

# More restaurants up for redevelopment on M-15

The new FED restaurant, now open for business on South Main Street, isn't the only M-15 eatery up for something new.

The Old Detroit Burger Bar is ready to start renovations on the former Nickelodeon restaurant on M-15, north of Rattalee Lake Road.

"That Nickelodeon's been such an eyesore for so long, it'll be nice to get something in there that's kept up," said Pat Kittle, Independence Township supervisor.

The township issued a building permit last week to renovate the 4,085-square-foot restaurant at 10081 Ortonville Road, and work can now start, said Brian Oppmann, township zoning administrator.

"It's just a basic building permit to renovate the structure," Oppmann said.

The M-15 location has been vacant for more than 10 years. Old Detroit Burger Bar is based in Oxford with locations in Lake Orion, Lapeer, Clawson, Troy, and Farmington. They're looking to open later this year.

"He has got a little business model where he picks up

older facilities and renovates them," Kittle said. "They serve very good food at a very fair price. It'll be good stuff."

The Dairy Queen at 5890 S. Main Street will also be redeveloped - the 1,500-square-foot building is up for sale.

"It's in amazing condition. Everything is new or newer," said Pam Ford Morgan of Morgan and Milzow. "It's a sweet opportunity for someone who wants something yummy."



# Workers busy with summer school construction

Almost a year since voters approved a \$75.98 million bond for technology and building improvements, workers are tearing up and replacing parking lots and fields at Andersonville Elementary, Springfield Plains, Bailey Lake and Clarkston High School.

Andersonville's updates will use \$1,753,000 of bond funds for a new parking lot and an updated safe and secure entrance. Work is ongoing for the parking lot, which will provide separation between the parent and bus drop-off loop.

Interior renovations are ongoing as well, said Jessica Kimmel of Clarkston Community Schools.

Springfield Plains Elementary is also getting a new parking lot, as well as an updated playground. These updates cost \$1,491,000 and sitework is ongoing for both.

Bailey Lake Elementary will also have a new parking lot and an updated safe and secure entrance. The cost is \$1,496,000 and work is ongoing for both.

Clarkston High School is updating its sports stadium. Total cost for this project is \$1,225,000.

New turf has been installed and detail work is currently underway. There will also be a new track and a new field event area at the stadium.

Track surfacing will start soon and the event area is almost complete.

Two bond project bid packages were accepted in March. Most of the construction work will be done during the summer, with work on the high school field finished by the first football game.

School officials are planning to bring bids for 2018 bond projects to the board in November or December of 2017.

#### Parks master plan

Independence Township Parks, Recreation and Seniors Department hosts a Five-Year Master Plan Community Open House, July 27 from 6-8 p.m. at the newly renovated Brady Lodge in Bay Court Park.

The informal discussion will be about the future of township park facilities and amenities, recreation programs and events, and safety paths and trails.

Results of the discussion, as well as a survey at www.surveymonkey.com/ ParksRecSeniors2018Plan, will be used when creating the new master plan.

#### School hires

Clarkston Board of Education approved six additions and subtractions to Clarkston Community Schools instructional staff, July 10.

A psychologist, \$41,802; learning resource center teacher, \$38,087; elementary Spanish, \$41,802; and Spanish teacher, \$41,802, were added. Bailey Lake Elementary added a kindergarten teacher, \$41,802, and Sashabaw Middle School added a science teacher, \$38,087.

A physics teacher, \$84,438, resigned from Clarkston High School, a school psychologist \$84,438, resigned, as did two shared services teachers, \$23,252 and \$14,517. Two media specialists were laid-off due to an elimination of their position, one at North Sashabaw Elementary, \$64,087, and one who worked at Independence Elementary and Andersonville Elementary, \$86,553.

There were also two subtractions from the schools' support staff. An early childhood teacher resigned from the Early Childhood Center and the Lead Caregiver at Andersonville Elementary retired.

## FED restaurant open to all

When the FED Community restaurant at 15 S. Main Street opened its doors for a soft opening, July 6, even those who knew the building best barely recognized it.

"I can't believe it. It's absolutely beautiful," said Dawn M. Horner, retail banking executive vice president for Clarkston State Bank, former occupant. "They did an awesome job. It's hard to envision where all the offices were. The basement is phenomenal. It's really beautiful."

"It really is something. I haven't seen it since they sold the building," said J. Grant Smith, president and CEO of Clarkston State Bank. "It looks fantastic. They did a really good job. The old stone walls are great. A lot of work went into it."

The teller desks, offices and conference rooms of the bank are long gone, replaced with open spaces, high ceilings, skylights, and table settings of the FED, which celebrated its grand opening July 14. The main walk-in bank vault remained, converted into a dining room.

"We're so happy and excited to be finally here," said Sarah Schneider, who owns the restaurant with her husband James Schneider.

Sarah redesigned the entire interior.

"We gutted it to the studs," she said. "Every solitary corner was a labor of love."

The globally inspired menu includes Asian chicken, double-double cheeseburgers, tortilla soup, and many other ingredient-driven items.

# City outsources engineering services

City residents in need of building inspection services will be served out of Springfield Township under an interim outsourcing contract.

City Council approved the two-month interim agreement for building administration and inspection consulting services with Code Enforcement Services, a division of Carlisle Wortman Associates, its regular planning consultant.

The \$2,000-per-month contract was approved on a trial basis to replace Jennifer Miller, former code enforcement officer who left on June 23, said City Manager Jonathan Smith.

"If it works well, we could stay with it," Smith said.

Springfield Township outsources its code enforcement services with the Carlisle Wortman company, as does Rose Township, Smith said.

"It's a proven process. It's worked well in the other municipalities and I think it will work well for us too," he said. Code Enforcement Services, represented by Craig Strong and Richard K. Carlisle, will provide building code administration and building inspection services; receive and process building, sign, electric, plumbing, mechanical, and other permit applications; assist with collection fees; distribute approved building plans to trade inspectors; review applications; process open permits; receive and respond to any Freedom of Information Act requests, state complaints, or similar matters under supervision of the city clerk.

Outsourcing makes no difference in regards to FOIA, the city manager said.

According to the interim agreement, "all documents or other materials prepared by the consultant under this agreement shall be considered the property of the client (the city)."

The contractual provisions support the proposition these records are subject to FOIA and are the city's records open to public inspection, said Robin Luce Herrmann, Michigan Press Association attorney and FOIA expert.

City Council mistakenly voted on June 26 to approve two contracts – the \$2,000/month agreement with Code Enforcement Division and a \$785/month retainer contracting with Craig Strong.

The city only needed to approve one of them, Smith said.

"There was a misunderstanding on the two contracts – it should have been one or the other," Smith said. "I apologize for the confusion."

City Council voted at its July 10 meeting to rescind the \$785/month contract.

The approved contract also includes insurance, as well as fees for attendance of any scheduled planning commission, city council, and board of appeals meetings as requested by the city – \$95/hour for principal; \$85/hour for building official; \$40/hour for clerical. Meetings during regular business hours are covered by the retainer.

"The law in Michigan is that a public body cannot 'contract away' their FOIA responsibilities," Herrmann said. "The true test will be when the FOIA requests are made and responded to."

## City suit

The state Court of Appeals rejected a motion by the Michigan Municipal League and Michigan Townships Association to file an amicus curiae brief on behalf of the City of the Village of Clarkston because it was filed too late, July 7.

However, lawyers for MML and MTA filed a Motion for Leave to File Tardy Motion to File an Amicus Curiae Brief in the case of Susan Bisio vs. the City of the Village of Clarkston.

The lawsuit stems from a FOIA request Susan sent to the city on June 7, 2015, requesting documents from Jan. 30, 2015, to May 20, 2015, between City Attorney Thomas Ryan and other attorneys and agencies related to 148 N. Main Street and a hold-harmless agreement for its development, as well as vacant property at M-15 and Waldon.

Bisio is appealing an October 2016 decision by Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Leo Bowman, which said some of them were not public.

Bisio issued a response to the motion, saying the government associations had 21 days to file, with a deadline of May 31; that Clarkston is part of the MML so the group is already involved; and does not offer relevant information.

#### Importance of travel

It's been awhile since I've been in Clarkston. My articles continued to show up in the paper, so everything's probably seemed normal for you subscribers out there, but I've actually been on vacation.

I travelled down south of the border to the beautiful country of Peru and hiked the 26-mile-long Inca Trail to Machu Picchu.

Trekking through places such as a cloud forest and the forebodingly named

Warmiwañusqa (Dead Women's Pass), my friend and I spent four days isolated from the outside world, camping in the mountainous jungles of the Andes.



Aside from the great adventure of it all, visiting

Peru and being immersed in the culture was a humbling experience.

Everyone can benefit from traveling to new places and realizing the sheer size of the world and how life in another place is completely different from your own. Yet these people still have jobs, families, responsibilities, worries, hopes, and dreams, just like you.

Tourism is a large industry in Peru, especially around Cusco, where I spent most of my time when I wasn't on the trail. Many locals work as tour and trail guides, porters, drivers and trail cooks.

Our trail guide Martín had extensive knowledge of Incan history and local flora and fauna, as well as being able to communicate in many languages including Spanish, French, English and German.

During the trip we practiced our Spanish, learned that Inca actually refers to the leaders of the tribe—the subjects are the Quechua people—and experienced the difficulty of hiking up a mountain.

Hiking doesn't sound too bad until you hike up 4,000 feet and down 3,000 all before lunch. It was certainly an experience worth having, though probably only once. It was a vacation that allowed me to feel accomplished and get a fresh perspective on the world outside of America.

Though traveling to new places in general is a great learning experience, I encourage you to go off the beaten path and travel somewhere other than a resort town or major city, especially outside the United States.

I've found big cities are similar, there's not many differences between NYC, London and Lima. But having a one-of-a-kind experience, such as hiking the Inca Trail, can change perceptions and allows us to view our lives through a new lens.

## Township news

The Independence Township Board voted, July 11, to approve a bid to repair the driveway and sections of curb surrounding Fire Station 2. The bid was approved for an amount not to exceed \$53,600.

The Township Board approved sponsorship funding for the Clarkston Area Youth Assistance (CAYA) at their July 11 meeting.

The board will provide \$5,000 to CAYA this year, a \$1,000 increase from recent years. The increase is due to a growth in CAYA's programs. CAYA offers programs and services for youth and families in Clarkston. They work to prevent and reduce juvenile delinquency.

A Memorandum of Understanding between the Charter Township of Independence and the Clarkston Cultural Arts Council (CCAC) was approved by the township board, July 11.

The memorandum provides \$4,000 in funding to the CCAC for set-up and site preparation for the Detroit Institute of Arts (DIA) 2017 InsidelOut Program.

The program will be on display throughout the township from August through October. Municipalities and businesses that take part in the program will be featured on an interactive map on the DIA's website and promoted on social media. CCAC will offer guided walking tours of the art installations.

Independence Township will be getting new voting equipment for future elections. Funding for the new election voting system will be provided by the State of Michigan and the Federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA). No matching funds will be required from Independence Township.

The new equipment includes 13 Verity Precinct Scanners, 12 Verity Touch Writers (Accessible Voting System) and a Verity Central Package (Election Management System Software).

Funds previously budgeted for the equipment will be used to purchase an Absent Voter Counting Board High-Speed Scanner and two additional Verity Precinct Scanners at discounted pricing from Hart InterCivic, the company providing the state and HAVA funded equipment. \*\*\*

The township board approved all future scheduled township meetings to start at 6 p.m. The meetings will also include budget discussions on July 25, Aug. 22 and Sept. 19.

Trustee Ron Ritchie said the time change is mostly for convenience, but an earlier start will also allow the board to get more accomplished in one night.







skill levels are encouraged to come out and play. It is a comfortable environment; the more experienced players are always willing to help out the new players and to teach them the rules.


New players are invited to enter a supportive community eager to teach the rules and other intricacies of the game they love.







After two tries, the senior at Clarkston High School earned the highest possible composite score on his ACT, 36 out of 36.

"I was feeling good coming out of it," said Osborn, son of Scott and Catherine Osborn. "I was expecting a 35, not a 36."

He found AP English provided good preparation for the test.

"Definitely, my teachers helped my reading comprehension," he said. "The ACT is really a reading test, really close reading of what you need to know, really quickly, so you have time to go back and check your answers."

He took the test as a 10th grader and again in his junior year.

"I did pretty well the first couple times," he said.


He took the test the third time with his sister, Allison, 14, who was taking it for the

"Mom made me go," Justin said.

"I didn't do as well, but I'll take it again," Allison said.

According to ACT Chief Executive Officer Marten Roorda, less than one tenth of one percent of students who take the ACT earn a top score. In the U.S. high school graduating class of 2016, only 2,235 out of nearly 2.1 million graduates who took the ACT earned a composite score of 36.

The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading, and science, each scored on a scale of 1-36. A student's composite score is the average of the four test scores.

ACT-taking tips from Justin include don't stress out, know what you're going into, be prepared; you don't have to necessarily study, but you have to know what you're doing; be prepared for a long test with a lot of reading; and know you have to do a lot quickly, and be able to understand what they're asking.


Justin is a four-year Varsity member of the Clarkston High School Ski Team, Pinnacle Ski Racing Team member, Eagle Scout, four-time winner of the Clarkston Foundation Math and Science awards, National Merit Scholarship qualifier, and National Honor Society member.

"Maybe I have a shot," he said.

"Maybe rockets. That would be cool," he said.










Coach Kyle Hughes was happy to report (and thank everyone) Team RUSH raised the most they ever have - \$45,513.





### **New loading zone**

The city is moving forward with plans to make three parking spots on the south side of West Washington Street into a loading zone from 8 a.m.-3 p.m.

# More to student success than test scores, officials say

Students in Clarkston range from 46%-73% for meeting state benchmarks on standardized tests, such as the M-STEP, but that's just part of the story, said Elizabeth Egan, Board of Education president.

Student success after high school can be found in a number of fields, Egan said, from construction to dance to engineering.

"We all excel somewhere based on practice and passion. We are bringing a greater commitment to skilled trades, fine and performing arts, and the Whole Child Initiative as well as college readiness in our schools," she said. "Our board has been and continues to advocate for a greater understanding of individual student growth."

The M-STEP is designed to measure how well students meet State Education Standards. Clarkston Community Schools prioritize focusing on the individual talents and strengths of each student and the Whole Child Initiative, she said.

"We understand fully that each of our students has individual needs, interests, passions, and brilliance," Superintendent Rod Rock said in an email. "We are working very hard to expand opportunities for our students to learn and grow."

Rock said several new programs are being implemented throughout the school district, including broadening career and technical education, offering more coding classes, starting a trades program at the junior high and world language at the elementary level and partnering with University of Michigan-Flint for early college, among others.

The state may follow Clarkston's lead with attention on the social, emotional and physical well-being of students in addition to their academics, he said.

Deputy Superintendent Shawn Ryan said, according to the state, the M-STEP is going to be replaced by a more reliable, user-friendly assessment, which will give educators and parents a better sense of student progress.

Though student population is going down in Clarkston, along with all over the county, these resources give the district a unique quality.

"We are fortunate in Clarkston in that we have a desirable community for families to live and students to learn," Egan said.

The student data, or Clarkston By the Numbers, reflect test results from the 2015-2016 school year.

Of the 7,511 Clarkston student scores included for the English Language Arts M-Step, 61 percent scored proficient. For math, 49 percent scored proficient. Clarkston rated ninth in Oakland County for ELA and 13th in math.

For grades 3-8 in ELA, Clarkston is above the county average and saw a two percent increase from the 2014-2015 school year. Three out of five students are considered proficient. In math, Clarkston is just below the county average, though there is a 1 percent gain from the 2014-2015 school year and one of two students are considered proficient.

For the ninth grade PSAT ELA 78 percent of Clarkston students meet the college and career readiness benchmarks, which is 8 percent above the county average and 9 percent below the highest rated district. Four out of five are considered college ready. For math Clarkston is at 58 percent, which is

above the county average by 4 percent and three out of five students are considered college ready.

In the 10th grade PSAT ELA, 73 percent of Clarkston students meet the college and career readiness benchmarks, which is above the county average by 4 percent and students dropped more than the county average from ninth grade. Five out of seven students are considered college ready.

In math, Clarkston is at 46 percent, which is 1 percent below the county average and students dropped more from the previous

year than the county average. One out of two are considered college ready.

In the 11th grade SAT ELA, 70 percent of Clarkston students meet the college and career readiness benchmarks, which is above the county average by 2 percent. Students dropped 4 percent from the previous year: 7 out of 10 students are considered college ready.

For math, Clarkston is at 49 percent, which is above the county average by 1 percent and students increased 2 percent from the previous year. One out of two students are considered college ready.
