of sixth graders at Clarkston Middle School learned a thing or two about giving selflessly during the school year as they raised money for PAWS and St. Jude's Children's Hospital.

"Regional title 26 years in the making" One inning was the catalyst for the Clarkston Varsity Baseball team to win their first regional title in 26 years as they scored three runs in the first inning in the regional championship game against Brother Rice. They defeated the Warriors, 4-2.

25 years ago - 1992

"Cityhood wins Supreme Court battle" Independence Township came up empty in a last-ditch chance to stop Clarkston cityhood as the Michigan Supreme Court upheld an earlier ruling by the State Boundary Commission.

"Catallo elected first city mayor" Sharron Catallo was elected as Clarkston's first mayor by 22 votes, edging out Charles Weber, 106-84. At the time Catallo was the village council president

"Hometown couple opens carry-out restaurant" Tired of fast food but not wanting to get dressed up for dinner inspired Clarkston natives Gregg Ryeson and his wife, Michelle, opened Gregg's Carry Out and Catering on M-15 in Independence Township. Everything from desserts to salad dressings to entrees are homemade and everything is made fresh with natural herbs.

50 years ago - 1967

"Plan for 324-acre housing development" A 324-acre development adjacent to the Village of Clarkston, which included 300 acres of the former Ford farm, was outlined to the council to be used for housing.

"Clarkston Legion team wins double header" The Clarkston baseball team won both games in a double header against Berkley in the American Legion League, 3-1 and 7-2.

"Round the town" John Craig left for summer camp in Northern Canada where he spent most of his time fishing, swimming, hiking and tracking.

So, what about fathers?

Another Father's Day has come and gone. Big whoop, right? If your dad is alive you give him a call, send a card or go visit so he can grill up something tasty for the family to eat on Dad's Day Weekend.

Bada-bing, bada-boom. Done and done.

Back in the day, when my sons were young and impressionable (of elementary age), I used to joke fathers got the short end of the parental stick. For Mother's Day, teachers make fuss and make sure their students make up cute cards and presents. Since school is out when Dad's Day rolls around, there isn't the hoopla around this "holiday."

Dads are just dads. Think about it: No one throws down when they hear something about, "Yo daddy." Say something about, "Your mother," and historically it's a lead into fisticuffs.

Dads are providers, the proverbial paycheck, and that is about that. I believe this is based on the value society, and dads themselves, place on the male parental unit.

I went to History.com and looked up Father's Day and found this (first on Mom's Day): "... in 1914, President Woodrow Wilson approved a resolution that made the second Sunday in May a holiday in honor of 'that tender, gentle army, the mothers of America.'"

Know when, or what, president proclaimed a national Father's Day? It was 1972 when President Richard Nixon okay'd a day for dads — 58 years after there was a national day for moms.

An article by Mark Manson was forwarded to me earlier this month by reader Pam Belding. It is a rather long read with lots of facts cited. The article, dated June 1, 2017 was headlined, "What's The Problem With Men?"

Manson wrote more eloquently than I ever could on the subject and spent a lot more time researching stuff to back up his arguments that mirrored what I just wrote a few lines ago. Wrote he, "Men work far longer hours, take fewer vacations and sick days, and suffer worse symptoms of chronic stress and fatigue. Men even die on the job at a startling rate. In short, most men treat themselves as nothing more than a walking paycheck."

Hey! I was just validated!

Manson's article, with lots of colorful metaphors (aka cuss words) explored why this phenomenon is. The answers he found are almost evolutionary. I will tee this up for Manson and then let him swing to drive home the point: Start thinking back to a time when Earth was as big as it is now, but populated by about seven billion less people. (WorldMeters.info/World-Population puts today's population at 7.5 billion plus people. At 8000 BC, it was around five million; 1 AD, 200 million; and when America was less than 10 years old, the world finally reached a billion people.)

Manson, take it away...

"... for most of civilization, young men were the ones responsible for protecting society. By the time they were adults, they needed to be battle-hardened and physically strong — the survival of the community often depended on it. As a result, brutal, physical violence among men (through organized sport) was celebrated (and still is today, although this is beginning to change). And men who weren't able to make the cut were shamed for their physical weakness, for

their emotional displays and vulnerable demands for affection. Men were meant to be ruthlessly competitive, and emotionlessly self-contained.

"... this was the hidden cost for their physical, and later political dominance, in human society — as men, we are taught from a young age to hide from our emotions rather than to engage them."

Today, society has changed so much "in the past couple centuries that a few things are true now that weren't true before." (Men don't have to fight off lions, tigers or bears and other tribes who want to take your resources and women-folk.)

"... Men commit suicide at a rate five times that of women while teenage boys commit suicide nine times more often than girls. They are also diagnosed with depression and ADHD at a rate of 4-to-1 to girls the same age. Men make up 2/3 of the homeless population, are more than twice as likely to become alcoholics and are approximately three times more likely to become drug addicts. It's widely documented that men are far less likely to ask for professional help, medical or otherwise, even when experiencing significant health problems or depression."

The world changed, men have not.

What the heck, right? It's no big deal. It's just men. We are expendable. To read Mason article online, go to markmanson.net/whats-the-problem-with-men.

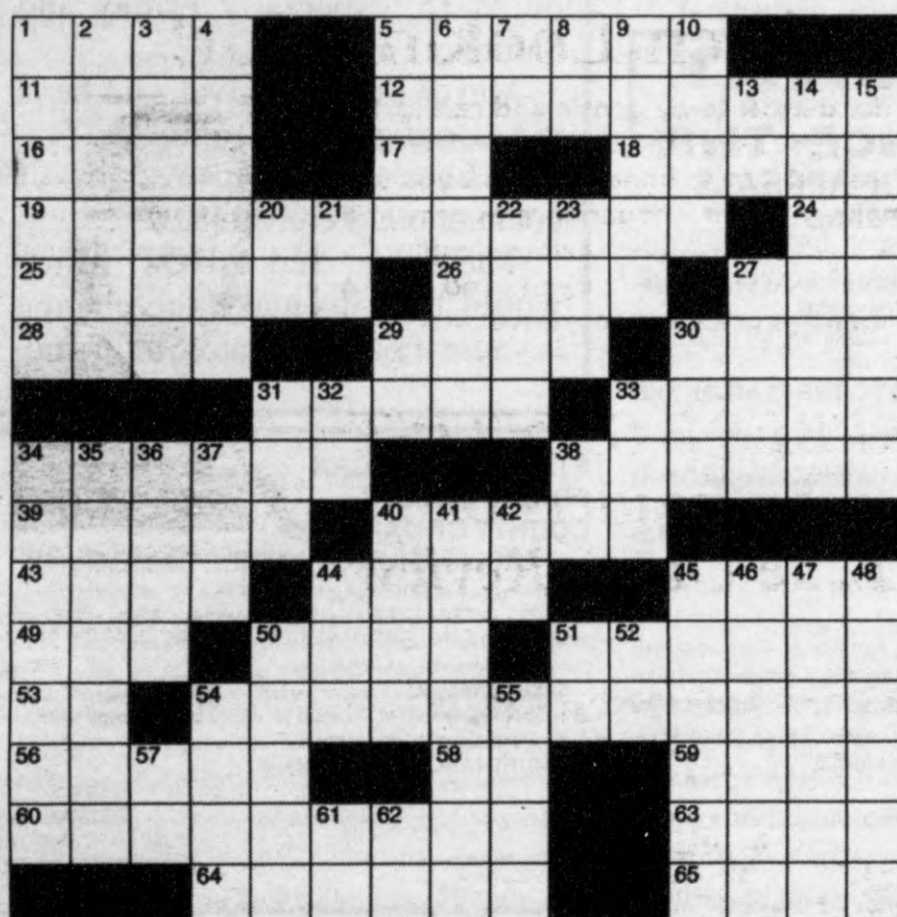

convincingly."

The Lady Wolves graduated seven from the team: Jessica Bennett, Kristin Bouchard, Maddy Dooling, Maddy Hannon, Chrysoula Kondyles, Kristen Page and Katie Schrei.

"They will be missed," said Huffer. "They showed great leadership and character. They are really good kids who worked hard and really led the team on and off the field which made it easy for me. I wish them nothing but the best moving forward. They will be hard to replace."

Huffer added they have quite a few players returning to next year's team and talented freshman coming in.

"It looks pretty promising," he said. "Moving up to the red division is going to be a lot more competitive so that will be a challenge."

He explained after this season the returners also have an idea of his style of playing soccer, which will help at the beginning of next spring.

"They are a lot more familiar with style of playing and systems we operate so we can hit the ground running," Huffer said. "We have a great group of girls returning along as well as a junior and senior who are really going to help us in the forward line."

He explained academy soccer also kicks in this year so many players will have to decide if they want to play for high school teams or play year round with the academy.

"I think quite a few other schools will be affected by it than we will be by it," Huffer said. "Troy Athens will lose 4-5 players to the academy. It will be a bit more even across the board because the academy has kicked in for travel soccer."

CJH wins annual Gordie Richardson meet

The Lady Wolves wrote their entry in the Clarkston history books as the eighth graders from Clarkston Junior High School won the 32nd Annual Gordie Richardson Oakland County Track meet, June .

"It was really fun," smiled Mattie Drennan. "Everyone was so excited. We felt at home with all of our teammates there. It is a very supportive group."

"I thought it was impossible," admitted Shannon Billette, who won the 800-meter run and was also on two relay teams to win first place. "I didn't think I would be able to do it."

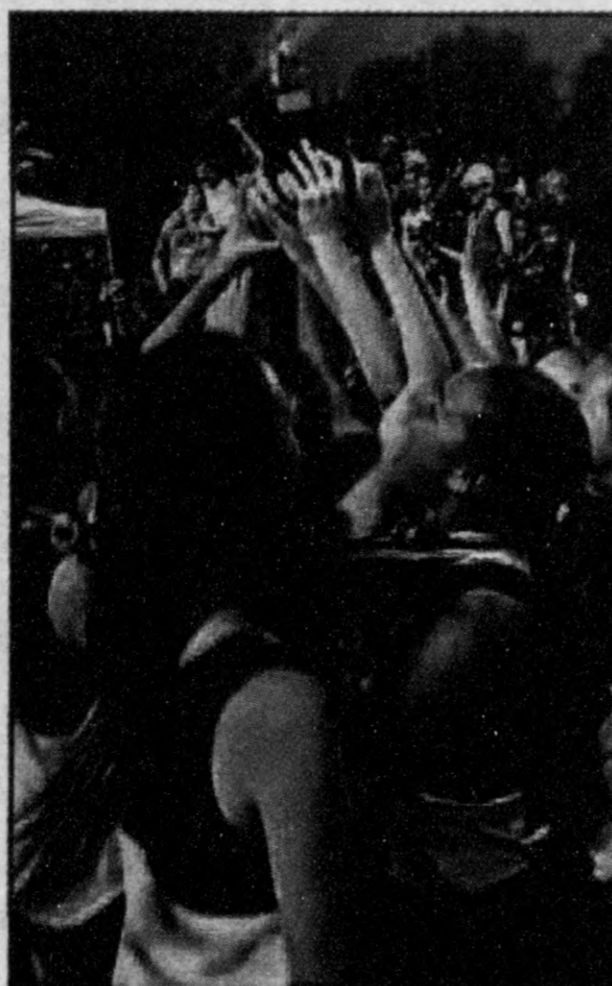
"It made it even better," Cooper smiled. The teammates explained they were nervous going into the meet.

"I was really nervous but the closer I got to my race I got more and more excited," Drennan said. "It helped me a lot to run with more competition. I think that's more of the reason I was excited - I could prove to myself I could do better."

"I was so nervous," Billette admitted. "I was also really excited because there would be a lot more competition at the meet than all our other meets. I was excited to see how I would do."

With over 30 teams at the Oakland County meet each athlete was concerned about a different team based on their strengths.

Billette and Drennan said Scripps Middle School was their competition for the distance

events. "They have a lot of strong runners on the team," Drennan added.

Cooper added for sprints she was worried about Oak Park.

Highlights of the day for the girls included the success they had in their individual events and the 1,600-meter relay team set a new record and also finished in first place.

"My mile was a big step for me," Drennan said about her fourth place finish. "All season I had been getting the same time over and over again. At county, I shaved off 17 seconds. It was exciting."

They added it was a really exciting spring season for the team as they also went undefeated at their dual meets.

Now they are ready to conquer as freshman when they compete with the Clarkston Girls Track and Field team at the high school next season.

"It gives me more confidence," Billette explained. "Now I know where I stand."

"It is definitely exciting to run with the older kids and see how they run," Cooper added. "They can help us if we need help on something. We can help them if they need help."

"This particular group of athletes is especially hard-working and selfless," said Coach Mike Greve. "Many of these girls sacrificed personal achievement for the accomplishments of the team. I couldn't be prouder of this group of athletes."

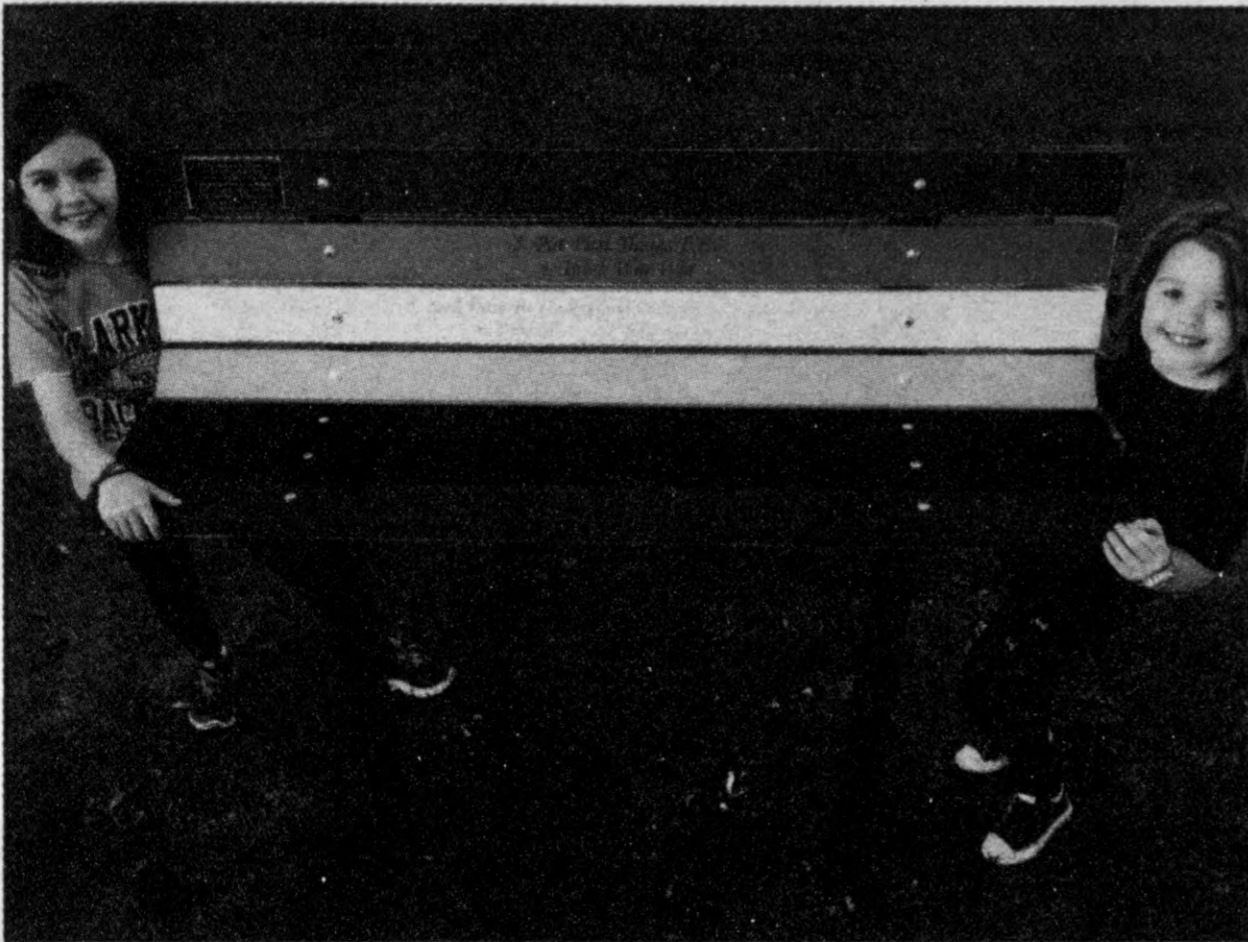

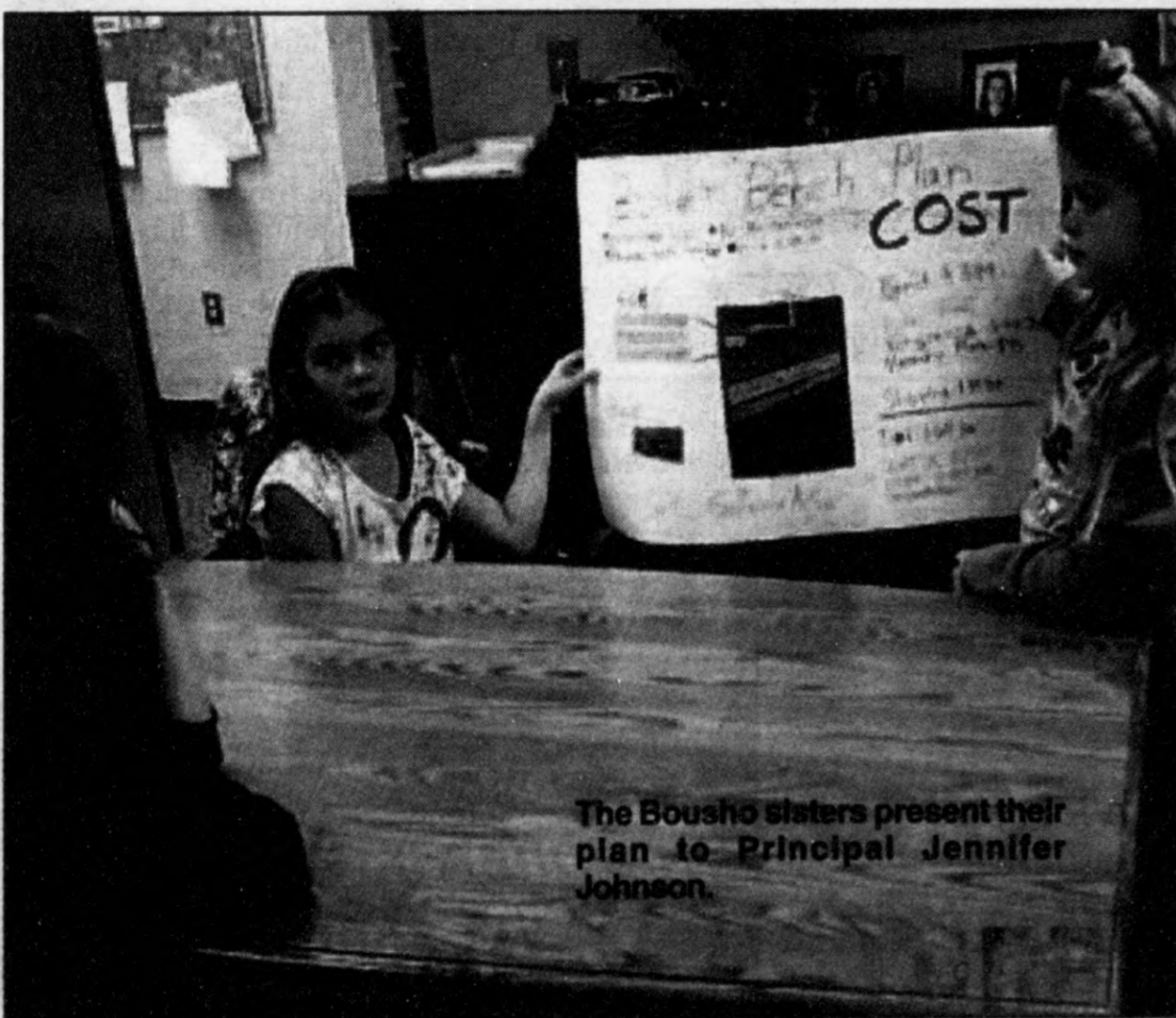

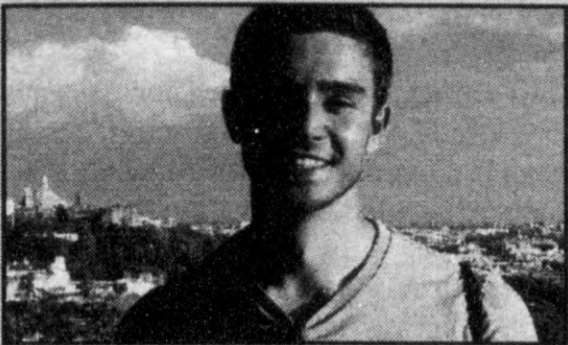

Marissa Lockwood will attend Cornerstone University in Grand Rapids.

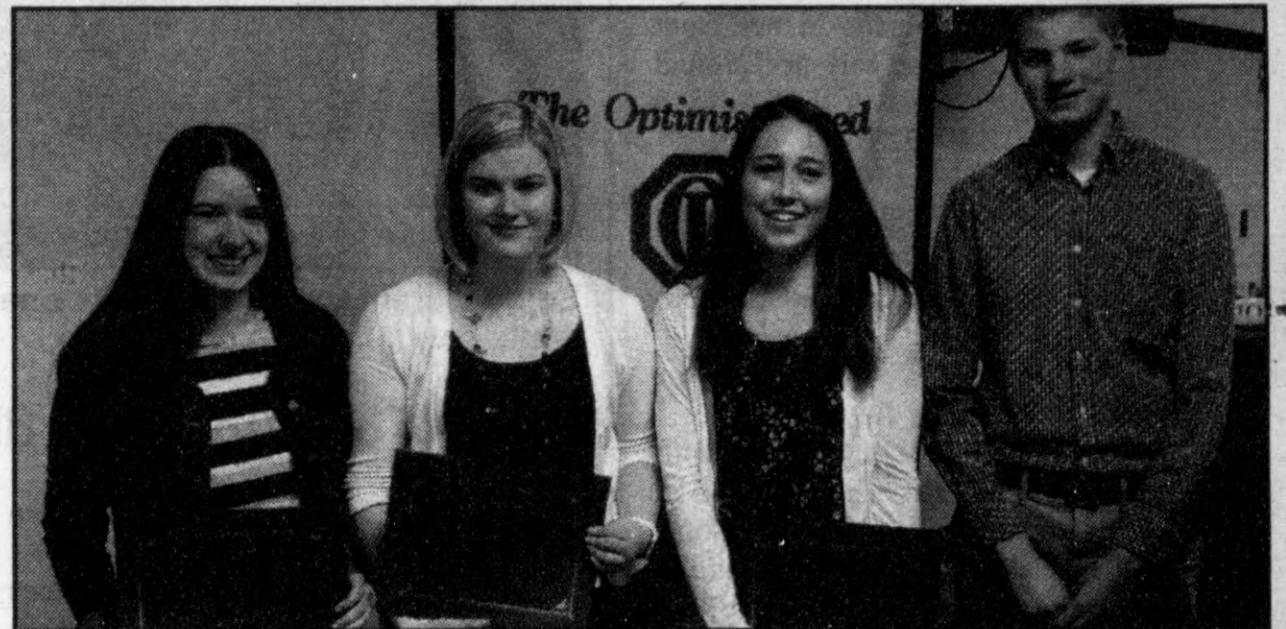

Foundation Math Award winner. At Senior Awards Night, he was awarded the Math Department Achievement Award.

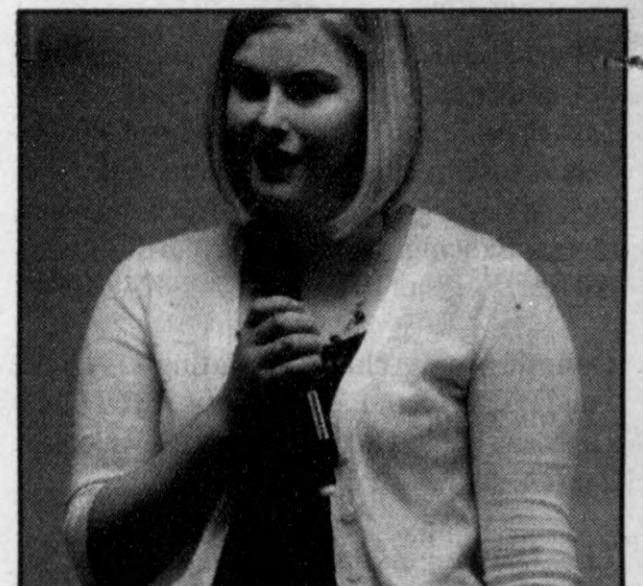

Sarah Snyder is heading to the University of Michigan as a Mechanical Engineering Major.

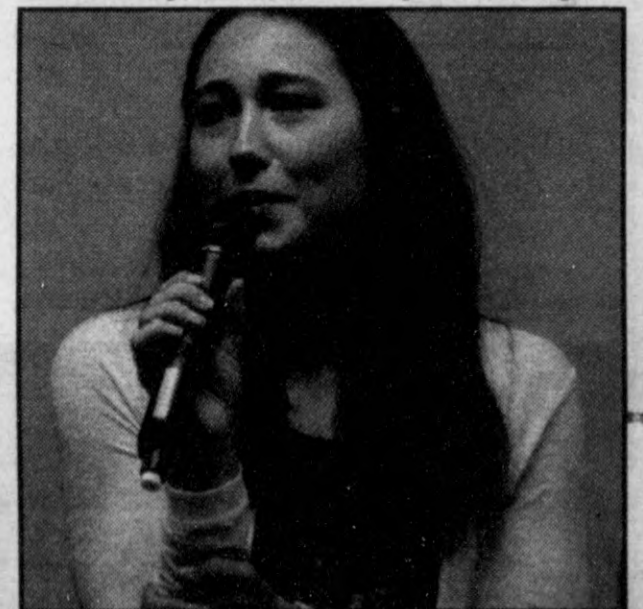

Smith said. "The interim city manager (Rich Little) didn't draw any salary. We were without a treasurer for 2-3 months."

The property tax millage rate is budgeted at 12.0966, down from 12.1056 this past year.

The city's maximum allowable millage for fiscal year 2017-2018 is 12.7876, rolled back from last year's 12.9168 due to the state Headlee law.

"The Headlee effect has really been kicking in these last four years," Smith said. "It's good for homeowners, bad for the city in terms of revenue."

With another reduction of 0.691 due to the city library millage resolution of 2014, the proposed millage rate for 2017-2018 is 12.0966. The library measure was passed as part of the campaign for the Clarkston Independence District Library.

"The wording is somewhat in dispute - was it intended to be in place for one year or every year," Smith asked.

The issue may be addressed by the Finance Committee over the next year, he said.

The measure was enacted to avoid double taxation of residents, said resident Lorry Mahler during the public hearing.

"It's very clear," Mahler said.

"It was never the city's money to spend," said Council member Sue Wylie. "We're just channeling it to the library."

"The letter of the law says to reduce it," Percival said.

Clarkston's taxable property value after the state Proposal A cap is \$40,833,740, up 3.57 percent from last year. Tax revenue, which is the millage rate times taxable value divided by 1,000, equals \$493,949, up \$16,665 from last year's \$477,284.

"Home values are coming back," Smith said. "Taxable value is limited by Proposal A - the rate of inflation or five percent, whichever is less."

The state law was passed to make sure people weren't taxed out of their homes when property values increased, he said.

Funding from the state is budgeted at \$75,000, unchanged from last year.

negative growth (in state revenue sharing) over the last 10 years," Smith said. "They're essentially using funds usually directed to communities on its own revenue growth. Unfortunately, we don't see that changing anytime soon."

Spending projects discussed but not included in the budget include full milling of Miller Road before paving, \$34,000; \$6,000 for additional sidewalk replacement, \$420,000 for long term requirement; \$60,000 for additional road paving, \$1.17 million for long term requirement; new office computers, \$21,000; and playground upgrades and marsh walkway in Depot Park, \$12,000.

Council member Eric Haven, member of the Friends of Depot Park committee, said adding \$6,000 to the budget for a parks and recreation plan could yield grant funding from the state Department of Natural Resources.

Percival agreed with the recommendation.

"We're just spinning our wheels here if we don't get the park plan in place," the mayor said. "We can get that plan done and move forward with soliciting for grants."

The final budget will be presented to city council at its June 26 meeting. The city must pass its budget by the end of June, according to state law.

"We're a little late getting this to you but it's still within the statute," said Smith, who is working on his first budget as city manager along with new Treasurer Greg Cote.
